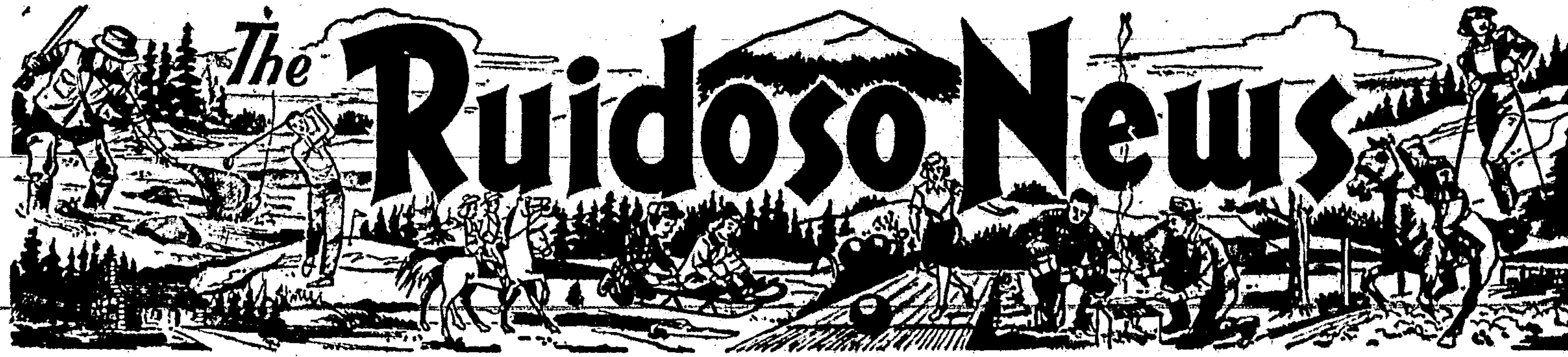

California Couple Buys Ruidoso News

Around Town

Seventeen years and two months ago the Lamb family purchased the Ruidoso News from Mr. and Mrs. L. P. Bloodworth who had founded the paper just five years previously, and also the small commercial printing plant of Byron L. Autry. Combining the Autry facilities with some the Lambs moved here, Ruidoso had its first modern commercial printing shop—but lacked all equipment necessary to print the Ruidoso News in its own home town. It was being printed in another city each week—but in only a little more than a year, with the assistance of Claude Miller, all equipment was obtained and the News was printed for the first time here. Since then, the newspaper plant and the commercial printing business have each been enlarged and expanded three times—as we thought the same problems as other public services here—of keeping pace with the rapid growth of our community. When we arrived in 1951 the population was counted at 850 permanent residents and the News' circulation was just about that same number. Today with a population of 4,500 and with a News circulation averaging better than 3,000 copies a week year 'round we can reflect on much progress and much hard work by our own shop force and that of others in the community to bring Ruidoso up to date. It is today. And, the story of our growth is only beginning as we see it from the editor's chair. The period of time we have spent here in seeing the community grow so much has been one of the most rewarding chapters in our life.

We remember the old phone system when we cranked the phone to get the operator, and when we also cranked one short and two long, etc., to call someone. We had only the barest essentials of a water system, only a couple of fire trucks, no bank, no cemetery, no sewer system, and there were only two school buildings and only five churches. We've built six additional school buildings, installed a couple more fire stations, five new churches and a host of other things like three shopping centers, some big motels, etc., etc., and still we say Ruidoso has only started!

In reminiscing like that we can get too sad—so we'll stop that and reflect more on the people of this place. Ruidoso's growth can be placed on the shoulders of several very fine citizens who have toiled long and hard in village boards, school boards, in individual businesses and in other fields to keep Ruidoso on the go—and prepare for the continuing increase in service and in patronage. Ruidoso has enjoyed. The continuous solid growth has never stopped and will not stop—Ruidoso will never stand still.

As we step aside to allow a new family to move in to operate the News, we leave with deep regret. (Continued to Page 6—Sec. A)

"We are looking forward to working and living in Ruidoso and will strive to continue the fine tradition of public service established by Vic Lamb," the Barretts said.

Native-born pioneer Ruidoso Valley rancher Wilbur Coe was laid to rest at Honono Tuesday afternoon following funeral services held in St. Anne's Episcopal chapel in that community. The colorful old-timer, a though crippled throughout his life had a zest for living and an interest in planning for progress and growth for the entire area that made him a figure who leaves many to mourn him and many to enjoy the fruits of his ideas and work.

The Rev. William Eubanks, Lincoln County Episcopal vicar, conducted the services.

He died at the age of 75 at 3 15 p.m. Sunday afternoon in the Ruidoso-Hondo Valley General Hospital where he had been brought only a few hours before.

Coe had enjoyed his very busy life by completing a valuable Negro history book, "Ranch on the Rio Grande," published and named the month by Alfred Knopf, worldwide known publisher firm of New York. He had had an appointment at a local radio shop to introduce a new radio set and New Mexico in recent years.

His wife, Mrs. Coe, said her husband had been a pioneer in the valley and a pioneer in the valley.

