

County's Income Could Double With College

The small private college proposed for an Alto site could double Lincoln county's gross annual sales, according to figures compiled by the college planners. Paul Wrye, president of High Mesa College, Inc., said a recent study in another state showed that a private college of 1,100 students poured six million dollars directly into the area in one year. "That money, passing from grocer to mechanic to druggist, etc., would re-circulate in the community at least three times," Wrye said. "That's a total of \$18 million a year—equal to the gross sales for all of Lincoln county in the past 12 months."



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








