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

# Summer Courses in '68 Proposed by NMSU Here



Three faculty members of New Mexico State University meeting with several Ruidoso business leaders noon Monday at the Holiday House here proposed that summer courses in biological subjects could be opened in 1968, using facilities of Ruidoso high school and of the land that has been offered, and accepted by that school five miles north of town. The land offer came from Mr. and Mrs. Sam Montgomery of Ruidoso, who have made an outright gift of 20 acres to the university at Las Cruces for development of a biological laboratory and field station, with an option to buy an additional 20 acres.

Dr. W. Dick-Peddie, professor of plant ecology; Dr. E. Staffeldt, professor of ecology of soil microorganisms and Dr. Burns B. Young met with Montgomery and others to propose that a schedule of costs and available rental units, to include trailers, trailer spaces, mobile rooms, cabins with kitchen facilities, etc., be made available to them so a brochure could be issued in February advertising the courses here. They proposed that two four-week sessions be held running from June 10 through July 3, and from July 8 through July 31. They estimated from 100 to 150 students might be enrolled with tuition of \$18 per credit-hour, or \$48 for three hours credit in each of the four-week sessions.

The National Science Foundation has funds available to assist such research projects, but only after the projects are in motion, Dr. Dick-Peddie said. "But, if we get summer courses underway they would be, at no cost. The school has two well equipped laboratories, White said, and are among the finest facilities the local school has, he stressed.

Study of New Mexico plants, New Mexico birds and ecology will be the main subjects offered in the original plan for the field station. There will likely be additional courses offered in the very near future, the faculty representatives declared.

Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce manager Don Stark was asked by Dr. Young to assemble information regarding the range in prices and facilities available for summer students who would come to Ruidoso to attend the branch.

In the discussion, it was pointed out that not only would teachers of the immediate area be prospective students of the branch, but teachers from other parts of the state and nearby Texas would also likely come here, bringing their families for a summer in a pleasant climate and where there are many vacation opportunities, plus owners of summer homes here, retired people, etc., who might enroll.

Two field station wagons would be used in some of the studies, to make visits to the Malpais area near Carrizozo, to White Sands and to all parts of the mountains surrounding Ruidoso, including the Mesalero Apache tribe owned ski area northwest of here, Dr. Dick-Peddie declared.

## Bronze Star With V Presented Parents Of Local Man Who Fell in Action in Viet Nam

The bronze star medal with a V for valor was presented at noon Sunday here to the parents of Private First Class Robert Gonzales Montoya, 20, a graduate of Ruidoso High School in the class of 1965 who was killed in action in the war in Viet Nam on Oct. 1 this year.

Mr. and Mrs. Fred Montoya, Sr. were presented the medal and a citation, plus a copy of the Presidential order that was issued calling for the medal with the V insignia in a brief ceremony in Ruidoso Downs village hall at 12:30 noon Sunday by Colonel Eben Wyles, professor of military science at the New Mexico Military Institute in Roswell.

Previously the parents had been presented the Purple Heart medal by Major William J. Jones, also of the N. M. M. I. staff.

In commenting on the two presentations, Major Jones said young Montoya "was quite a brave young man."

The body of young Montoya, whose father is a veteran of the Korean police action of 15-years ago, and who himself, was injured in that skirmish, was brought here early in October for burial in the Ruidoso Forest Lawn cemetery with military honors.

A crowd of about 35 persons attended the ceremony Sunday.

The Presidential order for the medal read as follows: For heroism in connection with military operations against an armed hostile force in the Republic of Viet Nam. On Oct. 1, 1967 Private First Class Montoya distinguished himself while serving as a Rifleman in Co. E, First Battalion, 14th Infantry, Pfc. Montoya and several other men were occupying an observation post outside his platoon's perimeter. Without warning the post was attacked by two Viet Cong hurling hand grenades. Immediately placing heavy automatic rifle fire on the enemy, Pfc. Montoya attempted to eliminate them before they could inflict any casualties. Although exposed to the blast of the grenades, he fought doggedly until hit by fragments of one of the grenades and was mortally wounded. Pfc. Montoya's bravery and dedication to duty are in keeping with the best traditions of the military service and reflect great credit on himself and his unit and the U. S. Army.