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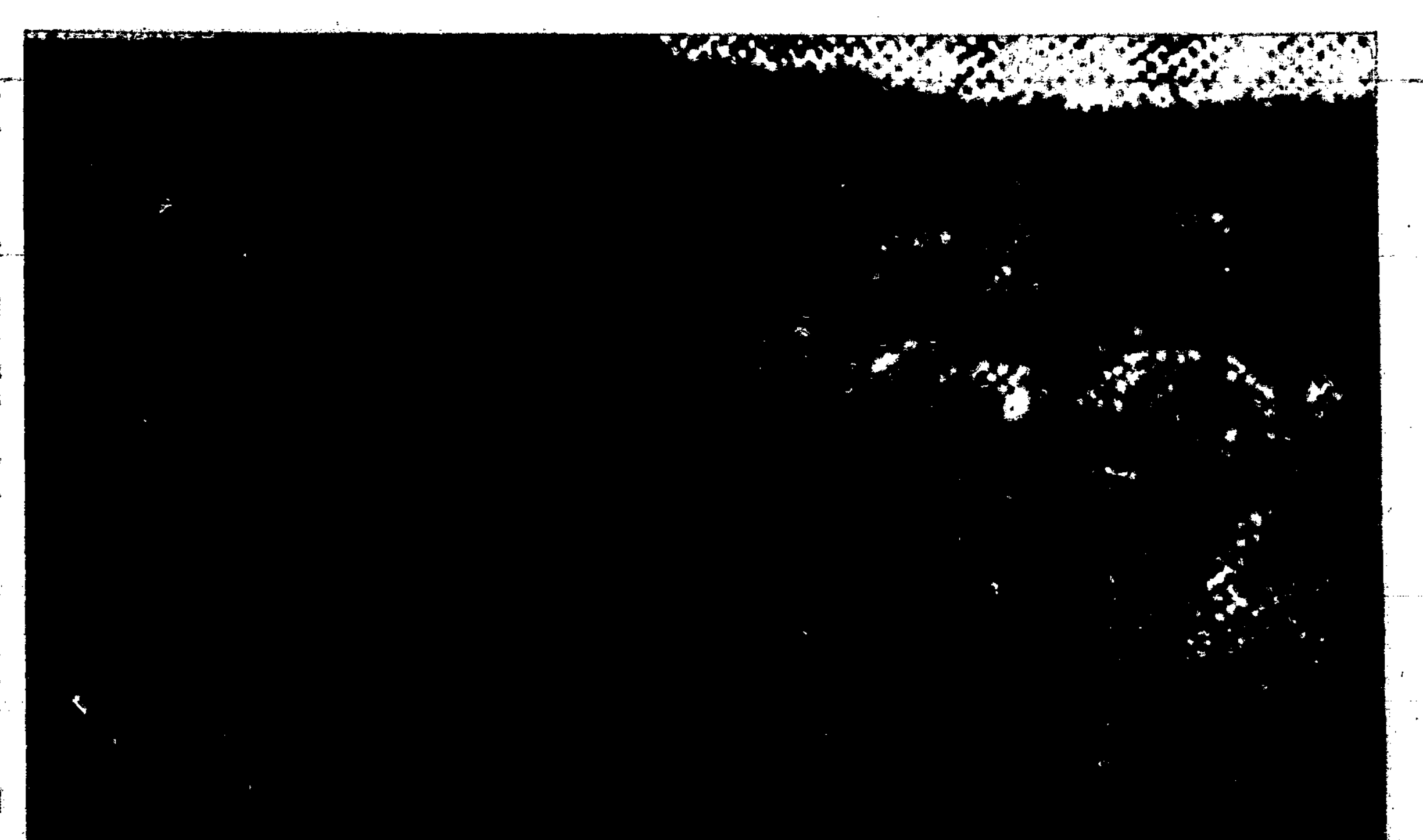

