Improvements in order to qualify the hospital as an intermediate care or nursing home facility.

If only the first question (Ruidoso Hospital) passes the taxpayer may expect an increase of the first year tax levy to \$1.43 per \$1,000 assessed value. Thereafter decreasing to .86 per \$1,000 assessed value.

If both questions pass the taxpayer may expect an increase of the first year tax levy to \$2.03 per \$1,000 assessed value. Thereafter decreasing to \$1.02 per \$1,000 assessed value.

According to the brochure should assessed valuation of the county increase in future years a corresponding decrease in the tax rate should occur. Any new residents moving into the area will help pay for these proposed bonds that are to be retired over a twenty-year period.

What Can the Taxpayer Expect For His Dollar?

Ruidoso

The \$1,018,000 to be used for addition, remodeling and equipping the Ruidoso-Hondo Valley General Hospital is budgeted in the following ways:

The hospital addition with equipment, \$234,140. Remodeling of existing facilities and equipment will cost \$124,920. Covered entries will cost \$88,420. Replacing parking area for 15 cars, 600 square yards at \$1.65 or \$1,000.

One operating room and equipment will cost \$14,400. Eight patient rooms (18 beds) will cost \$24,240. Parking and drives, \$7,030; Curbs and walks, \$3,000 and landscaping \$2,000.

The architect's fee is estimated at \$75,361.

Some questions have been raised concerning the cost of parking area. Currently the hospital parking facility holds approximately 50 automobiles. The proposed parking area would hold 75 automobiles (visitors, patients and staff) and is barely in line with requirements of the State Hospital Board.

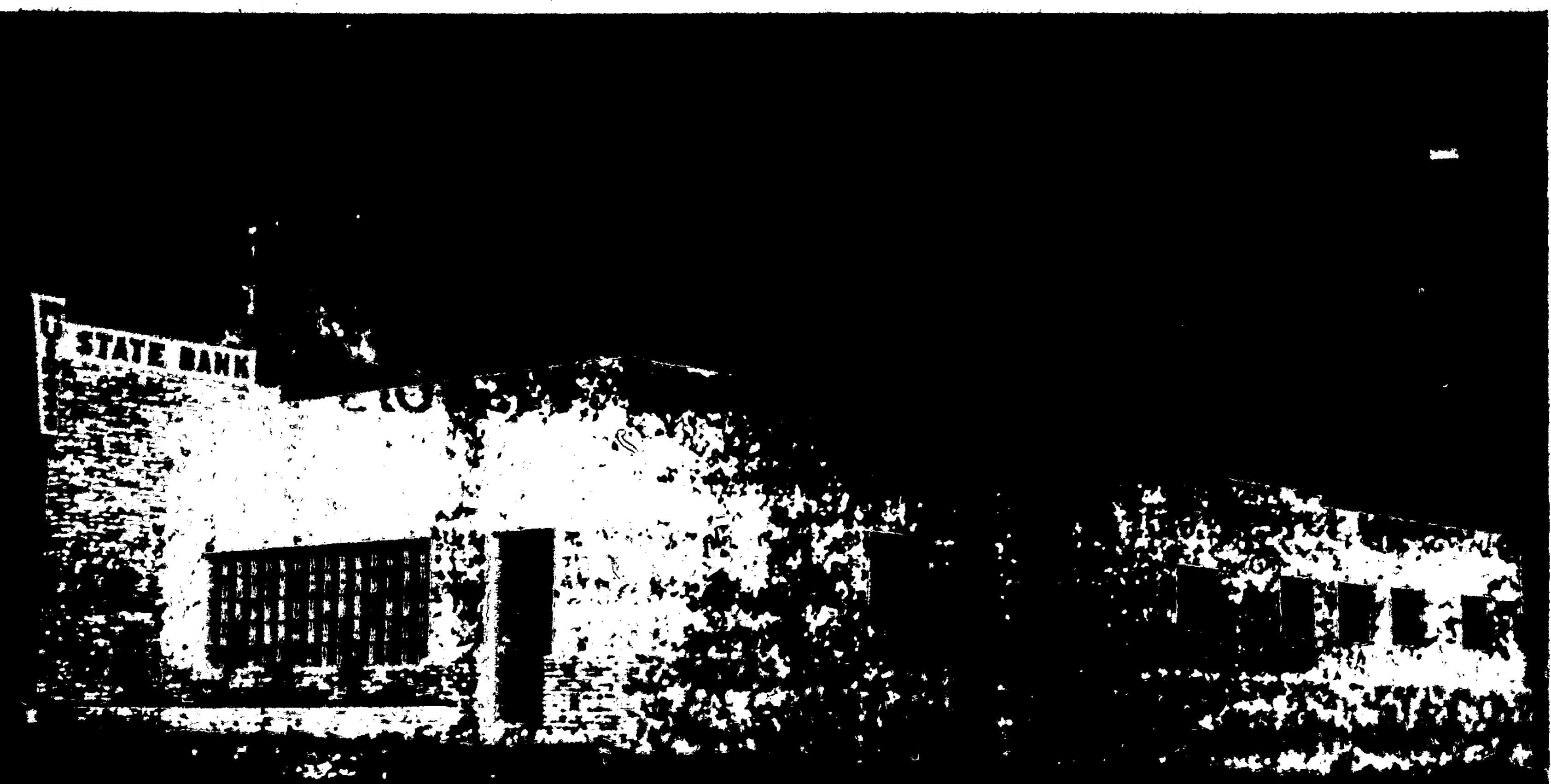

1969 Tax Rate Schedule Out

A Special Tax Rate Report issued recently shows the following tax rates to be used in computing tax bills for Lincoln County which should be mailed to taxpayers in November.

