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

BEAR CUB GIVEN BAYLOR UNIVERSITY

A 20-pound coal black baby bear found orphaned by the New Mexico Game and Fish Dept. has been given to Baylor University as a mascot for the Baylor Bears. The cub will be presented to representatives from Baylor U. in a pre-post time ceremony at Ruidoso Downs Thursday this week when representatives from the Waco, Texas school arrive here to receive the gift mascot. Dr. James A. Beall, Baylor graduate, will make the presentation for the C. of C. The cub was brought down from a pine tree in Ruidoso last week by Wildlife Conservation Officer Charles Cockerell. He said the little bear was full of fight and it took two strenuous hours to climb the tree and bring the cub down. Cockerell spotted the cub the night before and left it alone overnight, hoping that the mother would come for it. The conservationist surmised that the two had been raiding the town's garbage dump nearby and were separated when the older animal was run off by dogs and the little one ran up the tall pine. Some time ago representatives of the Waco, Tex., university wrote the New Mexico Game and Fish Dept. asking for a cub to replace their old mascot. The department said the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce will arrange for the orphan to be transported to its new home in Texas within a few days.

Bond Election is Tuesday School Starts New Term Monday

Ruidoso municipal school system begins its nine-month new term for 1967-68 Monday with a full day's school day—with all buses making their usual runs at their usual times and with all lunchrooms open to serve meals. Supt. George P. White said he had no idea about this year's enrollment, whether it would exceed or be less than last term, but that advance registration, which began several days ago indicated the figure would likely be about the same. . . .

Ruidoso residents who have paid a property tax within the last 12 months are eligible to vote Tuesday next week in the municipal building a fair proposed general obligation bond issues. The village council called this election on these issues: \$30,000 for new city facilities, including a municipal building; \$75,000 for additional recreational facilities for tourist and local enjoyment; \$150,000 for expansion of sewer facilities; and \$275,000 for enlarging the water facilities, including off channel storage. SIX PLANES USED IN HOPPER SPRAYING

The grasshopper spray program got underway Monday in Lincoln County in the Capitan area with six planes applying insecticide to the 614,000 acres in the spray area. The airplanes being used are World War II planes and a B-17 and PB-2. These planes can carry 650 to 1300 gallons of insecticide and treat 10 acres per gallon. "If you get the spray on you, try to wash it off as soon as possible as it is easier to get off when it is fresh," County Extension Agent Ralph Dunlap said. The spray program is under the control of the local ranchers committees. Representing the Nogal Mesa area are LaMoyné Peters, Fletcher Hall and Ellis Schildknecht. The North Capitan area is represented by Walt Wilson, Bill Edgar, Milt Jones and A. W. Gnatskowsky. Malathion at the rate of eight ounces per acre is being used. Within two hours after the spraying grasshoppers had started to die. They will continue to die for three to five days. After the spray has set six hours it will not be washed off by rain, Dunlap said. The spray program is under the control of the local ranchers committees. 

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the Mescalero Apache Tribe, the Bureau of Indian Affairs, and the Eight Canyon Job Corps Conservation Center was designed within the Navy concept of "Building for Peace" and the national goal of assistance to impoverished people and enhancement of the beauty of our natural resources.

"Operation Apache" was conducted for the specific purpose of improving facilities of the Ruidoso Recreation Area, a beautiful forested valley featuring fishing, camping and picnicking and operated by the Tribe.

These improvements included building a new gatehouse and fences, construction of a new bridge across the Rio Ruidoso, repairs to picnic tables, and construction of new privies and thirty new fireplaces. The project will open a larger part of the forest to public use.

The cooperative effort was broken down in the following manner: The Mescalero Apache Tribe provided all construction materials; Sea Bee Division 8-20 provided the skilled manpower of thirty-six officers and men, composed of engineers, carpenters, masons, electricians, and other construction trades; the Job Corps provided additional manpower and logistic support and the Bureau provided the specialized and heavy equipment required.

This successful effort is another example of the results that can be brought about through the pooling of resources available to reservation communities. In this particular case, the Tribe benefits from the improvement of its recreation area, the public benefits in having an improved, enlarged and attractive recreation area to visit, the Navy benefits from increased practical skills in terms of the assigned role of CB 8-20 and the Corpsmen participating benefit from having had an opportunity to associate with skilled craftsmen and a military organization. All participants enjoy increased knowledge that cooperation of effort can result in successful completion of a difficult task.

(Editor's Note: Clements, an official on the Mescalero Apache Indian Reservation in his civilian life, said that a contingent of the Seabee reserves recently went to Corpus Christi from El Paso where they assisted in the renovation of a church in a joint effort with other groups.)

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

**30,000 Color Brochures Expected
This Week For CC Promotion**

The long awaited four-color brochures featuring recreational attractions of the Playground of the Southwest were shipped from a printing firm in Clovis to Ruidoso-Valley Chamber of Commerce last week-end and were expected any day this week here, Don Stark, manager of the C. of C. told the board of directors in its August meeting Monday afternoon in the chamber's office.

More than a year ago a private concern sold ads to a number of Ruidoso business people to pay for the publication of the brochures, but when they failed to arrive the C. of C. investigated and found the

project had almost died. Stark took charge and worked with one of the partners of the private firm handling the deal to secure delivery this year. Pictures of activities in all seasons of the year here are featured in the several page book.

Other matters talked in the meeting was a report from Stark that \$11,000 in membership pledges and payments have been received towards a budget of almost \$20,000 for 1967-68. He said a response to letters mailed prior to the drive had brought more than 100 members—a fine reaction, he declared. Stark was voted another \$50 a month for travel expenses, bringing

the amount to \$100 to add to his salary of \$400 per month. The action was taken on motion of treasurer R. G. Hughes who noted that Stark had been paying most of the costs of the several trips he makes each month on behalf of chamber business.