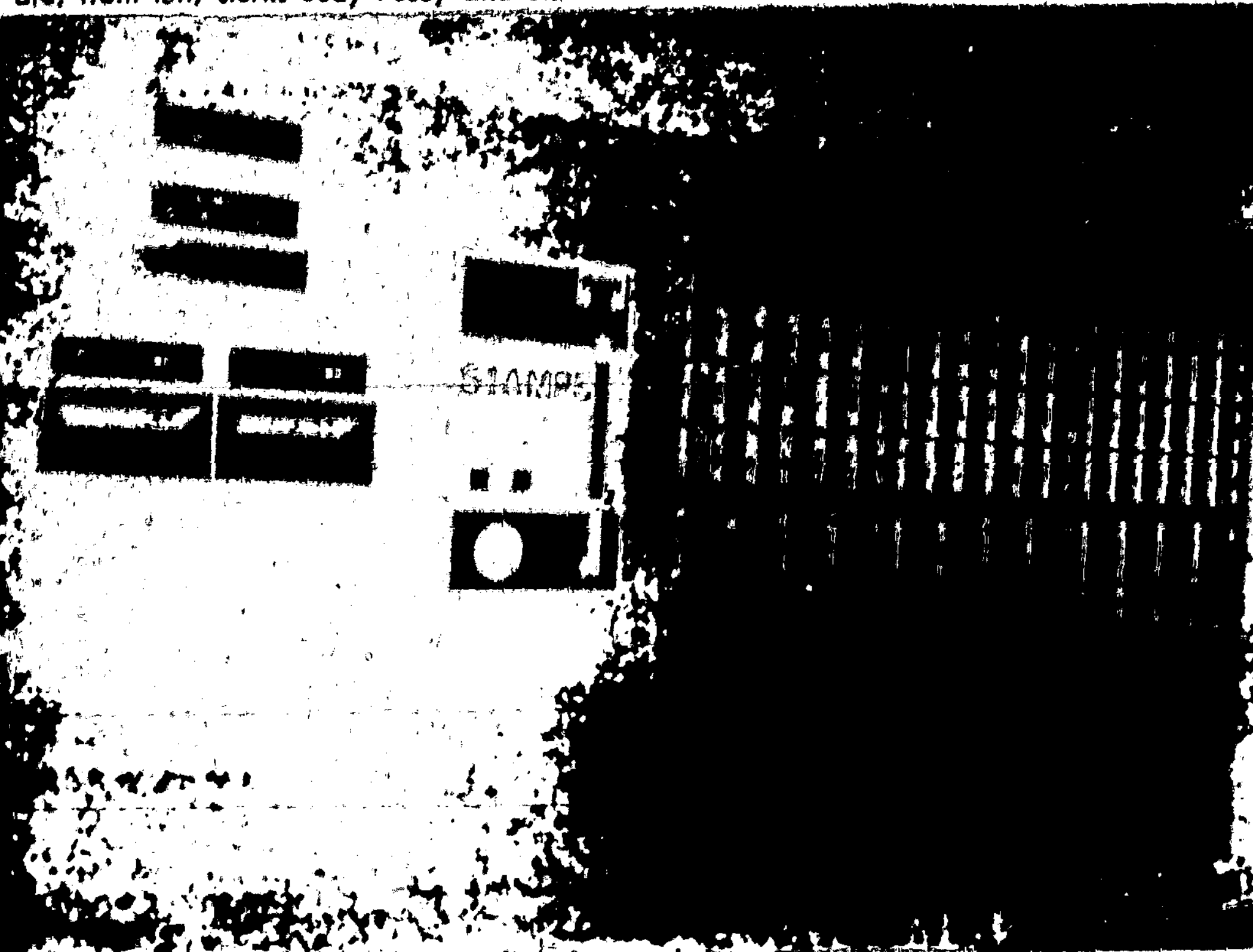

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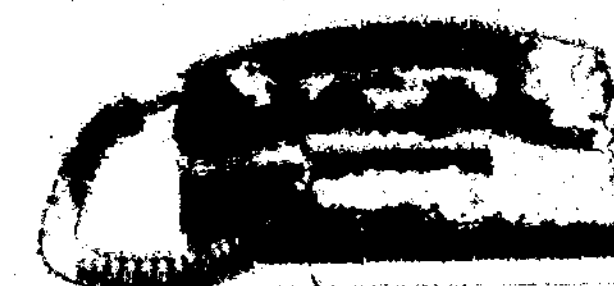

Village Marshal O. S. Montes warned Ruidoso drivers of the dangers of driving their cars with the windshield and windows covered with frost or ice.

"The 'peephole' driver," he said, "the individual who clears a small spot on the windshield, endangers not only his own life, but the lives of his fellow citizen. State law," he added, "requires that all windshields and the windshield be unobstructed, thus permitting the driver to see any danger that he might face."

Many serious accidents have occurred, it was pointed out, because

the driver's vision was obstructed by ice or frost.

