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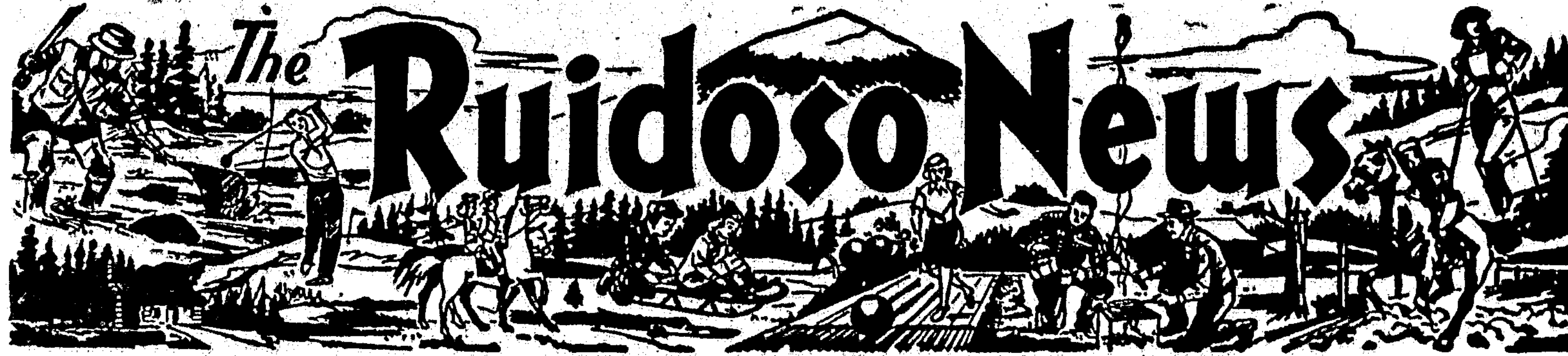

Dog Quarantine Again Possible If Owners Do Not Obey Ordinance

Lack of co-operation of dog owners in the Ruidoso area in licensing their pets and having them vaccinated for rabies as required by the state law may bring another dog quarantine here, Joe Truitt, president of the Humane Society said this week.

He has prepared an ad in this week's News in which the ordinance in full is printed to acquaint pet owners with the requirements. Truitt said the last rabies clinic held here saw only 48 owners bring their animals in for vaccination, "and there must be at least 600 other dogs in the area that do not have the shots," he estimated.

All-Seasons to Court HAFB Vacationers

The board of directors of Ruidoso All-Seasons, Inc., meeting Tuesday morning discussed plans to visit Holloman Air Force Base officials to promote vacations, and/or week-end visits to Ruidoso by airmen stationed at the Alamogordo military post. President Ed Wimberly said All-Seasons will suggest, or work with HAFB recreational leaders in providing facilities for the airmen and their families here.

Also discussed at the meeting this week was a meeting here July 8 with officials of the National Pilots Assn. who plan a fly-in here in October, and which may be attended by as many as 800 people or more from all over the United States.

On behalf of the G. A. & S. L. Jones Construction Co., owners, Stansell Jones this week announced the sale of the Holiday House complex here, one of Ruidoso's largest accommodations. The 43-unit motel, the large restaurant, two big meeting rooms, bowling alley and miniature golf course were all included in the sale to Mrs. Velma C. McCollum, former owner of the Dr. Pepper bottling franchise in Artesia for a dozen years.

Stansell Jones said the restaurant facilities, leased by the Ervin Knechts and the bowling alley under lease to the Jack Kennedy family, will continue operating with the present lease owners managing, and that the golf course will be operated by the Joe Payne family.

The sale price was not reported by the sellers. The Holiday House was a 120-unit operation built late in the 1960's by Elliott Mills, and was named El Willis Dee Motel.

The Jones brothers acquired it in 1969, adding 2 units at that time, then very soon after added a large lobby, one of the first swimming pools in this resort area, then the meeting rooms and bowling alley, and another 13 units. It has gained the reputation of being Ruidoso's finest family vacation center with the recreational facilities it offers.

Frank Sheitron and wife will continue as managers of the motel for Mrs. McCollum, Jones said.

A local realtor said he believed the transaction just completed was in the neighborhood of \$400,000 to \$500,000.

Race Handle Is Up \$200,000 Over '67

C. OF C. CRITICIZES CONVENTION HANDLING

After several directors and members of the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce Monday night had reported of criticism of prices and other problems of recent conventions held here, the discussion turned to prospects of securing a municipally operated convention center or one that might be privately financed. Those at the meeting were told there is a prospect, not to be divulged now, of a private concern building such a facility here.

