

Ruidoso Downs opened its 1968 racing season on a highly successful note this past week-end. A total of 8,500 attended the first two days of racing and wagered \$336,079. General manager Tex Barron feels "this is a great start of a great season." Barron said attendance and betting figures were highest in Downs' history for a non-holiday week-end opening.

The opening day feature, The Inaugural Handicap, was captured by Hal Bogle's favored Dobro Boy. The swift son of Balkarat-Dobro Girl was ridden perfectly by jockey Larry Byers and swept to a one and a half length victory over Tack's Lad. Dobro Boy returned \$4.20, \$3.20 and \$2.80 as the public's choice.

On Sunday the George Dolan Allowance Stake was captured by feet-footed Turf's Best. The fast son of Rebel Cause sped the 350 yards in 18.2 seconds for a one and a half length victory over Bounding Joy. Turf was Roma Charge. As prohibitive favorite, Turf's Best paid \$4.00, \$3.00 and \$2.80.

Many officials of the racing world were on hand for Ruidoso Downs' first week-end of racing. All the directors of the Ruidoso Racing Association were present for the opening, and expressed optimism over the '68 racing season. Also Don Jones and Denny Smith, vice-president and director of racing, respectively, of the American Quarter Horse Association were here for the beginning of the new season.

Ruidoso Downs will present four exciting racing days this Memorial Day week-end with racing Thursday, Friday, Saturday and Sunday. Post time will be 1:30 p.m. each day.

### Site Picked, Opening Date Target Set for Proposed High Mesa College

Four progressive steps towards realizing the potential of a college for this area were taken last week-end with the executive board of Lincoln County Steering Committee for Higher Education, now to be called High Mesa College, Inc., and a trio of officials from Franklin Pierce College in Rindge, New Hampshire holding continuous conferences on several matters.

The local college corporation's public relations man said these were agreements reached in three days of talking, visiting and touring the area:

1. It was generally agreed that September of 1970 would be a target date for opening the college, with a prospective 200 students enrolling for the initial semester;

2. Establishment of a southwest branch of the young Franklin Pierce here was contingent on the parent institution receiving accreditation after the legal five years life, inspection for which will be conducted this fall;

3. A 100-acre site for a college, whether it be Franklin Pierce's branch or another college, was selected by the New Hampshire college officials along with members of the High Mesa College's executive board, out of the High Mesa ranch and which is being given by the Bob Scribner family for use in developing a college; and

4. Attorneys for Franklin Pierce, at High Mesa College, Inc., and Bob Scribner will hold a three-way conference to draw up contracts for submitting to all three parties involved, sometime in the near future.

Attorneys are Joe Johnson, Roswell, for Franklin Pierce, Reggie Hughes of Ruidoso for the High Mesa College board and an attorney, name not disclosed, for the Scribner family.

Here from New Hampshire were Frank DiPietro, president of Franklin Pierce; Francis J. Sawyer, a trustee and Hugh Wharton, business manager. Accompanying the officials on almost all tours of various parts of this area, and also conferring in the offices of local executive board president Paul H. Wrye were Wrye and Hughes. The visitors had to return to New England earlier than planned - so were not here for some Saturday activities slated for them. They were honor guests in a reception attended by a large crowd Thursday evening last week at White Mountain school, held after the Ruidoso high school graduation program.

Charter for the newly named college, committee, High Mesa College, Inc., was received last week by Hughes from the state corporation commission.

Pietro said that when Franklin Pierce receives its accreditation, the college would send a representative here to be permanently based as a development chairman.

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

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



**Fire Danger Said Critical In N. M. Forests**

Critical forest fire danger coupled with intense holiday use of camp and picnic grounds is causing concern among Southwestern National Forest firefighters, according to Regional Forester William H. Hurst.

Recent hot dry winds have brought woodlands to tinder-dry conditions in many areas. Memorial Day and the coming dismissal of schools will send a surge of vacationers to Federal and State recreation areas. Hurst warns that careless use of fires of any kind may result in serious forest and grass fires that endanger people as well as timber and range lands.

Hurst asks that forest users observe these simple rules for forest and grass fire prevention:

Use extreme care with any fire. Never build a fire on windy days. Hold burned matches until cold before throwing away. Mix campfire embers with dirt and water until they are **OUT COLD**. (Leaving a camp of warming fire unattended or abandoning it is a violation of Federal and State laws. Violators are subject to fines and are liable for damages.)

Use auto ashtrays or crush cigarettes out in bare earth. Never smoke while walking or riding in the woods. Stop, clear a small area of bare earth, and smoke there.

If fire danger becomes more critical, forest officers may find it necessary to restrict or prohibit use of fires in certain areas, or close to camping or public entrance. Should this occur, forest visitors should check with District Forest Rangers for information on local restrictions.

Unusually heavy winter snows and spring rains have resulted in lush growth of grasses and other low plants in forests and on ranges throughout the Southwest. Now dry, this rank growth is a source of fuel for serious fires.

**Villagers Required Use Garbage Service At Ruidoso Downs**

It is now mandatory that all residents and businesses in Ruidoso Downs have their garbage picked up by the village. The village council of Ruidoso Downs passed an ordinance to this effect at a regular council meeting last Monday night.

Although the rate of two dollars for non-commercial residences has not been increased, the additional subscribers will increase the department's revenue. The rate for businesses will be adjusted to be equitable for the amount of refuse picked up. An ordinance was also passed making it possible for the village to tear down buildings that deemed a fire hazard or dangerous in other respects. The council would have to pass a separate resolution for each building it destroyed, however.

This may have been one of the few people realize the extent of losses from forest and range fires. First, it costs thousands of dollars to fight a blaze. The cost continues for years as watersheds are damaged, timber is killed, forage for livestock and wildlife is reduced, soil erosion increases, fishing and irrigation waters are polluted, and recreational resources are destroyed. The public bears these costs in the form of taxes and lost use of forests and range resources.







**County Agent's Report**

I have had some reports of livestock poisoning during the past week. Plague or rubberweed was one of the poisoning weeds.

Some fast growing weeds that are normally good feed can become poisonous temporarily if it becomes hot and dry. Nettleweeds, careless weed, Kochia and lamb's quarter are some of the weeds known to become poisonous under certain circumstances. They cause nitrate poisoning.

Watch your livestock carefully. If you start to lose some, feed them for a few days to reduce the possibility of poisoning.

The Lincoln County 4-H Swimming and Water Safety Course will begin on Tuesday, June 11 in Carrizozo, starting at 9:30 a.m. The instructor will be Mrs. Marion Spencer, and any 4-H'er wishing to take part should contact their club leader.

The halting of antibiotic use in treating meat animals will be discussed June 4 at the Dexter school cafeteria, starting at 8 p.m. Representatives of the Food and Drug Administration will explain the regulation on antibiotic use that becomes effective June 11. Anyone owning and selling meat animals will be affected by this regulation. It prohibits the use of antibiotics on beef cattle, sheep, swine, poultry and dairy animals.




