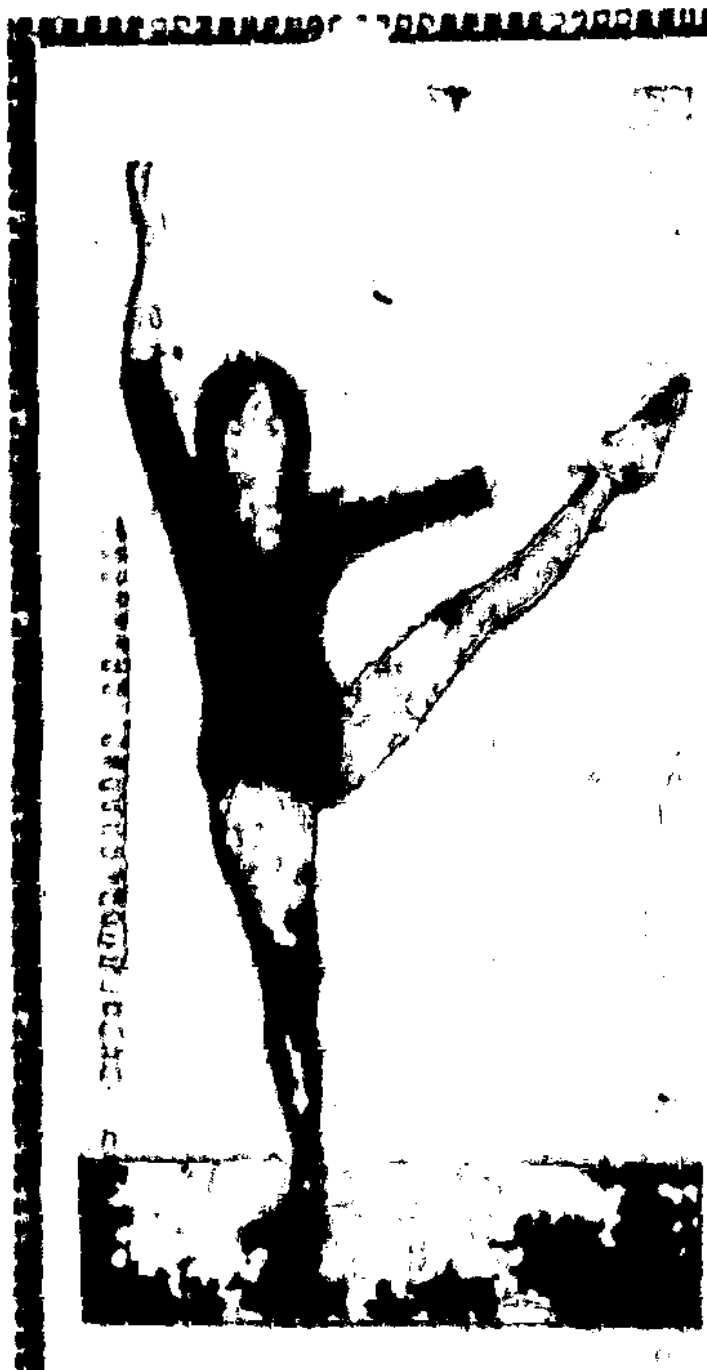

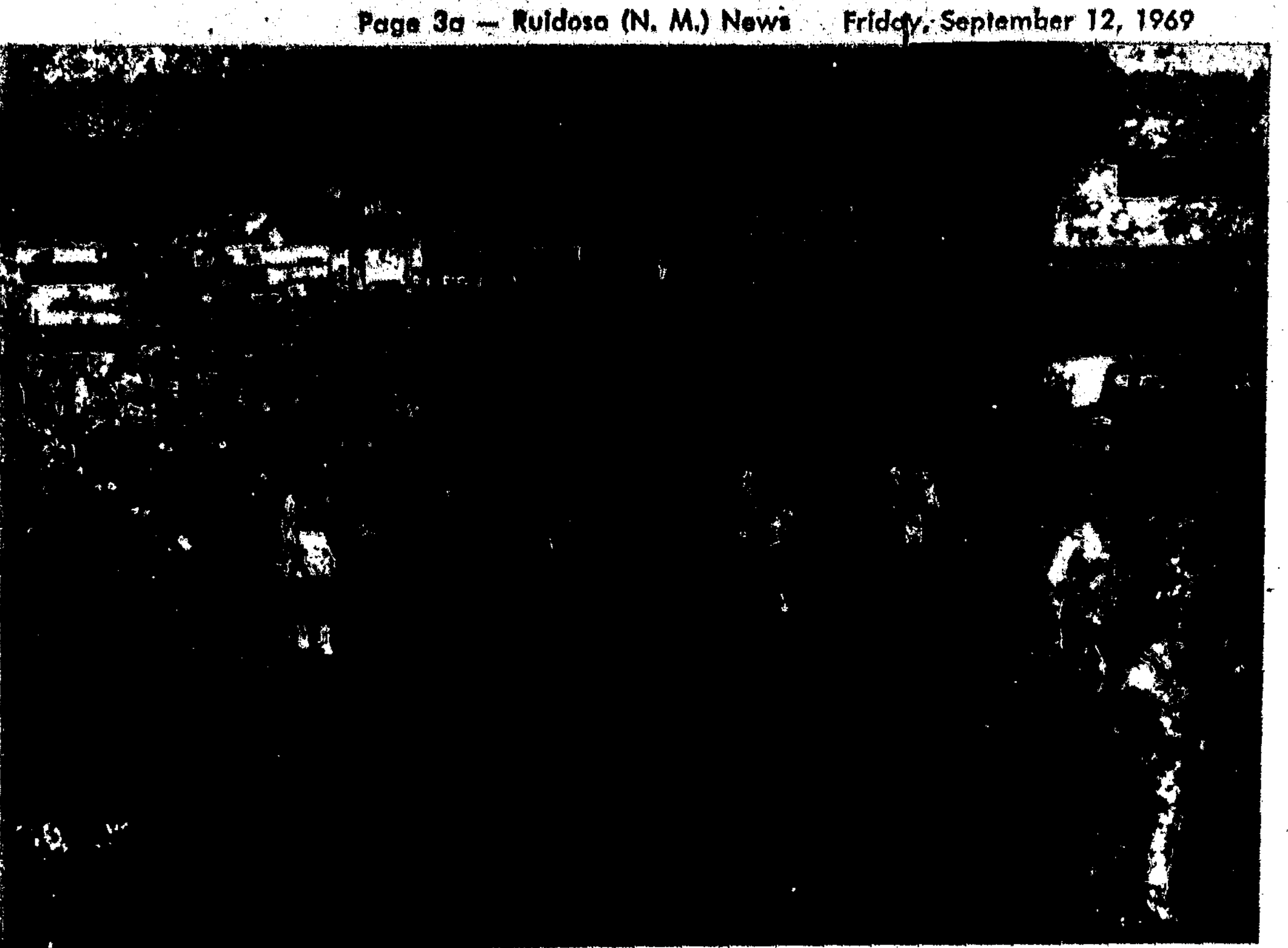
## England Speaker At Regional Meet