Typical of the problems the board heard aired was a proposal by Chaparral Motor Hotel to rent to the chamber of commerce the convention center for its 1968 New Year's Eve ball—price quoted being \$500 plus 15% of ticket sales and 100% of the bar sales. The one held last year by the C. of C. cost \$200 rental with the hotel getting the bar receipts. Don Driver, chairman of the '68 event, said, based on gross income from the 1967 event, he figured the 1968 ball would "go in the hole" and would cost the chamber of commerce \$500. The board decided not to sponsor the year-end festival this winter.

(Coincidentally, the Ruidoso All-Seasons, board of directors in a breakfast session the next morning, not knowing the C. of C. had talked of the convention problem, heard criticisms of treatment of convention delegates and also talked of a possible convention center for the community within the bounds of Ruidoso.)

Other action by the board, some of whom had dinner at Nob Hill restaurant to kick off the meeting, included acceptance of the resignation of former president Charles Findley from the board and appointment of Lee Omerud, local insurance man, in the vacancy; cancelling plans for renovation of chamber of commerce signs in the area; appointment of Ed Hyman, Don Stark and John Hall to put in motion a "care-free" front yard for the C. of C. building, to include removal of rocks, flagstones and shrubs there now and replacing with decorative, or landscaping gravel; appointment of Driver and Hyman to set up the campaign for advance sale of admission tickets to Ruidoso Downs in its third August Thursday added racing day with all advance sales going to the chapter; a report on publicity Ruidoso has received in Field & Stream magazine, in the Mobile Tourist Guide and in the Diner's club publication.

Omerud, co-chairman with Wayne Estes in the 1968-69 membership drive, urged directors to take prospect cards and work them soon. He said \$5,000 in memberships had already been received from letters mailed prior to the drive, and that the amount represented about a third of what is sought.

He stressed the need for solicitors to get members to sign bank draft cards that would be good from year to year, saving further calls.

He said he and Estes planned to continue working for memberships during the entire year, and not just during the drive period each summer.

Manager Don Stark reported on his setting up a travel booth in Western Plaza Shopping Center in Amarillo, Texas for a week with 6,000 to 10,000 people seeing displays of recreation here, and with as many as 3,000 free passes to the races at Ruidoso Downs being given to interested fans. Two week-end accommodation visits to the area, with the Chaparral Motor Hotel and the Villa Inn providing the facilities, were awarded in a drawing held in the show. Color slide film strips were shown continuously.

Herbert Smith Probate Judge Candidate

Herbert Smith, longtime resident of Ruidoso and Lincoln County, and who has served in several elective offices in this precinct as well as having an active career in Republican-party-work-in-years-past, has announced he will file his candidacy for Probate Judge in Lincoln county, subject to the C. O. P. primary in August.

Smith, in an announcement this week, said he was qualified for the office by experience, and that he will begin an active campaign soon to meet and talk with voters.

Several Groups Aid Police In Hunting Boy

Members of the White Mountain Jeep Club, 8 Canyon Job Corps, aided by three privately owned local planes and various individuals all joined with Ruidoso village and state police in an all-night hunt for a 9-year-old boy who strayed away from a hiking party southwest of Ruidoso Tuesday afternoon.

The youth, one of several here on a summer encampment at Southwest Children's Home, said when he knew he was lost and couldn't find his way after dark, he went to sleep.

Searchers worked through the night, and at 9 a.m. Wednesday he hailed a Ruidoso village police car in which Marshal O. S. Moores and Don Stark, Jeep club president, were riding, and asked for help. He wore no sweater, only a short-sleeved knit shirt and trousers.

Officers said his name was Steve Hendrix, 9, of El Paso.

He was found only half a mile from the children's home in the canyon near the old Wingfield dairy.

A helicopter had been summoned from Holloman Air Force Base at Alamogordo, but was turned back when the news was flashed the boy was found.

Marshal Moores expressed thanks to all those who helped, to cafes and others who sent food and for other assistance.

A spokesman for the White Mountain Jeep club, Mrs. Don Stark, also said "We wish to thank the restaurants and local citizens for food and coffee they supplied for searchers who were attempting to locate the lost boy."

Barron said this week that the five Thursdays will likely be offered various community organizations as benefit days—similar to the opening day which brought extra money for Ruidoso Band Boosters Club's band uniform (paid May 23).

