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

Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce board of directors Monday night approved an idea presented by President Max McCoy that a five-man permanent board be set up to direct the annual Aspencade program here each October. He said the idea was suggested to him and the proposal was for the first board members be appointed for terms of one, two, three, four and five years, with incoming presidents to name or reappoint future members for five year terms.

A motion by director Wayne Estes and okayed by the board was to set up a board to manage the Aspencade, with a recommendation that the Aspencade be spread out over a week's time each year, with added attractions to bring in more crowds, and also to have a theme for 1969 to recognize Lincoln County's Centennial year. Representing All-Seasons at the meeting was a director of that group, Bill Patterson, who invited board members to attend the next meeting of All-Seasons to be held Monday afternoon next week at 3:30 p.m. at the Wild Snail.

A monthly news letter from the C. of C. will be mailed to chamber members and to be published in the local newspaper to keep the community posted on projects, work done and activities was also given approval on a motion by Trustee Don Driver. Board members, led in discussion by director Ralph Petty, Jr., agreed that better communication was needed by the C. of C. with all its members and with the entire community.

Estes reported for director Ray Heid, who was absent, that on Jan. 11 this winter season the State Class C giant slalom and open class giant slalom races for junior skiers will be held on Sierra Blanca ski slopes here and that at least 150 competitors could be expected.

## Florida Man Found Dead In Parked Car

A man, identified from papers on his person as Robert Philipovich, was found dead in his car parked in Cedar Creek's forest service picnic grounds early Thursday morning last week. His papers indicated he was a resident of West Palm Beach, Fla., and that he was 37 years of age.

Justice of the Peace Austin Pritchett summoned a coroner's jury at the scene and death was ruled as caused by asphyxiation. Foreman of the jury was Tom W. Jones and other members were Albert Jay, T. J. Frank, J. W. Grosdiffer, Walter Mecker and L. C. Crews.

The jury's investigation revealed the man had been burning charcoal in his car during the night to keep warm while he slept in the vehicle. All windows in the car were closed.

The body was found by Deputy Sheriff Ernest Sanchez on a report by a neighboring camper that he had seen no movement in the car for several hours. The body was sent from here by Chapel of Roses to Florida for funeral services.

## Man Found Hanged In Local Jail

Arrested early Monday morning seated in a car that was not his, parked near Gambles store in the Gateway, Alfonso Anthony, age 44, whose probable address is Hubbard, Texas, was found dead in the village jail early Wednesday. He had used a sheet to strangle himself, a coroner's jury, summoned by Justice of the Peace Austin Pritchett determined when convened at the scene.

Hubbard was discovered about 8 a.m. by Jim Snow, who had checked the jail cell last at 2 a.m. The body was removed when officer Dave Bonnell lifted it so that John Anderson could cut the sheet. Hubbard was charged with vagrancy. He had arrived in Ruidoso by bus only a short time before he was arrested seated in the car.

On the jury were E. D. Lane, foreman, L. C. Crews, Ernest G. Lucero, T. J. Frank, E. U. Brecheisen and Don Hart.

Verdict was death by suicide by hanging with a sheet, Judge Pritchett reported.

Chapel of Roses had charge of holding the body here awaiting orders for shipment to his home.

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





## Superintendent's Corner

 Points of Interest Regarding Slow Readers

Most of the patrons of the Ruidoso Municipal Schools are aware of the fact that we have a remedial reading program under Title I, with Mrs. Barbara Isham as the teacher and Mrs. Helen Brown as the teacher aide. We are very proud of the results of this program last year and are looking forward to equal success with our students who have a hard time with their reading again this year.

According to Dr. Elena Boder, a pediatric neurologist at Cedars-Sinai Medical Center in Los Angeles, Calif., children who have difficulty learning to read are of all degrees of intelligence. Some of them may, indeed, be slow. But come don't learn to read because they can't hear well, and others don't learn to read as easily as is expected of them because they can't see well. Harder to single out than any of these, however, are those children who are, as is said in Europe "word blind."

In the United States neurologists have named this condition "dyslexia." According to Dr. Boder dyslexia may sound like a dread disease but it really is the inability to learn to read stemming from slight brain or nervous system impairment—too slight, usually, to present any obvious physical or mental indications of it.