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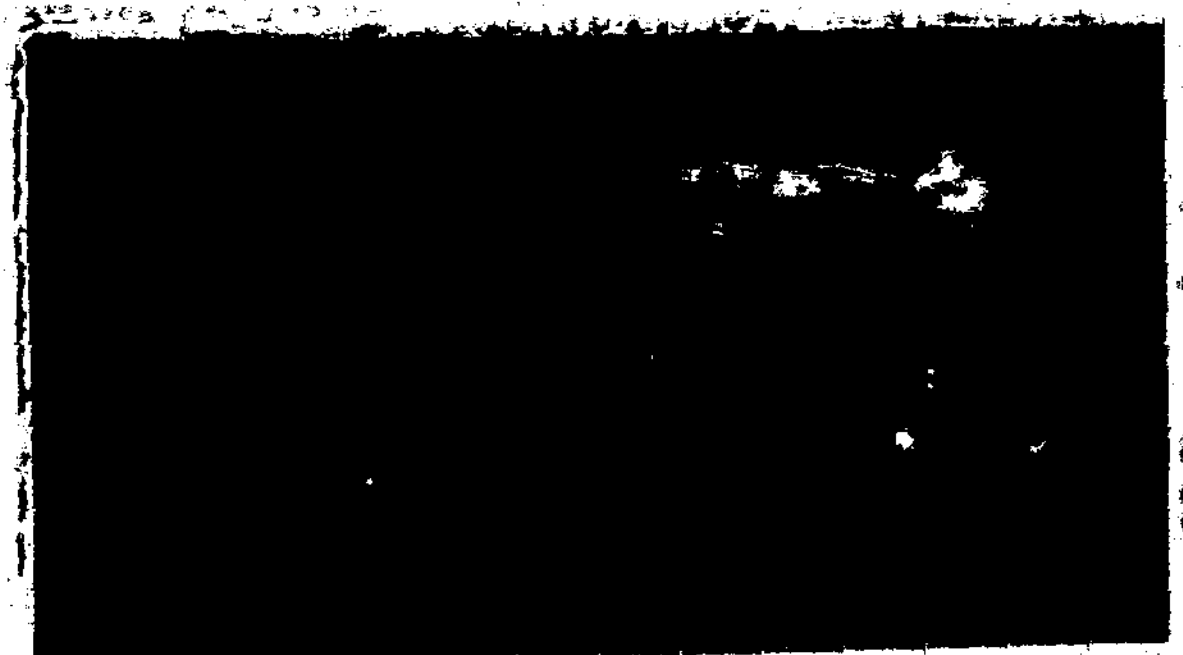
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## Fruit Calendar

