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





## New Officers To Be Elected By All-Seasons


Ruidoso All-Seasons, Inc., an organization of Ruidoso businesses formed a year ago to promote more tourism for the area, will hold its first annual membership meeting Wednesday next week, May 15, at 4 p.m. at Nob Hill restaurant. Besides a report on the first year's activities, on the agenda will be election of new directors for those positions whose terms expire. Currently serving are Ed Wimberly, Stansell Jones, Ken Geaslin, Lloyd L. Davis, Jr. and Vic Lamb. Wimberly was named by the first board as All-Seasons president; Jones as vice-president and Geaslin has succeeded Bill Adkins as secretary. Ken Knapp was appointed treasurer or from the membership.

President Wimberly named Jim Hine and Johnny Williams on a nominating committee, with Hine as chairman. The two men are to pick a third member and will submit a slate of nominees at the annual meeting next week.

Other business discussed at the board's breakfast session last week was prospects for working with existing tour bus owners of the area for regularly scheduled runs through Ruidoso, stopping at motels to take passengers to the race track in the summer and the ski area in the winter. The board was informed that Duke Browning, who has had a bus operation here for several years, is securing a new 42-passenger bus, especially geared for the long mountain haul to the ski area.

The board also expressed the desire to work with the Ruidoso District Junior Chamber of Commerce in its efforts to bring the national junior championship ski races to Sierra Blanca sometime in the near future.

Treasurer Knapp reported almost half of the members of the association have remitted checks for the \$75 assessment for the year to be used in advertising and promotion. The board also discussed prospective associate members among names of wholesale suppliers for Ruidoso, some of whom have already been invited to come into the organization with financial assistance. The first reply received to some invitations already mailed included a contribution from State Chemical Co., Roswell, Wimberly reported.


One of the largest crowds in the history of the local band attended last Thursday evening's spring concert program in which Gooch presented beginner, intermediate and the high school bands.



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

Powdery mildew was noted in one orchard. Use wettable sulfur or Karathane to control the powdery mildew.