The Taxpayers Association of New Mexico notes that rates have been converted to dollars and cents per thousand dollars of assessed value and because of rounding, some total rates may be "off" by one cent. Actual tax rates are carried out to six decimal places. Levies not included in the report are water, watershed, predatory control, irrigation and conservancy districts and special state livestock levies.

The school levy includes \$6.00 per thousand for the county school levy. Since this is distributed on the basis of total students within a county, the particular school district may receive a greater or lesser amount than the \$6 per thousand levy will produce.

In all but eight counties who have not completed reapportionment (one of which is Lincoln) the state will relinquish \$2.20 per thousand of its levy—\$1.50 per thousand to the counties and \$1.70 per thousand to the schools.

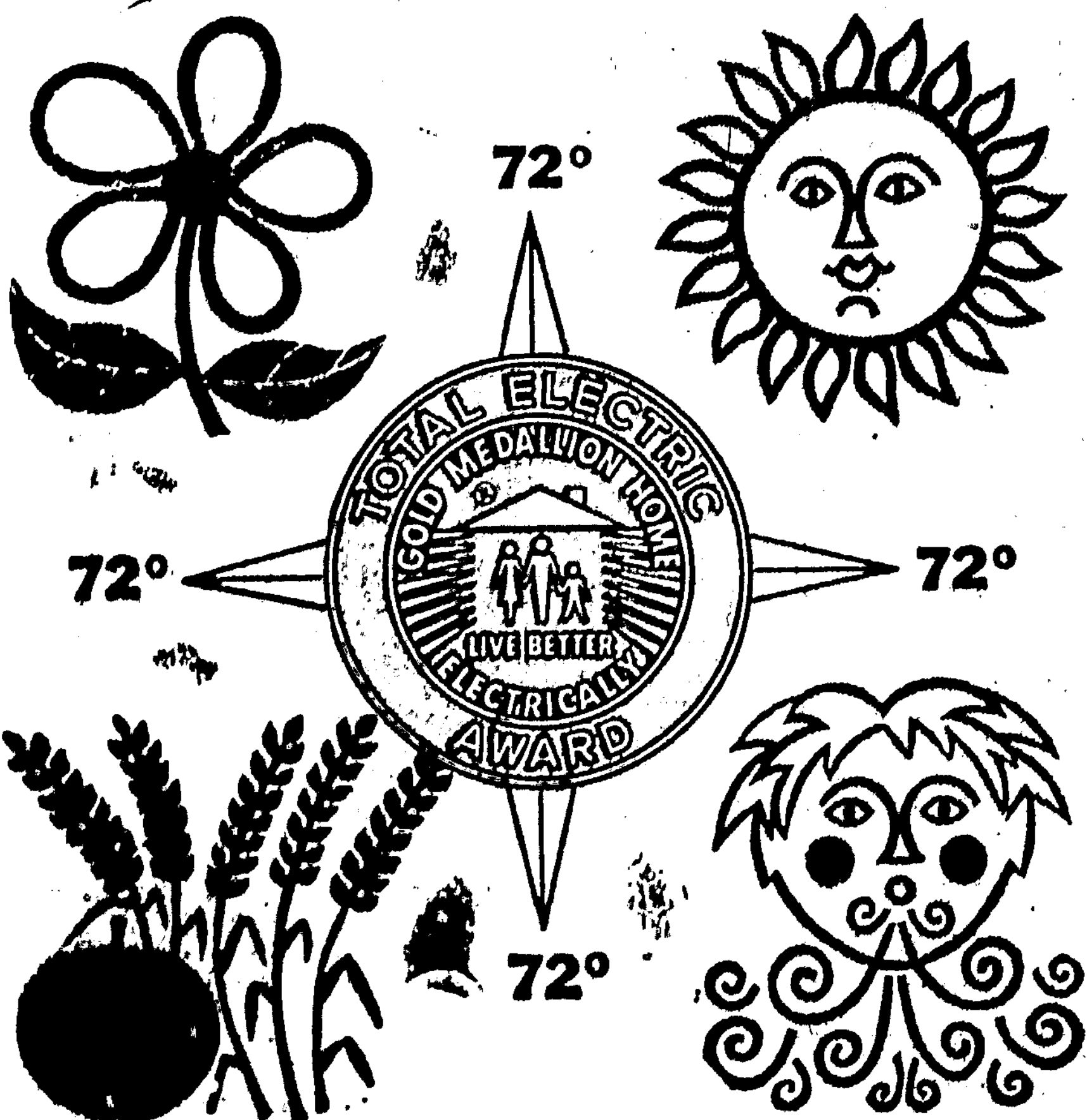

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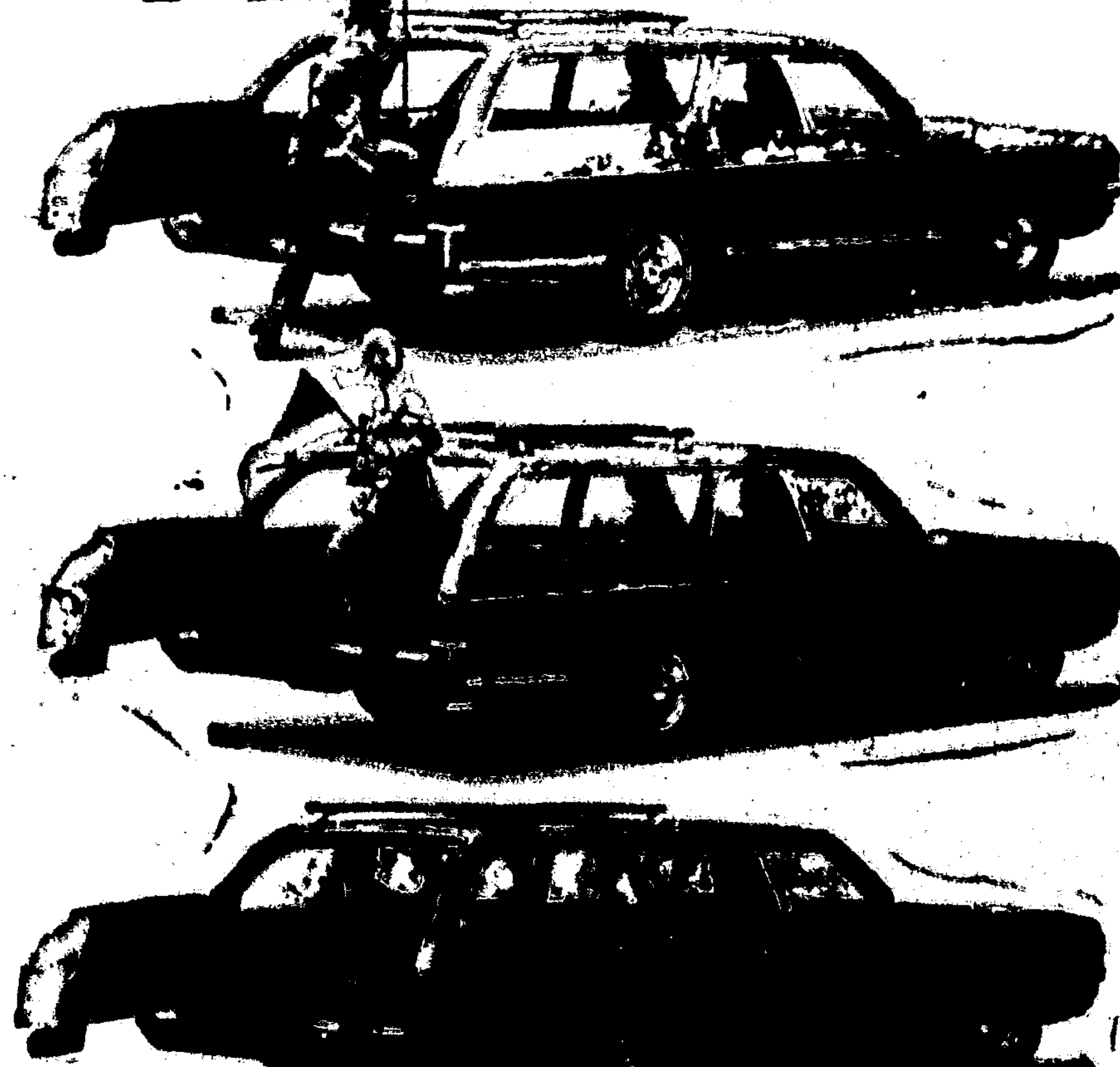

