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

John Alexander, Lubbock, writes a note along with sending his subscription renewal that made us feel, real good! "Always enjoy reading your paper. You are doing a fine job and Ruidoso should be proud of your efforts in having such a broad coverage of news." Thank you, sir! . . . Utilities manager, Don Hart of the village of Ruidoso provided the new council with some figures on four-year growth of the city's operation. Typical are these items: Water Meter connections: 1963-64, 1764; 1964-65, 1851; 1965-66, 1947, and 1966-67 2021. In the same years sewer connections grew from 506 to 639, collections by the village for utilities grew from \$144,000 to \$199,236.64; new subdivisions totaled 22 in those four years amounting to 3970 acres added to the village; and the village now has a total of 62.3 miles of water lines, 17.4 miles of sewer lines, 133.7 miles of gravelled streets and 60.4 miles of paved streets! . . .

Mrs. May T. Bell, R. N., who also holds B. S. and M. A. degrees in nursing, and well known to many Ruidosians since she owns a vacation home in Paradise Canyon here, is director of a new program of nurse training to be offered for first time this fall at Eastern New Mexico University's Roswell branch . . .

SKIING ENDS WITH EASTER

The Mesquero Apache tribe's Sierra Blanca Ski area will close its winter sports season Easter Sunday, April 14—and figures released this week by manager Roy Parker show it to be the biggest yet in the seven years of operation.

Excellent snow conditions since Thanksgiving gave thousands of skiers in a wide part of the Southwest some of the finest skiing any resort has ever offered. Continuing new snowfall in almost every week brought a total of more than 225 inches to the area—and for many weeks, the snow depth after softening measured 70 to 80 inches. Frequently the thick base was freshened with new snows measuring four, five or eight or more inches.

Figures were available only until the end of March for this season's operation, and does not include some heavy patronage in April. The office of Roy Parker, manager, reported that 55,900 skiers and visitors were counted for this last winter, an increase of 29.4 percent over the previous biggest season of 1965-66.

Department Heads, Village Council Discuss Projects Concerning Growth

In a special called meeting Thursday evening last week, heads of the various village departments met with the village council to discuss existing and potential problems concerning subdivision development and fire hazards and conditions relating to such developments. Mayor Lloyd L. Davis recommended that a date be set for the joint session sometime soon.

Department heads present included Kannady, village marshal O. S. Montes, airport manager Frank Potter, and superintendents Fred Bogardus, Blair Halliday, George Perry and Cliff Keith, who head the utilities branches.

Letters were read from the department heads recommending all present employees be retained.

Potter's report concerned an operating statement form to be used to give information on airport activities and sales. On the airport manager recommendation, a series of discounts to owners of aircraft was approved subject to invoices being paid by the 15th of the month following purchase. Discounts are applicable during a calendar month, it was indicated, and will be as follows:

Purchase of 100 gallons, 3c off each gallon; 200 gallons, 4c off each gallon; 300 gallons, 5c off each gallon, and 400 gallons, 6c off each gallon.

Among requests by the village's maintenance shop head Keith was that a chop building for work on and for storing vehicles be authorized, and he was assured the council would study the need.

Halliday, sewer and sanitation head, recommended that employees of his department, in view of their tenure, be given raises in salaries, and also suggested that his department be better informed of some of the projects and proposals under study by the council.

Marshal Montes brought five letters of resignation from peace officers he has had over a period of several weeks, and all mentioned too low salaries as principal reasons for leaving their jobs.

Street superintendent Perry reported on the work of his department and invited questions and suggestions from the council. The problem of providing money for maintenance was discussed at length.

Bogardus, assistant water superintendent, recommended that if funds could be made available, that



Saturday of next week the local team will play at Tucuman.





al Forest lands, and to some pooled undeveloped areas where concentrated or heavy public recreation use makes regulation necessary.

On developed recreation sites strict limitations are placed on both pets and vehicles. Dogs, cats and other pets must be kept caged or on leash. Motor vehicles—whether cars or motorcycles—are restricted to roads and parking areas provided for them. Campers and picnickers must follow definite housekeeping and sanitation rules for disposal of garbage, trailer drains and preventing pollution of water supplies.

Boisterous, abusive, threatening, or indecent conduct is prohibited in the areas concerned. Firearms, firecrackers or any other fireworks may not be discharged in the area. Radios, television, musical instruments, electric generators, and other noise producing devices must not be operated in a manner that will disturb other persons.

"The new regulations are aimed at increasing the enjoyment of recreation facilities and experiences," Regional Forester Hurst said. "They will make camping and picnicking better than ever. The considerable courteous camper has always followed these commonsense rules. Only the thoughtless, careless, or inconsiderate will feel their effect."

Stricter Regulations Stressed For Users Of National Forests

Greater public protection and enjoyment is the goal of new regulations that will direct visitors to camp and picnic ground, in Southwestern National Forests this year.

