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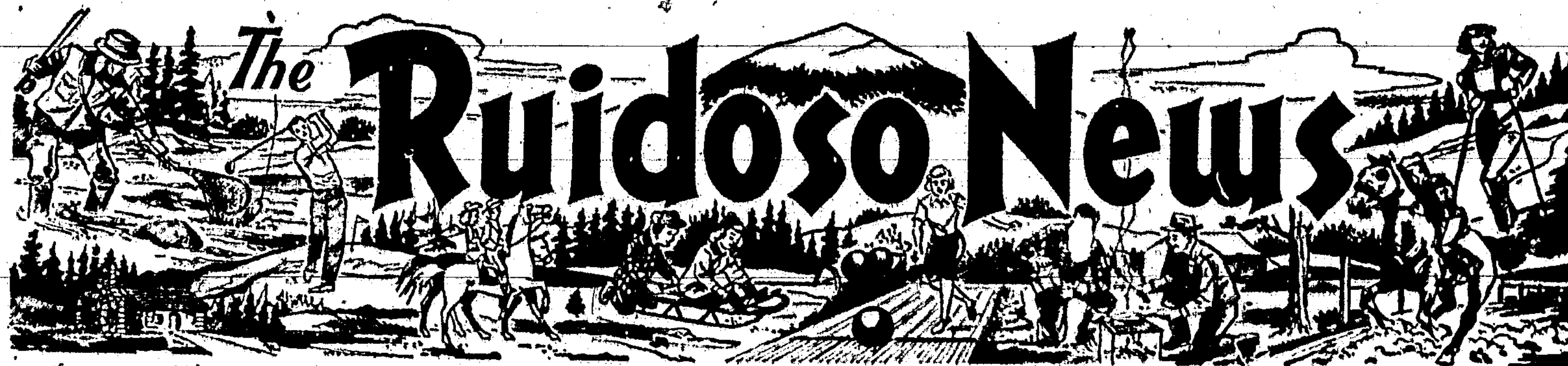