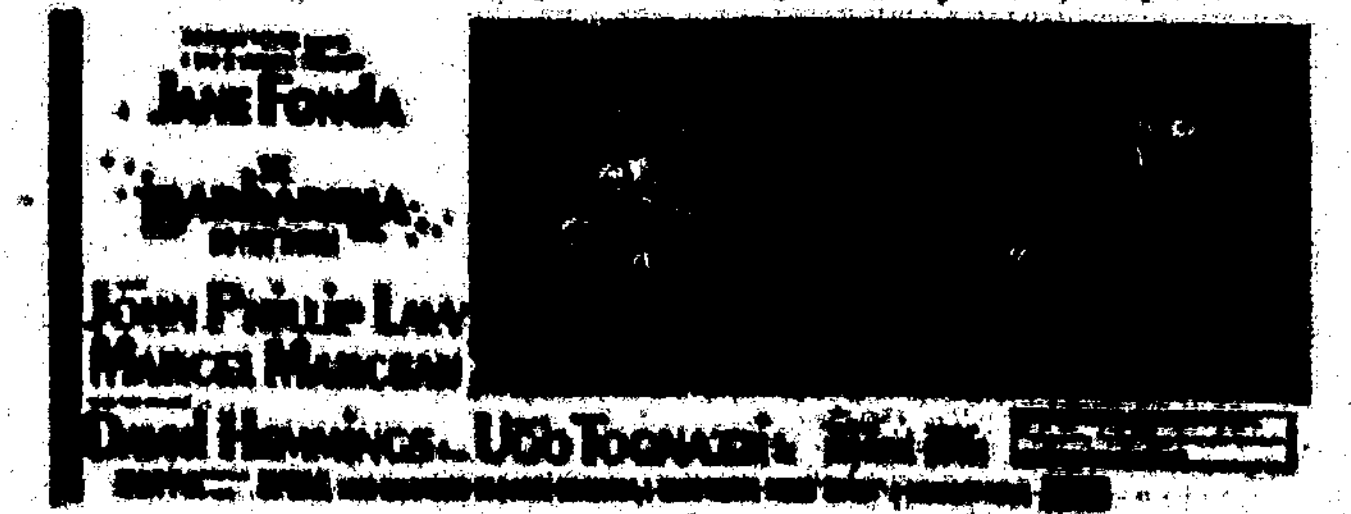

Neither team was able to move the ball in the next two series of downs. An exchange of punts found the Warriors in possession on their own 32-yard line.

David Latham, Warrior fullback, carried for 10 yards and a first down to the 42. On second down and 10, Miller dropped back to pass, found flanker back Jimmy Davis open behind the Dexter defenders, who raced into the end zone for the first Warrior TD, with 23 showing on the clock. The point after kick attempt failed and the Warriors led, 6-0.

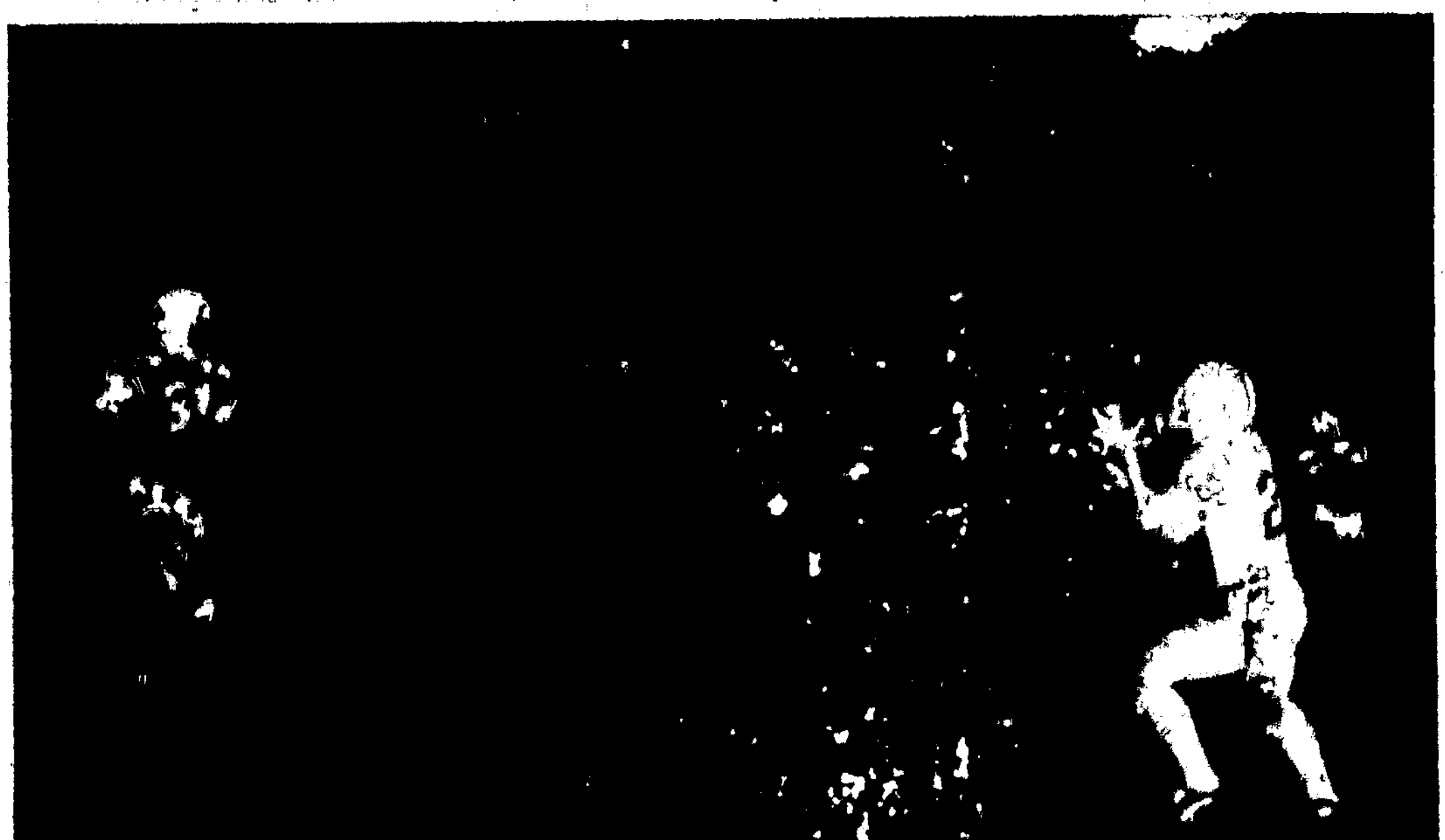
The aggressive Warrior defense drew four penalties amounting to 40 yards, in the second quarter in holding the Demons scoreless.

