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

Following six weeks of planning and preparation, interest is growing steadily in the first annual Southwestern Art Symposium booked in Ruidoso for the Easter season, starting Friday and lasting into Sunday this week-end.

Mrs. Mary Winkels, general chairman for the symposium, said early this week about 15 advance registrations at \$15 each have been received to date and that many more are expected as the opening date draws near.

Sponsored by the Lincoln County Art Association, the ambitious project also has the backing and support of the New Mexico Arts Commission, the New Mexico Department of Development, the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce, the Lincoln County Development Association and the Ruidoso Ambassadors.

Publicity has been given the first annual symposium here in several publications in the last few weeks, including the Socorro, Artesia, El Paso, Albuquerque, Roswell and La Cruces newspapers, and has been listed for two months on a calendar of art events sent out by the NM Arts Commission throughout the Southwest.

The public is invited to view the work by several artists that will be on view at the symposium at two different times - from 4 to 6 p.m. on Saturday and again on Sunday from 2 to 5 p.m.



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Two Major Needs For Our County

The Lincoln County Development Association in its first exploratory meeting held at Lincoln a couple of months ago heard ideas expressed from many people in many professions in many communities about what such an organization might tackle to better the economic climate of our area. Two ideas advanced that we feel are major needs for a very big recreation lake - which could also serve in water conservation - and expansion of food production - a field that offers much because of the population explosion in the world. There will be increasing needs - and the pressure will grow - for more food in the foreseeable future. Along this line - something that could be of benefit would be an apple processing plant that could turn cull apples, hail damaged apples and surplus apples in those far years into apple juice, apple jelly and jam, applesauce, dried apples, etc. Have you seen the price on a jug of apple juice lately? Being able to market apples that are unselectable through processing them in several ways could put extra dollars in the pockets of our valley orchardists.

No need to expand on the advantages of a recreation lake - what with more people making more money on shorter hour work-weeks - and more folks wanting to enjoy what the great outdoors offers - and with our country already established as a pretty fair resort country. A big lake for boating, fishing and other water sports would be a natural attraction for a wide area of the Southwest.

It may be that such an organization which now has members from all our communities is just the right one to pursue these two aims - along with the several others that were aired that first night. Enthusiasm in the association is still high as the members recognize more and more the possible results of county-wide efforts in several fields.

The Mesquero Apache Tribe has noted with interest the comments of the LNFCA contained in the Alamogordo News March 8, (and other news media) and Wendell Chino, president of Mesquero Apache Tribe feels that additional comment is necessary to clarify some of the statements made in the article.

1. Many citizens in the mountain area contributed a sum in excess of \$2000 for the importation of elk to the Mesquero Reservation. This contribution we feel was a striking demonstration of their desire to see the Tribe and the region progress. It should be noted that most of the individual donations were in the amount of \$15, and that a significant number of the donors were lessees of U. S. Forest Service lands.

2. The importation of Elk and other non-Indigenous game animals are only a part of the total long-range plans to increase and emphasize tourism and recreation on the Mesquero Reservation. The Elk planted on the Reservation will improve not only the economy of the Tribe, but also the whole mountain area. One rancher has stated that "my land, if I want to sell it is worth twice as much if it is stocked with deer, elk and other wildlife."

3. Before Elk were imported by the Mesquero Apache Tribe, a complete study of the Reservation habitat was made by a nationally recognized Research Biologist and Ecologist of the U. S. Fish & Wildlife Service, a person who is objectively well qualified to make recommendations on wildlife stocking. It was only after we had received their VERY FAVORABLE report that we started stocking the Reservation with Elk. Quite naturally their study include available forage for Elk on the Reservation and it is interesting to note that the competition for food between elk and deer is relatively minor. We think that it is important to point out also that the New Mexico State Game & Fish Department have encouraged us and have concurred with the importation of Elk

to our Reservation. The State Game & Fish Department has also assured the Tribe that they will assist with the control of elk if they stray from the Reservation habitat.

4. The Tribe recognizes the fact that a few will stray from the Reservation proper, but we have been assured by the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service that the majority will stay on the Reservation. It is a well known fact that a small herd of Elk have inhabited the Sierra Blanca area for the past eight years.

5. The Mesquero Apache Tribe has practiced strict grazing practices to protect and preserve the range resources of the Reservation since the return of the land from non-Indian leases. The Tribe will proudly compare the results of the range practices on the Reservation with those of the LNFCA. The proper balance of deer, antelope, elk and cattle on the Reservation have not led to any evidence of overgrazing. Damage from overgrazing does not come in one year, but occurs over a long period of time, therefore the Tribe questions any damage as the result of Elk importation.