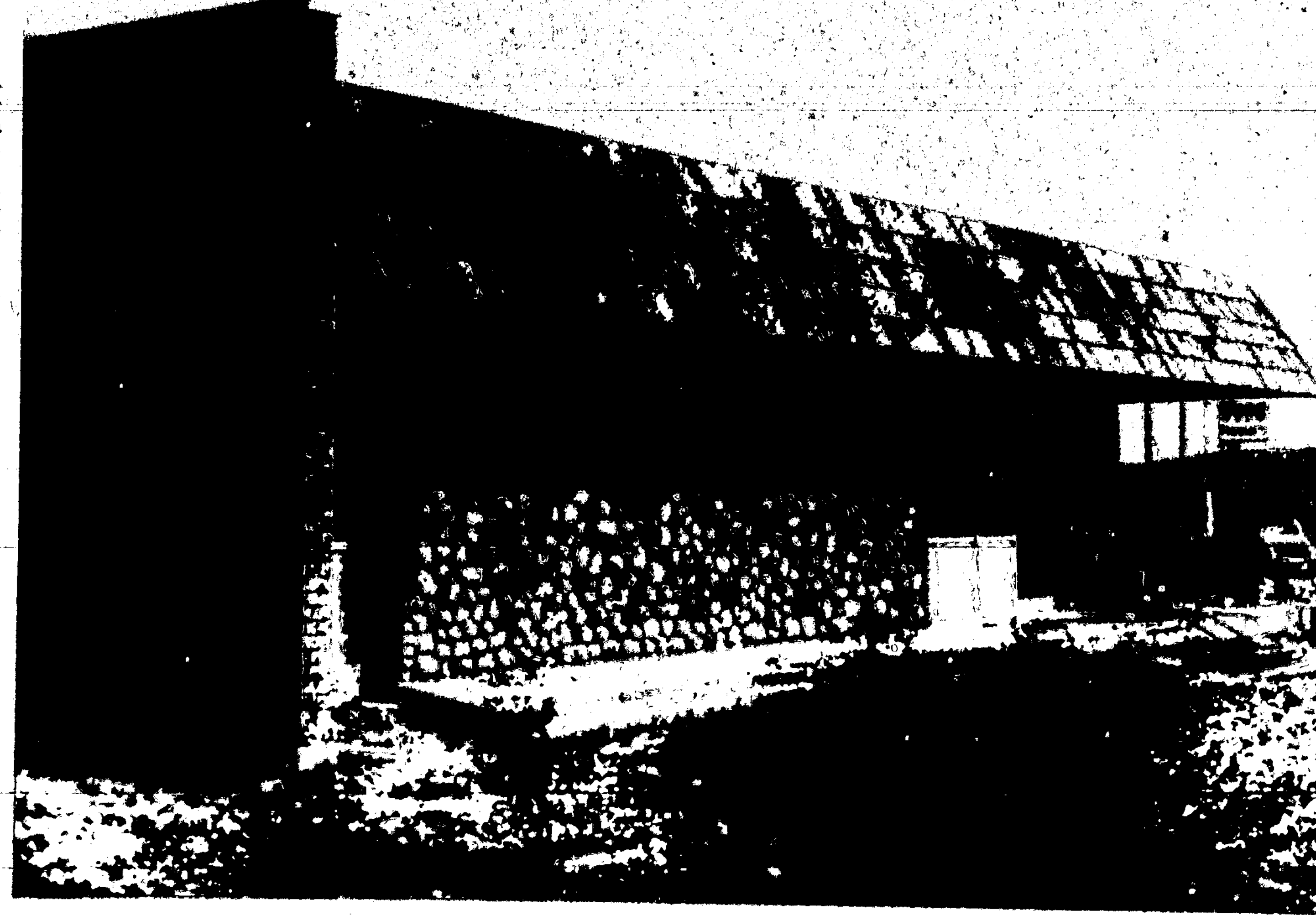

San Patricio Man Critically Injured In US 70 Accident

Bob Miller of the New Mexico State Police investigated an accident 14.5 miles east of Ruidoso Downs on U. S. Highway 70 Monday afternoon that sent one man to the Ruidoso Hospital with several broken bones.

Miller reported that a 1965 John tractor-trailer, driven by Jack Anderson Britt, 44, of Roswell, was parked on the shoulder of the road when a 1963 Ford pickup, driven by Eliseo Gallegos, 56, San Patricio, ran into the back of the truck.

The pickup left the road when it collided with the larger truck and pushed it forward 16 feet.

Gallegos was taken to the Ruidoso Hospital where he was listed in critical condition this morning. Officer Miller reported that Gallegos possibly had a broken neck and that both his legs were broken. No citations were issued.

At a meeting Nov. 8 in Carrizosa, the Lincoln County Development Association presented the following resolution which was accepted by the Lincoln County commissioners:

Be It Resolved that we, the Lincoln County commissioners, and the Lincoln County Development Ass'n recommend that prime consideration be given to the development of the Fort Stanton caves and that this development be coordinated with all agencies concerned.

Whereas, the development of the resources of Lincoln county is a vital necessity to its continued growth, and

Whereas, land needs to be used to the maximum benefit of all people and multiple use of Fort Stanton lands for research in range management, livestock and wildlife should include its recreation uses in a coordinated program, and

Whereas, the overall economic development plan recognized the recreation development as the primary need in Lincoln county,

Whereas, vandalism is continuing to destroy some valuable parts of this natural attraction, we urge that a coordinated development plan be implemented as soon as possible; and

Whereas, we would like to complement the Bureau of Land Management, New Mexico State University and the National Speleological Society for their cooperation and assistance in appraising the Fort Stanton caves for potential development, their support in helping reduce the vandalism is appreciated;

Therefore, please consider this resolution as an application from the Lincoln County commissioners and the Lincoln County Development Ass'n. for your help in developing the Fort Stanton caves. As the work you have accomplished is a valuable start, please let us know what you need from us to assist you in developing the caves.

On Nov. 7, the Lincoln group met to discuss establishing an Historic Site in Lincoln. The group decided to have a committee develop a proposed ordinance for the site. The committee named was: Bob Clumpston, Maude Perry, Edward Penfield, Walker Hearn, Roman Macz, Mrs. Christobel Zamora and Ray Taylor. Alternates named are Mrs. St. Salas, Red Ramey and Bill Shreevogost.

Cook Named Supervisor Of Lincoln

Appointment of Robert A. Cook of Missoula, Montana to the position of supervisor of the Lincoln National Forest was revealed today by William D. Hurns, Southwestern Regional forester.

