Expert Gives Downs Sewer Bond Costs

Property owners of Ruidoso Downs will pay a maximum of \$9.20 per \$1,000 assessed value to finance the proposed \$140,000 sewer bond issue if it is approved June 3.

This figure was released this week by A. Dana Fowler of Sierra Bros. & Co., bonding consultants for the project.

"The bond issue assessed at \$140,000 would pay \$7.00 per year," Fowler said.

He pointed out that \$3,000 is above the average assessed valuation, because the County Assessor assesses at only one-third of full value.

"With the installation of sewers there should be more building, and the assessed valuation will increase," Fowler said. "This will lower the tax rate below \$9.20 per thousand."

Vacant lot cost for the sewer project would be less than \$1.20 per lot.

Fowler estimated that \$12,000 is the annual cost of paying back the \$140,000.

"It is conservatively estimated the assessed valuation in Ruidoso Downs should exceed \$1,300,000 within 20 years," he said.

Total cost of the sewer system is estimated at a maximum of \$350,000. The local general obligation bonds will provide \$140,000 of this, and there will be \$33,000 grant under the Water Pollution Control Act. This will leave \$177,000 still needed.

A Farmers Home Administration loan, and possible FHA grant, will make up the difference. The FHA loan will be paid back from revenue on the basis of approximately \$5 a month to be added to the water bills of Ruidoso Downs residents. A total of \$10,000 a year will be paid back on the FHA loan.

Democrats Slate Meeting

Democratic precinct conventions are scheduled at five locations in Lincoln County at 7:30 p.m. Saturday.

Purpose is to elect delegates to a county convention at 7:30 p.m. May 10 at the Captain School. This convention in turn will elect delegates from Lincoln County to a state convention, Sierra Blanca Room, Jack D. Proff, chairman.

Nogal—Nogal Mercantile, Steve Douglas, chairman.

strict "one man, one vote" apportionment will be the method of reapportioning the State Central Convention in Albuquerque's Civic Auditorium June 14 on revision of Democratic Party rules in New Mexico.

Locations of the various meetings are: Ruidoso—Village Hall, H. Dale Dodd, chairman.

Ruidoso Downs—Chaparral Hotel, downtown, with its outlying areas, 30 per cent of the vote on the State Central Committee.

Lincoln County would have 37 per cent of the vote.

Miss Sawyer when contacted had just returned from a meeting of a 21-member committee assigned to recommend revision of Democratic Party rules. Hearings on the rules revision were held in various parts of the state. The nearest local hearing was in Alamogordo.

Sentiment there was strongly against the reapportionment, Miss Sawyer reported.

"It's a fight between Bernalillo County and the rest of the state," Miss Sawyer said. "We know there will be reapportionment—but they want one man, one vote, and that would leave us out here with nothing on the State Central Committee."

"They have 500 delegates to the convention and Lincoln County only has 14. But they're not happy with that. They want to rule the roost."

Miss Sawyer declared that under the Bernalillo County proposal, Albuquerque and counties adjoining it could have a quorum on the Central Committee and not even have to consult other counties.

"The rural people don't like that, and I'm one of them," she said. "I've been here a long time"

But they're from everywhere but New Mexico. Most of them are McCarthyites—the same bunch—I contended with in Chicago." (At the National Democratic Convention.)

According to Miss Sawyer, the proposed revisions of the Democratic Party rules have been turned over to a drafting committee, and it is due to report back to a rules committee meeting May 17 with a compromise.

Then it will be turned over to county chairmen for review, and voted on June 14 at the convention, she said.

"The big job is going to be to get one that will pass," she said.

She doesn't think it will be easy. Miss Sawyer, a Nogal area rancher, is the daughter of Mrs. Dessie Sawyer, New Mexico National Democratic Committee woman.

Former Publisher Repurchases Ruidoso News

Victor Lamb, former Ruidoso News publisher, will resume ownership and operation of the newspaper today (Friday).

He has repurchased the local weekly from Mr. and Mrs. Barney Barnett, who have been operating the Ruidoso News since Dec. 1.

The Barnetts plan to return to California, following completion of the current school year.

Their sons, Fred, 14; Dan, 11, and Michael, 9, attend local schools. Lamb had owned and operated the Ruidoso News for 17 years following his purchase of the property from the late Lloyd P. Bloodworth in 1951.

The Barnetts formerly operated the Obispo News Service in San Luis Obispo, California.

