



### SWIMMERS GRADUATE SATURDAY

The first session of swimming lessons in the new municipal swimming pool are over this week-end and it is time for graduation. ## ELDORADO VILLA ESTATES PASSES ANOTHER F. H. A. MILESTONE

The Eldorado Villa Estates—the Federal Housing Administration (FHA) Planned Unit Development project which has been in the planning stages for two years by Robert L. Windham for Ruidoso, which, incidentally, will be the largest single FHA approved project in the state of New Mexico, and about which the Ruidoso News has given preliminary publicity the last several months, passed another milestone last week. The project received preliminary approval by FHA Specialist in the FHA Central Office in Washington, D. C., who approve all such developments inasmuch as the condominium-type development is one of FHA's new programs. Eldorado Villa Estates subdivision development will be one of the first in the nation and certainly the first in the Southwest.

Windham arrived in Ruidoso Tuesday afternoon from Arizona to meet with Clarence H. Tyson, co-sponsor and general manager of the project, to go over final engineering drawings prepared by Daniel Engineering Co. of Alamogordo for final approval for submission to the Village of Ruidoso for final subdivision plat approval for recording.

Windham is also in town to meet FHA Appraisal Specialist arriving from Washington Thursday in order to finalize appraisals for the development. "At this completion" which data is needed for the insured financing under the National Housing Act.

Tyson reports that construction work now underway is that of clearing "hundreds" of trees. This work started May 26 and will require another month to complete. Following this work will be the land development improvement work, which will include the rough work (chaping) of the par-three, nine hole golf course and the site work for the Townhouse homes. This work will include all improvements such as streets, curbs and gutters, the placement of all utilities underground, the installation of all community-owned recreational facilities and the engineering and staking of the Townhouse lots.

Eldorado Villa Estates will be a planned development composed of homes that are unlike most condominiums, in that the Townhouse homeowner will own his home and the land thereunder in fee, shared with no one. He will also own an undivided interest in the common areas which will contain the golf course and clubhouse, swimming pool, tennis court, etc. Each homeowner purchases a share of stock in the Eldorado Villa Golf Club "Co-Owners" Association, a non-profit entity which owns the golf course and clubhouse and all other

## Large Recreation Lake Proposed In Cooperative Plan At Capitan

Capitan is slated for a man-made recreational lake and adjacent park to occupy 40 acres. J. C. Germany, the mayor, reports that the land has been donated by Mohaco Land Sales Co. It is to be located about a mile south of town.

He said \$86,000 is to be provided by the New Mexico Fish and Game Department for constructing a dam. The remaining financial problem to be solved is replacement of the village's existing four-inch pipe line from the Eagle Creek supply with an eight-inch pipe line, he said. LaMoyné Carpenter has volunteered to provide the machinery to lay the pipe, Germany reported.

## Two Rodeos, Indian Ceremonial, Five Days of Racing for July 4

The calendar is crowded with recreation and entertainment for the thousands of visitors expected to invade the Playground of the Southwest area in the next few days—fun seeking vacationers who will be celebrating the long July 4th week-end which begins Friday and lasts through Tuesday.

Five days of racing are carded at Ruidoso Downs, the Southwest's most popular horse race track. There are 12 races daily, starting at 1:30 p.m. with the popular daily double, two quinelas and the Big Q. Several feature events to bring out the best thoroughbreds and quarter horses are scheduled. (Full details are in the sports section of today's News.)

Two rodeos are to be held in the area. One of them, a two-day affair, the other set three days.

Capitan's annual Smokey Bear Stampede will be held Monday and Tuesday, with two programs on Tuesday plus a free barbecue at noon. Monday's activities will include selection of a queen for Lincoln county to serve as the county fair queen and also as this county's entrant in the State Fair Queen contest later in the fall. The first day's rodeo starts at 9 p.m., to be followed by a dance with the Aggie Ramblers playing.

On July 4 a parade is set for 10:30 a.m. followed by the noon barbecue, free to all, and rodeo sessions at 2 p.m. and again at 8, with another dance, with the Ramblers playing, that night.

A calf scramble will be staged as part of the rodeo to add variety to the program.

Rodeo events include bareback bronc riding, calf roping (one ground), saddle bronc riding, steer wrestling, bull riding, ladies' barrel race and ladies' pole bending. Buckles will be awarded all first place winners and added money for all winners.

This is the ninth year the Smokey Bear Stampede has been held, and each year it attracts a larger audience. It is held at the Lincoln county fair grounds in Capitan.

Dancing continues as long as there are participants and this year a new attraction will be a special midnight supper-breakfast to be served during the closing hours of the dances and at their end. Stampede officials are erecting a new booth for this activity which will be found right at the exit of the dance hall. "The catering for this supper has been entrusted to the members of the Lincoln County Art Association who have already proven their great community interest in the very successful Art Symposium held this spring in Ruidoso." The sponsors said, "To most people, artists and Paris are synonymous and our local Lincoln County artists are promising a touch of French cuisine with the traditional scrambled eggs and bacon. The artists who cook and serve will wear typical French chef hats and the booth will be nicely decorated."