Cook will assume duties of the office on Nov. 18, succeeding John Hall, who has been transferred to another administrative position in the region.

Cook is being promoted from a staff position in the division of operation of the Forest Service's northern region.

Prior to his assignment in the Northern Regional Office, he was in charge of timber management on the Cour d'Alene National Forest in Idaho. He has worked as a district forest ranger and served in other capacities on the Lolo and Flathead National Forests in Montana and the Kamiku National Forest in Idaho.

A native of Dorothy, W. Va., Cook graduated from the Colorado State University's School of Forestry in 1950 where he majored in range management. During World War II he served in the Navy for two years.

He and his wife, Jean, have three boys and one girl.

COLLEGE DEVELOPMENT DESCRIBED AS FEASIBLE

"It's all systems go!" That was the very optimistic summary made by Paul Wrye, chairman of the executive committee of High Mesa College, Inc., a chartered organization seeking to develop a college here on reporting on the receipt of a letter from Tamblin & Brown, a New York City firm that surveyed the prospects here.

Friday the executive committee determined from the firm's report that it is very feasible that a college can be established here, Wrye reported.

"Our ambition now is to go full speed ahead on the hopes and ambitions of many people to sponsor an institution of higher learning in this area," Wrye declared further.

"The feasibility study made by this very responsible firm also recommended that we continue to coordinate our efforts with Franklin Pierce College of Rindge, New Hampshire, to open a southwest branch, or kindred institution of that young and vigorous college. The college strongly urged we work to cement our union with Franklin Pierce."

The Eastern college became interested in the prospects here when it learned an offer of 100 acres of very beautiful land in the Alto area by the Robert Scribner family had been made to encourage development of a college for Lincoln County. The land is valued at \$100,000.

Franklin Pierce executives have visited here on three occasions to review the prospects. Wrye said the president, Frank DiPietro, is expected back sometime before the end of the year for still another conference with the executive committee.

Wrye said the college sponsors here are highly optimistic that there can be a "going institution" within three to five years.

A major fund raising campaign will be launched shortly to finance the college development, with assistance expected to come from federal education money to provide some of the facilities.

The college sponsors here include a steering committee of about 40 leaders in the various communities of the county headed up by the executive committee composed of Wrye as chairman, Dave Parks, vice-chairman; Mrs. Reginald Hughes, secretary and George P. White, treasurer, with Bill Hutchinson, Scribner, Don Riggert, Tom Dignan, Gerald Dean, Austin Pritchett, Reginald Hughes and W. G. (Bill) Shreevogost as members.

Three Are Burned When Lantern Explodes In Trailer

Three Las Cruces hunters were hospitalized here with burns on hands and faces suffered when a lantern exploded, setting their camper-trailer afire. The accident occurred off U. S. Highway 70 East of Biscuit Hill late Friday.

Clayborne Terry, 18, was most seriously injured with second and third degree burns. He is the son of the Rev. Ed Terry, former Ruidoso Downs Baptist pastor.

The youth noticed the Coleman lantern flickering and popping and went to throw it out of the camper when it exploded in his hands.

Two of the men walked to Highway 70, flagged a passing motorist who carried them to Biscuit Hill Cafe where they summoned the Chapel of Roses ambulance.

Albert Fishburn, 46, and L. R. Krebs, 63, also received treatment here at the hospital for burns suffered in the mishap.

Young Terry was flown to an El Paso hospital for further treatment Tuesday and Krebs was taken by ambulance to the VA Hospital in Albuquerque. Fishburn was dismissed from the hospital on Monday.

The three had planned to be ready for the opening day of deer season in the southern half of the state Saturday.

The fire completely demolished the camper.

Another camper in the area brought one of the men's wallets to him the next day which he had found at the scene of the fire.

Your chamber directors feel that the college is one of the most significant projects ever undertaken here, and one which will have a profound effect on the area's culture, opportunity and economy. It deserves your support.

News**



Tigers Come From Behind To Win 3-B Title 29-14

Ruidoso's bubble for the conquest of District 3-B and perhaps winning the state crown was burst last Friday night on the local football field as they were dealt out of the race by a bunch of Tigers from Truth or Consequences. Incidentally, Ruidoso was trying for their thirteenth win in a row, dating back to the last three games of last season.