Already confirmed are benefit days as follows:

Thursday, Aug. 1—Benefit for New Mexico Society for Crippled Children & Adults—the organization that conducts the annual Easter Seal campaign and which is headed up by H. Francis Berkshire, executive director. The state organization will sell Ruidoso Downs admission tickets throughout New Mexico at \$1 and will get to keep all the money on advance sales, Barron said.

Thursday, Aug. 8—Ruidoso-Honda Valley General Hospital Women's Auxiliary benefit day, with all advance ticket sales going to a fund to buy a new obstetrical table for the hospital. Mrs. Melba Frankum, president of the auxiliary, says the goal is \$1,000—and that she will call on organizations throughout the community to assist in the fund raising drive.

Thursday, Aug. 15—Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce benefit day, with Don Driver and Ed Hyman named co-chairmen to conduct advance ticket sales for the C. of C. tourist promotion work.

The other two days, Aug. 22 and 29, will be offered the Ruidoso Valley Ambassadors and to the Ruidoso All-Seasons, Inc., but plans are not complete yet for ticket selling campaigns for these two groups should they vote to accept the benefit projects. President Ed Wimberly of All-Seasons said Tuesday he would be in contact with manager Barron soon to talk over details of the proposal.

Fire Chief Jack Kennady, Jr. and Captain Charles (Cowboy) Murray of Ruidoso Volunteer Fire Department said this week that an extremely high forest fire indication has been relieved some with some showers in the area, but that there is still a dangerous possibility of fire at any time, and have declared that outdoor fires, for burning trash and refuse, cannot be built unless permission is asked. "We will approve such fires only

in the early morning or late evening hours," Kennady said. He said the Ruidoso department is working closely with the Ruidoso Ranger station of Lincoln National Forest here in policing such fires—and the co-operation of everyone is urgent. There have already been several small fires caused by picnickers and trash burners this spring—so caution is necessary in building any fire out of doors, the fire chief explained.

