

Ruidoso Jaycees Set Sights on US Junior-Ski Meet

Ruidoso District Junior Chamber of Commerce is laying the groundwork to secure a national junior ski championship meet at sometime in the next few years for Sierra Blanca slopes here. Held each year in Duluth, Minn., Jaycees in New Mexico have learned there is a chance it may be moved from there to some other ski area.

With this in mind, Ruidoso Jaycees are now at work to try to secure the New Mexico state junior championship meet here for the 1969-70 winter season as a training program for the staging of the national meet, should it become available for the Ruidoso resort. Sierra Blanca Ski club here will be working in support of the Jaycees to try and get the national meet.

Apaches Given Ft. Stanton Cave Land Decision

Efforts to develop a new recreation area at Ft. Stanton caves is bogged in a legal quagmire, including a claim on the land by the Mescalero Apaches, according to a story in the Albuquerque Journal last week.

The Bureau of Land Management, which has custodial responsibility for the land, and the State Parks and Recreation Commission have indicated interest in developing the site.

The commission voted last week to try to acquire the land by filing to take it out of the public domain.

Development by either agency, however, would be possible only if a monetary settlement was reached on the Indians' claim.

"The Indian Claims Commission has already granted a decision in favor of the Mescalero tribe," said Wendell Chino, Tribal president. "At that time we wanted the land instead of monetary recovery. I don't think we've changed our position on it yet."

If the 2,600 acres is returned to the tribe, he said, consideration might be given to recreational development.

To Seek Office Of Probate Judge

Herbert Smith of Ruidoso this week is announcing that he will be a candidate for the office of Probate Judge in Lincoln County subject to the will of the voters of the Republican party in the primary elections on Aug. 27 this year. Smith stated that he has resided in Lincoln County for the past 35 years and has worked with and for the party for the past 34 years in Ruidoso and Lincoln County and that he feels that he is qualified for the office of Probate Judge. He is soliciting the support of all Republicans in the primary and general elections, he stated.

Ruidoso Downs Raises Okayed

Subject to budget limitations the Ruidoso Downs village council Monday night approved raises for its employees for as much as \$600 a year for one employee.

Bessie Sewell, village clerk and finance officer, who is now receiving \$4800, would receive \$5700 a year. Joel Webb the city marshal would receive \$5700 also. Jay Focoy, water and streets, would receive \$4600. Hazel Lawing would receive \$3600. Level Romero of the state finance and local government division was to assist the village with a pre-budget conference slated for Tuesday night this week.

Other transfers listed included: A sick leave policy for village employees was approved. Building inspector H. A. Parnell will attend building inspector school in May.

Judge Alton Gray will attend the governor's safety conference on May 29 at Western Skies Motor Hotel in Albuquerque.

Mrs. Sewell will attend the 1968 clerk's and finance officer institute May 16 and 17 at the same hotel in Albuquerque.

A regional conference sponsored by the New Mexico Municipal League will be held May 2 at the Villa Inn here. At the Dutch treat dinner there will be ten minute talks on local self-government, state planning districts and tax study implications.

Also at the council meeting Monday night the Chaparral Hotel's application for transfer of ownership of their New Mexico state dispenser's liquor license was approved without protest.

May 11 has been set as a tentative date for a clean-up campaign in Ruidoso Downs in which the 8 Canyon Job Corps Center will participate.

Eldorado Villa Estates Gets Okay From Village Planning Commission; Start of Construction Set June 1

The Ruidoso village planning commission, sitting in a joint meeting with the Ruidoso board of trustees in a special session Monday evening gave final approval to the plan and plans of Eldorado Villa Estates, multimillion dollar housing development that has been in the planning stage here for about two years.

Located in the north part of Ruidoso on a large tract, the development will offer a variety of homes with the most modern facilities, all coupled with several recreational advantages, including a clubhouse, golf course, swimming pool, etc.

Robert L. Windham, principal developer and president of the Eldorado Villa Estates corporation, said this week that a general manager for the project who also holds the office of vice-president in the corporation, is to move here shortly from Lake Havasu City in Arizona where he has been assistant to the project engineer in that large development. He and his wife, Ione, are expected the latter part of May.

Windham added that it appears very likely now that construction can begin on the first phase of the huge undertaking about June 1. Surveying of streets and removal of some of the trees and brush has already been underway.