Supt. Reports Exams Set, 822 Enrolled, Meeting Interesting

Principal of Ruidoso High School, Metley McGuire, announced that week that nine-week exams will be held the week of Oct. 13-17, instead of the week of Oct. 10-13 as originally planned. School will not be in session Oct. 23 and 24 due to a teachers' meeting.

Enrollment is now up to 822 and Superintendent of Schools, P. T. Valliant, Tuesday.

Valliant had just returned from the second annual Public School Conference on Indian Education held Sunday and Monday in Gallup.

Attending the conference, said Valliant, were educators from the four state areas of Utah, Arizona, Colorado and New Mexico. Also attending were State Department of Education officials from those four states.

Valliant said of the many subjects discussed, in his opinion one of the most important was the lack of funding available under Public Law 816 which is designed to locate building in federally impacted areas.

According to reports received at the meeting there is a backlog of \$120,000,000 in unfilled applications that have built up over the last three years.

The Gallup-McGuire school superintendent, Dr. W. B. Fitzsimmons, moderator at the meeting reported there was such a need

for building money in his district that a delegation has been sent to Washington, D. C., and is in the process of attempting to get legislation for supplemental monies.

The district in which Fitzsimmons is superintendent has the largest Indian enrollment of any school system in the United States. Over 6,000 Indian students are enrolled.

Valliant said the consensus of those attending the meeting was that the greatest problem in Indian Education was the non-involvement of the Indian people. It was generally agreed that if Indian parents were more involved the schools might expect improved participation from Indian students.

On Wednesday, Valliant and his secretary, Mrs. Ruth Turner, traveled to Albuquerque to attend the annual fall meeting designed by the New Mexico Department of Education to aid superintendents and other personnel involved in conveying and reporting for the purpose of satisfying the requirements of Public Law 816 (Aid to Federally Affected Areas).

The assembly will be held during the dates of Oct. 10-12, at the Farmington High School. Meetings at the local Kingdom Hall will be suspended during those dates.

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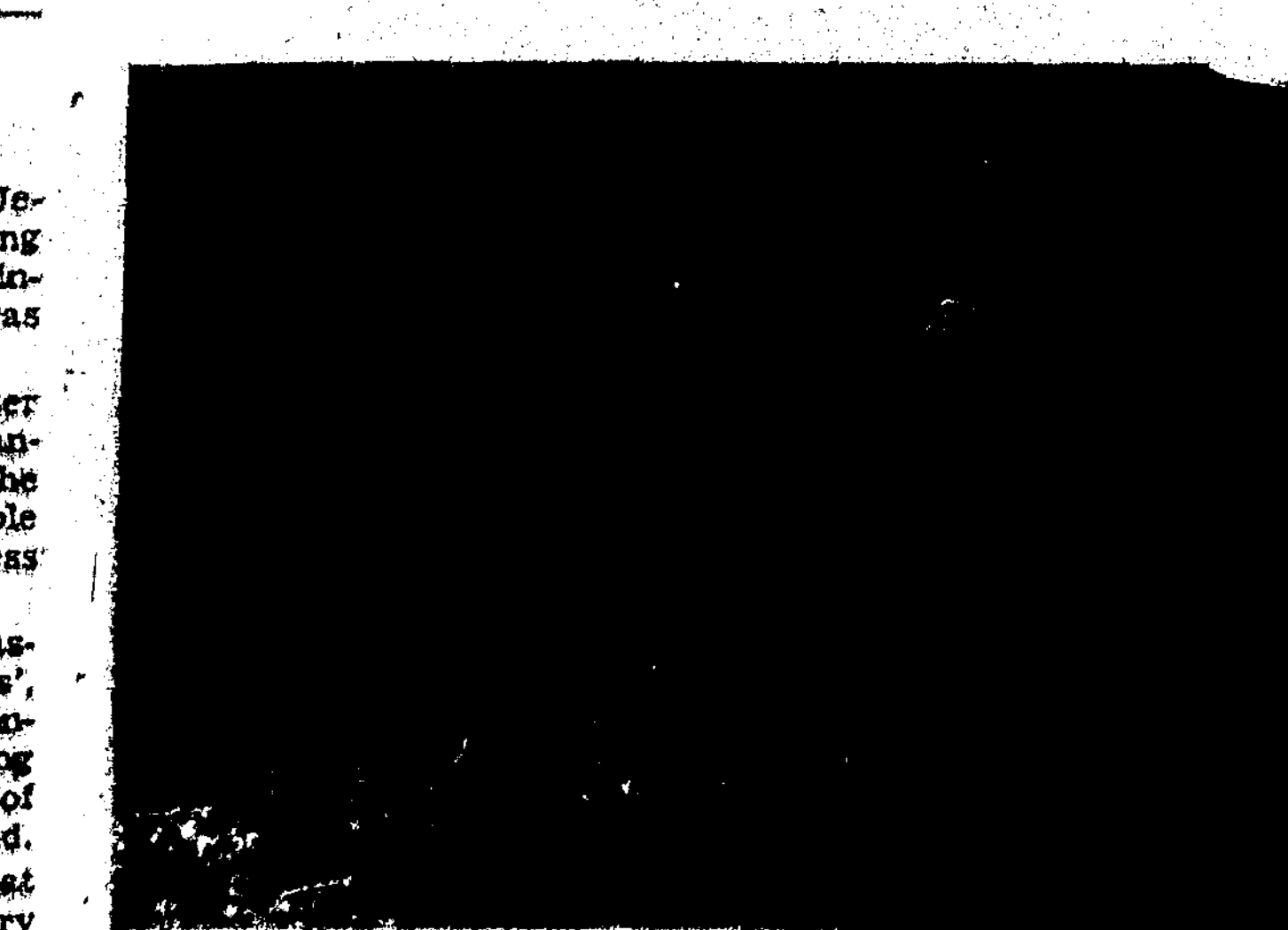

