

## SERVICES PENDING FOR VIET NAM VICTIM

Funeral arrangements for Lincoln County's fourth Vietnam war victim were pending this mid-week, according to Ballard Funeral Home of Roswell, who will be in charge of details. Army Specialist 4 George Henry Nunez, 20, an infantryman, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Roman C. Nunez, Sr. of Picocho, died on Jan. 18 (Jan. 17 New Mexico date) in a U. S. Army Hospital in Vietnam. Ballard Funeral Home said the rites will be held for the war casualty in St. Jude Thaddeus Catholic Church at San Patricio where he was a member, and that burial will be in the Picocho cemetery. The funeral home reported they had no word regarding time of arrival of the body in the U. S. from Vietnam. The firm reported the bodies now are being shipped by rail from the California port where they reach the states, and not by air as was done earlier in the conflict, so they could not speculate on any time the services might be held.

## Free Prizes, Other Events Offered In Cable TV Week Observance Here

Ruidoso Cable will join in observance of the second annual National Cable TV Week, Feb. 4 through Feb. 10, Fred Volquardsen, manager of the system, said this week. The cable system will show its appreciation to its subscribers and the community with prizes and special events. "Our industry has had a remarkable growth in a relatively short period of 18 years," Volquardsen said. "Now it once again marks its progress by celebrating the second annual National Cable TV Week, and the Ruidoso company is proud to be a part of this celebration."

New subscribers will be given an opportunity to become cable customers for a reduced installation charge. Volquardsen said that cable TV systems now serve about ten million viewers in 2,700 towns and cities throughout the United States. Franchisees have been issued for systems in an additional 1,840 communities. The local CATV system was established in 1957 and now provides 5 channels of television to approximately 600 homes. Additional channels are to be offered, subscribers in a continuing enlargement and improvement program, the manager said.

Volquardsen said during the special week there will be no charge for re-connections, and there will be a special price, or half price, for new standard connections. For a prize a portable television set or a year's free cable service will be awarded in a contest to be concluded the next to last day of the week, Saturday, Feb. 10, at 2 p.m. in the Ruidoso News office. Registration coupons for the prizes will be printed in the next two issues of the News. Local television sales and service stores are to participate in the registration of people wanting to take part in the prize contests, Volquardsen said. ## Motels Oppose New Sales Tax

Ruidoso motel owners this week sent telegrams and made telephone calls to various state representatives and senators now in session in Santa Fe voicing opposition to a new and additional sales tax on hotel and motel rooms as proposed in House Bill No. 11. A hearing on the bill was scheduled for Wednesday this week and several Ruidosians planned to attend the session.

**BULLETIN** - The proposed law to raise sales taxes 3% on motels and hotels was not given approval, and was tabled in a hearing held Wednesday in Santa Fe. Ruidosians reported on their return late that day. To enter protests on the measure which would add a 3% tax on all such accommodations in the state. As discussed in a meeting of local business men at the Chaparral Monday afternoon where plans for a strong Ruidoso unit of the newly organized New Mexico Tourist Council was being outlined, the tax was seen as a definite threat to curb tourism, because, when added to the present 4% sales tax it would mean motel and hotel customers would be paying a total of 7% on the dollar spent for such services.

Ken Geaslin, manager of the Chaparral, Max Oliver, operator of Mitchell's Motel and Stansell Jones of the Holiday House all declared they would telephone or telegraph protests.

Mrs. Emma Redmann, secretary at the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce office, which handles the Western Union service here, said up until the office closed Tuesday evening this week 73 telegrams had been sent from here to Santa Fe and Washington regarding the proposed tax raise. Attending a hearing in Santa Fe Wednesday on the bill from Ruidoso were Geaslin, Emmet Morgan, and Russell Haws, and representing local motels and hotels.

Ruidoso firms in all categories are being invited to join in the newly formed, private enterprise New Mexico Tourist Council, which is setting up an ambitious program of promotion to encourage tourists to stay another day or so in the state. Plans are to set up information booths in various sections of the state to tell the story of the great variety of attractions in the Land of Enchantment. In Ruidoso, headed up by local chairman Jim Wimberly, the solicitation for memberships, which start at \$50 annually for a vote in the council, is being conducted by two teams which are captained by Ken Geaslin of the Chaparral and Stansell Jones of the Holiday House. ## Bonito Lake Land May Be Sold To Forest

The City Commission of Alamogordo approved sale of 1,143 acres at Bonito Lake for \$457,196 to the U. S. Forest Service through the C. L. Crowder Investment Co. Alamogordo is not now holding the land in the Bonito Lake area, about 15 miles north of Ruidoso. City manager J. W. Harrison noted that the city transferred enough land there previously for the Forest Service to provide a campground. "And since that time the Forest Service has fully developed the area with drinking water, restroom facilities, picnic tables and all-time weather roads," he said. "The city has noticed that during this period the Forest Service has maintained the area exceptionally well, and therefore feels that by selling this land to the Forest Service, the citizens of Alamogordo will be provided better recreational facilities at Bonito Lake than now exist, and too, the Forest Service will insure through proper maintenance the cleanliness of the area which is our municipal water supply."

## Zeke Scott Files For Mayor In Ruidoso Downs

Incumbent mayor Zeke Scott of Ruidoso Downs early this week filed his candidacy for re-election in that community's city voting on March 5. Scott, first appointed to the council to fill a vacancy on the board of trustees, was elected in 1964, and was a holdover in the 1968 election when O. O. Barnes was voted in as mayor. Shortly after taking the oath of office, Barnes resigned and Scott, who had been mayor pro-tem, was appointed to the post by his fellow board members. Scott owns his home in Ruidoso Downs and has been a resident of the community since 1948. He said this week he had heard some rumors, but no one yet has filed for the two board of trustees offices to be voted on March 5. Final filing date for all candidates is Feb. 5 at the city hall there. Alton Gray, city judge in Ruidoso Downs, who said he would be a candidate for re-election, formally filed for that post this week, also.