Dr. James A. Beall, past president, was named by President Charles Findley to represent the chamber when the Baylor University Bears are presented a cub bear, secured through efforts of Baylor graduate Dr. Beall and the C. of C. from the State Game Department. The presentation was scheduled for pre-race time at Ruidoso Downs Thursday this week.

The chamber also voted to assist in sales of admission tickets at Ruidoso Downs for Thursday this week when all receipts will be turned over to a fund as a benefit to the Clayton Tolliver family. Mrs. Tolliver has been ill for several months, necessitating almost continuous hospitalization. Tolliver has been a Ruidoso Downs horseman for many seasons. The chamber board was told the Downs will also contribute box seat sales on Thursday this week to the fund.

Findley and Stark reported that Downs manager Tex Barron and Secretary Treasurer Joe Skeen each had expressed appreciation to the C. of C. for its assistance in getting a record turnout of fans last week for the first of three added Thursday race days the latter part of this month.

The board voted to buy a 12th of a page ad in the new Western Skier magazine which will have a cover picture, four pages of color photos and an article about Sierra Blanca Ski Area here for its October edition. The magazine circulation is in all the western states where skiing is found and will print more than 75,000 issues to kick off the new ski season.

Don Stark reported that a state sports car meet will be held here on Sunday, Sept. 24, on a paved stretch owned by Davis Developments, Inc. in Pinecliff subdivision, running parallel to U. S. Highway

70 in east Ruidoso. Minutes of an executive meeting of the chamber board held last week were read, and one item mentioned was that the C. of C. should hold a local contest to pick an entrant in the state contest to name Miss New Mexico as a competitor in the Miss America beauty pageant.

Manager Stark said an advertising promotion for week-end prizes in free facilities in Ruidoso, to use radio, newspaper and television advertising, is now ready to break in Amarillo, similar to one staged recently in Odessa. He said the same type of free publicity for Ruidoso is being sought in Snyder, Dallas, El Paso and San Angelo in Texas.

OFF AND RUNNING by John I. Day Try, Try, Again

In most sporting events a tie or a draw is a very unsatisfactory outcome, but in horse racing's equivalent, the dead heat, both horses get credit for a win and divide the spoils, while their backers are paid off from a division of the betting pool. Perhaps the most famous dead heat of modern times came in the Carter Handicap at Old Aqueduct in 1944, when not two but three horses were inseparable at the wire, and hickers of Brownie, Bossuet and Wait a Bit all collected their bets. Once a rarely, the dead heat no longer makes headline news, and only triples or those occurring in stakes races each year are noted in the American Racing Manual. This is due of course to the development of the photo-finish camera which records the horse or horses at the exact moment their nose hits the finish line. Prior to the photo-finish, the record book showed only one dead heat in North America, for the year 1931. By 1945 the photo-finish had been universally adopted and dead heats occurred in no less than 160 races that year.





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All-American QH Futurity Trials Are Saturday

77 Juveniles Try In Bid for Purse Totaling \$485,000

Headed by such outstanding futurity winners as Turf's Best, Jet Smooth, Laico Bird and Top Rockette, a total of 77 eager two year olds await Saturday's eight trials for the \$485,000 All American Quarter Horse Futurity, the world's richest horse race.

The gross figure sets another new record, far surpassing last year's mark of \$430,000 in which Go Dick Go took home the major share of \$198,000 for Joe Leitner.

For the first time in history the winner will collect better than \$200,000 for winning the Labor Day classic, which is also a national record.

The fastest ten Saturday will qualify for the 400 yards All-American, the final leg of the Tres Coronas.

The first heat, in particular, drew a contention packed field. Vying here are such rapid runners as Laico Bird, Top Rockette, Fly Little Jet and The Churl.

Laico Bird, fleet daughter of Good Bird, has already won more than \$110,000 with a second in the Rainbow and a win in the La Mesa Futurity, her best efforts. Top Rockette was best of the California horses this year, and won the Bay Meadows Futurity. Both Fly Little Jet and The Churl has yet to win a major race but have won their last starts impressively.

In the second heat the standouts appear to be Go an Roll, Horslin' Around, Mama's Delight and Golden Note. Third heat threats are Kansas champion Jet Smooth and Barn's Ladybug, while Ina Go Man and Double Don look like the pick-of-the-fourth-heat.

The obvious stickout in the fifth heat is the brilliant Turf's Best, who scored a dazzling 1 1/2 length win over Laico Bird in the Rainbow Futurity three weeks ago. A \$3,050 purchase at the All-American Sale last year, Turf's Best has won seven of nine lifetime starts and is a definite All-American favorite.

Double Dibs and Decathlon, Jr. are the ones to watch in the sixth trial while Gemini Rocket and Midland Jet, appear solid in the seventh. Sea Nymph looks like the pick-of-the-fourth-heat.

Minor injuries—caused by skids and falls on a wet, slippery football field—are hampering Ruidoso Warrior gridder's second of three week's workout before the season opener Sept. 1 at Carrizozo. The Tribe's opening match will be a conference 3-B game.

"We've been hit by a plague of minor problems and injuries," coach Ken Newton said Wednesday. "There's nothing real serious, (in the way of injuries), but we just can't seem to get rolling."

Newton listed at least seven players out with small injuries, consisting mostly of sprained ankles, pulled muscles and similar complications.

"A lot of it is due to the wet field," Newton said. "It's giving us a lot of trouble. We've only had one injury from contact."

He said the injuries this year were above normal for pre-season workouts.

"They've jelled as a unit," the coach said, "but we just can't get them together—especially the starters—for workouts."

Newton said he hoped most of the injuries would be cleared up in

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




A-Ruse Thursday Favorite