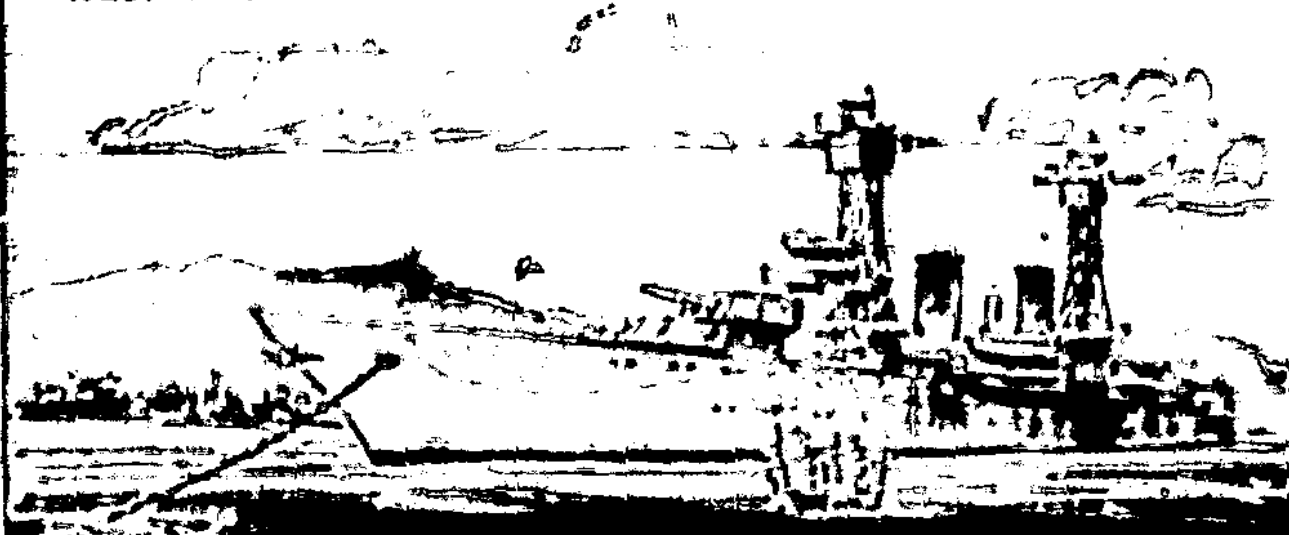
The few minutes that it takes to clear both the windshield and windows is just good insurance. Actually there is no reason for not having a clear field of vision. 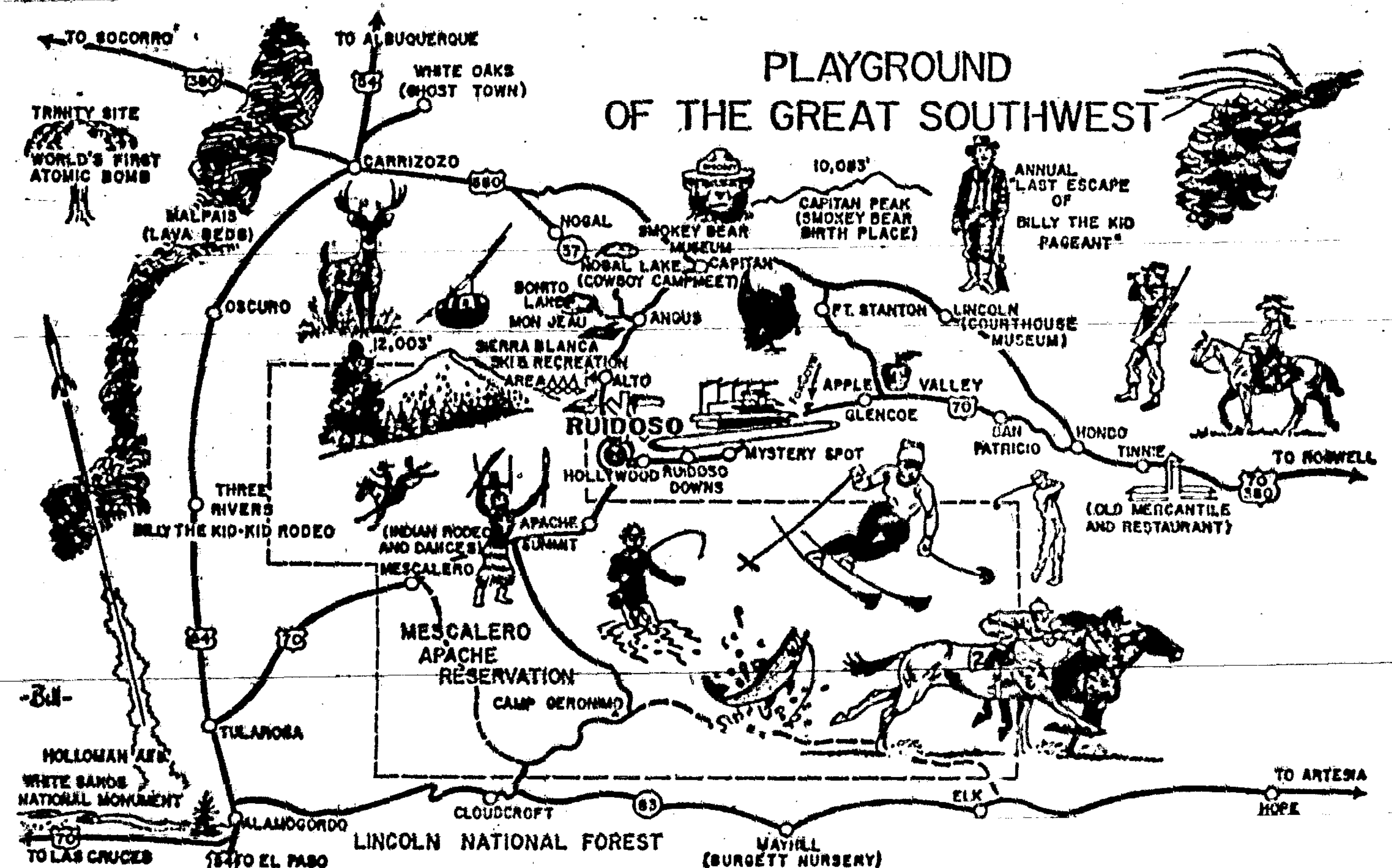

Forest Service Offers Trees For Christmas

The 12 National Forests in Arizona and New Mexico again this year have Christmas trees available for families who enjoy cutting their own, Southwestern Regional Forester William D. Hurst has announced.

Hurst added that some trees set aside for purchase and resale by dealers also remained and referred interested persons to the offices of Forest Supervisor for details.

