



Municipal Pool to Open June 1 Ruidoso Downs Kicks Off 49-Day Season Saturday

Around Town

Village officials have been kicking around a possibility of calling a big G. O. bond issue for a vote from the people between election years—getting the idea from another municipality that did this in New Mexico and whose action is now subject of a suit before the state supreme court. Some of the things the big bond issue—which could be as much as \$700,000 because of Ruidoso's big bonding capacity now—could be used for is updating, expanding and making more efficient the city's water lines to include some of the outlying areas, perhaps secure an off-channel storage of water the village is due from the Rio Ruidoso during those run-off periods when it is sometimes lost to all users, upgrade street equipment and build a new municipal building. Part of the projects talked can be afforded with some matching funds from federal agencies — which could mean better than \$1 million in improvements around here might result. Sounds good to us—especially if we want to grow. The prediction is that it will not cost the taxpayers any more than at present because the village's rate is going to drop shortly. . . . George P. White, who retires July 1st as Rotary Head, was talking about the activities underway now in the American Legion here, which he says is already at work on a big campaign to bring the state department convention here in 1968. The Legion met here two years ago. A. E. Hunt is named to head up Ruidoso's efforts to bring the session to the Playground of the Southwest. George has just been made commander of the Robert J. Hagee Post of the American Legion here. . . .

A new recreation facility for the Playground of the Southwest will be put in use here Thursday next week, June 1 with the opening of Ruidoso's \$130,000 municipal swimming pool. Manager Jim Isham said this week it appears the opening will take place then as the contracting firm is rapidly finishing up details to complete the installation.

Isham said the charge for the pool will be 50c for children under 12 and older children and adults, 75c. A season pass, which can save up to two-thirds on a full summer of swimming, will be \$15 for children and \$20 for adults. Private parties and swimming lessons can be arranged for by contacting the manager.

The manager said the pool will be open to the public for recreational swimming from June 1 through June 19 from 9 a.m. until 7 p.m., and after that each day from 1 to 7 p.m., and on Saturdays from 9 a.m. until 7 p.m.

Five two-week sessions in swimming, diving and water safety will be offered at a cost of \$6 for 8 one-hour lessons. Classes will be limited to 10 students for maximum benefit in instruction. The training periods will run from June 19 thru Aug. 25. Registration opens May 27 at the pool, and will continue thru May 29. Children 6 years old and older and adults can take the instruction. Competent, trained instructors will be in charge, Isham stressed. Questionnaires to parents of children in school were sent home via the pupils early this week, and should be returned by Friday this week if there are those who desire to take part in the pool school.

The large new pool, junior olympic size, 75-ft. x 42-ft., has a maximum capacity of 120 swimmers. It is heated to 85 degrees and there are two large dressing rooms and there are lockers and checking facilities.

Rock Vincent, a ski instructor at Sierra Blanca Ski Area, and Rob Newport, Roswell resident who is a student at New Mexico State U., will be lifeguards in addition to Isham. A wading pool is offered for tiny youngsters, but must be accompanied by an adult. Two diving boards are installed, one of them a one-meter board, the other a three-meter board.

Isham said the water in the pool is handled through the most modern filtration system available today. The pool is three feet deep at the shallow end and 12-feet at the deepest. A concession will be operated, offering hot dogs, soft drinks, candy and snow cones.

Police Investigate 25 Break-Ins

Since May 13 peace officers of the area have been discovering and investigating the breaking and entering of 25 homes and summer cabins in Ruidoso, almost all of them in the western part of the village.
The series of break-in discoveries began May 16 with finding the Paul Jackson residence broken into, with entry gained by breaking a window in the rear. The loss of items is undetermined.
On May 15, the C. W. Powell place was entered and a large inventory of small items, including an electric iron, raincoat, cap, other clothing, candy, canned goods and such things was reported missing.
Discovered on May 17 were those homes that had been broken into: Marion Doffing, J. B. Collins, Roy Mack and V. B. Knight. All had their residence early this week, broken windows for entry and rear doors unlocked, but no other vandalism.
On May 18, the Henry Peoples, the Smoot, W. W. West and Western Gas Service of El Paso homes had been entered in similar fashion, with undetermined losses.
The greatest number of break-ins were noted on May 19, including the Sawyer, Stephens, Ruth A. Burnum, R. B. Goffga, W. T. Mills, Jack L. Ludman, Royce M. Pembler, Ida Mae Smith, J. L. Myers, S. M. Ramsey, Jr., James P. Tappa, Jr., C. R. Anderson, Wm. A. Hutcherson and Ruby Hardin places. Food and a green corduroy jacket was reported stolen at the Hardin house. Losses in other homes had not been determined.
The Fred Volquardsens reported a portable TV had been stolen from their residence early this week.

The cream of the southland's sprinters are primed for Saturday's opening at Ruidoso Downs.

The extended four-day week-end of racing is expected to draw huge throngs of racing fans for the beginning of the 1967 season and three added money events have been scheduled by racing secretary A. C. Kemp.

The \$2,000 added Inaugural Handicap at six furlongs kicks off the long list of stakes races on the Ruidoso Downs summer schedule topped by the world's richest horse race, the estimated \$450,000 All-American Quarter Horse Futurity on Sept. 4.

"We look for such proven campaigners as Air Spare, Tode Corazon, Car Top, Lou Rate, Prince Len and Nepanta to go postward in the inaugural," Kemp said.