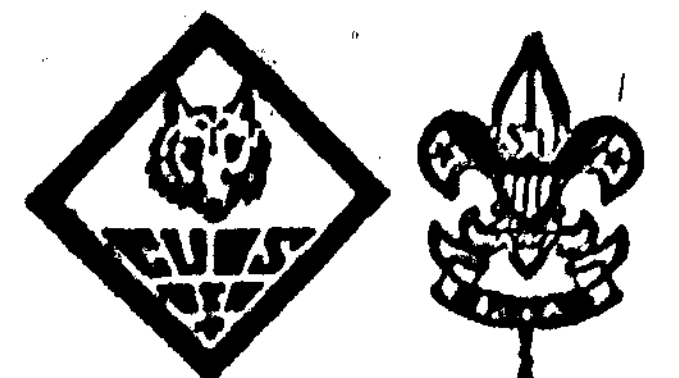

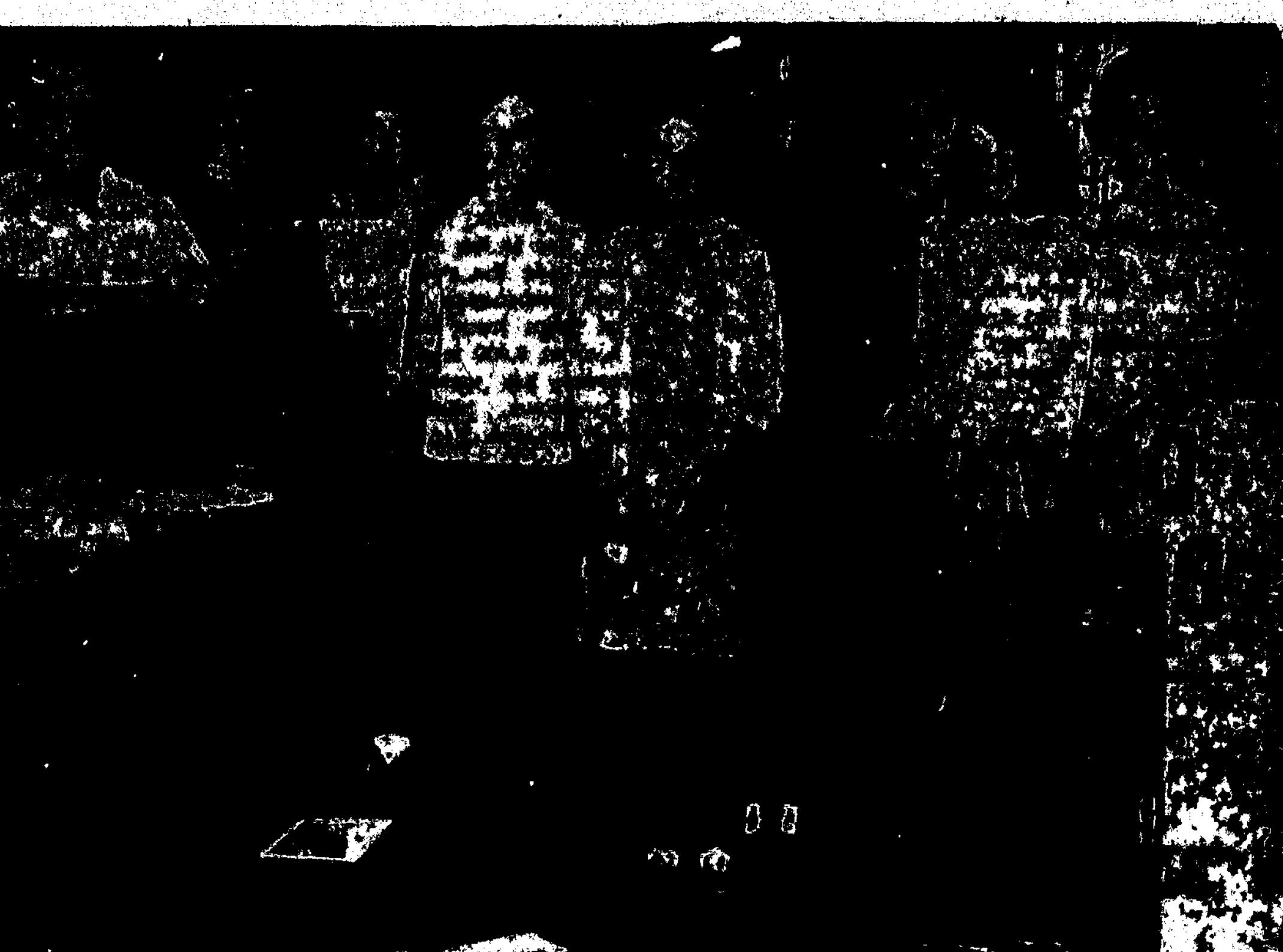

ORDINANCE NO. 29

An ordinance regulating and licensing the keeping of dogs, requiring the immunization of dogs against rabies, providing for the confinement, impounding, quarantine and destruction of dogs and other animals in certain cases, providing methods of enforcement and making violations a misdemeanor, punishable by fine not exceeding \$100.00.

It is hereby ordained by the board of trustees of the village of Ruidoso, New Mexico as follows:

Sec. 1. Definitions. As used in this ordinance the following terms mean:

Owner: Any person, group of persons or corporation owning, keeping or harboring a dog.

Vaccination: Injection of a vaccine, approved by the state veterinarian, and administered by a licensed veterinarian for the purpose of immunizing a dog against rabies.

Spayed female dog: A female dog certified by a licensed veterinarian to have been spayed.

Exposed to rabies: A dog has been exposed to rabies within the meaning of this ordinance if it has been bitten by any other animal or if it has been in contact with any animal known or reasonably suspected to be infected with rabies.

Sec. 2 — Enforcement — The provisions of this ordinance shall be enforced by the Village Marshall.

(See Ordinance 28 Below for Enforcing Here)

Sec. 3 — Tag and Collar:

(a) With the license there shall be delivered to the owner a metal tag stamped with the number of the license and the year for which issued. The shape of such tag shall be changed each year.

(b) The owner shall see that the dog wears at all times a collar or harness to which such tag shall be attached.

(c) If such tag is lost or destroyed, the owner may obtain a duplicate with the presentation of the license and payment of a fee of \$1.00 for the duplicate tag.

Sec. 4 — Restrict:

The owner shall keep his dog under restraint at all times and shall not permit such dog to run at large off the premises or property of the owner.

Sec. 5 — Vaccination:

No dog shall own, keep or harbor within the Village limits any dog over three months old unless such dog has been vaccinated within one year, or any dog over six months old and not over twelve months old unless such dog has been vaccinated within six months.

Section 7 — Impounding:

(a) Dogs not licensed or vaccinated and dogs found running at large in violation of this ordinance shall be seized and impounded, and if not redeemed by the owner within 72 hours thereafter may be humanely destroyed or otherwise disposed of as provided in this ordinance.

