

BONDS PASS

Ruidoso voters Tuesday favored four general obligation bond issues totaling \$550,000 by an almost two to one majority. The voting was light with only about 300 persons marking ballots. Receiving the heaviest vote of the four issues was the one for enlarging and expanding the water system. Unofficial returns were announced as follows: For a new city hall and other municipal improvements, 171 for and 100 against, \$50,000; For water expansion, 195 for and 82 against, \$275,000; For sewer expansion, 192 for and 84 against, \$150,000; For recreation developments, 169 for and 101 against, \$75,000. Village clerk-manager Jim Hine said Ruidoso maintained its record of never defeating a bond issue in the Tuesday election. Hine said Mayor Lloyd L. Davis, Jr., expressed thanks to the electorate for their confidence in Ruidoso's growth in the support given all four issues.

Ten of the fleetest two-year-old quarter horses who made the best times of 77 competing in trials last Saturday will sprint 400 yards Monday in the world's richest horse race here at Ruidoso Downs. They will be trying for a pot that amounts to \$486,000—a few dollars short of half a million bucks! Six of the stars are represented among the competitors in the race that runs late Monday, Labor Day 1967, and which climaxes a five-day, three-raced program that started Thursday. Names of the trial winners and qualifiers, plus also eligibles, appear along with owners' names and addresses in a special box on page one of today's News, and the odds on the 10 for win, place and show are given in the race results for Saturday's matches. Two competitors had the same time for 10th spot but Deacon's Luck, who led the last starting chute at over D. P. Sweet. Both finished in 20.37 seconds. Seven other feature races are set for Monday six named in honor of winners of the previous All-American races that have been held at the Downs: Joe Leitner, J. B. Ferguson, C. G. and Milo Whitcomb, Hugh Huntley—and the seventh feature to be the final—Adios Amigos, to be a mile or more for thoroughbreds. Three Features Sunday Sunday's race program will have three big races including the 11th, which is the annual running of the Ruidoso Mile for thoroughbreds; the New Mexico Farm and Ranch magazine, to be run the 8th honor. 3-Day All-American Auction Is Friday, Saturday, Sunday

The sixth All-American Futurity Quarter Horse Sale gets under way Friday night at the Chaparral Hotel Convention Center and buyers from all over the nation are expected to send prices rocketing to new records as 209 yearlings go on the block. The vendue will continue both Saturday and Sunday evenings and auctioneer Dean Parker's targets will be last year's record gross of \$379,775 an average of \$3,768 when 98 head changed hands. All yearlings eligible for the sale must also be entered in the 1968 All-American Futurity, the world's richest horse race, which is expected to gross more than \$500,000. Last year, some outstanding prospects were bought, including First Kiss, who sold for a record \$45,000 to Jim Routh. That mark could be topped this year. However, the outstanding buy turned out to be Turf's Best, picked up by Thomas Baker of San Antonio, Texas, for \$3,650 and after winning the Rainbow Futurity is one of the heavy favorites for the All-American Futurity on Labor Day. Buyers certainly will be looking for another Turf's Best and they will have a multitude of class stock to select from. Sons and daughters of such renowned stallions as Diamond Charlie, Double Bid, Everett, Dick, Go Man Go, Jet Deck, Little Dick, Moon Deck, Mr. Bar None, Rebel Cause, Rocket Bar, Three Bars, Tonto Barr Gill and the late Top Deck will be offered. One of the sales toppers could easily be Raymond Tucker's Blanche Priest, a full sister to 1968 All-American champion Go Dick Go. She will go as Lot 113. Lot No. 207 is named Miss Prissy Deck and is a full sister to such champions as Jet Deck, Jet Top and Jet Moon (a \$25,000 buy last year). She is consigned by William Carter. Bidding is expected to be very spirited with the All-American Futurity changing in format to a 20-horse payoff next year. Buyers will have this in mind when looking over the available yearlings. All horses in the sale are paid up to date for the world's richest horse race. The sale will begin promptly each evening at 7 p.m.

514,203 ACRES SPRAYED IN GRASSHOPPER BATTLE

The range grasshopper control program was finished in record time with the spraying completed Sunday morning. A total of 514,203 acres were sprayed during the program, according to County Extension Agent Ralph Dunlap. Respraying of areas having a poor kill and misce is being done for three days after the spray program was completed. A 90% kill or better has been reported in most areas. The ranchers received an added benefit, as it killed the flies on the livestock, Dunlap said. Ranchers in other areas should check their own ranch now for hoppers and consider the possibility of grasshopper control in another year, he urged. Also they should visit the sprayed area to see what they think of benefits from grasshopper control, he requested. (Continued to Page 1—Sec. B)

