

Supervisor Is Named For Lincoln

John M. Hall, a forester and wildlife expert with the Southwestern Regional Office of the U. S. Forest Service in Albuquerque, is the new supervisor for the Lincoln National Forest in southern New Mexico, the Forest on which he began his career in 1937.

Hall's appointment, he succeeds the retired Russ Rea—was announced by Regional Forester William D. Hurst. Hurst said Hall would assume his supervisor duties in Alamogordo Feb. 26. Since 1961 Hall has been chief of the wildlife branch, Division of Range and Wildlife. His first Forest Service job was as a range examiner on the Mayhill District of the Lincoln. A year later he enrolled at Utah State University, graduating in 1943 with a degree in forest and range management. He worked for the Forest Service part-time while in school. From 1943 to 1948 Hall served in the Navy, taking part in many of the island actions in the Pacific during World War II. He was discharged as a Lieutenant Commander. The Eagar, Ariz. native returned to the Forest Service in 1948 but a few months later accepted a position with the Arizona Game and Fish Department where he conducted Arizona's first elk study. He was federal aid coordinator, chief of game management, and from 1952 to 1958, director of the department.

Hall rejoined the Forest Service in the Albuquerque Regional Office as a wildlife biologist in 1958 and was assigned to wildlife posts on the Apache National Forest in Arizona and the Gila National Forest in southwest New Mexico before assuming his current duties. Capitan Elects Schuster To Board; Stevenson At 'Zozo'







Machines Will Never Take Place Of Teachers In The Classroom

Editor's Note: This is another in a series of articles concerning education and school topics we have asked be prepared for our readers.

By GEORGE P. WHITE (Ruidoso School Superintendent) It would be quite easy to offer some optimistic arguments about what education and the blending of technology will produce by, say 1970 or 1980. One could start with the notion that computer-assisted instruction will replace teachers and solve most of our educational problems. Witness the following quote of John W. Laughary, "Fifth Graders in East Palo Alto, California who are learning from computers can't resist the temptation. At least three times a week, when the computer asks a child to type his name, it comes up Batman. Similarly, when the computer asks the pupil for his drill

code number, he will type in 007. With no sense of humor, but with infinite patience, the computer answers, that is not on my list. Try again."

Yes, the new technology has discovered that education is big and a rapidly changing business. No, the impact of technology on education will not be as rapid as many people suppose.

Change in education is more apt to be evolutionary than revolutionary because technology is in competition with the role of the teacher. Education and technology promise more than they deliver today, the majority of teacher colleges have been designed for stability of operation and not for rapid adaptation and change, and the commitment in dollars required to accelerate the pace of change appears to be more than we are willing to pay. For these reasons, most of the schools of 1970 through 1980 will still look much like they do today.

Planning Panel Discusses Ideas On Subdivisions

By MARC VALEN (Ruidoso News Staff Writer) Design and construction standards for new subdivisions should not be part of an ordinance but should be a matter of policy referred to by the ordinance. Ray Chambers of Chambers and Campbell gave this advice to a meeting of the Village of Ruidoso Planning Commission Tuesday evening. He stated this would give the commission more flexibility in changing these standards. Chambers and Campbell has been engaged by the Planning Commission to suggest further goals for expansion and to update existing village ordinances and policies.

Chambers submitted suggestions for design and construction standards that the committee agreed would be beneficial to both the subdivision and the village. One of these is that a standard would be set for the size pipe used in both the water and sewer system of the subdivision. However, if the commission feels that a larger size pipe is in the interest of the system, to serve other areas as well, the village will stand the difference in cost. Chambers felt also that the new standards should clearly state that the developers should pay all costs of extending water and sewer facilities from existing sources to the subdivision.

The subdivision would also be responsible for paying all costs for extending these facilities to the end of its holdings.

Chambers suggested fire hydrants be of equal space along the street leading to the dwellings in the subdivision. The present ordinance provides for the hydrants to be within a certain radius of each other. Standards would be set for storm drainage as well. Jack Kennedy presented a plan for a proposed new subdivision to be called Enchanted Mesa. The developers are Mrs. Virginia George and Jerry Keaton. The entrance would be near the Sun Valley Road. Eighty acres would be developed into two and a half acre to ten acre lots.