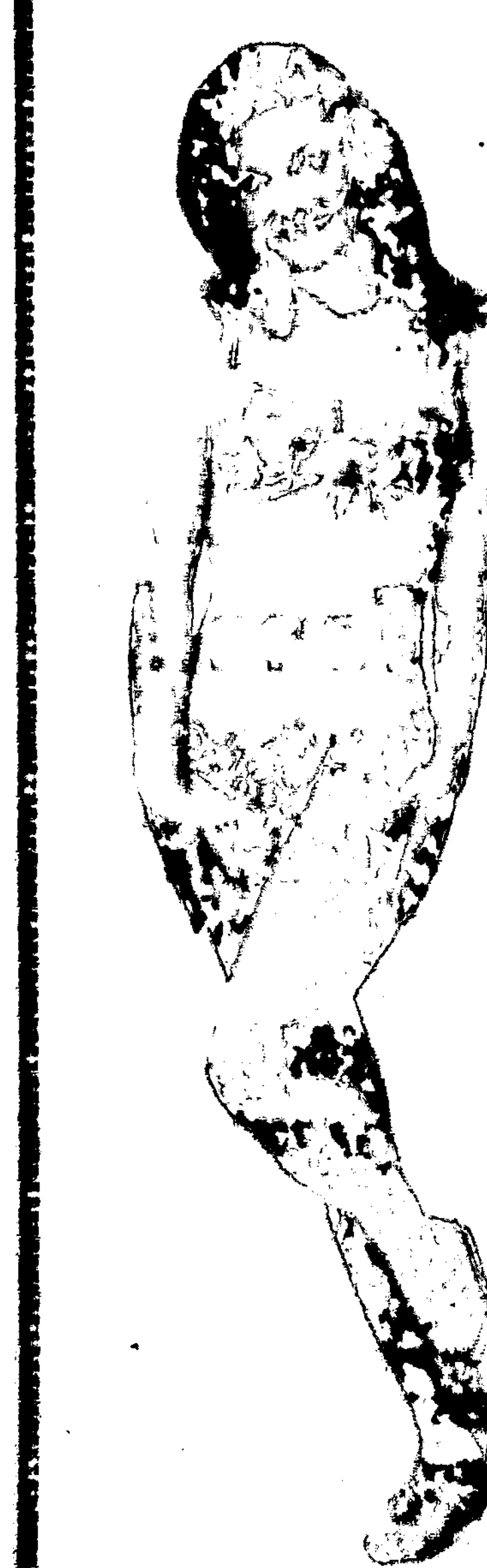

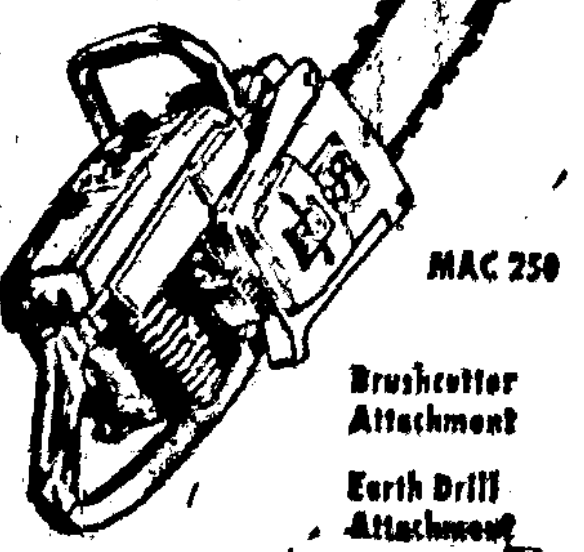

Capitan coach, John Dickey, had high praise for his team and their total team effort. He was very hesitant about praising any one of the Tiger players but rather said that it was a total team effort, both offensively and defensively.

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# Warriors Dump Grizzlies 34 - 14

A large number of Ruidoso High School Warrior football fans traveled to Carrizozo Friday night, Sept. 5, to see the local team defeat the Carrizozo Grizzlies to the tune of 34 to 14.

The season opener saw the Warriors score five touchdowns, run two 2-point conversions, and rack up 404 yards to dominate the game. Quarterback, Pat Farrar, touched off the scoring with an exciting 60 yard broken-field run for the first Warrior TD early in the first period of play.

Other scoring runs include: David Latham, fullback, 18 yards and a conversion run for two points; Barry Nelson, halfback, 40 yards and a conversion; and Nelson again, 20 yards, and Farrar, 10 yards.

The Warrior defense allowed the Grizzlies' offense only 138 yards and two TD's. The first on a one-yard plunge by David Lock, Grizzlie quarterback, conversion pass, Lock to Mackey, early in the second quarter. Late in the fourth quarter, the Grizzlies put together a drive, climaxed by a pass play, Lock to Mackey.

A simulated play by play account of the game follows:

Barry Nelson took the kickoff on the Ruidoso 15-yard line and returned it to the 5. On the first two plays from scrimmage, Pat Farrar, quarterback, handed off to Nelson, once for 3 yards and again for two. The next play saw Farrar trapped for a loss of a yard. On fourth down and six from the Warrior 9, Farrar punted to the Grizzlies 25.

Grizzlies' quarterback Lock after a net loss of two yards in two plays, on third down and 12 yards needed for a first, caught the Warriors unexpectedly with a quick kick, which rolled to the Warrior 30.

At this point, Nelson took a hand-off from Farrar, found a nice hole and went 13 yards for a first down.

On the next play, David Latham took a pitch out from Farrar for 10 yards, which was called back on an illegal procedure penalty back to the Warrior 38. Another play netted two. Farrar, on a keeper, with good blocking and a bit of broken field running, went 60 yards for the first TD, with 7:31 minutes remaining in the first quarter.

The conversion attempt failed and the Warriors led 6-0.

Two plays on carries of 0 yards and 3 yards by Mackey gave the Grizzlies' another first down on their 49 yard line.

