



## Home Building On Spring Spurt

## Alton Gray Announces For Magistrate

Judge Alton Gray of Ruidoso Downs this week issued the following announcement concerning his candidacy for Democratic nomination for magistrate, district 3 in Lincoln county:

"Alton Gray, Ruidoso Downs, announces his candidacy for the newly created position of Magistrate—Lincoln County Division 3, subject to the Democratic primary, Aug. 27. This position will be voted upon by all voters of the County in the general election.

"Judge Gray, who has been active in local civic groups and Democratic politics for a number of years, and is now vice-chairman of Precinct 10, first entered politics in 1952, serving as mayor of the Village of Green Tree (now Ruidoso Downs) from 1952 to 1956. He was then elected justice of the peace of Precinct 10, taking office January 1, 1957. He was elected as municipal magistrate of Ruidoso Downs in 1962 and has held both positions since that time. Gray was instrumental in organizing the Justice of the Peace Association of New Mexico in 1961 and is still serving as president of that group.

"Judge Gray is a member of the New Mexico Sheriff & Police Assn., the local service unit of the Salvation Army, is charter member of Ruidoso Elks Lodge, first vice-president of Ruidoso Valley Ambassadors, a member of Lincoln County Development Assn., treasurer of the Lincoln County CAP and a member of First Baptist Church, Ruidoso Downs and serving as its treasurer.

"He served in the U. S. Army from 1941 to December, 1946, being discharged as First Sergeant.

"He has been a long-time resident of Lincoln County, having lived in the same community through three name changes—first, when it was Palo Verde, then in 1947 when it was incorporated as the village of Green Tree, then to present name of Ruidoso Downs."

## '68 Futurity Payments Rolling In At Downs

Lis Devine, Ruidoso Downs' nominations secretary says that all payments on 1968 futurities continue to meet projections. Heading the list is the All-American Futurity. Lis states that "It looks like the All-American will hit the \$650,000 mark as of the latest payments, March 15." There are 287 two year olds still eligible for the World's Richest Horse Race.

"All other projections look good also," says Lis, including the \$125,000 Kansas Futurity, with 177 still eligible, the \$125,000 Rainbow Futurity with 176 still eligible, the \$50,000 (estimated) Ruidoso Thoroughbred Futurity with 66 still eligible and the \$10,000 (estimated) Rio Grande Futurity for New Mexico bred with 97 still eligible.

The board member said the board will be meeting often in the next few days to study a successor for the position and hopes to be able to announce securing a manager soon.

Spokane's Edward P. Montes, 19-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Albert Montes of Hondo has been receiving medical attention in an Army hospital in Vietnam for injuries he received in a mine explosion while on a combat mission recently. He had been in Vietnam four months. His injuries were in his back and on his face, the parents have learned. He graduated from Hondo High school in 1965.

## Swimming Pool Opens May 15

Ruidoso's new municipal swimming pool, located in School House park in the Gateway area, opens for its second season on Wednesday, May 15—if the weather is favorable. Village clerk-manager Jim Hine said this week it was planned to open the pool a little earlier in case there might be visiting school groups here, or local school groups wishing to use the facilities for their end-of-school activities.

Admission will be 75c for adults and 50c for children, with cheaper per-person rates for groups. The pool will be open in the afternoons only during the early part of the season, Hine said, but will have longer hours when swimming classes begin later in the summer.

## VILLAGE BOARD OK's EMPLOYEES' RAISES

May 15 Deadline Asked For Action

## On Track Agreement

Ruidoso village board of trustees Thursday night last week voted a salary increase for city employees, settling on raises of a 6% increase for those earning under \$4,800 per year, 4% increase for those making \$4,800 to \$6,000 per year and 3% increase for those earning more than \$6,000 per year. The board also recommended a \$24 yearly increment for each year employees have been on the same job with the village, not counting their first year, and in those cases where some employees are

heading up two city departments, that a salary adjustment upward be made for those persons.

At the end of the discussion, village clerk-manager Jim Hine said that the 1968-69 budget would reflect an amount reaching almost \$315,000 to be expended for city employees when approximately \$8,500 for social security and \$1,005 for hospitalization insurance participation and workmen's compensation costs to the city are figured in. Last year's budget showed salary costs totaled about \$107,000.

in their car on Sudderth Drive noon Tuesday that Montes learned the pair was sought as escaped convicts.







## County Agent's Report

John Cooper, Shanks Brothers, Marley and Whitney and Lincoln County Livestock received over 60 cents for their wool this past week. They all had a bright, light shrinking clip. The fine wools were commanding a premium. I know of one clip that received a bid of \$1.27 per clean pound in Roswell. Although this is not the top price, it is the top offer on a clean batch.