Last year Christmas tree sales totaled 36,000 in Arizona and 62,000 in New Mexico. "In addition to the income to the Federal Treasury," Hurst said, "Christmas tree cutting serves to thin crowded stands, giving remaining trees growing room."

Individuals who plan to cut their family tree should see the District Ranger for \$1 permits and directions to the cutting area. Following is a list of National Forests and Districts where trees are available and the hours and dates individual Ranger offices will be open during week-ends. Tree species that can be cut vary from District to District.

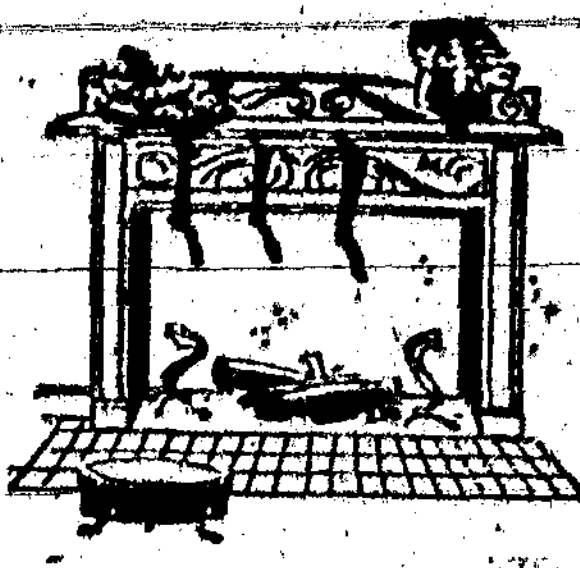
Although most offices remain open until 5 p.m., because of early darkness it is usually impractical to obtain a permit and try to cut trees after 3:30 or 4:00 p.m.

Almost all Christmas tree cutting areas are on dirt or gravel roads and are subject to closure if they receive heavy snow.

In the Lincoln National Forest all Ranger stations will be open 8-12 Captain, Dec. 7 through Saturday, a.m. and 1-5 p.m. weekdays except the Guadalupe Ranger District office at Carlsbad will not be open on Tuesdays. In addition, the following offices will be open on week-ends: Smokey Bear District at Dec. 21; Chisnolito, Ruidoso and Mayhill Districts, Nov. 30 through Dec. 22.

He was graduated from Stanford University and started work on a law degree when he was forced to return home and run the ranch during World War I.

Over the 15 years the bank has loaned a total of \$16 million. Its number of employees has grown from three to 20.