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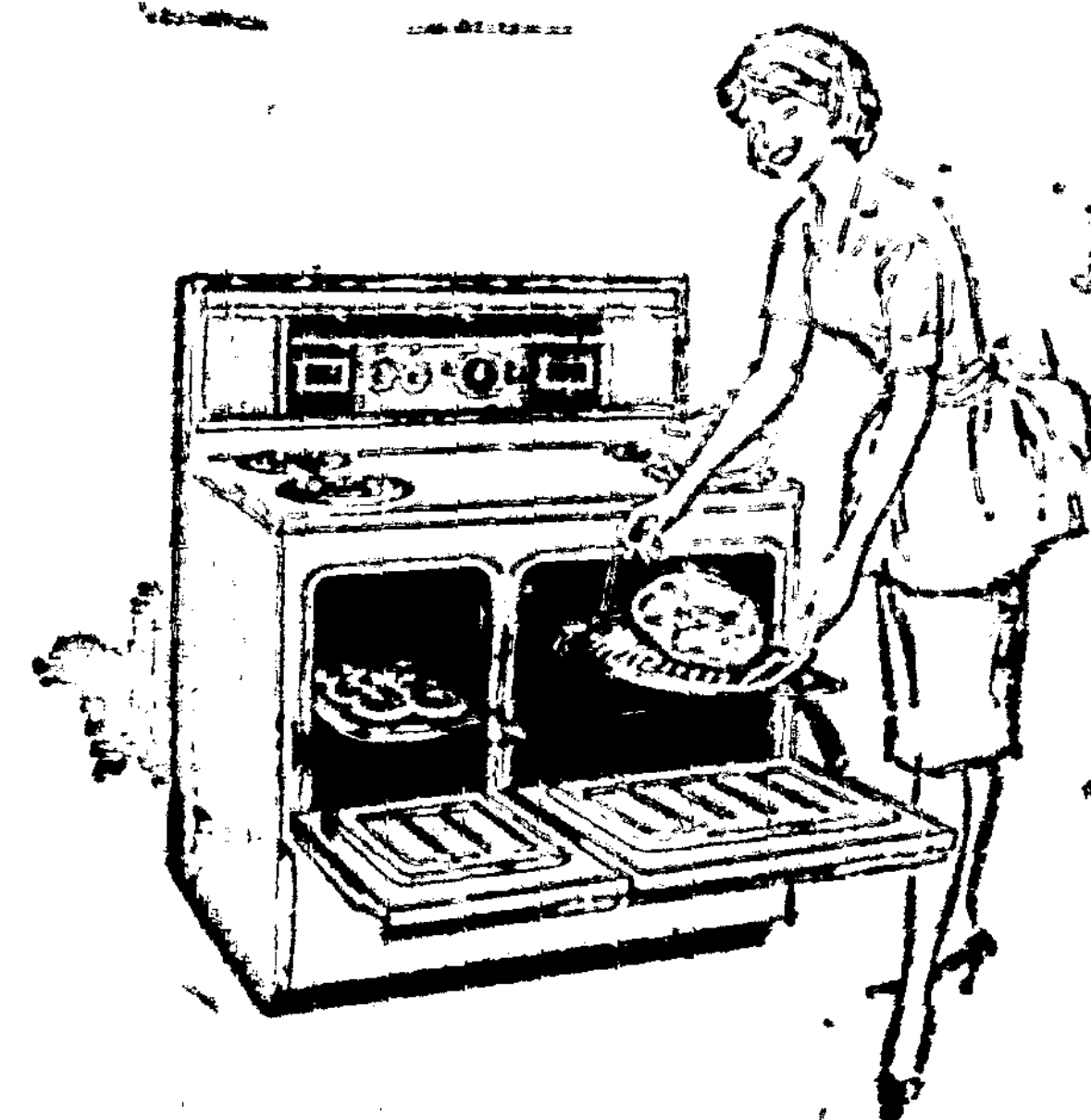
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