Last week the temperature got to 24 degrees at Lincoln, 28 at San Patricio and 7 at Ruidoso. All the apple blossoms out at this time in the Lincoln area were killed, but I did not notice any damage below San Patricio. Bert Pillingen smudged with his new oil fired heaters from 9:30 p.m. to about 7 a.m. and maintained the temperature in his orchard from 33 to 27 degrees although the temperature outside the orchard went down to 28. Bill Threngstad lit his kerosene pots at 11:30 and maintained the temperature in the orchard until around 6:30 when a few of the heaters ran out of fuel. I believe that there was enough heat in the orchard to prevent any damage.

It was around 28 degrees Monday morning near Lincoln. To get an accurate estimate of the fruit, we need to wait until after the late frost. The oldtimers say wait until May 9th.

Although plants are dormant in the winter, they are still alive, and loss of water from leaves and needles continues. Rapid fluctuations in temperature in addition to drying winds and full sunlight can result in the loss of water from plants faster than it can be replaced from the roots. This results in the dry-out and death of plant parts. Ice and heavy snow loads also cause mechanical injuries such as cracking and splitting. Very low temperatures can also cause damage.

Beall, the council voted to send a letter to Ruidoso Racing Association asking that it give the village of Ruidoso an answer showing some indication the association is still interested in selling the assets of Ruidoso Downs race track to the village, as was approved by the electorate during the winter in voting for issuance of revenue bonds for the acquisition. In making the motion, Dr. Beall commented that it had been two months since there has been any communication from the association regarding the negotiations—that the association has had a tentative contract offered for almost three months and that he would like to see some action. The motion set a date of May 15 for a reply, and Dr. Beall's proposal was that if no answer, or indication, had been received by then that the village dissolve the board it has appointed to operate the facilities in case they were obtained. The council voted to donate \$100 additional to the Lincoln County Humane Society for use in buying tranquilizer gun ammunition in rounding up stray dogs in the face of a possible rabies threat following the slaying recently of a rabbit skunk in the eastern part of town. Joe Truitt of the Humane Society made the request, reporting the society is removing from 55 to 80 dogs per month from the streets of Ruidoso. The society now receives \$230 a month for dog and cat control measures, plus licensing fees on dogs. He said also a special rabies vaccination clinic is to be staged here in mid-May to help forestall any rabies threat this summer. Other action by the council included—

—Agreement to allow overnight use for keeping prisoners of Ruidoso Downs in the Ruidoso jail.

—Approved Tract C, which has 15 lots, for an addition to Indian Hills subdivision on recommendation of the village planning commission.

—Heard engineer Quinton Daniels report there has been no word from the Federal Housing & Urban Development on Ruidoso's application for funds to implement the cost of installing a huge sewer improvement project to add to the village's facilities. Hine said the village would call Washington to ask for a progress report on the application.

—Moved to meet with the engineer to study location of tennis court sites in the village parks as a part of the recreational development program voters favored by passing a bond issue in 1967, and to make plans for new fencing around Two Rivers and School House parks sometime soon.

—Heard utilities manager Don Hart state the last word he had had from Holloman Air Force base concerning establishment of an R. & R. center here for airmen from the base was that the sergeants who are members of a committee planning the installation had approved Ruidoso as the site and had two places in mind in the area here. "They are now awaiting funds to begin the work," he said he believed.

—Trustee Wayne Esles, who served with trustee Herb Brunell on a committee to study vacation and sick leave regulations for village employees, moved for adoption of a resolution implementing the policy.

—Discussed at length the problem of the State Forestry Service not having a lease for the site for its headquarters here on airport land—and abandoning it when the State Forester Mark Sloan, Sr., was moved to Santa Fe. The council learned that Sierra Blanca Aviation, having an agreement for forest patrol work by air, was using the state forest service's radio facilities. The question was asked why a lease had not been drawn for the state forest service's use of the airport land after the council had so ordered from its attorney John Thompson early last year. The land was offered at no fee when the village of Ruidoso learned the state forest service wished to move its headquarters from Capitlan to Ruidoso, and at that



## Priest's 50th Anniversary Of Ordination is May 16

On May 16, 1968, the parish of St. Eleanor, Ruidoso, and St. Jude Thaddeus, San Patricio, will honor Father James B. Molloy on the occasion of his fiftieth jubilee of priestly ordination.

