



Around Town

The latest issue of the Communi-
cator, a monthly publication of
Community Public Service Co. has
a full page article on the recreation
offered by the Mesquero Apache

area, too. Also in the Communi-
cator are photos of Ruidoso in
1958, including a picture of Paul
Weaver, son of Mr. and Mrs. Min-
ton P. Weaver, and his 26 1/2-inch
long, Sam Montgomery making
presentation of a deed for the biolo-
gical field station for New Mexico
State U. and of Max McCoy, presi-
dent, and Reggie Hughes, Ed Hy-
land and Don Driver, new officers
of the C. of C. here.

We need to make clearer a couple
of things in last week's report about
a call for bids on a new postoffice
facility for Ruidoso Downs. The
bids must be mailed no later than
June 18, 10:00 a.m. Robert E. Kerstner,
chief, real estate branch, P. O. D.,
Box 1978, Denver, Colo., 80201,
Room 309 main postoffice building.
Also the \$1,000 figure mentioned is
a "minimum" of assignable option
to purchase approximately 13,000
square feet of land and shouldn't
be interpreted as meaning that's
the yearly lease on the building.
Also, Mrs. Dorothy Parnell, post-
master, didn't say so, but you
ought to use the zip code in mail-
ing your bids to Denver, for they
must be there by June 20, and that
would speed it along. Two re-
ports to our office said petitions
would be presented at the Ruidoso
Downs village council meeting to
approach the mayor, J. J. DiPaolo
and the entire council, but none
were offered at the council's regu-
lar meeting Monday night there.

Folks up at the city hall remind
us to remind you to honor the land
by building no unauthorized fires—
we've already had some grass and
brush fires this season by folks
unintentionally burning trash, or
having "back" fires that got away
from them. Ruidoso Volunteer Fire
Department adds emphasis to the
city hall reminder by trying to
inspect for all fires by using caution
and common sense. Some folks
have already paid some heavy fines
for not getting permission to build
fires, so remember—it can hurt
your pocketbook, too.

Arveta Barron of Covered Wagon
Canteen in downtown Ruidoso, one
of our pioneer firms, gave us a
very interesting souvenir ball point
pen this week. It advertises roses
at Ruidoso Downs and has some
moving horses in a mad dash to
the finish line. You ought to see it.

Another scholarship for one of
our 100 graduates from Ruidoso
High: A \$200 grant has been made
to a young man entering New
Mexico State U. this fall for pre-
law study has been received by
David Volquardson, son of Mr. and
Mrs. Fred Volquardson. The schol-
arship is from an attorney in El
Paso. Someone slipped a letter
under our news office door the
other morning—which we appre-
ciate, but we'd like to know who
did it so we can print it. We like
all letters signed, please, and will
print them without the name if de-
sired.

Among items crowded out of last
week's news-packed paper was the
report from Frank Potter, our air-
port manager, that he had attend-
ed a meeting of the state aviation
board at Roswell and that he had
received approval from the board
to assist in the cost of sealing the
remedial airport runway and taxi
ways here. He said the state will
assist up to half of the cost, which
may run as high as \$17,000, and that
the work will be done in mid-sum-
mer. Several state candidates
in town last week, including Mack
Baskley, for governor; Governor
David F. Cargo; Ed Foreman, for
congressman; Earl Hartley, for
supreme court justice.

The world premier of "The

Downs race track has invited. Fol-
lowing this special screening of the
Paramount made color movie of

Ruidoso Gets
Sewer Loan

The village of Ruidoso received
approval Tuesday morning, this
week in Washington for a \$350,000
loan to give the green light to a
proposed \$704,000 sewer expansion
project. The news came from
Congressman E. S. Johnny Walker,
Ruidoso's office through a secretary,
Jerry Brown. It was Brown who
called about a month ago to in-
form the News that he hopes for the
loan were very dim—in view of
economy moves in the federal govern-
ment and also due to some other
projects with higher priority.
Brown said at the time Congress-
man Walker planned to appear in
person as soon as he could to speak
in behalf of the need for Ruidoso.

