





Charges Dropped In Shooting Case

Justice of the Peace Austin Frilich told the News last week that charges of aggravated battery, filed against Mrs. Louise West following an incident Feb. 18 here in which her husband, J. E. West, Jr., received bullet wounds in the left leg as he sat in a pick-up near their residence, were dismissed. District Attorney E. H. Williams requested the dismissal on the grounds there was not sufficient evidence to prosecute.

Plane Crash Death Brings \$50,000 Suit

An airplane crash in the mountain area near Corona is the subject of a \$50,000 District Court damage suit filed Thursday in Albuquerque by an Albuquerque doctor.

Jules Gilbert sued Ray Maner, administrator of the estate of the late Doss W. Maner, pilot of the craft involved; Insurance company of North America; Frontier Airlines and Federal Insurance Co. Gilbert claims that he had a ticket for a Frontier flight from Alamogordo to Albuquerque last Dec. 15, and that he was informed by Frontier Airlines his flight would not land in Alamogordo that day. The airline, according to Gilbert, had arranged to fly the passengers to Albuquerque on a Maner Flying Service plane.

Doss Maner was pilot and flew the Piper Cherokee aircraft negligently and carelessly in bad weather, the suit asserts, causing it to crash in the mountain area about 18 miles southwest of Corona.

Gilbert alleges he suffered injuries and was exposed to snow and wind for 34 hours. He asserts he also lost his employment as a doctor with the U. S. Public Health Service as a result of the crash. The suit says Insurance Company of North America insured Maner, and Federal Insurance Co. insured Frontier.



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



Colorado indicates that a radiant heat system for frost prevention is more effective.

Daily frost forecast will again be available to growers in the area this year. Mr. and Mrs. Tom Beiers who furnish the local observations will furnish minimum temperature each morning plus an additional 4:00 p.m. observation on critical days.

I had a new experience this last week. I accompanied the group with Jim Dillard of the State Park Commission in examining the Fort Stanton Caves. After a trip mainly crawling in the cave, I came out with two sore knees and a lot more respect for the spelunkers who led the group.

We entered the cave around 1:45 p.m. The temperature was around 47 degrees; however the temperature in the majority of the cave is 37 degrees. We traveled about 1/2 mile before we came to the Duck Walk which is about three feet high and 40-feet wide and requires a person to crawl or walk on his hands and knees. The cave then branches and we entered a long crawl area of clay and gravel. One spot had several crystals shaped like horse shoes.

Crossing the Devils Slide was the most harrowing experience in entering the cave. This is a 600-foot wet clay slide area where you hope not to fall and end up at the bottom. With one or two slippery rocks to hold on to, I hesitated to even try it.

The group then entered the most impressive part of the trip. A large room filled with flow stone and stalagmites, made the hazardous crawl worth while. I saw new formations that were beyond accurate description. A few were soda straws and bacon rind. The water containing minerals flows down the center of the formation and forms a hollow stem known as soda straws. The bacon rinds are formed by water flowing from the sides of the ceiling and making formations several feet in length and resembling bacon even with a dark strip in the center of the formation. We finally came out after 8:30 p.m.

Jim Dillard and the other State Park people were impressed with the area and are very interested in developing the area as a state park. They are now concerned about the area being vandalized before it can be prepared for the public to see and appreciate. Anyone entering the caves should observe the saying "Take only pictures and leave only footprints." I would hate to see this excellent natural attraction ruined.

Protecting fruit trees from frost was discussed with a group of interested growers last week.

Mr. Jacobson of the U. S. Weather Bureau of Albuquerque explained that frost accumulated in the valleys and flowed downhill slowly, like molasses. Any barrier such as a row of trees or road embankment can slow cold air down, causing a frost pocket. Strips of cloth tied to the lower branches of the trees can help the grower detect the movement of this cold air mass down the valley. The cloth will not wave in the breeze, but just maintain one position with the steady air current.

The narrow valley increases the problem of frost protection. Fruit growers can do several things to help prevent frost. A dark soil absorbs more heat and a compact soil gives off heat more readily than by slowing down frost occurrence. A wet soil helps, too. Research in



Recreation Permits Now On Sale

For National Forests

Annual Federal recreation area permits—the \$7 "Golden Eagle Passports"—are on sale at all U. S. Forest Service offices in the Southwestern Region. Regional Forester William D. Hurst announced today. The permits are valid from April 1, 1968 through March 31, 1969, and will admit the purchaser and those riding with him in a private vehicle to more than 3000 designated Federal recreation areas across the nation.

A \$1 one-day entrance permit gives the purchaser the same privileges as the Golden Eagle Passports, but only for a single day and in a single area. Daily permits are sold at Ranger Stations and at some heavily used areas are dispensed from coin machines.