Warriors Meet 'Zozo' In Opening 3-B Tilt



Cash and Land Exchange Deal Totals \$1 1/4 Million Near Alto

One of the largest land transactions in Southeastern New Mexico in many years was reported this week to the Ruidoso News by an authoritative source. The trade owned or leased by Sonny Wright and cash purchase, totaling \$1 1/4 million involved 14,000 acres of land and Bessie Ruth Wright. The property was acquired by a group headed by Harry Shane of the jewelry firm of El Paso; Maurice Antwell, Ft. Worth, and Alec Singer, Tulsa; Glover McCarty, Ruidoso real estate man, was also reported to be one of the buyers. The News was told the lush ranch, located northeast of Alto, will be another large real estate development project for this area, probably the largest in the Southwest Playground's history. It is understood that a majority of the group making the purchase and trade are bankers in two states. One third of the deeded land acquired by the new owners lies within the Ruidoso school district, the News was told. Cattle and equipment was not included in the transaction. A portion of the property is grazing allotment, it was also reported. Wright is currently engaged in operating the Far West Hunters, Limited business in partnership with Marvin Jones of Capitan. Hunting parties for lion and bear are guided by the pair, who already have a large number of luxury safaris of this type booked for the coming season in this area. They are licensed and bonded. Wright is also a nationally known rodeo contender, having won a variety of championship titles and big money prizes in his career on the rodeo circuit.



GAME AND FISH NEWS

Dove Hunting Begins Sept. 1—State Game Department biologists predict a successful dove season this fall, but hunters in the northern part of the state will have to get out early, since the majority of the birds will migrate south rapidly as the weather begins to turn colder. The statewide split season runs from Sept. 1-Oct. 1 and opens again Dec. 2-30.

Field men report good numbers in all areas of the state at the season opening. Department officials remind dove hunters that it is illegal to shoot from or across a public road, a common violation that they find during the dove season. Shooting hours are from one-half hour before sunrise to sunset, and federal regulations require that a "plugged" shotgun be used. The daily bag limit is 12 birds, with a possession limit of 24 after the first day.



Religious Census To Be Conducted By Ministerial Group



Whitfield Transportation, Inc., after three years of hearings, reply to exceptions, and jointly with the Interstate Commerce Commission successfully defending the Commission's decision in Federal Court, has been granted a certificate to provide a direct general-commodity service between Dallas-Ft. Commencing Oct. 2, 1967, schedules will be operated 5 days a week over these new routes to provide the shipping and receiving public of New Mexico a direct and dependable transportation service.

Whitfield presently provides direct service from Salt Lake City, Utah, on the north, and El Paso and San Antonio, Texas, on the south, on all intermediate points on U. S. Highway 85, to and including Albuquerque; all intermediate points on U. S. Highway 84 to and including Carrizozo; over U. S. Highway 80 from Las Cruces to the Arizona State Line, serving all intermediate points; service to the entire White Sands, Missile Range, Holloman Air Force Base and the Ruidoso-Hollywood area.

Applications are pending on which favorable recommended orders have been issued by the I. C. C., which further extend Whitfield's service to Roswell, Artesia, Carlsbad and intermediate points. This new service to southeastern New Mexico should be instituted within the next several months.







TEXAN FINALLY GETS DUE RECOGNITION

(Ruidoso Downs Turf Writer)
John B. Ferguson is primarily noted as the man who owned and bred the great Go Man Go. But there is a lot more to Ferguson than one horse.
He has dedicated a lifetime to improving the breed and today his bloodlines are recognized as the finest in the industry. This is obvious when one glances at the 77 horses attempting to qualify for the All-American Futurity last Saturday. Of this group, 35 were descendants of his late but great stallion, Top Deck. There were 15 sons and daughters of Go Man Go and many sired by sons of Top Deck.
Ferguson has been missing from the All-American since 1962 when his brilliant Hustling Man roared to victory.
Labor Day, a full sister to Hustling Man, Go Mae Go, will carry Ferguson's hopes for another win in the world's richest horse race.
Ferguson has much to say about the quarter horse. As a pioneer in the running quarter horse during the past three years (and in the entire 20 before), said Ferguson, "Today, there is no place for the bulldog type horse except maybe, at the county fair."
"We had to soup up the quarter horse," Ferguson went on. "And to do that, the right kind of thoroughbred was required."
The veteran oilman and rancher has over 100 broodmares on his sprawling 6,500 acre ranch at Wharton, Texas.
"I sold Go Man Go for \$125,000 a few years ago but retained 21 lifetime breedings," John said. "His He stimulated the running quarter horse industry and at that time, was the highest price for which any quarter horse had ever been sold."
Currently standing on the Ferguson ranch are some fine young stallion prospects.
John is especially proud of his Top Deck stallion, Top Maxie. Also, he stands Cee Man Go and Ariel Deck. However, he does breed outside studs such as Rocket Bar.
Undoubtedly one of the largest individual breeders of quarter horses, Ferguson has done much to put the short runners on a higher level.
He helped organize the American Quarter Horse Racing Association and still retains the right to meet





Check your sheep for fleecce worms. I found three cases in one flock last week. The lush feed and moist weather has caused this problem. The sheep with fleecce worms appear damp in the affected areas. An animal with heavy dung tags is very susceptible. Use a livestock spray such as Lindane or Toxaphene around the affected areas. Also clip the wool to prevent this problem.