Ruidoso was off and running in the first quarter after an exchange of punts and the Warriors coming out on the best end of the deal on a very short punt by the Tiger punter, being blown dead on the Truth or Consequences' 20-yard line. On a third down and seven try, Nelson burst through the right side of the Tiger line and rambled 75 yards into the end zone for the TD. Raymond Taylor's kick for the extra point was true and Ruidoso took an early 7-0 lead.

Truth or Consequences came rearing back in the second quarter when Ruidoso attempted to punt from their 45-yard line and the ball went over Rick Scott's head and the Tigers got possession of the ball on the Ruidoso 34-yard line. A pass from Howard Keithley to Jim Campbell put the Tigers on the scoreboard. The PAT was good and the ball game was all tied up, 7-7.

Ruidoso wasn't satisfied with the tied up ball game as they came right back, driving 86 yards after receiving the kick from the Tigers after their TD. With Pearson, Nelson and Farrar working on the inside and Scott hitting the outside the Warriors got their offense rolling. The big play came when Pat Farrar threw a hailback pass to Barry Bizzell good for 16 yards and put the Warriors on the Tiger 8-yard line with a first and goal. Scott's hit down to the 2-yard line and then Pearson rambled in for the TD. Taylor's kick was once more good as Ruidoso took a 14-7 lead.

Ruidoso had a drive stopped in

the third quarter as they drove down to the Truth or Consequences' 19-yard line, only to lose the ball on a fumble.

Ruidoso's defense rose up and stopped a T. or C. drive on the Ruidoso 8-yard line late in the third quarter after the T. or C. Tiger defensemen and they jumped eleven had driven from their own 40-yard line. John Sanders, kicked a 17-yard field goal to put the Tigers within four points of Ruidoso.

The roof fell in for Ruidoso in the fourth quarter as Truth or Consequences racked up 19 big points while holding the Warriors to none. The big gun for the Tigers was their All-State candidate John Sanders as he demonstrated some fancy broken field running and fast speed.

Truth or Consequences scored twice within a few minutes as Sanders barreled 75 yards for one TD and on the ensuing kick, Ruidoso tried a triple handoff when the ball got away and a Tiger pounced on the loose ball in the Ruidoso end zone for 13 quick points.

A questionable play occurred in the fourth quarter with Ruidoso behind 23-14 when Scott was rushing

ed and in trying to scramble, dropped the ball. A referee was in the midst of the play and the ball hit him on the leg with Scott in hot pursuit with a chance to recover his own fumble. The ball took a bounce back toward the onrushing Tiger defensemen and they jumped on the loose ball. Sanders took quick action as on the first play after the fumble he rambled 64 yards to put the Tigers further out front and put the game on ice.

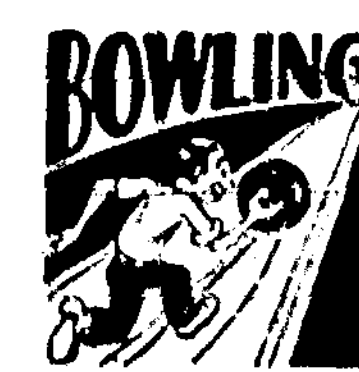

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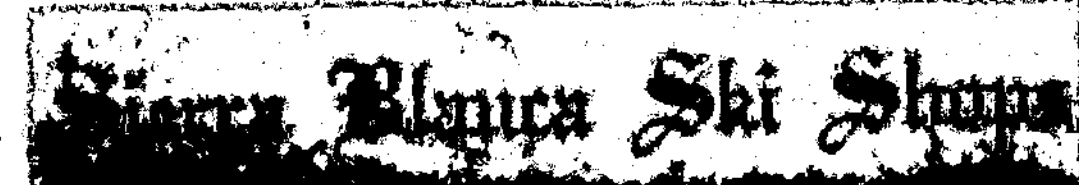

Not only has Laico Bird emerged into one of the top tier of the top bargains in the history of the sport. As a weanling, Laico Bird was purchased by Floyd Jones for \$5,000. Jones, the trainer's brother, bought the youngster after the original owner, B Bar J Ranch of Wichita Falls, Texas, turned down an auction bid of \$3,000.

The original owner, according to Trainer Jones, has been understandably frustrated by Laico Bird's spectacular success.