Terms were not disclosed but both parties expressed satisfaction with the transaction.

The Barnetts said they felt it was in the best interest of the community to sell the property.

"We had our political and social views and they were widely divergent from those of many Ruidoso residents. If we continued to operate the newspaper it might mean the community would be divided. This would not be in the best interests of Ruidoso or the Ruidoso News," they declared.

Special emphasis will be placed on regulations regarding rights of Vietnam veterans, according to Elizabeth L. Jackson, executive secretary of Lincoln County Selective Service Board No. 14.

May Induction Quota For County Is Two

May induction quota for the Lincoln County Selective Service Board is two men, Chairman R. L. Sherrill announced.

The board has also received a call from Santa Fe headquarters for two men to have physical examinations.

A total of \$10,000 a year will be paid back on the FHA loan.

Sherrill announced that at the meeting last Thursday the board determined the classification for 34 registrants. Eight men were classified for the first time.

Village Rejects Annexation Bid

A proposed 2910-acre annexation that would have extended Ruidoso's boundaries to Alto Village was rejected Monday by the Village Council.

Councilmen adopted by a four to one vote a motion of Councilman Herm Brunell to table the six-mile annexation proposal. Wayne Estes voted against it.

The annexation move was dropped following protests of a group of landowners and residents of the Alto area led by Robert Scribner of High Mesa Ranch.

They protested that the proposed expansion of the village's boundaries to take them in would have increased their taxes without giving them any benefits for it.

The petition for annexation was signed by owners of more than 51 per cent of the acreage in the proposed additions.

Those signing were Ruidoso Land Sales, Ruidoso Realty, North Heights Park, Inc., Valton Hall, Johnny Mobley, Glaze Scarda and John Allen.

Opponents of the annexation suggested that a group of developers wanted the village to maintain standard roads in various land developments.

Lee Tilken, owner of the La Junta Guest Ranch, charged, "Some of these subdividers are trying to get off the hook. They told people when they sold them their lots that the county would keep up the roads, and they found it wouldn't, because those roads were not put in according to standards. They are trying to avoid lawsuits

Insurance Firm Founder To Be C. of C. Speaker

S. E. (Solle) McCreeless, pioneer in the field of group hospitalization insurance, will speak at the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce banquet at 7 p.m. May 8 at White Mountain School.

A graduate of the Texas Military Institute, McCreeless holds the degree of bachelor of arts, bachelor of oratory, and doctor of humane letters from Asbury College, Williams, Ky. He did post-graduate study at Southern Methodist University.

In 1931, McCreeless founded the Hospital Service Company of San Antonio, Tex. In 1935, the company was chartered as the American Hospital and Life Insurance Company, with home offices in San Antonio.

By 1965, it had 27 branch offices in 12 states, with over \$30 million of life insurance in force. McCreeless is president and chairman of the board of directors.

He is also chairman of the board of Alamo Savings and Loan Association, president of the American Heritage and Trust Company, president of the American Security Company of San Antonio, and from 1954-58 was president of the Texas Life Convention.

He is a past member of the finance committee for Life Insurance, Texas Safety Association, and was on the steering committee which set up the Texas 63 program for senior citizens hospital insurance.

Active in the Methodist Church, he was the first layman in San Antonio to be elected president of the San Antonio Council of Churches.

In civic affairs, McCreeless has been equally prominent. He was first chairman of the board of directors of the San Antonio Heart Association, past chairman of the board of directors of the Texas Heart Association, and has served on the executive committee and the committee on policy of the American Heart Association.

Don Stark, Chamber of Commerce manager, said 275 tickets are available for the banquet through Chamber of Commerce directors or at the Chamber office.

Skeen Has Hope For University

New Mexicans should have faith in the legislature committee and board of regents to straighten out the situation at the University, State Senator Joe Skeen told the Ruidoso-Hondo Valley Rotary Club Tuesday.

Skeen said much of what happened at the University in regards to the Love Lust poem was misrepresented.

"The poem was given to a small class. Now it has been distributed throughout the state. It is being sold in junior high schools for 25 cents a copy," Skeen said.

"Who has also been guilty of distributing it?" Skeen asked.

The speaker said an investigation showed Ken Pollock was far more at fault than Lionel Williams. The two men were suspended and then reinstated by the president of the university.

Skeen said the legislature has been unhappy with many other things at the university, including the student newspaper.

"The students and faculty must be responsible to someone. Academic freedom means the responsibility to teach and examine both sides," he told the Rotarians.