Walter Jones, secretary for the Stampede, wants to stress again that all entries for the three rodeos must be made by 10:00 a.m. on Monday, July 3. He can be reached at EL 4-2454 before July 2 and at EL 4-2081 after that time.


Due to the long program of rodeo events and the time available, entries must be limited and it is recommended that all contestants contact Jones at once.

Two young Apache maidens will be honored in the annual ceremonial held in Mescalero beginning at dawn July 1. They are Adel Ena Shanta and Erdine Cathleen Pellman. The rite held for the young maidens reaching puberty is based on early beliefs and has both a sacred and social significance.

A big tee-pee made from limbs of trees and called a wickiup is constructed facing the east as ancient songs are chanted. The young maidens don magnificent buckskin suits and are required to wear them throughout the four-day celebration.

When the wickiup is completed the maidens are escorted to its front where they stand facing the east. Then the yellow pollen ceremony takes place. The girls are laid face downward on buckskin and rubbed with the pollen. Next the girls run toward the early rays of sunlight to symbolize their physical fitness.

Next the maidens run four times around a basket filled with fruit, nuts, candy and tobacco. After this the contents of the basket are

### \$100 In Liquor Stolen From Inn-Credible

The storage room of the Inn Credible at Alto was broken into Sunday night and approximately \$100 worth of liquor was stolen. The thieves did not enter the saloon proper where there was more liquor and some cash. An investigation is being conducted by the Lincoln County sheriff's office.

Following the ceremony, breakfast is served to everyone. Then follows social dancing in which other tribes are invited to take part.

On the afternoons of July 1, 2 and 4 at 2 p.m. there is a rodeo at Mescalero which features bull riding, ribbon roping, bare back bronc riding, double mugging, calf roping and barrel racing.

Every night at 8:30 from July 1 through the 4th the Mescalero Apaches' famous Dance of the Mountain Gods and several other dances will be performed. Visiting Indians from other southwestern tribes will also present exhibitions at various times.

Besides the special scheduled events as noted above, there will be fishing, horseback riding, roller skating, picnicking, camping, children's playlands, golfing at a regulation or on miniature courses, movies, dancing at two teen-age centers as well as night club dancing for adults, hiking, exploring, dining at numerous restaurants and snack shops in the area, bowling, swimming in the new municipal pool, or just plain and simple rest and relaxation under the pines in nature's air-conditioned Lincoln National Forest. There are also numerous tours in the area for those wishing to visit such scenic or historic sites as Old Lincoln with its three museums, the ghost town of White Oaks, the ranchland and mountain rides, plus a gondola ride up the shoulder of Old Baldy to a lookout point at Sierra Blanca Ski 11,400-ft. lookout point at Sierra Blanca Ski and Recreation Area.

### A REMINDER FIREWORKS PROHIBITED

A spokesman for the Ruidoso Ranger Station in the Lincoln National Forest here has asked the News to remind vacationers, picnickers, campers and others here, as well as the residents, that fireworks of any kind are prohibited within the boundaries of the national forest.







## LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

 Recent Court Decisions Regarding Imprisonment of Alcoholics

Change comes about in strange ways, but at last a change in attitude toward the alcoholic patient is being accomplished.

For too many years the plight of alcoholic persons, especially those who habitually skid rows and "drunk tanks," has provided the occasion for amusement, disdain and disapproval. Because of seemingly insurmountable social and administrative barriers, the medical profession has not afforded alcoholics the treatment usually offered to sufferers of more clearly defined medical disorders. The fall, with the policeman, judge and probation officer acting as unwilling accomplices, was made the dumping ground for this human "refuse"; here little but futile ritual was exercised, and constructive action was seldom undertaken.

Recent application of the 8th Amendment of the United States Constitution confronts us with the fact that alcoholism is an illness and must be treated as such. Our society can no longer ignore the fact that it is wrong to punish another human being for being sick, even if the sickness is alcoholism.

The decisions in the Driver case in the Fourth Circuit Court in North Carolina and the Easter case in the Circuit Court for the District of Columbia are important landmarks. In each decision, alcoholism not only received legal recognition as a disease, but frequent appearance in public in an intoxicated state is defined as a symptom of alcoholism, not a criminal offense. Judge Bryan said of the alcoholic in the North Carolina decision: "This addiction—chronic alcoholism—is now almost universally accepted medically as a disease. The symptoms, as already noted, may appear as 'disorder of behavior.' Obviously, this includes appearances in public, as here, uninvited and ungovernable by the victim. When that is the conduct, for which he is criminally accused, there can be no judgment of criminal conviction passed upon him. To do so would afford the 8th Amendment; as cruel and unusual punishment in branding him a criminal, irrespective of consequent detention or fine.

These decisions do not negate statutes punishing ordinary public drunkenness; neither do they deal with the issue of the culpability of persons carrying out unlawful and antisocial acts while under the influence of alcohol. They do portend, however, the end to the time-worn practice of meeting the problems of public drunkenness on the part of chronic alcoholic persons primarily by incarcerating them as criminals. This change in attitude also presents to the medical profession and others a forceful challenge to create nationwide programs for those afflicted with problems with alcohol.

Our most immediate task is the development of specific guidelines for the diagnosis of alcoholism,