Hurst emphasized that fees are charged only in designated developed Federal recreation areas. Lists of these areas are available where permits are sold. There is no charge for recreational activities on other National Forest lands, where Americans may hike, hunt, fish, ride horseback and relax. However, State licenses are required.

The remaining 40 per cent is made available to certain Federal agencies for buying additional lands having high recreation value.



DeMolay Charter Presentation Set For Heritage Chapter April 21

(Editor's Note: With the upcoming charter presentation to the Heritage chapter in Lincoln county for the Order of the DeMolay set for 2 p.m. April 21, officers of the local chapter have asked the Ruloso News to carry a series of articles outlining what DeMolay's objectives and principals are. Below is the first of several such pieces to be printed.)

What the Order of DeMolay Is Building better citizens out of teenage boys is the goal of the Order of DeMolay, an international youth organization founded on March 18, 1919, in Kansas City, Mo., by Frank B. Land and nine teenage youths.

The organization was named for Jacques DeMolay, the last Grand Master of the Knights Templars, who was burned at the stake by King Phillip of France on March 18, 1314, as a martyr to loyalty and toleration.

Today, members of DeMolay strive to carry on the fine ideals for which DeMolay gave his life loyalty and service to God and fellow men.

Frank Land served as the Secretary General for DeMolay until his death on November 8, 1958. By 1920, the Kansas City chapter had grown to 3,000 members, and chapters were soon instituted from coast to coast and in several foreign countries. Today there are over 2,500 active DeMolay chapters and nearly three million boys have taken their obligations at the DeMolay altar.

DeMolay membership is open to any boy of good character who is between the ages of 14 and 21. Although DeMolay chapters are sponsored only by Masonic bodies of individual Masons, it is not necessary that a boy be a son or a relative of a Mason to belong to DeMolay.

The Order of DeMolay is a non-profit corporation with the international office located in its own four-story building in Kansas City, Mo. Under the guidance of the Grand Secretary, a small office staff acts on the clerical and administrative group to maintain a central office of record and promote the growth and development of the organization.

The youth movement is governed by an International Supreme Council composed of over 200 outstanding Masons located around the world. They meet in annual session to review and approve the actions of the staff.

DeMolay's slogan is "Building Better Citizens." Its ritual is what sets the organization apart from other youth groups.

The ritual was written in 1919 by Frank Marshall, a prominent Mason and newspaper man in Kansas City. It has been termed ageless, and is divided into the Initiatory and DeMolay Degrees.

The Initiatory Degree is one of solemnity and concentration, during which the initiate dedicates himself to uphold the virtues of filial love, reverence, courtesy, comradeship, fidelity, cleanliness and patriotism.

The DeMolay Degree is a dramatic and historical portrayal of the trials, tortures and martyrdom of Jacques DeMolay, and teaches a

person in fidelity and comradeship, other fields. Special keys are given. As the officers of a chapter, boys are taught responsibility and given the opportunity to express themselves before a group of fellow youths. Although DeMolay ritual and meetings are greatly revered, the organization does not advocate any particular creed, but teaches only a profound faith in the one living and true God.

DeMolay has a three-way program designed to benefit the individual DeMolay, the chapter, and the community.

Various awards are given to individuals for achievement, and Merit Bars are awarded for distinction in civic service, athletics, music, dramatics, religion, and

adviser of the chapter. Chapters and individual DeMolays are also required to observe certain obligatory days annually. These include Devotional Day, Patriots Day, DeMolay Day of Comfort, Educational Day, Parents Day and Frank B. Land Memorial Day.

The participation of DeMolay chapters in community projects has been extensive and is sometimes carried out on an international basis. Teenage traffic safety programs have been especially successful. These involve campaigns aimed at making safe drivers of all teenagers. Such efforts have received high praise from the National Safety Council and local

law enforcement agencies. Other projects have been carried on include charitable fund drives, blood donations, civil defense, anti-narcotics and anti-Communist campaigns, and distribution of safe-driving pledges.

Each chapter is supervised in all of its functions by an adult advisory council. One man is designated as the official "Chapter Dad" to handle the supervision of chapter meetings and to counsel the members.

Another helping hand for most chapters is the Mother's Club. These now number over 1,900. The Mothers' Clubs primarily help the boys to raise money for their activities, and they usually handle

the purchase and repair of robes and regalia.

DeMolay publishes an international magazine called The Cordon, which serves as a medium for distributing information from international headquarters and furnishing information on chapter activities.

DeMolay does not attempt to take the place of the home or church, but rather supplement them. The organization's purpose is to offer the teenage boy of today: (1) a wholesome occupation for his spare time; (2) worthwhile associates; (3) the best of environment; and (4) an interesting and complete program of all-around youth development.
