



**SCIENCE FAIR DATE CHANGED**


Travis said a budget of \$1,200 has been set up for handling the costs of some of the speakers being invited to participate.

**WESTERN REAL ESTATE IS NAME OF NEW FIRM**

In Ruidoso Downs, in the building formerly housing the Western Land Sales, Henry Hyman, Harold Hyman and Vaden McCray are to operate a new real estate brokerage, the Western Real Estate, they announced this week.

The Village of Ruidoso has scheduled a hearing on Friday, March 10 at 7:30 p.m. at the municipal building on the proposed half-million dollar Sewer Assessment District No. 2 in which more than 1,000 lots in almost 30 subdivisions have been set up.

At the hearing, protests against the assessment district will be read and or heard according to a legal notice which has appeared three times in the Ruidoso News, and also which has been mailed to all property owners at their last known address.

These property owners who are affected by the assessment proposal can visit the municipal office during their regular hours and get facts on the proposed costs assessed their property.

Of the total cost of the project, estimated at \$586,333.80, a federal grant of \$170,500.00 has been received by the village to apply on the project—leaving \$415,833.80 to be assessed against the various properties benefited by the improvement. The costs are estimated at a maximum—and no more than the assessment now proposed can be charged after it is approved. Should the district have the approval of the people, contract would be let within about three months and construction will likely begin this summer, Village Clerk-Man-ager Jim Hine said.

Village assistant Clerk-Manager Don Hart said this week the assessments would average from \$450 to \$500 per lot, and that the lowest estimated cost had figured \$120.

**Moisture Brings Smiles to Area**

Rainfall that measured .42 of an inch in Ruidoso Sunday and Monday, and snowfall that measured from 8 to 12 inches in the higher elevations of our mountains brought wide smiles to the faces of local people.

The rainfall was general in the southern, central and northern part of Lincoln County, but was not very heavy in the eastern part. Reports were that only a trace was received in the area east of here. Hollis Cummins, Captain, said at least half an inch of rain was received in that vicinity.

**31 Firms Participating In Food Stamp Program In County**

Families with U. S. Department of Agriculture food coupons to spend will find retail grocery stores scattered throughout Lincoln and Otero counties ready to accept them like cash.

This was announced today by Carl Speegle, in charge of the Roswell field office, USDA's Consumer and Marketing Service.

He said about 31 food-retailers have applied for authorization to accept these coupons.

With nearly all county food retailers in the program, patterns of trading should continue as usual, he explained.

"Remember," he emphasized, that USDA food coupons can be spent only for food, so don't get upset with your groceryman if he (A notice posted on the door of the village of Ruidoso Municipal building states that food stamps will be sold at the Ruidoso Downs fire hall 9:30 a.m. to 12 noon March 5.)

won't accept coupons for soap, matches and other household needs. Although such items are sold in most grocery stores, they are not food!"

You can buy almost any food you want, Speegle pointed out, as long as the food is produced in the United States.

"This regulation makes sense," he said, "because one of the purposes of the USDA Food Stamp Program is to help American farmers sell more of their foods."

Also the Food Stamp Program is designed to give low-income families more "food buying power" so they can improve their diets and thereby improve their health and well being.

The program is operated jointly by the New Mexico Department of Public Welfare and USDA's Consumer & Marketing Service. It replaces the distribution of USDA commodities to needy families in Lincoln and Otero counties but USDA-donated foods will continue to be available to schools and non-profit institutions.


**Ambulance Service Will Continue Here**







## Keep Your Car Radiator Protected, It's Not Yet Spring In Ruidoso

Charles A. Culver, volunteer cooperative weather observer here for 22 years for the U. S. Department of Commerce's Weather Bureau, says it's time to remind oldtimers, and newcomers, too, that you still must protect your car radiators and perishables - for March can bring some frigid low temperatures at Ruidoso. In the last 22 years the thermometer has dipped below zero on six occasions - as witness this table Culver prepared for our readers:

3. What we consider "high school" goes by various names in Europe: gymnasium, lycee, or just state school. These schools are with hardly any exceptions, for selected youth of high ability as determined by written entrance examinations. End-of-year examinations given these pupils are prepared at the national level. In these systems a pupil who fails two of his many subjects must repeat the whole year, including even those subjects which he passed.

4. The subjects studied in gymnasiums often are as many as ten or eleven, but of course they do not meet every day. Some subjects require only one hour or two a week. That is how pupils study more subjects a year than in true in our schools.

5. Although teaching and study follow highly academic lines in high schools abroad, the resources, equipment and libraries of the schools are, with rare exceptions, much, much less than we are used to. Also, there is no guidance or counseling service available in the schools; these are provided by classroom teacher or not at all.




