



## Hospital Board Makes Reply To Criticism

Although representatives of other news media in the area were invited, the Ruidoso News was not when a special called meeting was held of Ruidoso-Hondo Valley General Hospital's Board of Directors Thursday night last week. The board meeting, with the hospital's attorney, Richard Parsons present, was for the purpose of discussing criticism of the board's action on Medicare and of the hospital administrator, Truett Ball. Reviewing the denouncement expressed in remarks made during several days by Joe Truitt, the board issued the following statement:

"The board has, in conjunction with the Medicare people, made an exhaustive survey as to the feasibility of Medicare, and with a view to the general welfare and the best interest of the community as a whole... At the present time the requirements are exceptionally difficult and every attention is being given to them... The board continues to work on the problem and the board is and has been capable of reaching independent decisions and further wishes to state that the board has confidence in the administrator and that he will continue to follow the board's policies as directed. Taped recordings of Truitt's criticism voiced over the air were heard by the board, and on advice of Attorney Parsons, the board decided it would not use the same means of replying, following Parsons' advice that such problems should be discussed at board meetings.

## Tenth Annual Program Is Set For MD's Summer Clinic Here

The 10th annual Ruidoso Summer Clinic, sponsored by the New Mexico Chapter of the American Academy of General Practice, will be held here July 24-27. The registration fee of \$40 is waived for medical students, interns, residents, medical officers of the Armed Forces and Public Health Service.

The program will be provided by the Faculty of the University of New Mexico School of Medicine, headed by Dr. Reginald H. Fitz, dean of the school. ## Nogal Ranchman's Camp Meeting Slated July 19 Through 23

This year's Interdenominational Ranchmen's Camp Meeting on Nogal Mesa is just a month away, July 19 through July 23.

Nogal Mesa Camp Meeting is held on the Camp Grounds on Nogal Mesa in the Lincoln National Forest. "You reach it by turning off U. S. A new meal and service schedule will be followed this year in order to observe Daylight Saving Time with the sunset over the valley. Breakfast will be at seven o'clock in the morning each day and all other services and meals will be one hour later than in past years; there will be services at 9:30 a.m., 11:30 a.m., 3:30 p.m. and 8:00 p.m. Prayer meeting will be at 5:30 p.m. and dinner and supper at 1:00 p.m. and 7:00 p.m.

All camps and parties will be registered this year and teenagers and youth camping without their parents must have a registered sponsor camping with them.

The first meal will be served at seven o'clock in the afternoon on July 19, and the first service will be at eight that evening. We hope you can come and stay the rest of the week, but if you can't make it all the time, come for one service, or for many as you can. We'll all be looking for you.

**Ruidoso Garden Club Officers Installed In First Meet Here**



## Federal Aid Is Proposed For Orchardists

U. S. Rep. E. S. Johnny Walker today reported he has asked the Department of Agriculture to look into the possibility of assisting apple and peach growers in New Mexico whose crops have been damaged by frosts.

Walker said he has not yet received the results of an investigation into the matter. He asked the Department to determine the amount of damage and to report on ways and means to assist the growers.

Walker said records on the peach crops in New Mexico have not been kept by the Agriculture Department because the volume is relatively small.

A determination must be made as to whether the trees have been extensively damaged by the killing frosts, or the damage has been mainly to the blossoms. Sometimes the frosts will kill a tree or damage them to such an extent as to make them nonbearing for several seasons.

The New Mexico Democrat said he will introduce legislation, if necessary, to help the apple and peach growers.

Apple production figures varied from more than one million bushels to less than 600,000 bushels during a three-year period, Walker said, and he has asked the Department to determine how the growers can stabilize their production, if it is desirable to do so.

### Bill By Joe Skeen Reduces Exemption On Some State Workers

A new law sponsored by Senate Minority Leader Joe Skeen, P. C. Republican, will cut the number of exempt jobs in state government under the Personnel Act from about 270 to 200 and produce more qualified employees. The little noticed statute, passed unanimously, was effective Friday. Persons in exempt positions are not required to pass a qualifying test. Many are political appointees who get their jobs through the patronage system. Sen. Skeen's amendment removes a major category of exempt posts from present law. The category covers "heads of divisions of agencies and such other employees serving in policy making capacities as may be determined by the Personnel Board."

The legislature narrowed the number of exempt jobs by adopting the following classification: "State employees, if the Personnel Board, in its discretion, decides that the position is one of policy-making." Some exempt job holders, aware they could not pass, reportedly will not even take qualifying examinations required under the change. There are still two loopholes. Persons in exempt jobs for at least a year will be "grandfathered" in and covered by the Personnel Law. People in exempt posts less than a year may qualify by passing a non-competitive test. Most of those in exempt positions have been hired since the Republican administration took office Jan. 1.

The legislature also clamped down on another avenue of political patronage. The law has allowed hiring of employees in emergency status for up to 90 days without a qualifying test and without a ceiling on salaries. The new amendment permits hiring of emergency employees only when a list of qualified applicants is not available. It also prohibits payment of emergency personnel at established rates for work done. Political hirings of emergency workers have been common in the past in both Republican and Democratic administrations.


Jeep Club Has Covered Dish Dinner