The word dyslexia is often loosely and inexactly used, Dr. Boder says. "Some say it includes all kinds of poor reading, even those that result from poor eyesight or poor hearing—but it really means poor reading caused by nerve or brain dysfunction."

In Europe, where a lot more has been done to help children who are having a hard time learning to read, dyslexia is called "word blindness." In this country, however, poor reading is much too readily and too commonly laid to lack of intelligence. This is a grave mistake. Most physicians diagnose dyslexia by an ancient, tried and true scientific method—the process of elimination. If a child can't learn to read and has normal eyes and hearing, and is of normal intelligence, with normally affectionate family ties and motivation, they suspect dyslexia. "Very few poor readers with brain or nervous damage get that way through injury at birth. Most of them have brain or nervous dysfunction that is probably genetic in origin. One usually finds others in a family who do or have had the same kind of trouble, just as you'll often find left-handedness or color blindness running in families. There is also another group of children who may be classified as dyslexic, even though in their cases one will not suspect brain or nervous damage. These are the children who are slow in maturing, the "late bloomers" as they are sometimes called.

Determination of a poor reader's precise problem is very important, chiefly because the earlier the causes of poor reading are found, the earlier remedial training can be begun. One reason prompt remedial work is necessary is to prevent the affected children from getting the idea they're not very smart. Poor readers have an evil self-image to master what the actual cause of their trouble may be. They soon learn to think of themselves as stupid, not as quick as their classmates, and they may tend to withdraw into daytime dreaming or hostility. Both attitudes complicate their problems and lead to serious social and personality difficulties in later life. Recognition of the true nature of a reading program is in itself re-



# Boy Playing Marbles Helped Billy the Kid In Escape from Lincoln

By DAN STORM

(Written in the late 1950's prior to the subject's death. Storm is now writing a book about Severo Gallegos and this will be part of it. He has copyrighted this story.)

One summer day in 1881 a little boy 12 years old was playing marbles with two young companions just outside the courthouse gate up in Old Lincoln Town. It was a peaceful quiet day with the doves cooing down amongst the walnuts and box elders and oaks along the Bonito River.

And from the steep hillside that slopes upward toward a high natural look-out tower south of the little pioneer village capital, you could hear every now and then the contented chirping of the robin, the loud bugle-like call of the pinion jay mingled with the tiny voice of the bluebird sounding from the cedar, juniper and pinon trees.

The boys laughed at their play. While he was taking aim on the marbles of his companions, the boy who was 12 years old heard heavy footsteps coming from across the street at the saloon. A large man passed stamping in boots and spurs just close to the

marble ring.

This boy just barely had time to ask his playmates,

"What's he running for? I never saw him run before."

But there was no time for an answer. A figure appeared in a window in the upper story of the courthouse and a voice said:

"Hello, Bob."

In a flash the peaceful summer day was changed as a booming shot sounded from the window followed in a split second by another. The large man fell heavily. And a double barreled shotgun (new fangled for those days) came flinging and spinning down from the window close behind the smoke from the gunfire.

The 12-year-old boy jumped up and began to run, but the voice from the window called,

"Don't run, Severo. Don't you be afraid. Run and get me Bill Brant's horse."

I guess you know that the man in the window was Billy the Kid, who had just made his escape from two guards armed to the teeth, with the odds stacked a thousand to one against him.

With the eyes of the two guards

glued upon him day and night, shackled hand and foot, he had killed these two after day upon day of iron patience, by "bitting on his very last card."

Well, the boy ran out to the corral and got the sheriff's horse, but was too small to bridle him, so he threw the hackamore over his neck and came leading him over to the court house. By this time, the Kid one of the most accomplished jumpers of pioneer times, had leaped out the window landing with a clanking thud, irons, handcuffs, pistol, guns and all.

So the gunman who was a great friend of the children was helped to escape by a child.

One of the very oldest natives of Lincoln County, Severo Gallegos was born in San Patricio back in the days when Lincoln County took in all of the southeastern quarter of New Mexico and Lincoln was the capital and trading center for all this land.

Although he has come through almost 90 years of life filled and refilled with hardship and sorrow of every kind, Severo spreads sunshine and good cheer everywhere he goes.


