

It is 34 pages and colorful pictures, detailed maps and personal messages which do an excellent job of explaining what the Mescalero Reservation is and what it is doing. Part of the booklet is devoted to descriptions of towns and cities in the vicinity of the Reservation, but it is pitched mostly to the industries which they hope to get in the future. Along with listing the brochure's members of the reservation's development planners and tribal officers, too, have held meetings in California and New York with prospective industries, telling the story of manpower and resources in hopes of developing some outside businesses to make use of the reservation's facilities.

REPAIR CAPITAN SKI LIFT, MAKE TWO NEW TRAILS

Work of repairing Capitan ski lift at Sierra Blanca Ski & Recreation area is underway this summer in preparation for another big winter sports season this fall and winter. The lift was not in operation last winter, knocked out of use when a huge fir tree fell across the lift lines damaging the upper terminal. Manager Roy Parker of the area said the job of putting the lift back into use is a complex one, and a very difficult engineering feat. "We will be able to use the large foundation at the upper terminal," he added. He said two new ski trails are being cut and put in shape for the 1968-69 season, that gondola lift towers and other lifts are being painted or renovated and other maintenance work is being done in the area.

Kennan Fuller of Corona has announced he will file as a candidate for Lincoln County commissioner in District 2, subject to the Democratic primary in August. P. supervisor during which time he helped map most farms and ranches in the county. Regents Okay NMSU Branch

The board of regents of New Mexico State University in Las Cruces, meeting last week-end, approved a proposed biological field station to be built on land north of Ruidoso donated by the Sam Montgomery family here. The offer of the land was accepted for this purpose earlier this year by the college in a brief ceremony at Las Cruces attended by about 20 local people. The board approved expenditure of about \$17,000 for construction of the first building on the site, to begin sometime soon, as the initial development stage. Also the board has named the station the Montgomery Biological Research branch in honor of the donors. Former Officer Faces Bribe Charge



Ralph Petty, Jr. Announces For Legislature

Ralph Petty, Jr., resident of Ruidoso since 1959 and a native of Lincoln county, has announced he will file as a candidate for the House of Representatives for the Lincoln and Sierra county districts, subject to the Democratic primary in August. Associated with his parents in operation of Gambles store, he has a background in the problems of the small merchant, of the rancher and orchardist, having been engaged in the latter business, too, and of resort areas such as Ruidoso and Truth or Consequences since he has served as a director of the Ruidoso-Hondo Valley Chamber of Commerce. Born in Carrizozo, Petty has also lived in Truth or Consequences and has a wide acquaintance in that part of the two-county district. He said in making the announcement he has received encouragement from members of both the Democratic and the Republican parties to make the race. He said he believes this area has been penalized in years past because it has had a Republican legislator, a member of the minority party in the House of Representatives. Petty attended the University of New Mexico following his graduation from Carrizozo High school. He is a member of the Ruidoso Elks Lodge. He is married and his wife is named Gayle. They are home-owners here. He said he has the time to devote to this office and will give every consideration to the responsibilities of this position.

Wimberly Succeeds Hood As Ruidoso Bank President

Ed Wimberly, young Ruidosoan, has been the policy since it opened. Hood has announced that he has disposed of most of his stock in the Ruidoso State Bank and that his tenure as president of the bank has been terminated. He will remain on the board of directors until the annual stockholders meeting next month. Hood expressed his thanks and appreciation for the whole-hearted support of the entire community for the bank, and extended his best wishes for the continued growth and progress of the institution in the future." SKI AREA ACCIDENT CLAIMS WORKER

Alfred Sanchez, Ruidoso Downs, doing maintenance work on the gondola ski lift at Sierra Blanca Ski & Recreation area, was fatally injured when caught between a cable that carries the gondolas, and the giant bull wheel while it was operating at 9:30 Wednesday morning. Witnesses told Deputy Sheriff Ernest Sanchez that it took workmen 30 minutes to extricate the victim from between the cable and wheel. Deputy Sanchez said that investigation is continuing in the accident. The victim was pronounced dead on arrival at the Ruidoso hospital when he was brought here by Chapel of Roses ambulance, and the deputy said he understood members of the family might call for an autopsy on the body. Funeral services were pending as the News went to press early Thursday.

Ruidoso Firm Has Option On Mexican Ore

Wally Hesse, owner of the W. H. Mineral Exploration Co. of Ruidoso states that last week in the state of Chihuahua, Mexico he obtained an option involving millions of tons of titanium rutile bearing gravel. Titanium is an extremely vital element to the United States' war effort and space program. Titanium's corrosion resistance and high temperature melting point make this unique metal very much in demand in today's advanced technology, he said. At present, titanium rutile is generally imported from Australia at approximately \$20 per ton. Until now there have

been no known commercial deposits of titanium rutile on the North American continent, he added.

The acquisition of this option was the direct result from the merger of the W. H. Mineral Exploration Co. and the Neurope Corp. of Los Angeles, Calif., Hesse stated.