(b) All dogs found running at large may be seized or impounded.

(c) Reasonable effort shall be made to promptly notify the known owner of any impounded dog, or the holder of the license on any licensed dog.

Sec. 8 — Redemption of Impounded Dogs:

(a) The owner shall be entitled to resume possession of any impounded dog upon payment of the impounding fees set forth herein and in compliance with the license provisions of this ordinance.

(b) Any dog impounded under the provisions of this ordinance and not reclaimed by the owner within 72 hours shall be humanely destroyed or placed in the custody of some person deemed suitable who will agree to become the responsible owner thereof and comply with the provisions of this ordinance; provided, if the dog is one to which the respective rights of the owner and the person in possession or custody are determined by state law, such law shall be complied with.

Sec. 9 — Impoundment Fee:

Any dog impounded hereunder may be reclaimed as herein provided upon payment by the owner to the Village Clerk of the sum of \$2.00 for the first day or fraction thereof and \$1.00 for each day thereafter.

Sec. 10 — Confinement of Certain Dogs:

The owner shall confine within a building or enclosure every fierce, dangerous or vicious dog, and every female dog in heat. The confinement shall be in such manner that the dog cannot come in contact with any person or animal, except for breeding purposes.

Section 11 — Rabid Animals:

(a) Every rabid dog or animal and every dog or animal exposed to rabies shall be immediately confined by the owner, who shall promptly notify the Police Department, which shall then immediately notify the County Health Officer where such dog or animal is confined and the reason therefor. The owner shall not permit such dog or animal to come in contact with any person or animal. The owner shall surrender possession of such dog or animal to the Police Department on demand for supervised quarantine. The owner shall pay the cost of such quarantine, or the owner may at his option and expense have such animal quarantined at the hospital of a licensed veterinarian. Such dog or animal shall not be released from him, and of his investigation of the same. The report of a rabid case involving a rabid animal shall be immediately communicated to the Director of the County Health Department.

(b) The foregoing records shall be audited annually in the same manner as other city records are audited and shall be open to inspection as public records at all reasonable times.

Sec. 16 — Penalties:

Any person violating this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and punished by a fine not exceeding \$100.00, and if such violation be continuing, each day's violation shall be a separate offense.

Sec. 17 — Appeals:

All other ordinances in conflict herewith are repealed to the extent of such conflict.

Sec. 18 — Severability:

If any part of this ordinance be held void, such part shall be deemed severable, and the invalidity thereof shall not affect the remaining parts of this ordinance.

ORDINANCE NO. 30

An Ordinance to amend that certain ordinance of the Village of Ruidoso, Lincoln County, New Mexico numbered No. 10 and entitled "Animals".

Be it ordained by the Board of Trustees of the Village of Ruidoso, Lincoln County, New Mexico:

That Sec. 2 of Article 1 of Ordinance No. 19 be amended to read as follows:

Sec. 2. That the Pound Keeper shall receive in full compensation for his service as such Pound Keeper, the following fees for the care and keeping of animals taken and impounded by him, to-wit:

For each animal impounded—\$2.50.

For each animal held—\$1.00.

For the care, keeping and feeding of each animal, such as dog, hog, per day—\$1.00.

Any animal not kept and impounded shall be deemed to have been held one day and liable to full charge per day; and only the proportion of the fee provided per day shall be charged according to the number of times such animal has been fed.