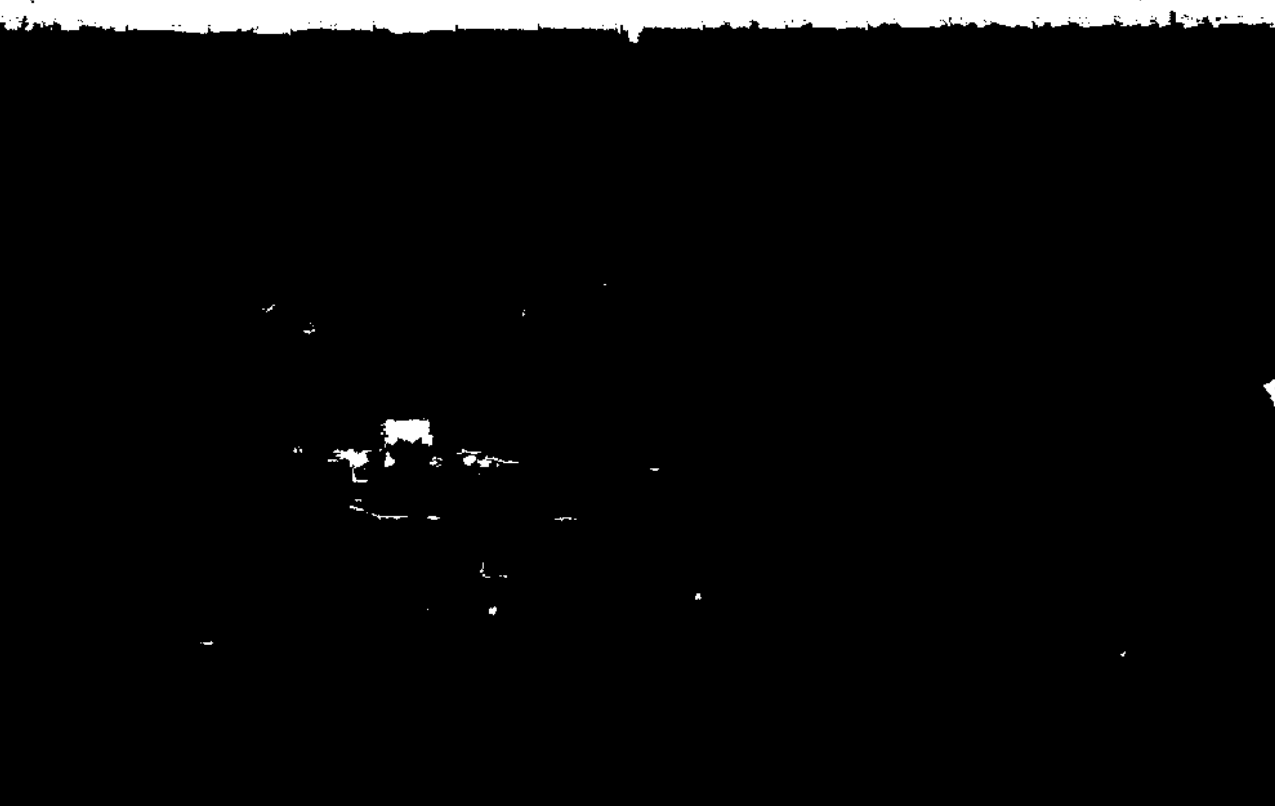
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## Bear Hunting Term Good In Local Area