### FOUR YOUTHS FACE NARCOTICS CHARGES

### NEW SNOW FRESHENS SKI SLOPES

A general snow storm throughout most of New Mexico last week-end dumped a fresh layer on the slopes of Sierra Blanca Ski area here to make skiers and ski shop operators alike rejoice at improved prospects for this season.

Temperatures dropped following the storm last week-end, with C. A. Culver, local co-operative observer for the U. S. Dept. of Commerce Weather Bureau here reporting two below zero early Sunday morning and 11 above early Monday. At the same time, the weather bureau's instruments at the local airport recorded 9 degrees below zero early Sunday and 6 above on Monday.

Intermittent snow showers Wednesday and Thursday dropped another couple of inches in the canyon country, with a great deal more recorded on Sierra Blanca ski-slopes. All of Lincoln county was receiving precipitation this mid-week, and roads were hazardous in much of the area. When the News went to press before noon, snow was still falling with over-cast skies promising additional snow.



## Work Completed On Addition To Christian Church





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

**Multiple Use Yield Followed In U. S. Forests**

By B. H. STARKEY  
(Ruidoso-Ranger Station)  
On June 12, 1960, Congress passed the Multiple Use Sustained Yield Act. This act prescribes that the prime objective of multiple use management is to manage all surface renewable resources of the national forests for multiple use and sustained yield of the several products and services obtained therefrom. The five recognized categories of surface renewable resources are wood, water, forage, recreation and wildlife. This law does not mean that every acre must eventually accommodate all five categories. On the contrary, acres will be designated to be managed with emphasis placed on one or two uses. The remaining uses will be blended in on these areas to the extent that they do not cause any great interference in obtaining our prime management objective.

This law sounds quite confusing but let's follow this concept a little further. The first step in planning for multiple use management is to determine what resources are of the most importance in the management on a given area. Since many people are familiar with Bonito Lake, let's consider what the multiple use goals would be for the area immediately surrounding the lake. Before someone gets confused, these lands are not National Forest but are owned by the City of Alamogordo. Since these lands are above a lake that furnishes water for municipal supply, extreme emphasis would be placed on protecting the watershed to prevent pollution and siltation of the lake. The lake with its fishing, provides a recreational attraction to many people; therefore, emphasis would be placed on obtaining proper camping and sanitation facilities at a safe distance from the lake to prevent pollution. The possibility of increasing wildlife feed through vegetative manipulation is quite limited due to the steepness of the surrounding terrain. Where game openings and planting of browse did not interfere with recreational development, it may be possible to attempt to maintain game populations at a high level. Since we are talking of large scale investment for recreational facilities, timber harvest would have to be greatly modified. Since timber plays a great part in the aesthetics of an area, complete removal of the large trees in one operation could not be permitted. This harvest would probably require three or four operations spread over a 20-year period. This would allow for a minimum amount of area being disturbed at one time. Diseased trees must be cut for the health of the stand. Cutting can be done to promote health and national beauty and still produce wood products for the needs of people. Forage is produced in the open areas, range plans have to be made to harvest this forage at periods outside of the peak recreational months of June, July, August and September. All five uses are planned for in this area but emphasis is placed on

watershed and recreation values. In other areas, timber and wildlife may be the prime resources to manage for. With the greatly increased recreational visits to the forests each year, areas suitable for recreational development must be managed with the idea that at some point in the future these areas will be developed. There is no set rule for managing a piece of land, however.  
The major aim of multiple use management is to utilize our resources to the fullest extent and still maintain their potential to produce on a sustaining yield basis.

1. Trails and/or lifts may be closed at any time at the discretion of the management due to insufficient snow, difficult skiing conditions, or for any other reason the management deems necessary.  
2. There may be times when all the trails do not have the same conditions or the top of the mountain may not have the same conditions as the bottom. In this situation the report will be issued on the management's best judgment of the average conditions.  
3. Road conditions will not be mentioned in our reports other than in the case that the road is closed. The conditions vary too much from morning to afternoon. The New Mexico State Highway Department maintains the road with excellent equipment including a new snow blower. Chains may be required and we advise skiers to have chains with them at all times when driving to the ski area.