Father James Molloy was born on July 11, 1891 in Nashua, N. H., one of six children born to John and Ellen Molloy. Both John and Ellen had come to the United States from their native Ireland as teenagers. Father "Jim" attended the parochial school and one year in the public high school of Nashua when he enrolled in the Benedictine college in Nashua of St. Anselm where he completed his high school and college education. It was upon completion of his college training that Father Molloy entered the Immaculate Conception Seminary at South Orange, N. J. in pursuit of his priestly studies. He completed his priestly studies at Queen of Angels Seminary in Niagara Falls, N. Y. and was ordained to the holy priesthood at the Cathedral in Buffalo, N. Y. on May 18, 1918 by the then Bishop Dennis J. Dougherty, later Cardinal Archbishop of Philadelphia.

Father James Molloy offered himself for missionary work in the mid-west and was accepted by Bishop John Ward, bishop of the then Diocese of Leavenworth, Kansas. This diocese later was renamed the Diocese of Kansas City in Kansas. Here Father Molloy served as an assistant pastor for two years, then in the capacity of chaplain at an orphan home for three years. Later he served several parishes in this diocese as pastor. 

## Factors That Retard Growth Studied In County Economic Survey

(Editor's Note: This is the concluding portion of a three-part article the Ruidoso News has been printing in giving the complete text of the Overall Economic Development survey recently completed by order of the Lincoln County Development Assn., the county board of commissioners for the County and the South Central Mountain Resource Development Area association, formed from combining the three soil and water conservation districts of the Upper Hondo, the Carrizozo and the Otero County groups. This final article ends with recommendations of action to be taken in 1963. New Mexico's two U. S. Senators recently requested funds be appropriated to implement further resource development of this region about which the survey reports.)

The irrigated farm in the area is small with 83% under 10 acres and 73% under 50 acres. The open ditch system is contributory to a high water loss.

2. Livestock - The livestock raising enterprises are mainly cow-calf operations, however, there are some holding their steer calves to yearlings.

There are 37,000 cattle and 180,000 sheep in the county, the sheep enterprise being the largest in the state and is principally located in the eastern part of the county. The sheep are run under fence and there are no herded sheep in the county.

The farm and ranch operators enjoy fair market conditions. Cattle are shipped from the area to market both east and west. Cattle buyers make periodic visits to the ranches during the year to bid on saleable cattle. The purchased cattle then become the responsibility of the buyer who provides transportation to the various markets. Small lots of cattle and sheep are sold through the sale rings in Clovis and Roswell.

4. Lumber - There are three sawmill operations in the county. They vary considerably in number of employees.

area is not participating fully in the food stamp program.

E. Factors That Retard Growth -

1. Vocational Training - Many of the low income families need to help to devote skills and become self-sustaining. Vocational training is vitally needed to reduce the unemployment and under-employment in the area.

2. Water - Throughout the west water has been a limiting factor and Lincoln County is no exception. Conservation and wise use of this vital resource is a constant need. There are several useable sources of water but adequate financing is needed to pipe the water where it is

needed.

3. Housing -

Lack of adequate housing is a limiting factor in development of Capitan, Corona and Carrizozo. Many of the existing houses are in such poor condition that it is not economically feasible to remodel or repair. There is inadequate commercial credit available in this area and a large percent of families are not eligible for Farmers Home Administration credit. One of the most pressing needs is a Savings & Loan Association located and financing the housing construction needs in the area.

4. Financial Capability - This area has always suffered

a lack of adequate local capital for long-term investments in industry or extensive business expansion. This lack has been due in part to the heavy demand for short term agriculture and consumer credit. It is felt that outside capital is needed if any significant new industry is to be brought in. Federal assistance, ranging from small business loans to large-scale economic development assistance could fill some of the financial gap. The area is not eligible to housing development funds and is severely limited because of no long term lending agencies located in the area.

5. Transportation -

Lincoln County was for years definitely needed in the next ten years. The responsibility for following through to see that necessary actions are taken to complete the proposed projects will rest with the Lincoln County OEDP committee chairman. He will assign committees as needed to each of these projects to insure their completion. Follow up action on proposed projects that are in the planning stage will be taken every three months by the committee to insure their completion, revision or rejection as appropriate.

IV. Program Evaluation During the month of January,

1968, the Lincoln County OEDP committee with the cooperation of the Lincoln County Development Association and the assistance of the Lincoln County Technical Action Panel, this OEDP will be reviewed, needed revisions and changes will be made at that time. The public will be made aware through general meetings and local news media of the activities of this OEDP and its revisions and changes. At each annual interval thereafter the program will be reviewed and up-dated.