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## Chips from the Rangers Log

A short time ago we attempted to bring to your attention the local insect problem. We feel that this problem needs considerably more attention and definite action.

First, a tree is much the same as a human being insofar as the process of life is concerned. A tree has to breathe, eat and drink to survive. Cutting off the supply of any of these elements is fatal. Many things cause serious, if not fatal, injuries. Undercutting the root system or pouring asphalt or concrete around the base of a tree is serious, and almost certainly means death. Damage to the inner bark by bunnyping or scraping of some object is also serious.

A weakened tree, just as a human, is more susceptible to infestation and disease. This is when insects attack the tree because of the low resistance. If remedial action is not taken immediately, the tree will undoubtedly die.

The first signs of a dying tree are needles beginning to turn yellow and falling, and pitch forming on the main trunk. A healthy tree will combat insect entry by excessive "bleeding" or the forming of pitch pockets. This natural effort tends to drown or trap the insects, and indicates a fight for existence.

If it is determined that the tree is infested in the early stages, it is possible to spray the tree with one of several chemical solutions. This helps considerably, but does not necessarily mean that the tree will be saved. Once the tree is beyond saving, it should be cut and buried in place if possible. This would prevent spreading of the insects. Unburied slash is a prime reproduction area for insects, and should be avoided if we intend to protect our healthy and vigorous trees.

We are presently preparing a pamphlet here at the ranger station as a recommendation for treatment of diseased trees for the local area. These pamphlets may be picked up at the Ranger Station beginning Monday, Sept. 22, from Monday, Sept. 15, at 7:30 p.m. in B.S. Monday through Friday.