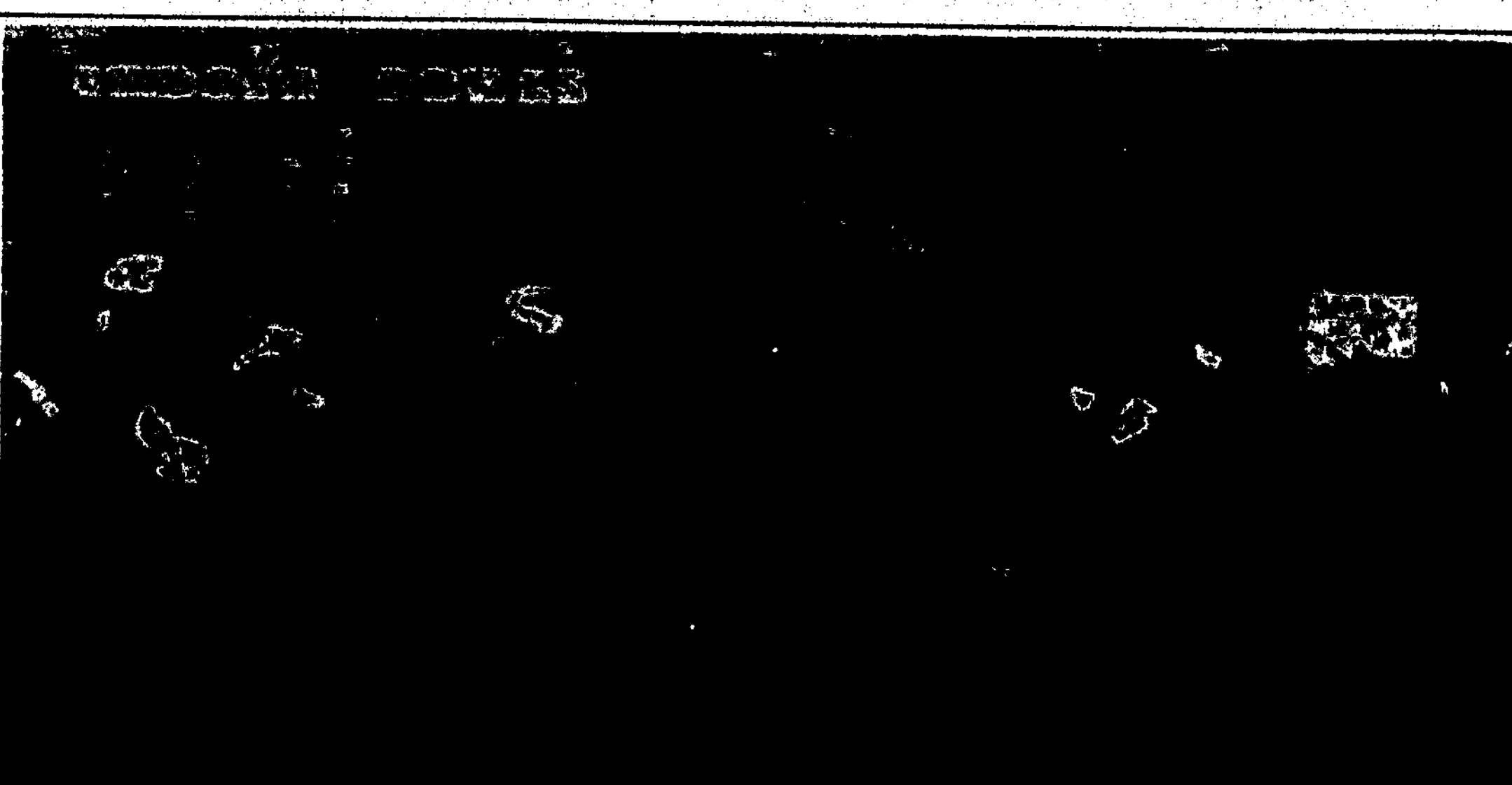

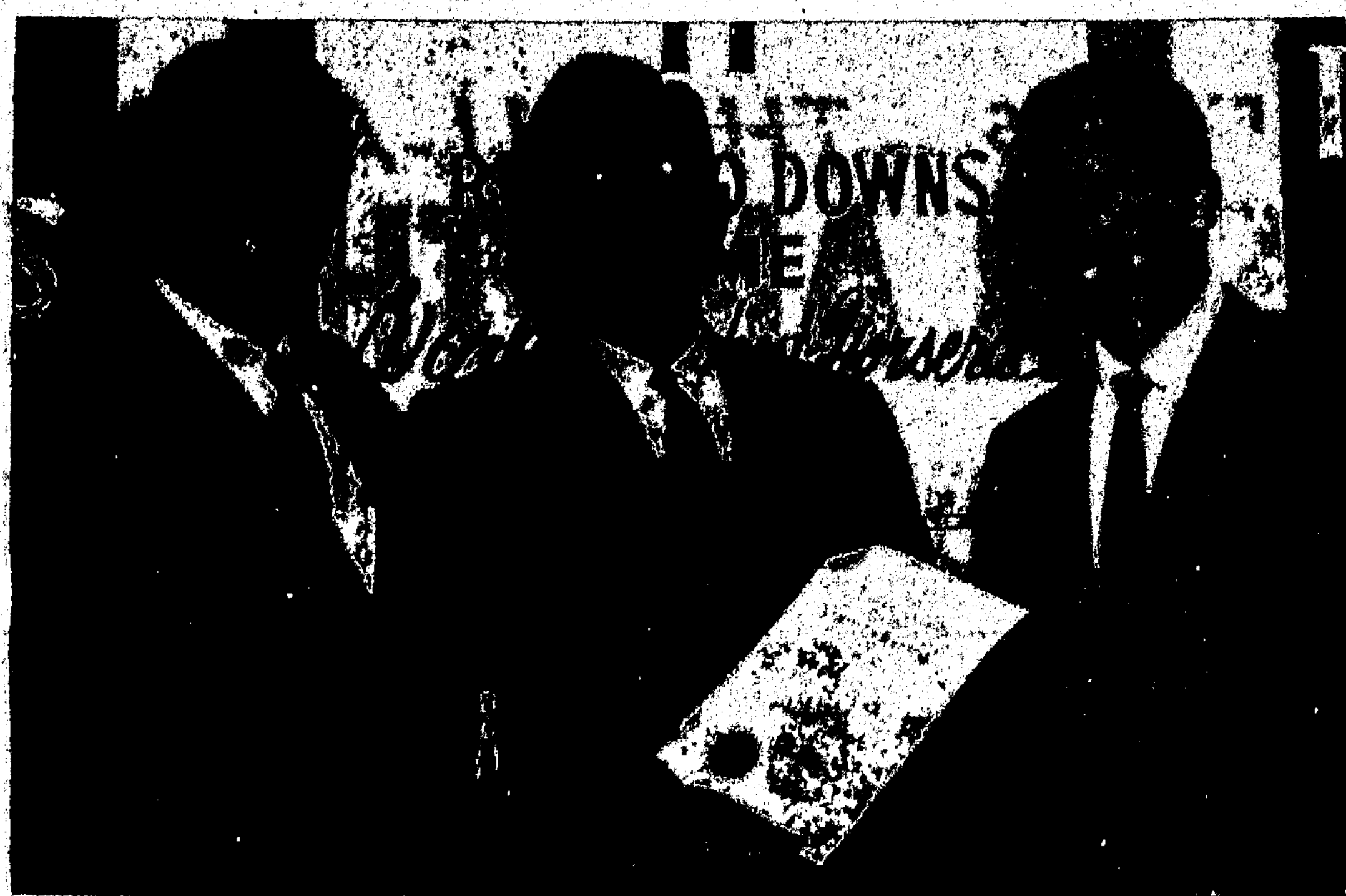

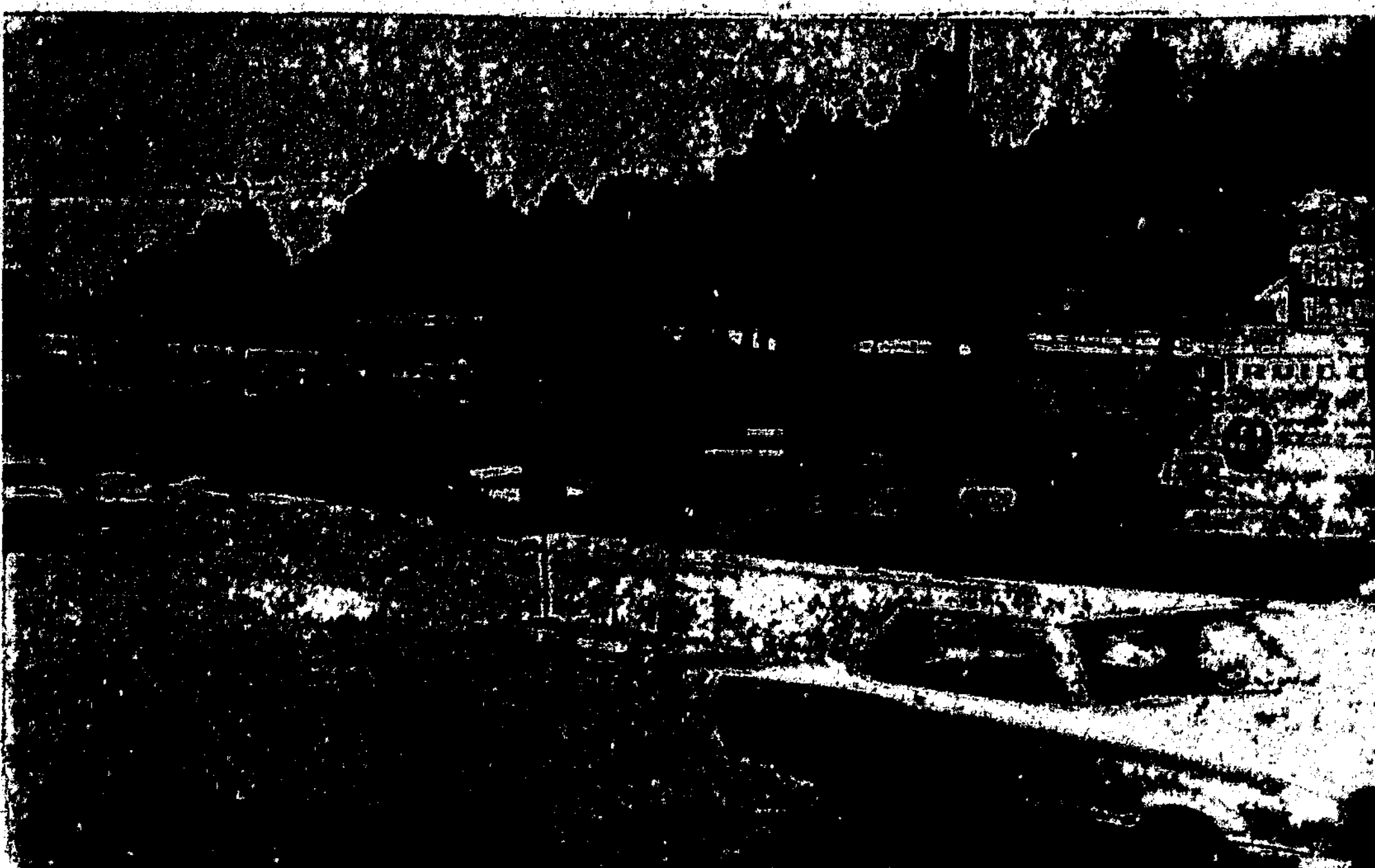

I had a visit Saturday with Lee Skinner and John Corcoran of the National Speleological Society on the Fort Stanton Caves. They feel that this cave is being destroyed by visits of unarmored persons. They are stepping on the flowstone. Once the