Air Spare won the same race last year while Lou Rate is the "uncrowned" champ of the state's 870 specialists. Prince Len was a double stakes winner here in 1966 and Nepanta, back in top form, was runner up in the Ruidoso Derby behind Rock Island a year ago.

Another possibility is Pointical, winner of the \$10,000 Ruidoso Mile in 1966, who has been training forwardly for the coming season.

On the second day of the season quarter horse will be prominent with the running of the Dale Robertson Allowance Stake at 350 yards for three year olds and up. Named for the fine actor and horse breeder who stars in "Iron Horse" the test is likely to bring out such corking shortliners as Jet Too, Go Al Go, Fandango Bellboy and Panacea.

The big opening week-end will be climaxed on May 30 with the running of the Memorial Day Handicap. The event is for three year olds with an eye on the Derby later in the season and will be contested at six furlongs with \$2,000 added.

Among the early favorites are unbraten Wagon Roman, Sunland Derby winner Douro Boy, Haschund and El Bahram.

"I feel we have the finest crop of quarter horses and thoroughbreds ever assembled at Ruidoso Downs," Kemp added. "In particular our older horses look outstanding."

As usual the high class of two year old quarter horses will be competing at Ruidoso Downs throughout the summer.

Ruidoso Downs President A. B. Green, a newcomer in the position, has confidently stated that this season could be the greatest ever at Ruidoso Downs.

Topped by the estimated \$450,000 All-American Futurity on Sept. 4, Ruidoso Downs, again offers a varied variety of top stakes for each quarter horse and thoroughbred.

Only 11 members of the Ruidoso Racing Association Board of Directors and Joe Skeen, secretary-treasurer, and members, Mrs. Billie Hendley, John L. Augustine and Paul S. Hagee. Only the last named is a newcomer to 1967.

Wayne Wiggins heads up the Public Relations and Publicity Department.

Few changes have been made in other official positions for the coming 49-day season.

A. C. Kemp returns as Racing Secretary and will be assisted by Pat Drypocher.

John Phillips, representing the state, Wayne Fling, and newcomer, Richard Lidberg, make up the Board of Stewards. Lidberg, a former southwest riding star, starts his first term as a steward.

Others and their official positions at Ruidoso Downs include W. D. Jackson Sr., Paddock Judge and Checker Henry Mills, Starter; Joe Smith, Stacks Superintendent; Carolyn Fankhauser, Track Superintendent; Benny Roller, Custodian of Jockey Boxes and Assistant Clocker; Jerry Keaton, Mutuals Manager; Robert Dudich, Announcer; Bill Coody, Photographer; Dorothy Hatter, International Bookkeeper; Lia DeValle, Nominations and Payments; Oscar Hawkins, Chief of Security, and Ed. man Atwood, Comptroller.







Upgrading of Classroom Study At Ft. Stanton Boys Camp To Be Directed Thru Ruidoso School

George White, superintendent of Ruidoso schools, spoke to Rotary members Tuesday noon on the new educational program for Camp Sierra Blanca for Boys at Ft. Stanton.

White told members that although the state's correctional program was considered adequate in most respects, many members of the state legislature have felt that the basic education for the boys there is lacking.

Although the school will continue to offer courses in forestry and leatherwork, as in the past, this pilot study will put the emphasis on math and reading, the basic skills. The ages of the boys at the school are from 16 to 21. Sixty boys will be involved in the program.



Ruidoso Downs continues a trend this summer of naming many of its outstanding stakes races in honor of horses that have left their mark in the quarter horse world. A total of six added money events will bear the names of such horses beginning with the Flying Charm Allowance Stake over the exciting 870 yard distance on June 4. The event, for quarter horses and thoroughbreds, will carry \$2,000 in purse money.

Racing secretary A. C. Kemp has added the Bright Eyes Special on July 4 over the express' route of 400 yards and the winner will be gunning for the major share of the \$2,000.

Top-Deck and the Immortal Three Bars both get their due honors at Ruidoso Downs this summer. Top Deck, now deceased, is a thoroughbred son of Equestrian and he will be posthumously honored Aug. 11 by the running of the Top Deck Allowance Stake over 400 yards. Top Deck has been one of the nation's outstanding sire of speed horses and his sons and daughters are around in force to carry on his fine traditions.

Sept. 1 is the day Three Bars' name comes to the fore. The son of Percentage is still active in the breeding shed even though now at an advanced age. Without any question he rates as the outstanding sire of quarter horses in the past 20 years.

The Three Bars Handicap will be over 870 yards with \$5,000 added. Two other \$700's will carry names of Ruidoso Downs favorites of the past.

On July 18 the Brigand Handicap will headline while the Sea Raider Handicap is scheduled on Aug. 19. The former carries \$2,500 in purse money and the latter \$3,000.

However, all stakes this summer at Ruidoso Downs serve as an appetizer for the big daddy of them all—the All-American Futurity on closing day, Sept. 4 in which another record purse of \$450,000 is expected to be at stake for the world's richest horse race.

The summer season begins May 27 with the Inaugural Handicap at six furlongs headlining.

Spinach production in the Hondo Valley was reviewed last week by Paul Schoenberg. Several growers are considering producing spinach as well as other vegetables.

The grower can expect to invest \$40 to \$50 per acre and gross about \$250. Spinach will produce around 500 bushels per acre.

Perennial weeds such as Johnson Grass are one of the biggest problems. If insects are not controlled, they transmit a virus blight which ruins the spinach. The possibility