'Cracked' Lake Gets Bonito's Excess Water

Nagal Lake, which has recently shrunk to the proportions of a big puddle about 3 1/2 feet deep, was looking better this week after the opening of the pipeline valve from Bonito Lake by the City of Alamogordo.

Recently the City of Alamogordo turned over Nagal Lake and its surrounding surroundings over to the U. S. Forest Service. Following the presentation the City of Alamogordo turned off water necessary to the lake's existence, according to a SCMR spokesman.

Repeated meetings between officials of various state departments and Alamogordo were held to discuss the problem and was presented to the SCMR (South Central Mountain Resources Area). The SCMR (an organization serving the Otero and Lincoln County areas) entered a plea with the Alamogordo City Council through Alamogordo Chamber of Commerce manager, Tom Faulkner.

Since recent rains have swelled Bonito Lake to the spilling point, Alamogordo agreed to open the valve from Bonito Lake to Nagal.

The SCMR has located, through the State Engineer, water rights for presently being used by Ft. Stanton, and is attempting to have these water rights temporarily transferred to the Fish and Game Department.

If successful the Fish and Game Department can meter the Bonito Lake-Nagal Lake pipeline and use Ft. Stanton's water rights temporarily in order to maintain a safe water level for the fish that are stocked in the lake.

Alamogordo has agreed to co-operate in the future transportation of water to Nagal from Bonito free of charge for any water rights the Fish and Game Department can use.

Nagal Lake normally covers approximately 35 acres and acquires a depth of 20 feet. However, for several years it has been known that the lake is "cracked" and leaks water if filled over the 14 point.

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Chips from the Rangers Log

With fall approaching many folks are scouting the woods for the yearly crop of berries and nuts. Of special interest are alderberries, elderberry, currant and pinon pine nuts.

Pickers of alderberries must be of a tough breed close the red berries grow singly, or in two's and are very leaved bushes. A few of the pugnacious berries, however, so a long way in making delectable jellies and jams. The best crop spotted to date can be found at Three Rivers.

Chickadees are now nearly gone and like alderberries they are difficult to gather. For the hardy, though, the fruit can still be found in the canyon of the Rio Grande and on the trails near the Sierra Blanca Ski Area.

Of the three fruits, elderberry is the most easily picked. In just thirty minutes it is possible to net 10 or more pounds of the tart, purple berries. Jam, jellies and wine can be made from the tart fruit. Now at the peak of production, elderberries can be found near the Skyline Spring on the Mountain Road, four-quarter mile above the Madonna and in Nagal Canyon near the wilderness boundary.

Last on the list for harvest is the pinon pine crop. Since the crop is rarely bountiful in consecutive years it is wise to take advantage of this year's production.

Pinon nuts are scattered in the pine cones. After locating a stand of pinon in which the cones are just opening, cover the ground under several trees with tarps and either shake the nuts down or let them collect naturally. Collected nuts can be placed in a bucket and shaken to skin off the bad ones. Then after roasting the nuts in the oven you can settle back and have a delightfully flavorful TV snack.

