

\$100,000 DEPOSITED IN ACCOUNT

Ed Sunrise, an Apache from the Mescalero reservation, has appeared in some 15 of the more widely known TV series—most of them the Western type . . . George Perry from down the valley was remarking that the best way to catch trout in the bone-dry Ruidoso—around Glenoco was to use a glass of water for bait . . . Newsstand racks with coin boxes attached to them (including the one in front of the News office) were picked up by robbers Wednesday night last week and hauled off somewhere where the thieves earned a few coins for their hard work in 'busting 'em open. Several stores reported their racks were gone Thursday.

Robert L. Windham and Clarence H. Tyson, developers of Eldorado Villa Estates, Tuesday deposited \$100,000 in Ruidoso State Bank for the "kick-off" work which has begun with the felling of hundreds of trees at the project site in north-west part of Ruidoso. "We're not cutting all the trees," Tyson hastened to explain, "there are hundreds left."

With considerable engineering on the site completed, construction is expected to begin soon on first model homes of the complex which also will include a condominium apartment, swimming pool, small golf course and clubhouse.

The proposed letting of a contract in July for Ruidoso's projected \$532,000 sewer assessment District No. 2 may be delayed. Village clerk-manager Jim Hine said this week. He said members of the council have been studying another possible financing method which may bring the cost down to participants. The council has reviewed protests heard in a public meeting and has made some minor revisions and deletions in the original plan that would serve 1,000 lots in the northern and northwestern portion of the village. This may be one of the items on the agenda for Thursday night's council meeting. Hine said, but he added that was conjecture on his part.

With the village's new fiscal year beginning July 1 he said there will likely be some budget matters up for discussion also including transfers of funds or credits. The proposed ordinance to give the village the power to collect its own municipal sales tax may also come up for some discussion.

Other village business this week included a review of the proposed municipal regulations in the Ruidoso Planning Commission meeting held Wednesday night.

'Territorial Problems' Of C. P. S. and R. E. A. To Be Aired

Santa Fe Severe territorial problems of Otero County Electric Cooperative of Clouderoft and Community Public Service Co. in parts of Lincoln, Otero and Chaves Counties will be discussed in Santa Fe if a contemplated meeting is held.

The Public Service Commission will hold a hearing July 12 in Santa Fe to issue a certificate of convenience and necessity to the cooperative and to certify its plant, line and system. The routine procedure complies with a new law adopted to remedy objections raised by the State Supreme Court to a 1961 statute. Similar hearings are being conducted for the 21 electric co-operatives serving customers in New Mexico.

Manager Jay D. Lanster of the Otero County Co-op hopes an "across the table" meeting on boundary line problems can be held in Santa Fe with Community Public Service representatives some time after the PSC hearing. He said other meetings have been held earlier in Santa Fe and PSC representatives attended.

Numerous problems on service areas exist between the co-operative and the public utility. Otero County Co-op has 4,300 meters and 3,500 members. The area served by the co-op or Community Public Service includes Ruidoso, Ruidoso Downs, Hollywood, Alto, Alamogordo, Tularosa and Sierra Blanca.

Apaches Lift Closure In Parts of Reservation

Wendell Chino, president of the Mescalero Apache Tribe and Paul Clements, superintendent of the Mescalero Agency Bureau of Indian Affairs, Wednesday announced a partial relaxation of fire closure restrictions on the vast Mescalero Apache Indian Reservation effective at 6:00 a.m. Saturday.

The restrictions to be removed are limited to the Eagle Creek and Ruidoso Recreation areas—and all restrictions are not being lifted in those areas. Fishing and picnicking will be permitted only from 6 a.m. to 8 p.m. each day.

The closure, imposed May 11, prohibited use of roads through and into the reservation except U. S. 70 and New Mexico 24 to traffic to and from homes and other traffic by specific permit. The closure also prohibited camping, picnicking, all fires and smoking in other than cleared areas.

In announcing the restrictions in the two very popular recreation areas, the tribal president and the superintendent each stressed the creation of fire danger and warned that the restrictions against smoking outside cleared areas, camping and fires would continue to be enforced. All other areas of the reservation will remain under fire closure as stated in the original decree order which briefly stated means that all other areas are "off limits."

The two areas opened to the public by the new order are the Ruidoso and the Eagle Creek Recreation areas. The Ruidoso, in the upper Ruidoso Canyon above the Village of Ruidoso and Eagle Creek, located west of Alto and U. S. 70, the road to Sierra Blanca Ski Resort, are operated by the Mescalero Apache Tribe. Fishermen using these areas must have a tribal permit and a valid New Mexico fishing license. Limits and rules are the same as those for other New Mexico trout waters.

The Eagle Creek area, a pond be-neath the year of a new lake a few yards above existing Eagle Creek Lake.

Reservation fishing waters were heavily stocked by Mescalero National Fish Hatchery personnel prior to the usual opening date in late May. The fish have been waiting for the angler since that time. To make the opening day even more exciting, the hatchery staff will do additional stocking in both Eagle Creek Lake and the Upper Ruidoso just prior to opening day.

Fishing information is available at Apache Summit restaurant.

The boys will work all day using Job Corps equipment cleaning up the river. Following the work day there will be a picnic in one of the city parks for the boys paid for by the village.

Some of the other bottles on display contained ale, beer, wine, whiskey, perfume and food stuff. The colors of the bottles are varied and interesting.