Regional Forester William D. Hurst has announced that dogs, cats, automobiles, motorcycles, and the actions of thoughtless people will be affected by the new regulations. The regulations are announced by Secretary of Agriculture Orville L. Freeman. The new rules are necessary because of rapid growth in both the number of people using National Forest recreation areas and the intensity of that use in the last 3 or 4 years.

Among the new regulations are those controlling sanitation, public conduct, noise-making devices (ranging from radios to motor-driven equipment) and fires within the areas, Hurst said. The regulations apply to all developed recreation sites on National Forest lands.

recaptured soon by halting loss of revenue in faulty meter operation. Fire department captain Charles Murray expressed the hope the department could acquire a larger truck to replace an old vehicle the department has.

Summarizing the department heads' requests for salary increases, village clerk-manager Jim Hine outlined some of the fringe benefits employees receive that are not considered perhaps when raises are asked for, then reviewed the village's revenue and expenses to point out only limited requests could be acted on.

Mayor Davis said he felt there was some inadequacies in the salary structure and every measure would be employed to make proper adjustments. He stressed it was the council's duty to provide employees and department heads with the best possible equipment and materials — and that financial means should be studied and secured for meeting some of the requests brought to the council.

recaptured soon by halting loss of revenue in faulty meter operation. Fire department captain Charles Murray expressed the hope the department could acquire a larger truck to replace an old vehicle the department has.

Summarizing the department heads' requests for salary increases, village clerk-manager Jim Hine outlined some of the fringe benefits employees receive that are not considered perhaps when rates are asked for, then reviewed the village's revenue and expenses to point out only limited requests could be acted on.

Mayor Davis said he felt there was some inadequacies in the salary structure and every measure would be employed to make proper adjustments. He stressed it was the council's duty to provide employees and department heads with the best possible equipment and materials — and that financial means should be studied and secured for meeting some of the requests brought to the council.



Movie Star's 'Bad' \$5,000 Check Not Allowed As Reduction, IRS Says; Extortion Attempt by Tax Man Hinted

Attorneys for the Ruidoso Racing Assn. in petitions filed in U. S. Tax Court in Washington, D. C. hinted that the Internal Revenue Service agent working on a back tax claim against the racetrack had extortion in mind during the tax investigation, according to a story in the Albuquerque Journal last week.

A back tax bill for \$625,000 was slipped on the association by the IRS last December. The government is seeking to collect the added taxes for 1959, 1960 and 1961.

James Powers of Phoenix, race track attorney, said "on information and belief, the purpose of such agent in making such investigation was not to compute the correct net income of the petitioner but the purpose of such agent was to extort funds from the petitioner or petitioners then secretary-treasurer for his own personal use and benefit."

During the three years for which IRS is trying to collect additional taxes, Eugene V. Hensley was secretary-treasurer of the track.

Hensley filed a motion in June, 1966, alleging that former IRS agent W. Wayne Spence tried to collect bribes during a five-year tax investigation of Hensley.

Spence later was found guilty in federal court of receiving bribes in connection with other IRS tax investigations.

The IRS disallowed a wide array of exemptions claimed by the Ruidoso Assn. For the three years they totaled over \$800,000 and

Mr. Land, being prudent and thoughtful, suggested that they think it over for a few days along with all the other names mentioned.

A few days later, the enthusiasm for the name DeMolay was still apparent in each boy, and thus it was that the new youth group was named the Order of DeMolay.

Little did this beginning nucleus know that their organization would soon spread like wildfire throughout the world. It now numbers

nearly three million active and endeavors to conducting traffic safety campaigns, church services and performing charitable and community service projects.

At the altar of DeMolay, members promise among other things to be better sons, better men, better citizens.

It is with humble and modest pride that DeMolay members can point to the thousands of leaders today in all walks of life who started up the ladder of success in a DeMolay chapter room.

DeMolay Named For Knight Who Sacrificed Self For Truth

(Editor's Note: The Order of the DeMolay's Heritage chapter in Ruidoso is to receive its charter April 21 at 2 p.m. in the O. E. S. Hall here during a special ceremony. This article is one of a series telling of DeMolay's founding, growth, history and aims.)

The Namesake of the Order It's been more than 650 years since Jacques DeMolay, the last Grand Master of the medieval Knights Templar, died as a martyr to truth and fidelity, but today the ideals for which he gave his life

are being perpetuated by young men the world over who are members of the Order of DeMolay.


Nearly three million youths that have been inducted into the Order since its founding have added new lustre and meaning to DeMolay's name by dedicating themselves, as he did, to the virtues of reverence, loyalty and chivalry.

Jacques DeMolay has provided a historic heritage for the youth organization. In the 14th Century as the Knights Templars grew in might, prestige and wealth, and the popularity of the crusades declined, the Order incurred the jealousy and enmity of Philip the Fair, King of France.

Philip ordered the arrest of DeMolay and the other Templars and had their properties and riches confiscated. Facing through torture to get DeMolay to reveal the identity of other leaders and the location of supposedly hidden treasures, Phil-