AN ORDINANCE AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF VILLAGE OF RUIDOSO JOINT WATER AND SEWER REVENUE BONDS, SERIES 1969, IN THE PRINCIPAL AMOUNT OF \$450,000.00, FOR THE PURCHASE OF THE EXISTING ENLARGING AND EXTENDING THE SEWER SYSTEM; PROVIDING THAT SAID BONDS WILL BE PAYABLE AND COLLECTIBLE FROM THE JOINT UTILITY SYSTEM, SUBJECT TO THE PAYMENTS REQUIRED BY ORDINANCE NO. 148 FOR THE SECURITY OF VILLAGE OF RUIDOSO JOINT WATER AND SEWER REVENUE BONDS, SERIES APRIL 1, 1964; PROVIDING FOR THE DISPOSITION OF THE REVENUES RECEIVED FROM THE JOINT UTILITY SYSTEM, ALL PURSUANT TO ORDINANCE NO. 148; PRESCRIBING OTHER DETAILS CONCERNING SAID BONDS AND SAID REVENUES, INCLUDING BUT NOT LIMITED TO COVENANTS AND AGREEMENTS IN CONNECTION THEREWITH, AND THE FORMS, TERMS, CONDITIONS, AND MANNER OF EXECUTION AND SALE OF SAID BONDS; PROVIDING FOR THE ISSUANCE OF ADDITIONAL BONDS; REPEALING ALL OTHER ORDINANCES IN CONFLICT HEREWITH AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

The following is a general summary of the subject matter contained in Ordinance No. 69-8:

Sections 1 through 8 state the title and the terms of the bonds and manner of execution and set forth the form of the bonds and coupons and the definitions as used in the Ordinance, including the following matters: Bonds are dated February 1, 1969, in the denomination of \$5,000.00 each, in the aggregate principal amount of \$450,000.00, maturing serially in varying amounts on April 1, 1974, through April 1, 2009, optional on April 1, 1979, bonds maturing on and after April 1, 1980, at a premium of 4% of the principal amount of each bond so called, with the reduction of the premium of 1/4 of 1% on April 1, 1980, and 1/4 of 1% on each April 1 thereafter so that on and after April 1, 1984, there shall be no premium on any bond so called, at the interest rate of 4 1/4% per annum payable on April 1, 1970, and on each October 1 and April 1 thereafter with the principal and interest being payable at the Ruidoso State Bank, Ruidoso, New Mexico, or, at the option of the holder, at the Chase Manhattan Bank, (National Association), New York, New York.

Sections 9 through 15 state the period of usefulness of the improved facilities, the pledge of the joint utility revenues, junior and subordinate to the Village of Ruidoso Joint Water and Sewer Refunding and Extension Revenue Bonds, Series April 1, 1964, the adoption of Sections 17 through 30 of the Ordinance No. 148, of February 27, 1964 the funds established to pay the bonds and coupons, the Reserve Fund to be established in the amount of \$44,000.00, the Repair and Replacement Fund to be established in the amount of \$25,000.00, with provisions that if there are insufficient funds to pay the Series 1969 Bonds or the Series April 1, 1964 Bonds, the monies in the Reserve Fund and the Repair and Replacement Fund may be used for that purpose.

Section 16 states the additional bond provisions with the provision that additional bonds may be issued on a parity with the Series 1969 Bonds, which will be junior and subordinate to the Series April 1, 1964, Bonds, or any bonds issued to refund them, and to the Series 1964 additional parity bonds.

Sections 17 through 20 state the provisions for additional requirements for the issuance of first lien bonds, separability, and the repealer clause and that the Ordinance is irrevocable, and that the bonds are special obligations payable only out of the revenues of the joint utility system pledged herein, negotiability, construction account, award of bonds to the United States of America at par and accrued interest to the date of delivery, emergency clause, effective date of Ordinance, and general summary for publication.

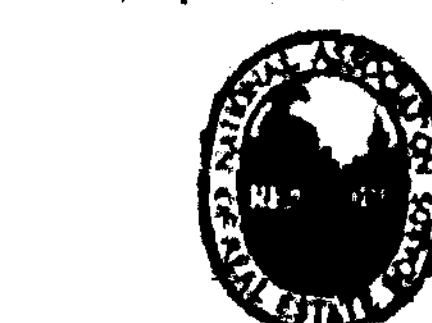

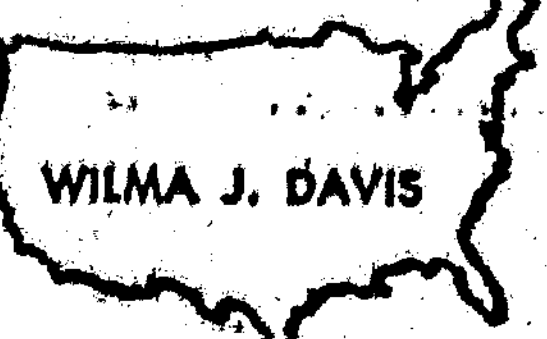

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SILVER LINING... BY DAN STORM

You remember Longfellow's poem, "The Arrow". "I shot an arrow into the air. It fell to earth I know not where. For, so swiftly it flew, the sight could not follow it in its flight. I breathed a song into the air, It fell to earth I knew not where; For who hath sight so keen and strong,

That it can follow the flight of song? Long, long afterward, in an oak, I found the arrow still unbroke; And the song from beginning to end,

I found again in the heart of a friend. Here Longfellow touches on that experience of sending out words into the world hoping and trusting they will reach somebody. It is a pleasure that never grows old to meet someone who has been reading your words over the years.

