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

As Part of Program for Art Symposium

Sewer Assessment District Set Up

A total of \$170,500 has been approved by the United States Department of Housing and Development to help defray the costs of the Village of Ruidoso's proposed Sanitary Sewer District No. 2. At a meeting Feb. 7 the Board of Trustees of the Village of Ruidoso voted to approve and adopt the grant and proceed to put into action the Sewer Assessment District No. 2. The remaining cost would be paid for by the property owners concerned depending on the size of their holding. A legal notice in today's News gives full details on the project to serve about 1,000 lots in Ruidoso.

The trustees also voted to reduce the speed limit throughout the village to 25 miles per hour from 30 miles per hour unless the street is marked otherwise. The ruling will not affect Sudderth or Mechem Drives.

Johnny Durham was given permission to rent space in the municipal airport to operate the charter facilities of Alpine Aviation which he recently acquired. The name will be changed to Sierra Blanca Aviation.

Durham also received permission to operate a car rental service. The rental service would not be connected with any national concern. However, Durham stated that he would charge the rental service to anyone holding a national credit card, and he would bill these people directly. Durham's offer to pay the village ten per cent of the rental fee for any vehicle a Village employee rented, was accepted. This amount was to be in addition to the rent he would pay for the office space. Durham agreed to give the Village a letter of release from all liability for the Village employees moving his cars.

In other business before the Board of Trustees Darrell Scott, former Village employee who had been in the service was hired to work with Airport Superintendent Frank Potter. Tom Jasper, a local realtor, was appointed to serve on the Village Planning Commission to replace Charlie Hardister. The trustees also went on record as favoring daylight savings time.

Assisting in sponsorship of the first annual Southwestern Art Symposium—scheduled here four days during the Easter season, March 24-28-29-30 will be one of the nation's most prominent artists, and Lincoln county's own—Peter Hurd of Sentinel Ranch near San

Patricio.

Also, as an added incentive to bring attendees from a wide area will be the presentation of one-act plays by members of the drama department of The University of New Mexico. Whether there will be two one-act plays given one night, or one each night for two nights, is yet to be determined by the program committee.

These two announcements were heard at a planning meeting held Thursday last week at the Chaparral Motor Hotel when members of the Lincoln County Art Association, staging the event, set up some committees and discussed some arrangements.

Mrs. John Hall was named general chairman for the symposium. Members of the executive committee and others in the association are to be called on to assist in the various details. Mrs. Roy Lare will head up a committee to write invitations to university and college art departments, art associations and individuals to take part on the program, or to attend for instruction. Demonstrations, lectures, displays and round-tables will be held on various kinds of paintings and mediums in the four-day program. Mrs. Lare will be assisted in the latter writing chores by Mmes. H. W. McKenzie and Amelia Anderson.

David Travis will head a committee to seek displays from art supply companies.

Till Watts, acting president of the Lincoln County Art Association, presided in the two-hour session in which a registration fee for the four days of \$15 was approved, and a 20% commission would be charged for paintings on exhibit at the symposium that are sold here. The symposium will be held in the convention center of the Chaparral, and there will be exhibits by artists from all over the southwest. There will be no hanging fee charged for the paintings, and the public will be invited to view them during certain times, the hours to be announced.

The news of Hurd's participation came from C. E. Van Broecker who reported he and Walt Higgins had secured permission to use his name during a luncheon last Thursday noon here. Hurd will also have some of his paintings on exhibit.

Van Broecker said he had secured a plot from two state governmental agencies, the Department of Development and the New Mexico Art Commission and the art department of the University of New Mexico, to help co-sponsor the symposium. He said the Department of Development had arranged for the display of 29 paintings from members of the Taos art association during the program. Travis reported that he also had the promise that New Mexico State University art department heads would have paintings on display here.

Art departments of New Mexico, Arizona and Texas colleges and universities will receive invitations to have parts on the program or to attend as spectators, and to hang paintings in the show.

Art associations throughout the Southwest may stage exhibits of their own in private places of business in the community at the time of the symposium, it was agreed.

The news of the drama department from UNM bringing the plays here was announced by D. Masters, student assistant in the department, who said there would be no charge to the symposium to present the plays—but that admission could be charged and funds would go to the symposium's expenses. He added that the drama department hopes to bring some semi-professional actors back to Ruidoso in the summer for week-end programs of light comedy, on the order of the latter project is only in a preliminary discussion and is yet to be determined, he declared.

Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce will assist the Lincoln County Art Association in sponsorship and arrangements for the symposium, it was reported in the meeting.

Other business included appointment of Bill Hies to take over the work of a series of programs for the association's regular meetings the next several months. Among projects later this year will be a June Art Festival in the spring, plans and arrangements to be worked on at a later date.