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




## LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

**Editor's Note** With exploration meetings already held between Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs over the prospects, or possibility of consolidation at some time in the future, Ruidoso's mayor Lloyd L. Davis, Jr., submitted the following article from the New Mexico Statutes municipal code book concerning bonded indebtedness of two such communities involved for benefit of our readers:

## ARTICLE 76 CONSOLIDATION OF MUNICIPALITIES

Section 14-6-1. Municipal consolidation - Commissioners - Ordinance - Special election - Declaration of consolidation - Payment of bonded indebtedness or judgment levy.  
 14-6-1. Municipal consolidation - Commissioners - Ordinance - Special election - Declaration of consolidation - Payment of bonded indebtedness or judgment levy.  
 A. Whenever any two (2) or more contiguous municipalities wish to consolidate as one (1) municipality, the governing body of each municipality shall appoint three (3) commissioners who shall prepare the terms for consolidation and submit the terms for consolidation to the respective governing bodies. If each governing body approves the terms for consolidation, it shall adopt an ordinance declaring its approval of the terms for consolidation and shall provide for an election on the question of consolidation.

on consolidation, any municipality, proposing to consolidate, has outstanding indebtedness or a judgment payable from a tax on property and the consolidation is approved, a tax sufficient to pay the interest and principal on such indebtedness or judgment shall continue to be levied on the property within the boundary of the municipality as it existed on the day of the election on the question of consolidation. Indebtedness created by the issuance of revenue bonds and the current obligations of each municipality shall be assumed by the consolidated municipality. The consolidated municipality may refund the indebtedness of the municipalities which are consolidated.  
 D. Certified copies of the entire proceedings for consolidation shall be filed with the clerk of the municipality so consolidated, with the county clerk and the secretary of state. When certified copies of the consolidation have been filed as required in this section, the consolidation is complete.

The heifers receiving two pounds of supplement weaned a 40 pound heavier calf and had a higher calving percent. This was just one year's results, but I feel that the difference in calving percent of .63 and .81% will not be as large over a period of years.

(Editor's Note: These terms to describe skiing conditions at Sierra Blanca Area will be followed in all future ski condition reports, and are used in the new tapes made daily to report latest developments which you can hear by dialing 257-4252.)  
**POOR:** Many obstacles (stumps, rocks, etc.) showing on all trails. Some lifts and some trails may be closed due to insufficient snow.  
**EXCELLENT:** Sufficient base to cover any and all obstacles on all trails, and some new snow within past week.  
**GOOD:** Sufficient base to cover all obstacles on all trails. No new snow within the past week and surface conditions may vary.  
**FAIR:** Snow covering not sufficient to cover all obstacles on all trails. Some trails may be closed due to the lack of snow or difficult skiing conditions.  
1. Trails and/or lifts may be closed at any time at the discretion of the management due to insufficient snow, difficult skiing conditions, or for any other reason the management deems necessary.  
2. There may be times when all the trails do not have the same conditions or the top of the mountain may not have the same conditions as the bottom. In this situation the report will be issued on the management's best judgment of the average conditions.  
3. Road conditions will not be mentioned in our reports other than in the case that the road is closed. The conditions vary too much from morning to afternoon. The New Mexico State Highway Department maintains the road with excellent equipment including a new snow blower. **Prescribed Burning Necessary Work**

(Ruidoso Ranger Station)  
Recent brush burning on the Lincoln has brought many telephone calls and questions. Some people are uneasy because we have periods of gusty winds while these fires are smoldering. What makes this time of year different from the spring period when the Gavilan fire took off? During the next few articles I will attempt to answer this question.

In order to understand fire we must first look at what ingredients are necessary before combustion is possible. Any fire must have heat, oxygen and fuel in the right proportions. Reduce any of these factors and the fire will behave differently or go out. Since heat is important in wildfires we will look at this first. What happens in the spring, we usually have a long dry spell, warm days, low humidity and high winds. The heat from the sun warms and dries the forest fuels. As with any fuel, there is a certain temperature which must be reached before ignition will take place. During mid-day in the spring, the temperature of the fuels is usually quite high. All we need is additional heat added and the fuels will burn freely. In the Gavilan fire this additional heat was supplied from something or someone causing a brush pile to be ignited. The heat radiated from this pile warming the already dry warm nearby fuels to an even higher temperature so that they ignited readily near the pile. Other factors were at work also. So the size of the fire increased the heat generated also increased air movement carried this heat ahead of the fire drying and warming the materials at greater distances. Unchecked this process is what caused the fire to travel at such a rapid rate.

What is different at this time of year? For one thing daytime temperatures are lower than during the average spring day. The drying out of fuels is therefore much slower. It took 6 to 8 weeks to create the Gavilan fire conditions. Most brush burning is done during and for 6 or 7 days following a snow or rain storm. Sometimes in the case of a wet storm, it is necessary to allow the fuels to dry some before burning can take place. Even if the fire does creep away from the piles, it does not consume all of the forest litter. The heat produced by burning of the light dry needles is seldom sufficient to dry the stuff to any depth. Therefore all that is removed is the upper layers of litter, some of the logs that are dry enough to burn and some small trees near these burning logs. Yes, small trees will go; however, most of our stands are grossly overstocked and the removal of a number of these trees, either by thinning with saws or fire, will greatly benefit the remaining stand. In addition the chance of a devastating spring wildfire starting in this area are greatly lessened.

Next week we will look at the interaction of the other ingredients needed for fire.