Army Specialist Four Albert P. Sedillo, 23, son of Mr. and Mrs. Leo O. Sedillo, San Patricio, is participating in "Operation Truong Conz Dahn" in Vietnam with other members of the 9th Infantry Division.

Located in the Mekong Delta region south of Saigon, the allied counter offensive also includes the 11th Regiment of the Republic of Vietnam's Seventh Army, as well as American Naval and Air Cavalry units.

The operation is designed to drive the communists away from the major population centers and keep traffic moving on Route 4, the vital lifeline between Saigon and the major population centers and delta.

So far the operation has accounted for over 1,000 Viet Cong dead and has chased the enemy away from My Tho, the capital of Dinh Tuong Province.

White Mountain school students are taking achievement tests this week and all classes are quite busy.

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
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

Orchardists Await Verdict on Freeze; Snow, Rain, Ice Visit Ruidoso Area

The weather this week pointed up the old saying "Springtime in the Rockies" by bringing a late wintry storm into the area, with a killing frost in the higher elevations and killing some garden plants and wiping out some of the fruit blossoms in the three valleys.

Old Baldy once again is wearing a white mantle of new snow that fell Monday and Tuesday.

Ruidoso had from two to three inches of snowfall in the storm that saw the thermometer dip to 18 degrees before dawn Tuesday morning and to 7 early Wednesday.

Sunshine Wednesday had removed most traces of the snow in the Ruidoso vicinity, but it was still evident in the shadowed slopes of the hills around the community.

It will be several days before orchardists in the Ruidoso valley can determine if the cold snap caused serious damage to the fruit trees, Mrs. Mayme Perry at Glencoe said early Wednesday. "The temperature dropped to 22 degrees and since the period of cold lasted so long, and since we had no wind to carry the smoke through the trees, we felt it was a waste of time to try to use smudge pots to protect the orchards," she said. There was ice in her neighborhood, she said. "The wet weather, snow and rain, with the cold spell was in our favor, and may have been of some protection," she added.

(Editor's Note: This is the second in a series of articles in which the entire survey prepared as an Overall Economic Development Program for the County of Lincoln and the Lincoln County Development Assn., is being printed by the News for the widest possible readership. The survey goes into depth reporting the county's resources and discussed its potential.)

2. EDUCATION— There are five public school districts in Lincoln County, Carrizozo, Capitán, Corona, Hondo and Ruidoso Districts. Grade, junior high and senior high schools are located in each district. The schools enjoy an excellent student teacher ratio of approximately 18 to 1.

Plans are under consideration to develop a private college in the Ruidoso area. Land has been donated by Bob Scribner for this institution.

The Biology Department at New Mexico State University has established a station and is conducting summer study classes at this station.

The Sierra Blanca Boys Camp is located at Fort Stanton. It provides opportunity for boys from Springer to learn forestry, woodworking and vocational skills.

3. HEALTH— Lincoln County has two hospitals, one in Ruidoso and one in Carrizozo. There are medical doctors in Carrizozo and Ruidoso. Ruidoso has two dentists and one optometrist.

Fort Stanton is now a state institution for the mentally disabled and provides for 147 residents. Plans are to increase this to 250 residents.

4. PUBLIC TRANSPORTATION AND FACILITIES— The principal highways in the county are U. S. 54 which goes through Corona and Carrizozo to the western part of the county, U. S. 390 which goes through Hondo, Capitán and Carrizozo in the south central part, U. S. 70 which goes through Hondo and Ruidoso in the southern part of the county, New Mexico Highway 42 which connects Corona to U. S. 95 north of Roswell, New Mexico Highway 48 which starts at Angus and connects Nogal, Angus and Alto to U. S. 70 at Ruidoso and U. S. 390 east of Carrizozo. State Highway 10 connects Claunch to Highway 54 and State Highway 349 connects White Oaks to Highway 54. County roads have been developed by use of growing out of need, beginning with our earliest settlers, they are connecting or feeder roads for the Federal and State roads. Roads in subdivisions outside the corporate limits of Ruidoso, Carrizozo, Capitán and Corona are part of the county system.