Professor William E. Perry of El Camino College, Torrance, Calif. and Jeffery Fowler, Los Angeles manufacturing consultant, filed their intention to incorporate with Wally Hesse of Ruidoso. Proceedings were set in motion last week in the offices of Mario De la Torre, attorney-at-law in Chihuahua City. The new corporation to be titled The Mexamerica Mineral Exploration Corp. Officers are to be, president, Wally Hesse; vice-president, Ruben Calderon; secretary-treasurer, Prof. William E. Perry; board chairman, Jeffery Fowler.

At the present time extensive preparations are being made by Hesse to "block-out" one million tons of titanium rutile bearing material. Next week Wally will lead a work party on horseback to the deposit, he said.

They will enter the foothills of the Sierra Madre mountains and begin the difficult task of analyzing and evaluating this property. All phases of this operation will be carefully recorded on 16mm movie film, color slides and photographs, charts and strata diagrams will be made to be used in determining the full potential of this area. Assisting Wally will be Greg M. William of Chicago, Ill., motion picture photographer who is presently drama director of the Church of Christian Psychology, 3001 Main St., Santa Monica, Calif.; Fritz Quenzler of Seattle, Wash., engineering advisor formerly with North American Aviation, IBM Division, and Kurt Richardson of New York City, material and equipment coordinator formerly with University of Texas at El Paso.

Ruidoso Downs Post Office Bids Are Sought

Mrs. Dorothy Farnell, postmaster of Ruidoso Downs, this week said bids will be received at the post-office there, or by mail in the Denver regional postal headquarters in Denver up to June 20 this spring on a new postoffice facility to be leased. Specifications include that the building would be leased for one six-year period with three five-year renewal leases to follow, that a total of 2,500 square feet should be in enclosed space, at least 8,500 square feet of parking and driving area would be needed and an 80-square foot loading platform be included. Total land needed was stated to be 13,000 square feet for the new installation. It was also specified that the building be on the north side of Highway 70 and that \$3,500 would be a limitation on the lease per year.



Three Escape Hurt In Crash Of Helicopter

A replacement helicopter was due last week-end to be used in lieu of the Bell G3B three-place chopper which fell after take-off Wednesday morning from the heliport at Capitlan.
 Although the craft—one of two assigned to Lincoln National Forest under a contract agreement with United Helicopters, Inc. of Placerville, Calif.—was severely damaged, no injuries were reported.
 Lincoln Information Officer Dan MacIntyre said pilot Ray Cooper and Forest Service employees Mack Cook and James Taylor, both of Ruidoso, were taking off to take some administrative supplies to a trail crew when the aircraft dropped into some pinon trees about 300 yards from the heliport.
 MacIntyre said the main and tail rotors and the tail section of the aircraft were severely damaged. Cost of repairs has not yet been determined; nor has the cause of the accident.
 This is the fourth year of helicopter operation in the Lincoln and the first incident involving a chopper, MacIntyre noted.





growing season," agent Dunlap explains. "But once the trees get through this phase, increased emphasis must be placed on insect control, as this is a continual and growing problem."

The anticipated 250,000 bushels for this year compares to the 40,000 bushels produced in the same area last year. Commercial picking will begin in mid-August and most of the apples will be sold in Texas, Dunlap points out. There will still be a labor problem just as there always has been and growers are already looking for labor sources. Drying past seasons up to 50 percent of the total apple crop has dropped and ruffled because of the lack of pickers.

In general, the moisture condition throughout the county is good, especially in the valley areas, says the agent. The spring runoff is the best in 20 years because of the good snow pack in the Ruidoso and Bonito watersheds. Moisture during the winter was a big help, but more moisture is needed now on the rangeland, he adds.









Areas on the Lincoln National Forest on bulletin boards provided in each of the sites and areas. The regulations also are printed in green brochures which will be available at the supervisor's office in the federal building in Alamogordo and at all ranger district headquarters.

"The purpose of these regulations is not to hamper the public's enjoyment of the Forest Service recreation sites but rather to increase their enjoyment of these sites by eliminating disturbances by thoughtless people and vandals," Hall said. "They also are designed to help protect the facilities which the Forest Service has made available to the public."

"These regulations prohibit such acts as: destroying natural features or plants; destroying public property or buildings; discharging firearms, fireworks, etc., within or near the campgrounds.

"They control the use of noisy devices such as radios or vehicles without mufflers; and also control speed limits and operation of vehicles within the campgrounds which might be hazardous to the other users. They also control the use of pots in recreation sites such as dogs, cats and horses."

Hall said he recognizes that the great majority of the people using the recreation sites and areas of the Lincoln National Forest are responsible and considerate people who do no damage and who cause no disturbance to other users. However, he further recognizes that there is a small minority of people who can be found in any public place and these people are irresponsible and inconsiderate of the other people using the areas with them. Hall said that these new regulations are aimed at this small irresponsible minority.

He expressed the wish that the people using the recreation sites and areas in the Lincoln National Forest "will take these new regulations in a positive light" and will not let the regulations make the new regulations work. He noted, however, that a violation of the regulations is subject to a penalty of not more than 60 days or six months imprisonment or both.

The prize was a beautiful bay colt, impossibly bred, being by Tompton out of Miss Kinale by Fighting Step. The new owner