Most any day in good weather he can be seen walking up the street in his home town of Ruidoso, the handsomeness of his friend of the Spanish people and



Among the first settlers who followed the traders over the Santa Fe Trail from Independence, Mo., to Fort Union, New Mexico Territory, in search of a new life in the West during the last century were Frank and Al Coe. Their experiences and those of their children in this rough new land amount to an American saga, a classic Western experience.

The story of this remarkable family is told by Wilbur Coe, Frank's son, in *Ranch on the Ruidoso: The Story of a Pioneer Family* in New Mexico, 1871-1908, to be published by Knopf on November 27.

The book is illustrated with two paintings by Peter Hurd, one by Henriette Wyeth, four maps by Jose Cisneros, and twenty-two photographs from the Coe family archives. It will be sold by several local stores.

After trying their hand at several occupations, both brothers homesteaded ranches. They were soon caught up in the Lincoln County War, a bloody cattleman's vendetta

that was to bind their fate with such legendary figures as Billy the Kid and Buckshot Roberts. Wilbur Coe vividly recounts the story of the death of Billy the Kid's friend Tunstall, of Billy's devastating revenge and their mournful departure from the territory. As times changed, and as the West became less wild, Frank Coe developed his ranch on the Ruidoso River into a flourishing enterprise, with fine blooded beef cattle.

Wilbur Coe has preserved and expanded his heritage. The ranch has prospered with his vast apple orchards and Wilbur Coe and his wife Louise have enriched with boundless hospitality the country of which they are a part. Mrs. Coe

In the wake of your article on Old Tucson I would like to call your attention to the little town of Lincoln, New Mexico which has some decided advantages over Tucson's stage set.

1. Lincoln is a town with a real hard-riding history, it does not need a manufactured past. A western filmed in the land of Billy-the-Kid would be a press agent's dream.
2. Lincoln residents have evidenced an interest in documenting their history by establishing two museums and installing historic markers.
3. Lincoln exhibits an interest in the drama of its past through the staging of the Billy-the-Kid Pageant each year. The townspeople are quite hospitable to the great influx of visitors this brings.
4. Lincoln is preserved largely as it was in the days of the old west, when it was a swinging town in the largest of counties. To see this living evidence of the proportions of the past is quite a shock to a crushed urbanite.
5. The area is most picturesque, a fact which artist Peter Hurd seems to have discovered years ago.
6. Nearby Ruidoso is a natural stay and play town for any movie company which wanted to make the scene.
7. Shelton seeks to "authentically recreate the frontier west". Why "authentically recreate" in Old Tucson when you can accurately preserve in Lincoln. Careful development of natural sites and amusement areas always brings people when they know there is something worth the time and money spent.

In case you're wondering, I have been both to Lincoln and Old Tucson. Never "authentically recreate" by building a sound stage in the middle of your museum, it spoils the illusion.

# San Patricio Artist's Work In Roswell Show

A large retrospective exhibition of the work of Peter Rogers, young British painter now a resident of San Patricio will open at 121 West Third Street in Roswell on Sunday, Nov. 3. Over 150 paintings and drawings representing this artist's development since the mid-1950's will be shown. Included in the exhibition is the latest of Rogers' landscapes, a 13 1/2 foot panel painted especially for this occasion, depicting the Peter Hurd ranch at San Patricio with the Hondo valley surrounding it. The artist will be present at a reception opening the exhibition from 3 p.m. to 9 p.m. Sunday.

Some of his work is on display here in Ruidoso at Gallery III.

Peter Rogers was born in London in 1933. During 1953 he was a guardsman in the Welsh Guards and in 1954 was an officer in the Queen's Royal Regiment. His formal training was then taken at St. Martin's School of Art in London. After living in the South of France and in Spain for several years, he came to the United States in 1963, at which time he married Carol Hurd, daughter of the renowned San Patricio painter Peter Hurd.

# PETER ROGERS

Rogers was elected a member of the Royal Society of Artists in 1967, and in 1960 Arthur Tooth & Sons, Bruton Street, London, became his dealer, in which gallery he has since exhibited. Also in 1960, he had his first one-man show at "Bow Bells" in the City of London.

Shortly after coming to New Mexico, Peter Rogers was commissioned to paint a mural in the State Archives & Library Building, Austin, Texas. This 45-foot mural depicts the history of Texas from the coming of the Spanish Conquistadors to the present—and after finishing it, Rogers was made an honorary citizen of Texas.