velvet on the flow stone is destroyed it stops growing. Carbide from lights is casually being dumped and it kills the few silverfish like insects unique to the cave. Preservation of this cave is necessary if it is to be developed. We in Lincoln County have the potential of a multi million dollar industry, so let's try to help prevent its destruction.

Thursday evening I attended a committee meeting of the San Patricio Fruit Cooperative with Gene Ott, Extension Farm Management Specialist. They plan on looking at packing equipment for their packing operation. They hope to be ready by Aug. 1 to pack pears. 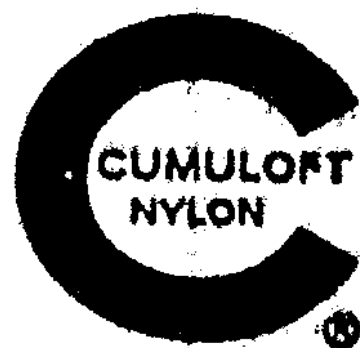

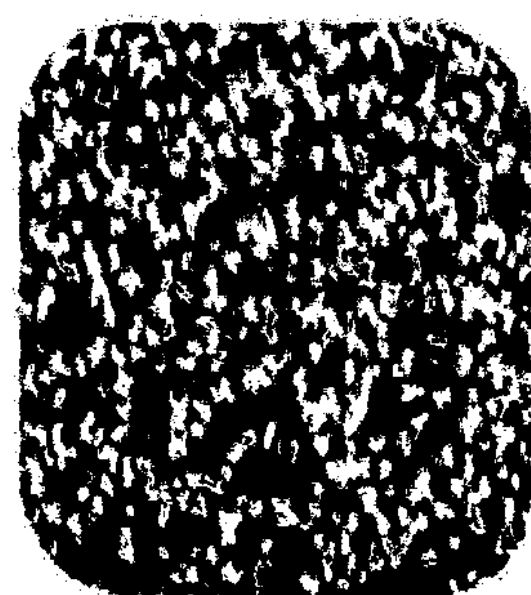

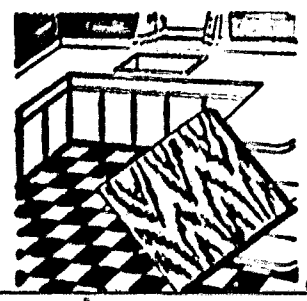