Ruidosians voted last year to
issue bonds to take care of a large
part of the cost, and to seek a loan,
secured by revenue from the ex-
panded system, to pay for an addi-
tion to the sewer disposal plant and
to add collection mains. About 2,000
lots within the village limits in the
north and western parts of town
will be served by the addition.
Construction may get underway
as soon as three months from now,
the Washington spokesman said,
that he had understood, and that
it will take about ten months to
complete it.

News came from Washington two
weeks ago that a \$38,940 grant had
been made to Ruidoso to assist in
the cost of a \$122,800 interceptor
line as a part of the big project.
This grant was reported by three
of New Mexico's four-man con-
gressional delegation. Prior to that
the local project had already re-
ceived a grant of \$170,500 from the
community facilities branch of
H. U. D. in 1967.
The expansion of the sewer sys-
tem will be larger than the exist-
ing facility installed about nine
years ago, serving a much larger
area of town and many more pro-
spective users.

by Travis Lee and has 11 students.

Betsy O. Walker, 26, daughter of
Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Olin, Jersey
City, N. J., came here recently to
be wed to Walter Whitford, a facul-
ty member of New Mexico State
University's new biology field sta-
tion opening its first semester this
month.
Late Tuesday she died in a one-
car automobile accident on U. S.
Highway 70 east of Las Cruces
when the vehicle she was driving
went out of control and rolled over.
She was pronounced dead on arrival
at the hospital at White Sands
Military Range.
Wednesday the fiance and the
woman's 2-year-old son, Lance,
were enroute to New Jersey, ac-
companied by the body to where final
rites will be held.

Max Oliver
Is Legislator
Candidate

Max Oliver, now serving as a
Lincoln county commissioner from
this district, and operator with his
wife of Mitchell's Motel on U. S.
Highway 70 in Ruidoso Downs, an-
nounced this week that he will file
his candidacy for the office of state
House of Representatives from the
combined Lincoln and Sierra coun-
ties district, subject to the Republi-
can primary in August. He said he
will begin a visiting campaign soon
in all areas of the two counties in
the interest of his race.

Oliver came here in 1950, operat-
ing a service station in Ruidoso
Downs prior to going into the motel
business. He issued a statement this
week in regard to his race and it
is printed below:
"I have been in municipal govern-
ment for 14 or 15 years and I
know that no one man can really
make a big change in the way city,
county or state policies are made.
But I do know that with a little
more thought some of the bills and
laws we now have can be improved
and that it is not necessary to keep
imposing new rules and laws on
the people of New Mexico. Having
been county commissioner for 3 1/2
years and trying to live with some
of the rules that are passed on to
the county, I feel with the experi-
ence I can help Sierra and Lin-
coln counties. The two counties are
quite similar in tourist and agricul-
ture trade and there are many
things that can be done to improve
both these enterprises in the two
counties and the whole state of
New Mexico."

Ski Area
Open All Week
Starting Now

Sierra Blanca Ski and Recre-
ation area, 16 miles northwest of
here, will be open all week long
beginning this week-end, manager
Roy Parker reported this week.
The restaurant will be open and
the enclosed gondola lift, which
climbs from White Mountain Park
to Lookout Peak, a rise from 10,000
feet to 11,400 feet, will be operating
to allow summer visitors the mag-
nificent panoramic view of almost
all of southern New Mexico. Moun-
tain ranges as far away as the San-
diegos around El Paso are
among long views provided at this
height.
Summer visitors have been set-
ting records year after year as
motorists grog in number, making
the breakfast drive up the side
of the mountain to the recreation
area—passing through aspen, fir,
spruce, pine, oak and other
growth, and as a bonus viewing
meadows splashed with the color
of wild flowers. Often wild game
can be seen at some point along
the route.
Parker said the area will remain
open daily until the September 15
week-end close the vacation sea-
son in the Ruidoso area.