ORDINANCE NO. 67-2
AN ORDINANCE ADOPTING A
FIRE PREVENTION CODE
PRESCRIBING REGULATIONS
GOVERNING CONDITIONS
HAZARDOUS TO LIFE AND
PROPERTY FROM FIRE OR
EXPLOSION AND REPEALING
ORDINANCE NO. 93 AND ALL
OTHER ORDINANCES IN
CONFLICT HEREBY

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE
GOVERNING BODY OF THE VIL-
LAGE OF RUIDOSO:

Section 1. Adoption of Fire Pre-
vention Code.

There is hereby adopted by the Village of Ruidoso, Lincoln County, New Mexico, for the purpose of prescribing regulations governing conditions hazardous to life and property from fire or explosion, that certain code known as the Fire Prevention Code, Abbreviated Edition, recommended by the American Insurance Association, being particularly the 1965 edition thereof and the whole thereof, including all future amendments thereto and all future Abbreviated Editions thereof, unless otherwise amended in the future by the governing body of the Village of Ruidoso; of which code not less than one (1) copy has been and now is filed in the office of the Clerk of the Village of Ruidoso and the same is hereby adopted and incorporated as fully as if set out at length herein, and from the date on which this ordinance shall take effect, the provisions thereof shall be controlling within the limits of the Village of Ruidoso.

Section 2. Enforcement—

The code hereby adopted shall be enforced by the Chief of the Fire Department.

Section 3. Definition—

Wherever the word "Municipality" is used in the code hereby adopted, it shall be held to mean the Village of Ruidoso.

Section 4. Modification—

The Chief of the Fire Department shall have power to modify any of the provisions of the code hereby adopted upon application in writing by the owner or lessee, or his duly authorized agent, when there are practical difficulties in the way of carrying out the strict letter of the code, provided that the spirit of the code shall be observed, public safety secured, and substantial justice done. The particulars of such modification when granted or allowed, and the decision of the Chief of the Fire Department thereon shall be entered upon the records of the department and a signed copy shall be furnished the applicant.

Section 5. Appeals—

Whenever the Chief of the Fire Department shall disapprove an application or refuse to grant a permit applied for, or when it is claimed that the provisions of the code do not apply or that the true intent and meaning of the code have been misconstrued or wrongly interpreted, the applicant may appeal from the decision of the Chief of the Fire Department to the governing body within 30 days from the date of the decision appealed.

a. Any person who shall violate any of the provisions of the code hereby adopted or fail to comply therewith, or who shall violate or fail to comply with any order made thereunder, or who shall build in violation of any detailed statement of specifications or plans submitted and approved thereunder, or any certificate or permit issued thereunder, and from which no appeal has been taken, or who shall fail to comply with such an order as affirmed or modified by the governing body or by a court of competent jurisdiction, within the time fixed herein, shall severally for each and every such violation and non-compliance, respectively, be guilty of a misdemeanor, punishable by a fine of not more than \$300.00 or by imprisonment for not more than 90 days or by both such fine and imprisonment. The imposition of one penalty for any violation shall not excuse the violation or permit it to continue; and all such persons shall be required to correct or remedy such violations or defects within a reasonable time; and when not otherwise specified, each ten days that prohibited conditions are maintained shall constitute a separate offense.

b. The application of the above penalty shall not be to prevent the enforced removal of prohibited conditions.

Section 7. Repeal of Conflicting Ordinances—

Ordinance No. 93 and all other former ordinances or parts thereof of conflicting or inconsistent with the provisions of this ordinance or of the code hereby adopted are hereby repealed.

Section 8. Validity—

The governing body hereby declares that should any section, paragraph, sentence, or word of this ordinance or of the code hereby adopted be declared for any reason to be invalid, it is the intent of the governing body that it would have passed all other portions of this ordinance independent of the elimination herefrom of any such portion as may be declared invalid.

Section 9. Authority—

This ordinance is adopted by authority contained in Section 16-9, New Mexico Statutes Annotated, 1953 Compilation, relating to codes adopted and enforced by reference.

Section 10. Date of Effect—

This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its approval as required by law.