For two years he starred in Hollywood as a personality on his own TV show, "The Adventures of Patches" and "Spunky the Bear".



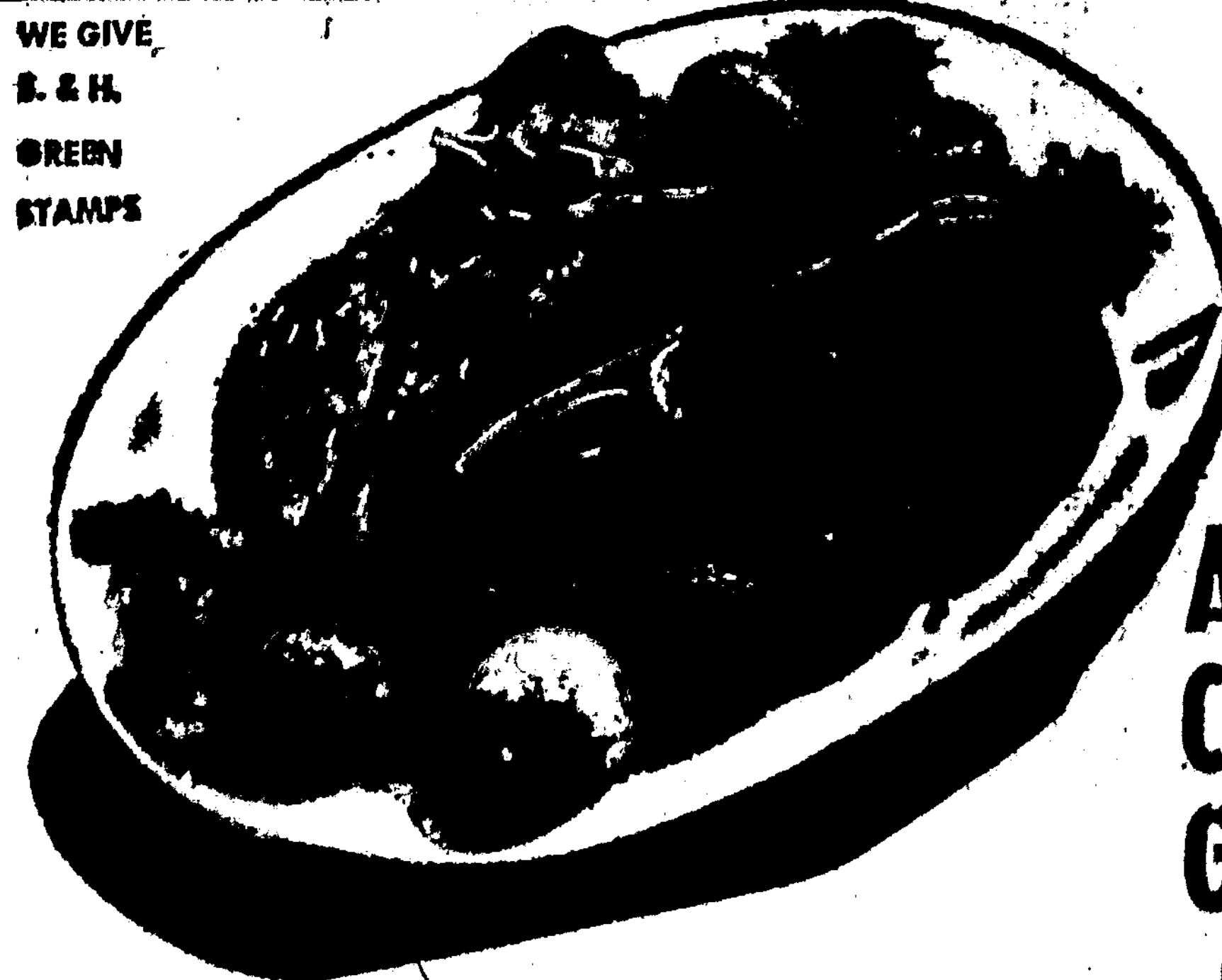