Ruidoso Downs Serviceman Given
Silver Star In Georgia Ceremony

Specialist 4 Leo T. Salas, the son
of a Ruidoso Downs woman, Man-
uella Salas, and his close friend,
Specialist 5 John S. Hawley, shared
the spotlight at Fort Stewart in
Georgia recently. They each re-
ceived the Silver Star for heroism
in Vietnam.
Spec. Salas' father, Leo Salas,
lives in LaLuis.
A report from the newspaper
published at that military base,
The Flight Trainer, telling of the
honors bestowed on the two bud-
dies, is given below:
"Specialist 5 John S. Hawley and
Specialist 4 Leo T. Salas, both as-
signed to the 8th Aircraft Mainte-
nance Battalion at Ft. Stewart,
received the Silver Star from Colonel
David G. Cogswell, deputy center
commander, for their heroism in
the same regiment May 15, 1967,
while serving with the 170th Assault
Helicopter Co., 14th Combat Avia-
tion Battalion in Vietnam.
"Specialist Hawley was decorat-
ed for his role as a crew chief on
a UH-1D on a reinforcement mis-
sion to a unit of the 101st Airborne
Division pinned down by heavy
automatic weapons and small arms
fire. On the first run into the area,
he began placing accurate sup-
pressive fire on suspected enemy
positions until the aircraft had
landed, whereupon, he aided in
loading the wounded aboard the
aircraft, and administered first aid
on the return trip to the aid station.
"When his ship returned to the
battle area, Specialist Hawley
climbed onto the side of the air-
craft to direct the ship to the
wounded. After the aircraft had
landed, it was hit by an enemy
mortar round.
"As he started to move toward
a bunker, Specialist Hawley heard
a call from a comrade on the op-
posite side of the landing zone.
Running across the open area, he
reached the comrade's position
and began carrying the wounded
out of the open area to the tree line.
He continued to do this until all
the wounded were out of the area,
whereupon he began administering

Powdery mildew has been found in many orchards in the Honda Valley. Control this disease with Karathane in two applications 8 to 10 days apart.

Powdery mildew affects the new leaves first, causing them to curl up and have a white powder over the entire leaf. Jonathan, Stamen and Golden Delicious are usually affected first. Trees heavily infected with powdery mildew fail to mature the apples.

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

In Memoriam

of
Mrs. W. Tisworth

Memorial services for Mrs. Will Annie Coe Tisworth was the second daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Coe, she had one brother, Wilbur Coe of Glencoe. She was born April 1, 1885. After a prolonged illness she died at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Herbert Johnson in Cleveland, Ohio, May 12, 1961. Mrs. Tisworth had lived with her daughter several years.

Mrs. Tisworth was a member of the Episcopal Church and for the greater part of her life had attended the chapel at Glencoe which her mother, Helena Anne Coe, was instrumental both in establishing and maintaining.

Mrs. Tisworth was a member of the Order of Eastern Star, having been a charter member at Carrizosa. She was also a charter member of the Glencoe Women's Club. She belonged also to the New Mexico Folklore Society and to the Historical Society of Lincoln County.

From the time Annie Coe Tisworth was a small child she was the constant companion of her father from whom she early learned the skills of horsemanship and ranching. Though petite and dainty she was outstandingly efficient with both horses and cattle. In an area where almost every woman was expert, she was considered the outstanding horsewoman of the country. As were her sisters she was often asked to lead parades at Roswell and in other localities. Mounted upon her beautiful white horse she was a striking figure. She was equally expert in the practical tasks of ranching. Even as a child she had rapid mastery of the "Whisper" and "the" infrequently she broke horses for use on the ranch. She loved hunting and was a remarkably good shot. Most unusual of her extraordinary skills was her ability in tracking. The older Apaches recall that she rivaled their best trackers in ability and say that few of them could compete with her in tracking trails.

In 1912 she was married to Mr. Will Tisworth of the firm of Tisworth Company in Carlsbad. Their business was considered to be the largest general store in any small town in New Mexico. Her husband remained in Carlsbad and she came to the ranch, Mr. George A. Tisworth the merchant's business.

Perhaps the greatest tribute paid her is the statement of one of her Spanish-American friends who said, "Annie Tisworth was the kindest and most beloved in the community and especially by the children. They were always welcome in her home though she apparently made no effort to attract them. They looked into her kitchen but presently she complied to her unusual ability. She enjoyed riding with them and she would bring them to the city and use of horses.

Though she excelled in dancing she did not in other activities. Skills found it difficult to secure her as a partner because she preferred instructing her children in the art, and loved helping them become adjusted to social life. Times and again at dances at the Glencoe Ranch Mrs. Tisworth obliged children to enjoy the festivities. She often competed in local