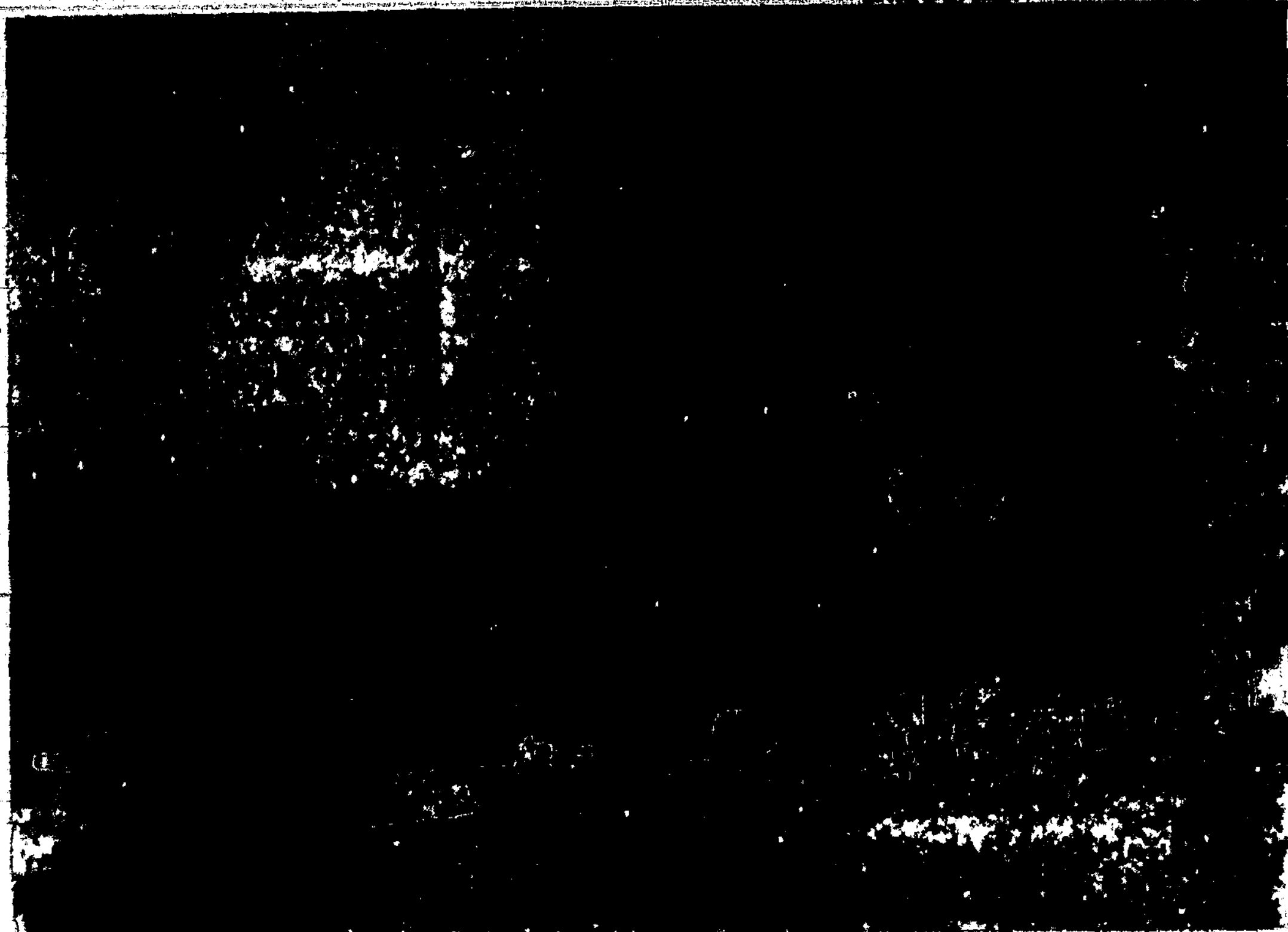

Suit Is Filed For County

At the request of state representative-elect Ralph Petty, Jr., district attorney Ernest Williams of Las Cruces met here shortly before noon with several local people to clarify what his office is doing in behalf of the county commissioners in seeking to get performance on a contract with Leon Nelson & Co., a firm employed more than two years ago to set up an equalization on tax renditions in this county.

He said that on Sept. 1, within seven days after he had been requested, he had filed a suit in district court on behalf of Lincoln county asking that the evaluation work be completed according to contract, or that records the company has up to date be turned over to the county, or that some other solution to the problem of delay on the survey be arrived at.

In the conference held here, Petty said there was some misunderstanding about the role of the district attorney had played in the controversy, and he wanted Williams to clarify some points in the action. Attending were local school officials, some of the county commissioners-elect who will begin new terms next year, as well as several news media representatives.

It was disclosed at the meeting that the Nelson firm had completed 85% of the evaluation survey. Previously it had been announced the survey was more than 92% complete.

Purpose of the county commissioners action in contracting for the survey was to bring tax equalization to this county and establish a base for fair rendition of all property, which in turn would create additional tax revenue and at the same time probably bring tax relief to some property owners whose taxes were rendered much too high.