Monday I was in Bennett's Food-Store and in one part of the store a lady had left her grocery cart in

the aisle so that I had to wait just a few seconds to pass. This lady, with a very gracious smile, said, "I shouldn't have left my cart in the way there."

I said, "Oh, that is all right, my dear lady."

After I was outside ready to drive off, this lady drove by and signaled to me. I went over to her car and she asked, "You are Dan Storm, are you not?"

I said that I was, and she told me, "There is something in the way you spoke to me in the store and in your manner that made me think surely you must be Dan Storm, so I asked the young man in the store after you had left, 'Is that by any chance Dan Storm?'"

She said she had taken the Ruidoso News almost from its beginning and had read the Silver Lining for years.

She is Mrs. Mary Terrazas Watson, great-granddaughter of Don Luis Terrazas, famous governor of the state of Chihuahua, Mexico.

Mrs. Watson divides her time between Lubbock and Ruidoso. She has two beautiful homes and several cabins here, and has been coming up to Ruidoso since about 1915.

In those days she lived in El Paso, a city she dearly loves; and the family would make the trip in a Model T Ford, bringing their groceries with them.

"There were no stores here then," says Mrs. Watson. "In fact, there was nothing here. A little cow trail wound along the river up through the valley. We camped out near the first crossing and I remember we would put our jars of milk in the cool waters of the river. That was our refrigerator. About that time the strawberry sodas came out, and we kept them cool in the river, too."

Memories of Pancho Villa. "My father, Santos Terrazas, was an immigration official for the United States in the Big Bend Country when I was a very small child. It must have been about 1910

or 1911 that we owned some springs on the Mexican side of the river. These were making into a health resort, and had put up bungalows and other facilities. Pancho Villa, the Revolutionary leader, passed that way and asked to whom this property belonged. When told that it belonged to the Terrazas family, Pancho burned our property to the ground. Villa had been fighting against my great-grandfather, Governor Terrazas.

"Not long after this we were living in El Paso and my mother sent me down to a lady friend of ours

who was a dress maker, to have me fitted for a dress. I was a small child, five or six years of age.

"Pancho Villa used to be in hiding from time to time in El Paso in those days. While the dress maker and I were talking, out of another room came a man. And the lady said to me, 'Mary, I want you to meet Don Pancho Villa.'"

"At this Pancho stuck out his hand, and instead of shaking hands I hit his hand with my fist. I remembered what he had done to our property on the Big Bend.

"As I was scampering out the door, I heard Pancho ask the lady, 'Who was that?' When told that I was a Terrazas, he said, 'Oh-Ho.' It was a real inspiration to meet Mrs. Mary Terrazas Watson, a charming and brilliant lady and a friend of long standing of our home town, Ruidoso. The City in the Pines.

We hope she will continue to come back again and again to Ruidoso, even though she does not have to bring her groceries with her and put her jars of milk in the river.

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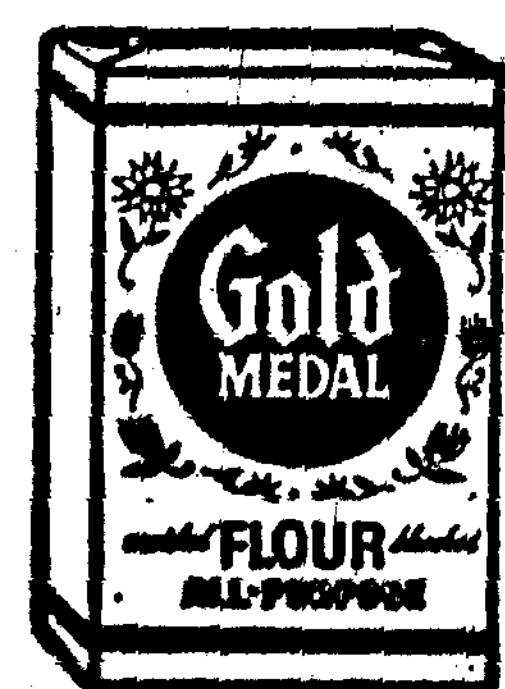
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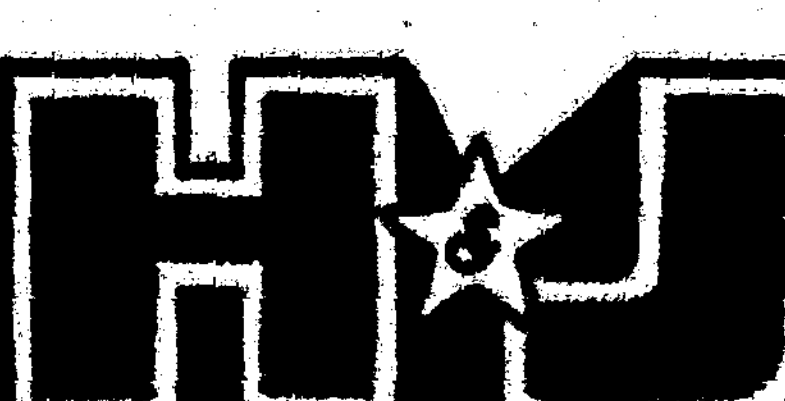
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