(Editor's Note: We wish to correct the survey's report on state roads in this area. Actually State Road 48 begins at Angus, goes north through Capitán, then northward to turn east to skirt the Capitán mountains on the north and continues on to Roswell. State Road 37, not mentioned in the survey, begins on U. S. Highway 70 at Ruidoso, goes north through Alto to Angus, then northwest to Nogal to intercept U. S. 390 east of Carrizozo. A new state road, No. 532, begins at Alto and goes west to the Sierra Blanca ski area.)

There are no paved roads in the county system. Approximately 50% of the 1350 miles of county roads are graded and provided with limited drainage. Much of the remaining roads are narrow and not provided with drainage.

The Southern Pacific Railroad, goes through Carrizozo and Corona in the western portion of the county and Carrizozo is a division stop for the train crews. The Santa Fe Railroad has a branch line into Roswell and this railroad is used by the eastern portion of the county.

Two weekly newspapers, the Lincoln County News and Ruidoso News are printed in the county. Television reception is good in the area with Albuquerque stations received in the western portion and Roswell station received in the

eastern portion. Ruidoso has a cable service with 5 channels drawn from Albuquerque, Roswell and El Paso, Texas TV stations. There is one radio station in the county, station KRER in Ruidoso.

Electricity is supplied by Otero County Electric and Community Public Service in the southern portion of the county and by Cental New Mexico Electric in the northern portion. Natural gas is transmitted by El Paso Natural Products and Trans-Western Company through the northern portion of the county. Natural gas is available in Corona, Capitán, Ruidoso, Carrizozo, Nogal and Angus communities.

5. MINING— Lincoln County has yielded a variety of metals and minerals: gold, coal, iron, lead, copper, zinc, fluorite, barite, gypsum and tungsten. In addition, deposits of molybdenum, thorium, uranium and manganese are known, although no significant production has been reported.

With the possible exception of the White Oaks district, lack of sufficient development of the various mines and prospects in Lincoln County prevents an accurate appraisal of the possibilities for further ore discovery. The known deposits of the county do not appear to favor economic exploitation under present market conditions, but several of the iron and fluorite deposits may be exceptions. Future exploration by courageous prospec-

tors may completely reverse this discouraging outlook.

C. AGRICULTURAL RESOURCES

1. General Description— Lincoln County is primarily an agricultural county with the major portion of its income derived from cattle, sheep and fruit raised on the ranches and farms in the county. Of the total 3,109,708 acres in Lincoln County, 1,982,983 acres are presently in ranches and farms.

2. Irrigated Farms

Most of the irrigated land is located in the Ruidoso-Bonito-Hondo valley with small irrigated areas located around Nogal and Carrizozo vicinity. The land in the Hondo Valley area is irrigated from the river and supplemented by shallow well pumps in some places. The irrigated land in the Carrizozo vicinity is all done by pumps. The Nogal area used regular flow from Emerson and Nogal Canyons with pumps to supplement the water.

(Ed. Note: There is also some irrigation from wells in the Bonito Valley in which old Lincoln is located.)

The Ruidoso-Bonito-Hondo rivers have small flows developing at different places along the river bed. The amount of water available from the river depends on the location of the land in relation to where the flow develops.

The soils of the irrigated lands are mixed river alluvium, moderate to fine in texture and generally range in the sand of silt loam classification. Most of the irrigated land is located in a strip along the side of the river and fields vary from one to one hundred acres in size. The land is generally well drained with soil averaging with a PH of 7.0 to 8.0. There are no indications of alkaline or saline conditions in this area.

They asked that the State Engineer's Office of New Mexico join in asking the U. S. D. A. to provide assistance in developing a work plan for the Ruidoso Watershed.

Through this request, the U. S. D. A. Soil Conservation Service has scheduled April 22-26, 1968, to make a preliminary investigation of the feasibility of a watershed protection and flood prevention project on the Ruidoso Watershed. Four men from the watershed division of the SCS in New Mexico will investigate the need for the project, the economic feasibility of the project, the interest of the local people, and the ability of the sponsoring organizations to carry out their commitments for the maintenance of the project, necessary easements, etc.

The watershed covers about 169,000 acres with the main problems being floodwater and sediment damage to irrigated farmland along the valleys together with damage to homes, businesses, highways and power lines. Other project objectives would be to consider the feasibility of recreation developments and municipal water supplies.