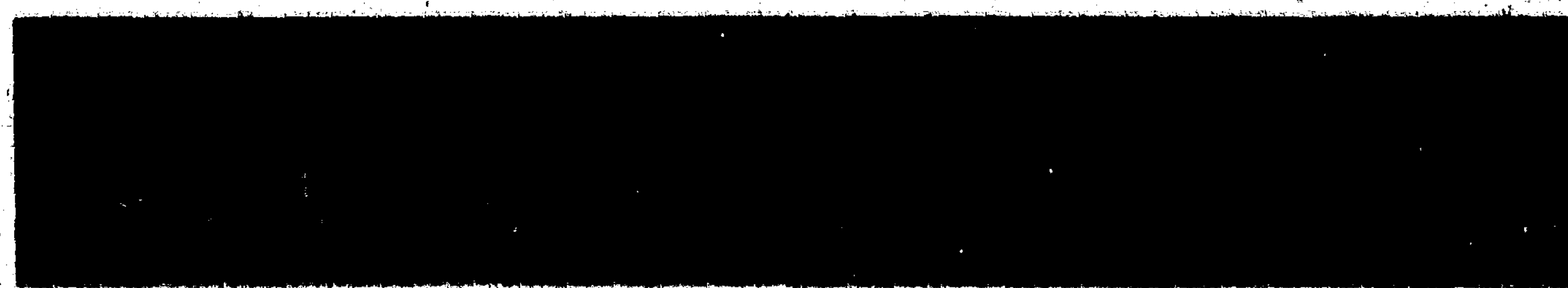

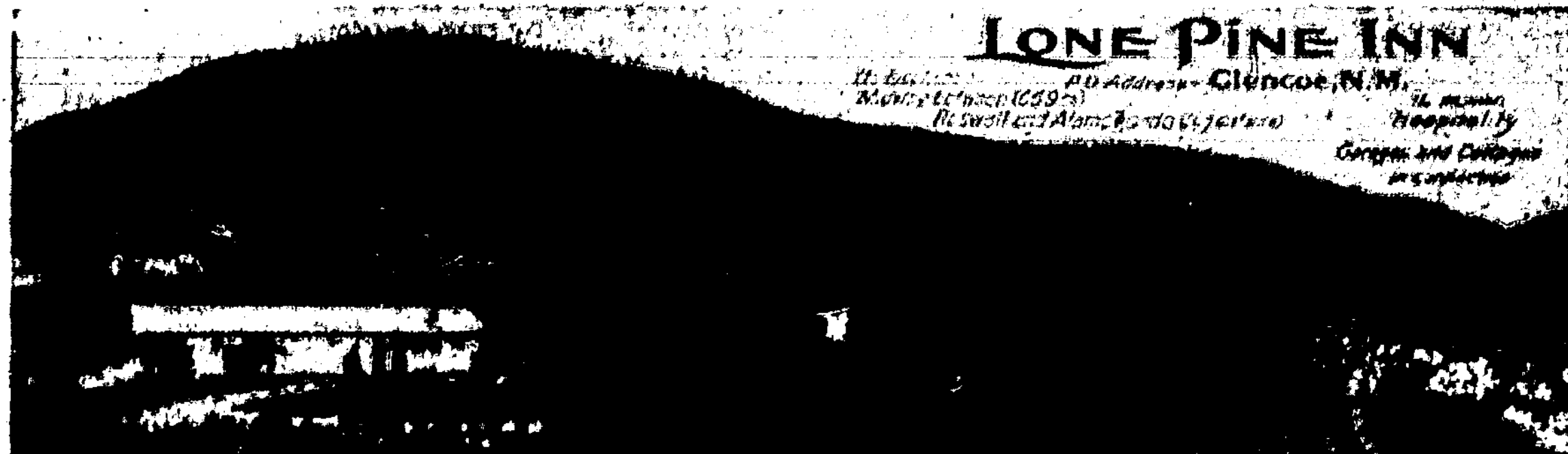

Ski Report—1968-69 Ski Season
1. The only official ski reports from the Sierra Blanca Ski Resort are available 24 hours a day by telephoning Area Code 505-257-4252. Note: Radio stations and newspapers will also be using this source to assure continuity and avoid misunderstandings.

2. These recorded ski reports will normally be changed twice daily, once in the morning (no later than 9 o'clock) and once in the afternoon (between 4:00 and 5:00 p.m.).

3. In the event that there is a change of skiing conditions during the day, i.e., additional snow fall, the recorded ski report will be so changed.

4. The recorded ski report will include the day and date; base snow depth in inches; skiing conditions rated as excellent, good, fair or poor; new snow in either past 24 hours and/or in past 10 days, and the weather at report time.

5. Ski Report Legend and Policy: Excellent—Sufficient base to cover any and all obstacles on all trails, and come new snow within past 10 days. Good—Sufficient base to cover all trails. No new snow within the past 10 days and surface conditions may vary to some extent, particularly from top of mountain to the base. Fair—Snow coverage not sufficient to cover all trails completely. Some obstacles may be showing on any or all trails. Poor—Many obstacles (bare spots, stumps, rocks, etc.) showing on all trails. Some lifts and some trails may be closed due to insufficient snow.

A. Trails and/or lifts may be closed at any time at the discretion of the management due to insufficient snow, difficult skiing conditions, or for any other reason the management deems necessary.

B. There may be times when all trails do not have the same conditions or the top of the mountain may not have the same conditions as the bottom. In this situation the report will be based on the management's best judgment of the average conditions.

C. The New Mexico State Highway Department maintains the highway with the finest snow removal equipment available, and as a result the highway conditions can easily change from bad to good within the hour. Thus it is impossible to report highway conditions. Chains may be required at any time, and we advise skiers to have chains with them at all times when driving to the ski area.