Laico Bird is slightly smaller than the average Quarter Horse. She has a delicate look which Jimmie Jones described as "A cross between an elk and a deer."

"She loves to run and she loves to win," Jones said. But her racing days will soon be over. After her brief Sunland campaign—which will probably include no more than three starts—she'll be returned to the Jones Ranch in Oklahoma to begin a career as a broodmare.

So far, Laico Bird has started 31 times. She won 16 races, finished second 11 times, and came in third twice. She's been out of the money only twice.

The biggest victory in her career was a conquest of the 1967 All-American Futurity at Ruidoso Downs, which netted a check for \$225,000—probably the biggest winner's share in the history of horse racing.

Other key victories include the Columbus Futurity, which brought \$16,000 for first place; The Gollad Futurity at Gollad, Texas (\$25,000); the Raton Futurity at La Mesa Park (\$52,000); and the Los Alamitos Futurity (\$62,000).

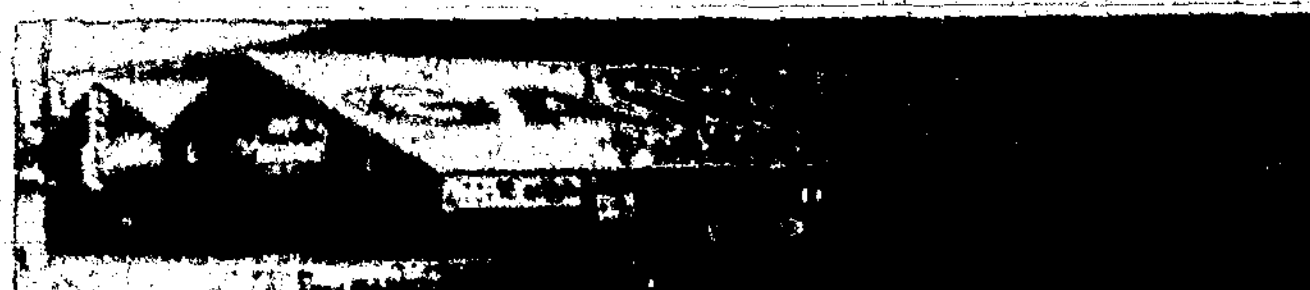

New Fishing Lake, Campgrounds Set For Opening On Apache Reservation

Fishermen, campers, hikers and outdoorsmen will have use of a new fishing lake, campgrounds, and hiking trail area sometime in the near future when plans are carried out by the Mesquero Apache tribe for developing the Clenege Recreation Area located between Mesquero and Cloudcroft on Highway 24.

Wendell Chino, president of the Mesquero tribal council, presided at a ceremony to celebrate the opening of the flow of water from Silver Creek into a 12-inch transit

roads and improving transportation on the reservation. "This is a tribal land project," All Galland, assistant director of the Eight Canyon Conservation Job Corps camp, said, "we will be helping them develop the lake for recreational purposes. It provides opportunities for our campers to get good training in such work as roadbuilding, bulldozing, building trades and engineering." Located 7,719 feet above sea level, Clenege Lake will be using water which simply flowed away before. When the lake is filled, the water will overflow into the present creek and hopefully more fishing lakes and streams will be constructed later. The lake will be 34 feet deep at one end and will have

9.2 acres of surface when filled. Work was started on the project in May of this year and the ceremony recently culminated the effort to get the water diverted into its confines. Development plans for the Clenege Recreation Area include space for 34 campground sites in the immediate future designed to accommodate small trailers and truck campers, 30 walk-in campsites, a picnic area, playfield, a hiking trail, fire guard station and parking for some 70 cars in two lots. STANSELL L. JONES, PROJECT CHAIRMAN FOR LCC, Stanessell L. Jones of Ruidoso has been appointed by the trustees and administration of Lubbock Christian College to serve as Project IV Advancement representative for LCC in the Ruidoso and Lincoln County area. Project IV Advancement is LCC's drive to raise \$2,192,000 in three years to advance from a junior college to a four-year senior college serving twelve hundred students. Jones will lead in contacting all alumni, parents of ex-students and prospective friends of Lubbock Christian College. He has been a loyal booster of LCC and he has helped the college grow to its present size with 10 permanent buildings and assets of over \$5 million. Seven hundred and thirty-five students are presently attending the private junior college. The funds will be used to in-