6. The Mesquero-Tribe, as land-owners interested in good grazing practices would be glad to provide a representative to serve on the Board of the LNFCA, and we would like to invite the Board of the LNFCA to visit the Reservation, study our grazing practices and particularly to see if the Elk have done any damage to our grazing land since their importation.




17 Men and Boys Make Texas Tour

NOLON HART

Nolon Hart Once Had Distinction Of Having No Finger Prints; Wood Carving Is Consuming Hobby

The achievement that got the most attention was a reel design in a round bottle. Inside the bottle on the craftsmanship is written "1917".

"I saw a drawing in a magazine," observes this craftsman, "and a \$2 offer to teach me how to do the work. Instead of taking them up on the offer I went out and whittled one of the designs and put it in the bottle."

Nolon put his work into the bottle one piece at a time, using a hat pin. He made one for his mother, Mrs. Pearl Hart of Lubbock. Others went to a bank in Seminole, Texas and all over the country. The stopper in the bottle twisted the reel inside. "People loved to twist the stopper," says the creator, "and watch the reels move. I never have found anyone who figured out how the designs were done and how they got into the bottle."

This crowning achievement has a cross at the bottom of the bottle and one at the top. A staff connects them and has a reel on it. Many hours of patience go into such a project.

Wood-minded Hart points out that in making things out of wood you have to sand them down. This applies to new and old furniture alike. Through the years he has used endless yards of sandpaper and many pieces of pumice stone to carry out the smoothing process. And a lot of steel wool has gone through his fingers.

He has finished tables on which he used a vibrating sander. But most of his work had to be done by hand. Over nearly half a century of working with wood Hart has re-worked organs and refinished furniture. Many rare pieces of antique furniture have been restored by this mild-mannered artisan.

To get away from it all he grabs a rod and reel and heads for one of the well-stocked lakes in the area. But it isn't long before he is back to being a "smooth wood-worker" again!

Instead of creating calluses from this endless rubbing as some might think actually Hart's skin was thinner than normal. "When I applied for that job," Nolon recalls, "I knew my fingerprints had worn off over a period of time. They have done that before. I just let it go at that and didn't say anything about it. It is part of my work."

This Ruidosoan started on wood when he was a small boy. He is now 67 and still at it. "As a small boy I made anything I could see out of wood," he remembers. "I got into woodwork naturally and stayed there. If I could copy something I could whittle it. I wore out several pocket knives whittling."

Nolon made axetors and knives out of wood. The first thing he ever made was a wood chain. This he placed in a square bottle. To add an artistic touch the former Lubbock, Texas man put a doll in the chain and an umbrella over the doll. The bottle had a stopper with a peg in it.

Two years of woodwork and grammar school and four years working with wood by hand in high school qualified Nolon in his art.

Pot-Bellied Stove Now Retired As Means of Heating Our Schools

(Editor's Note: This is another in a series of articles we requested our school system's board to write for the patrons of Ruidoso school district.)

The little red schoolhouse with its pot-bellied stove is a thing of the past. Gone, too, is the whispering wind that scurried through the walls in the winter and the heat from the stove rays that streamed in during the autumn and spring. Our White Mountain Elementary School is so constructed that all drafts and loss of heat is controlled by its 14-inch insulated walls and by its two windows located at the front and back of the individual rooms. The temperature of each room is calibrated within two degrees of the 70 degrees that one thinks of as the optimum temperature, with a complete change of air every six minutes.

The old concept of the one teacher and the students in one standardized classroom with permanent walls separating each classroom does not fit well with our modern philosophy of communication. Witness our folding partition set up at the White Mountain School in which teachers are taking advantage of the larger classroom with the expert of each of the fields doing the teaching with two or more grades.

The compact school is built from the inside to the outside with first consideration given to what is needed. Knowing our climate's conditions prohibits much outside

play in the winter we produced a "common area" in the center of the building to be used for play area, music, art, etc. This making use of floor space for a good cause and eliminating corridor space, which in traditional schools often amounts to as much as 35% of the floor space.

The importance of lighting and color cannot be overly stressed as about 90% of what a student learns is due mainly to visual processes. Proper lighting reduces eye strain and contributes to better posture. At White Mountain School we work under perfectly controlled artificial lighting thus doing away with the conflict between natural and artificial light. Colors should and were selected on the basis of psychological effect on pupils, giving consideration to warmth, coolness, size and dimension.

A building should implement the educational program and not hinder learning. Such environmental factors as lighting and color, temperature control, sound control and furniture and equipment must be given proper consideration. These were done at White Mountain School and because of these considerations we think the educational program has been enhanced to a large degree to the 236 pupils in attendance after an evaluation and observation one year later.


