Brochures TALKED BY ALL-SEASONS



Needle Cast Diseases Hit Ponderosa Pines

Many of the Ponderosa pine in the Ruidoso area are infected with one or more of the needle cast diseases which are common to the southwest. The most obvious symptom of needle cast disease is a red-brown discoloration of the foliage. Trees with heavily damaged foliage are commonly mixed with trees with little or no damaged foliage and this year's new growth is not affected.

Needle cast diseases tend to occur sporadically. Trees rendered unsightly one year may recover the next. Past experience in the southwest indicates that trees with damaged foliage suffer some loss of

Forest Service Issues Brochure On Mountain Scenes

A new brochure, "Natural Beauty of the Southwestern National Forests," is available for public distribution. Southwestern Regional Forester Wm. D. Hurst announced today. Two photos, one in color, are printed of scenes in the Ruidoso area, of Sierra Blanca Ski area, lodge and of Old Baldy.

This publication tells by words and shows through use of color and black and white photos what the Forest Service is doing to keep the 12 National Forests in Arizona and New Mexico and the National Grasslands in Texas, Oklahoma and New Mexico, productive and attractive. Hurst said, "We are convinced that, under Multiple Use Management, it is possible to utilize the resources of the National Forests and still maintain or enhance their natural beauty."

He pointed out that, in Arizona, the National Forests boast such scenic wonders as Superstition Wilderness, Santa Catalina Mountains, San Francisco Peaks, Sycamore Canyon Primitive Area, Coronado Trail, Woods Canyon Lake, Big Lake, North Kaibab and Saiguaro Lake, North Mexico, the Olla Wilderness, Sierra Blanca, Pecos Wilderness, and the Mountains, Wheeler Peak Wilderness, Red

growth and vigor but are not permanently damaged.

No control method is available for use under forest conditions.

Research is being done at the present time in the Ruidoso area to evaluate the damage and determine an effective and suitable control.

Forest service personnel and Ruidoso village officials are scheduled to meet 2 p.m. Friday at the city hall to discuss the problem, it was announced Wednesday.

Homeowners concerned with needle cast damage in yard trees may find the following suggestions useful:

(1) Apply water during prolonged dry periods to help maintain the vigor of the trees.

(2) Collect and burn fallen needles.

(3) Spray the foliage with the fungicide, Bordeaux mixture, three times, spray the first time after the spring rains, the second time in the spring when the "candle" or new growth is one-fourth emerged and the third time two to four weeks later.

Additional information concerning this disease can be obtained at the ranger station. Information on mistletoe and bark beetle infestation and control are also available.

County. The recent showers would probably provide enough moisture for more to hatch. Check low spots and protected areas for the young hoppers. If you find heavy spotted infestation spray them with toxaphene before they start spreading out. If you find any hoppers let any one of the following persons or me know: Archie Perkins, Corona; Doc Dean, Claunch; Ben Roberts, Corona and Ernest McDaniel, San Patricio.

Spray your trees to control the codling moths that hatch in increased numbers during the rainy spells.