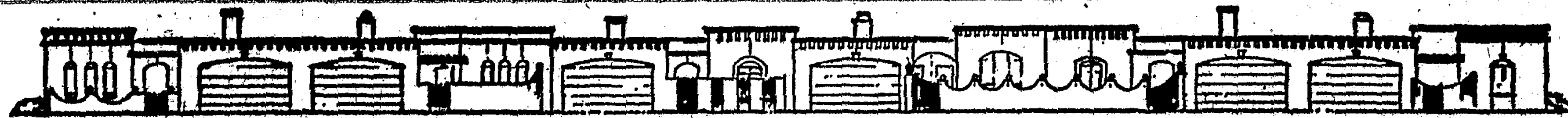

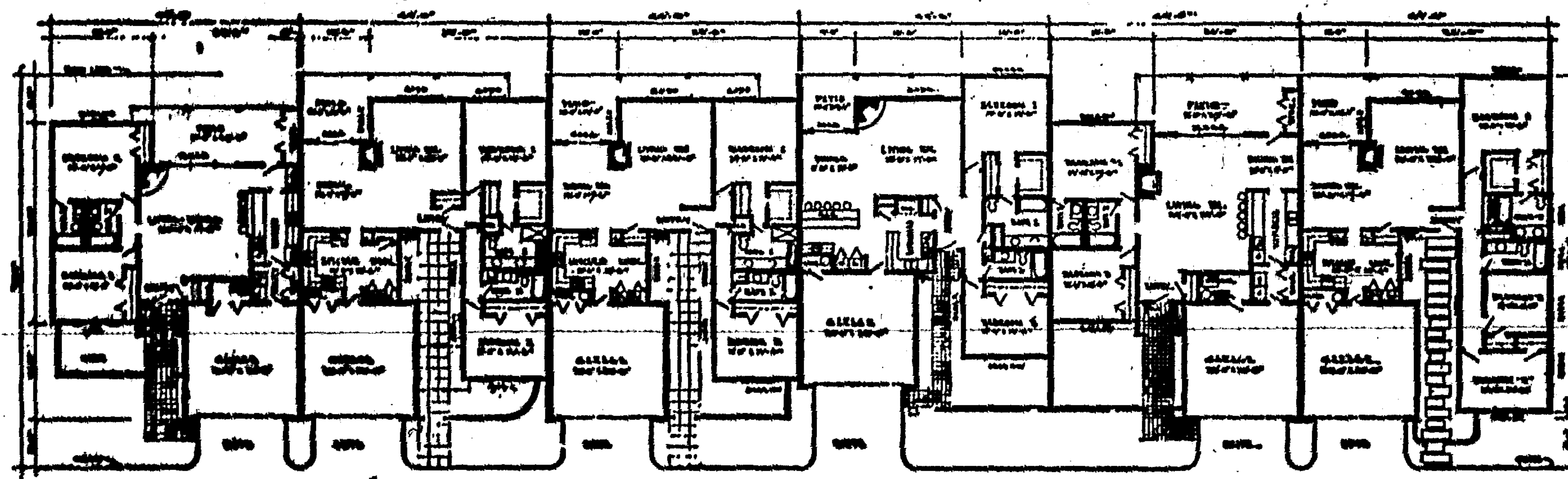

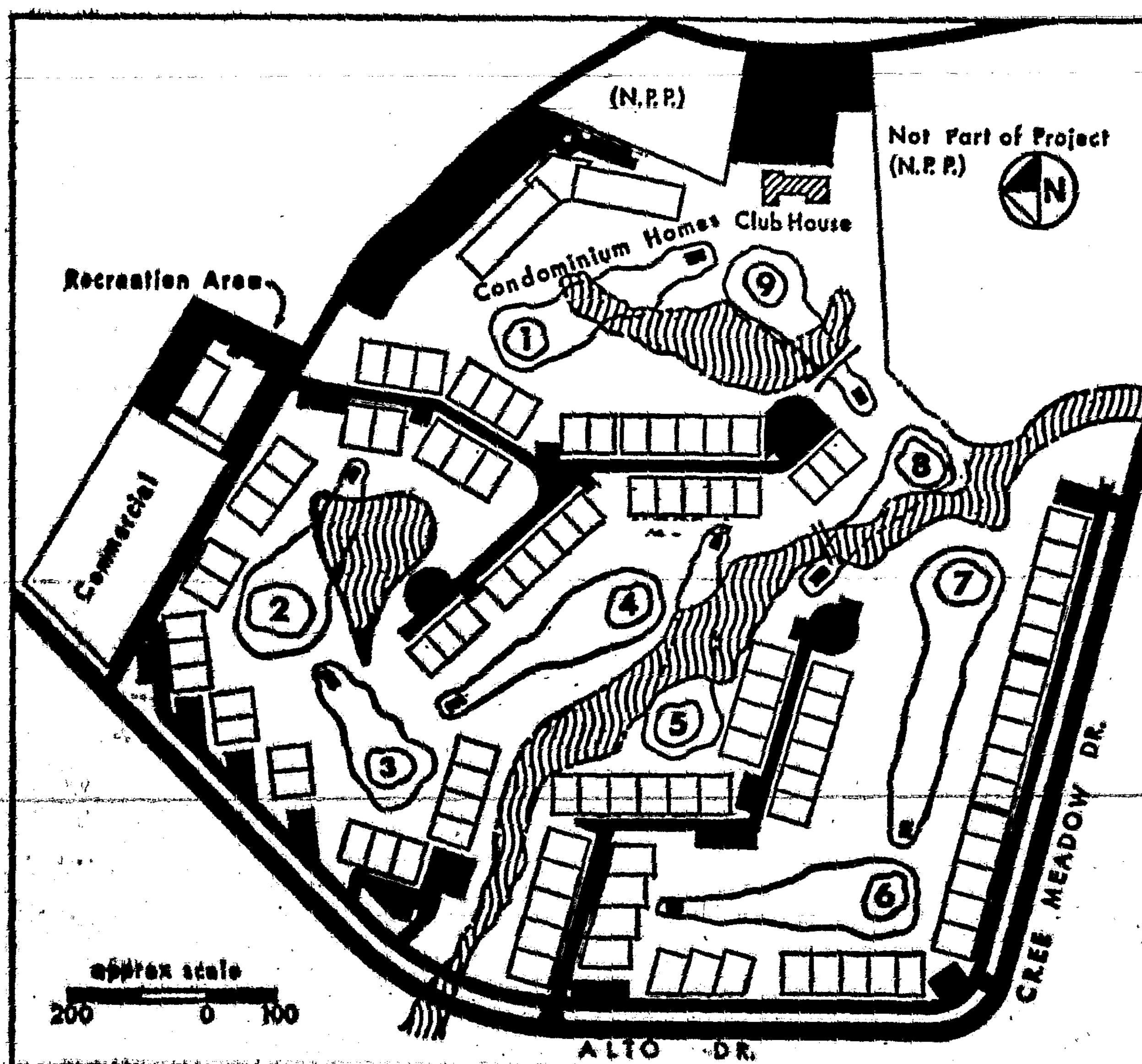