Providencea Community Ditch Reorganizes Irrigation System

Landowners on the Providencea Community Ditch, about three miles north of Lincoln, New Mexico, have just completed reorganizing their irrigation system. They have installed 145 feet of 4-inch steel diversion and approximately 17,000 feet of underground pipeline.

There are ten owners of the ditch, irrigating about 160 acres of land. The owners are W. G. Shrengost, ditch manager; Clark Pfingsten, James Nethaway, Henry Sanchez, Benny Apadoca, Joe Baca, Elifigo Griego, Art Salas, Salas Estate and Rosa Silva.

Prior to the installation of the diversion and pipeline, many hours were spent by each person re-

placing the diversion and cleaning out their ditches. They were unable to irrigate their land adequately because large amounts of water were lost through seepage in the dirt ditch. Some could not irrigate but once or twice a year because of a lack of water. Now, with just minor yearly maintenance, each farmer will be able to irrigate all of his land when it needs it with a designed head of water of three cubic feet per second.

The Soil Conservation Service, through the request of the DMCh Company and Upper Hondo SWCD, furnished the technical assistance needed to do the job. The Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service cost-shared 70% of the cost and the State Engineer's Office shared 15% of the cost.





New Colt Brings A Wide Smile To Woman Horse Breeder, Trainer

Wearing the broadest smile of anybody herabouts the last few weeks has been Mrs. Mamie Mezen, owner and trainer of thoroughbred horses for many years. She has a familiar figure at Ruidoso Downs, having had horses running here for several years, as well as in other tracks in the Southwest. Reason for the big wide grin is the birth recently of a colt to a mare she owns Jerry's Blend, a granddaughter of the great and fabulous Man-O-War, one of the big money winners of all times. Phoenix, Sunland, Haten and Ruidoso are tracks on which Mrs. Mezen's thoroughbreds have raced and won.

In the birth of the colt recently, she said she was very grateful to the Clifford Bryan family who live in the Ruidoso valley east of Ruidoso Downs for their having let her place Jerry's Blend in a barn they had available. "I was getting frantic when it came time for the mare to deliver," she said. Father of the young colt is one of Robert Scribner's famous studs, Everett's Son.

Mrs. Mezen came to New Mexico in 1929, and has been represented at Ruidoso Downs since 1930 with some of her trainees, including Poco Pete, Kay Morden and Sutton County all of them names familiar to the fans.

Little fellow has yet to be named according to owner-trainer Mrs. Mamie Mezen, who has trained horses for racing at Ruidoso Downs, at La-Mesa, and other Southwestern tracks for several years.

Johnny-Come-Lately's. Mrs. M. is far from being one of the Mamie-Come-Lately's. A native of the Kansas wheatlands, the stately lady spent her girlhood in Oklahoma and Texas. After attaining womanhood she migrated to eastern Canada where she became the owner of an active stable of racing thoroughbreds.

"In 1928 her efforts as an operator of a feed barn at Riverside Park were successful. The late Bill Kyn gave her a break in granting her the lone concession and during the Riverside meets she had the foresight not to press owners in distress for payment of their bills. "To quote Mrs. Mezen, "I never had a gyp beat me out of a dollar on a horse feed bill."

"Among her clients in the old days when a silver cartwheel was equal to a sawbuck today, she sold feed on-the-cuff to Plain-Ben-Jones who later became trainer for the Calumet Farm. Ben has since saddled more winners of the Kentucky Derby than any other trainer.

"C. B. Irwin was another of her clients. Asked as to how many race tracks Old Rose and Blue Diamond racing silks have been in evidence, she replied, "They have been seen in practically every state in the union along with Old Woodbine in Toronto thru midwest Canada to British Columbia."

"She was first licensed as a trainer in 1934 and since then has performed the duties as a conditioner of thoroughbreds up to the present."

And then, there was his mention in the same year in the La Mesa Park's News Bulletin printed later during that meeting:

"Mrs. M. Mezen, owner-trainer of an active stable has done well by herself during the 11 days of the current meeting. Mrs. M. has won with five of her 11 starters. The stately lady is 2nd in gross earnings having accumulated \$136.54 less than leading owner E. T. Springer. A native of Kansas,

she has been racing thoroughbreds for many years. Courteous and amiable in response to another's address, her theory on the training of the race horse is founded on the basis of common horse sense. Her recent win with the good router Calamanco finds her firmly entrenched in 4th position in the trainer's standings as of June 30."