In 1966, Mr. Rogers was given a one-man show at Tooth's in London. Earlier this year, twenty-two of his more recent paintings were shown at the College of Santa Fe in Santa Fe.

This exhibition divides itself roughly into four parts, those being *The Land, The Goddess, The Christ and Everyman*.

Rogers' paintings are represented in museums and private collections throughout the world: in England, France, Sweden, Spain, Holland, Germany, Southern Rhodesia, New Zealand and the United States.

The coming exhibition in Roswell will be open to the public during the reception, from 3 p.m. to 9 p.m. Sunday, Nov. 3 and daily thereafter from 10 a.m. to 8 p.m.

# Jones Firm Low Bidder On Rec. Projects

G. A. and S. L. Jones construction company's low bid at \$55,364.50 on phase two of recreation facilities in School House Park was accepted by the Ruidoso village council in its meeting of Oct. 10. Another bidder, W. S. Riley, Jr., submitted a proposal of \$56,800. The phase two will include two

tennis courts, a multipurpose court and paved parking area. The village has received approximately \$38,000 in grants from the Bureau of Recreation to assist in the project and also the citizens voted \$50,000 in general obligation bonds last year. Balance of the money will be spent later for other recreational facilities, such as horseshoe pitching courts, etc.

Trustee James Beall who served as mayor pro-tem in the absence of Mayor Lloyd L. Davis, Jr., recognized Ray Day who, as president of the local Lions club sought the endorsement of the governing body

to co-sponsor a defensive driving course as the official school driver education program in Ruidoso. After reviewing the letter of agreement, Trustee Elmer Pirelli made a motion, seconded by Trustee Wayne Estes, that a letter of agreement be executed. The motion carried.

Trustee Beall next recognized J. D. Locke, owner of certain lands contiguous to the corporate limits and agent for other property owners in the same area.

Locke spoke of several things he had in the "ready form" for possible annexation, etc., with no action asked for or taken.

Mayor Davis arrived at the meeting at 8:10 p.m. and assumed the chair. Under discussion was a request from the contractor for the sewer extension project, whereas, said contractor is receiving interest financing from The Arizona Bank and asked that their periodic payments be assigned to The Arizona Bank. Attorney John W. Thompson advised that any and all checks from the Village be made out jointly to the contractor and the Arizona bank. Hine was authorized to handle the request with the inclusion of Attorney Thompson's statement.

Attorney Thompson and Hine near Daniel reviewed the proposed sewer extension plans and in particular those areas where easements are needed, and certain proposed changes where the attorney requested as to final conditions of the project, i.e., those areas that are not built up enough, according to Thompson. The areas referred to were marked in red on the attorney's official map. Thompson expressed concern as to a portion of the project following the river in Riverside and Ruidoso Springs addition. Mayor Davis stated that he and Hine were in the process of trying to get government participation in this area and that they would have a report after a visit with the proper authorities in Santa Fe.

After more discussion, Trustee Estes made a motion, which was seconded by Pirelli, that Thompson proceed with the condemnation provisions, according to law, in those areas where easements have

not been granted and furthermore, that the attorney do so with haste, and that those areas marked in red on the official project map be handled as presented by the attorney for selection. The motion carried.

Hine and Daniel reported that the HUD office had telephoned permission for construction to begin and that the contractor will begin soon.

Under more unfinished business, utilities manager Don Hart presented, on behalf of Ruidoso Land Sales, petitions for annexation and applications and covenants of the W/2 of W/2 of S10, T11, R13E, N34PM and A101 Street, Unit 13; and Holiday Acres. It was brought to the council's attention that these petitions for annexation had been presented at a prior meeting and no action had been taken because the dedication and covenants had not been presented with the petition. Thompson raised the question as to the different signatures that appeared on the petitions and the dedication and covenants, stating that the signatures of the legal owners of the property appeared on the petition only. But, that the signatures of the officers of Ruidoso Land Sales, Inc., appeared on the dedication and covenants. Thompson stated he did not know for sure whether Ruidoso Land Sales could legally bind the owners to the dedications and covenants. Trustee Pirelli stated that the dedication and covenants had not been presented to the planning commis-

club at the time the final plat had been presented. The question then arose as to whether dedication and covenants had to be presented on areas outside the village limits until these areas were petitioned for annexation.