Dog Packs Plague Valley Ranchers

Don Bonnell, Ruidoso Valley rancher reported this week that his cattle and particularly small calves are being attacked and injured by packs of wild dogs roaming the area. Bonnell has a ranch in the area of the old Nelson School and near the garbage dump in that area, and reported that his cattle had ears and tails chewed off by these packs of dogs and some have even been killed by the dog packs. Bonnell said he and other ranchers in that area are forced to defend their cattle, and the only way they can do it is by setting traps and killing the dogs. He said he has received permission from the Forest Service authorities in Ruidoso to trap the dogs. Bonnell himself says he has dogs of his own, but they do not roam around loose. He said owners of dogs in the Ruidoso Downs and valley areas let their dogs run loose and also when their dogs have pups, these pups are taken to the garbage dump and left to fend for themselves. Bonnell said he hopes something can be done to eliminate this dog pack problem.

The Humane Society of Lincoln County in a meeting held Wednesday night this week at Whispering Pine Coffee Shop discussed this problem, then voted to assist the owners of the dogs that were trapped and killed in their efforts to get the district attorney to investigate and prosecute those responsible for the inhumane killings.



Last year for the first time we visited the interesting Indian Walls area located in an arroyo tumbling down out of the mountains northeast of Alamogordo. What interested us most besides the rock formations was the great variety of native flora in the region including several varieties of cactus — cholla, barrel, prickly pear, the colorful ocotillo, etc., and quite a large amount of mesquite plants, the type the local Apache tribe derived its name from, and then there is a plentiful amount of yucca, century plants, greasewood and we believe that there is even some algerita along with some sage brush. It would be a very likely place to designate as a state park not only because so much of the native New Mexico plants and bushes are found there, but because of the historical Indian walls. We'd like to see an effort made along this line.

Physical Education Is Essential Part of School System's Program

(Editor's Note:—This is another in a series of articles about Ruidoso's schools this newspaper requested our superintendent to write for our readers.)

 (Supt. Ruidoso Schools)
 Physical fitness no longer is a natural result of the American way of life. Machines supply the "muscle power" for most jobs, large or small, and the trend toward spectator and passive entertainment is even taking the activity out of play. There is little necessity and little encouragement to engage in physical work or exercise. We have reached a point where our vitality is threatened by our prosperity.
 The answer to this problem must be planned programs of physical exercise and recreation. The place to begin is with good physical education programs in our schools. I am pleased to report that Ruidoso has recognized this fact and has taken steps to do something about it. Our present physical education program reflects a continuing concern regarding youth fitness. Specific exercises and activities which develop strength, endurance, speed, flexibility, and coordination constitute a significant phase of the total program. This is particularly true at the Junior, Senior high levels. Several problems arise when a school seeks to establish an adequate physical education program. For example, those regarding facilities and trained personnel are limited at the elementary level, certain Board of Education and administrative decisions must be reached. These include deciding the amount of time, the number of personnel involved, the activities which will be offered, and the amount of money allocated at each grade level before our program can attain the goals of a good, well rounded program in grades one through twelve. When the amount of available money is limited, AND IT IS OUR SCHOOL, one must do the best he can with what he has and hope for the best. We do have an excellent beginning. I am sure as soon as money is available it will be used to improve physical education programs for all the pupils of the Ruidoso Schools.

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

Increase Sick Leave For Local Teachers

Ruidoso school board in a brief
meeting, and discussing only rou-
tine matters, Thursday night last
week voted to increase sick leave
allowed for teachers, giving them
12 days sick leave per year. This
would be accumulative to 90 days,



FILE \$568,000 SUIT IN LOCAL DEATHS

Two Oklahoma brothers who are named in federal court actions involving stock in Ruidoso Hacks Ass'n filed a \$568,000 damage suit in U. S. District Court in Albuquerque last week alleging negligence in connection with the deaths of their parents.

Clint C. Cooke Jr. and Warren B. Cooke, sons of Clint C. and Betty B. Cooke, both deceased and as co-executors of their parents' estates.

The suit asked \$568,367 from Catherine B. Loughridge and Frances Douglas, of Ruidoso and Rhoads Plumbing and Heating Co. of Roswell.

The complaint said Clint C. Cooke rented a house on April 19, 1965 from Catherine Loughridge and

Frances Douglas, and that Rhoads installed a water heater in the house in the latter part of April, 1965.

The Oklahoma City brothers said that when their parents were in the house in April 1965, a vent to the water heater and furnace collapsed, allowing carbon monoxide created by burning gas to escape into the house.

The suit said Clint C. Cooke died May 30 or 31 of asphyxiation and that Betty Cooke was permanently injured from which injuries she died Dec. 22, 1964.

The co-executors asked \$300,000 damages for the death of their father and \$250,000 damages plus \$10,367 medical and hospital expenses for the death of their mother.

Earlier this year the Cooke brothers filed a civil suit in U. S. District Court against Eugene V. Henzley asking for return of 1810 shares of racing association stock in a judgment of \$500,000.

Henzley, former manager of Ruidoso Downs, was sentenced to five years in prison on a conviction for income tax evasion. He is free on bond pending an appeal.

U. S. Atty John Quinn filed a civil suit against Henzley and the Cooke brothers asking the court

About 240 bankers from five states Saturday attended the eighth annual Public Relations Seminar of the New Mexico Bankers Assn. here.


Benton Hudgens, executive secretary of the association said the theme of the seminar was "let's sell ourselves."