Skeen said the constitutional revision committee faced a hard task and expressed doubt it could come up with something acceptable to the voters.

The senator predicted there would be a special session of the legislature to deal with the Medicaid problem.

He said the main difficulty was the problem of caring for old people and needy children and expressed the hope new federal regu-

lations would be enacted.

"We were paying 30 per cent of the cost and the federal government 70 per cent. It was the 30 per cent that was breaking us," Skeen said.

In other action the club voted to send a letter to the committee investigating the university asking firm steps be taken to prevent a recurrence of the poem incident.

Medicaid Loss Not Great Here

Loss of Medicaid payments as of Wednesday will afflict "no appreciable damage" on the Ruidoso-Hondo Valley General Hospital, Felix d'Entremon, administrator, said this week.

"I had the girls run some tapes, and it showed we took in approximately \$7,000 in Medicaid funds in the last six months," he said.

Earlier this month, the State Health and Social Services Board voted to withdraw from the Medicaid program at the end of April.

The program provides a large range of health services to persons receiving welfare assistance. The end of the program means no state or federal funds will be available for the 63,716 state welfare clients.

They include families with dependent children, aged, blind and disabled and general assistance recipients.

"No patient will have to leave the hospital," d'Entremon said. "I imagine we would fall back on the county indigent fund, if any funds are available."

Village Attorney Announces He is Convention Candidate

Village Attorney John W. Thompson this week tossed his hat in the ring for election to represent the Lincoln-Sierra County representative district at the State Constitutional Convention in August.

The only other candidate to announce so far is State Representative Ralph Petty, Jr., also of Ruidoso. The non-partisan election will be June 17.

More home rule for New Mexico cities is favored by Thompson. He thinks the state should delegate more power to cities and counties to govern their own affairs and solve their own problems.

"The first New Mexico Constitutional Convention was in 1910, way back in the horse and buggy era," the lawyer said.

He suggested it may be necessary to study a basic change in the tax structure to eliminate the present 23 mill limitation on the tax levy.

"I think if people want to vote for better schools and public facilities, and tax themselves to pay for it, they should have the right to do it," he said.

At present, Thompson pointed out, the state has control over the budgets of local jurisdictions—county, city, school district. He thinks that instead of being allowed to do what the legislature specifically says they can do, cities should be allowed to do what they want to do unless it is specifically prohibited.

Problems come up every day for a city government," Thompson said. "We have to try to find a way to do what we want to do."

Thompson thinks a municipal government should be able to dispose of its own property without a vote of the state about it.

Thompson, who also practices law in Ruidoso, was city attorney for 30 years and a county district attorney for two. He has resided in Lincoln County for 11 years.

A native of Albuquerque, he attended the former School of Mines and the New Mexico Institute of Mining and Technology where he did his undergraduate work. He received the degree of doctor of jurisprudence from the University of New Mexico Law School.

He was active in the New Mexico Municipal League.

Horses Arriving At Downs Track

Ricken, who does his training from a wheel chair, has trained such top performers as Fly Away Falls, Tonto Bars Girl, Michata, Sleppy Toe, and the indomitable Roma Charge.

Ricken is aiming at the big time this season. He has three hopefuls nominated for the \$600,000 All-American Futurity, and a filly nominated for the \$50,000 Ruidoso Thoroughbred Futurity. The All-American nominees are Rick Nick, a handsome son of the mighty Rickett Bar, 1968 leading sire of winners; Maid's Request, and Mls-sy Barduct, the latter a winner of three futurities already.

Others in his stable are: Tulip Time, Keela, Mercedes Rocket, Bar Ditch Dude, Jack Spot, Jolly Tamale and Bounding Dier.

"I'm optimistic," the amiable trainer said. "I look for great things to happen this summer at Ruidoso Downs. It's my fourth season here, and I love it."



Other sources said fishing was good but so far no record size trout had been caught.





A GRIEVOUS BLOW

I disapprove of what you say but I will defend to the death your right to say it. -Voltaire.

There are those who think that Americans must agree on matters of policy or the republic will fall apart.

However, there is nothing particularly American about unanimity of opinion.

The first amendment to the Constitution should be well-known to all Americans, but in the heat of dissension, such as that which grips this nation today, it is all too often forgotten.

"Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof, or abridging the freedom of speech, or of the press; or the right of the people peaceably to assemble and to petition the Government for a redress of grievances."

The freedom of the press was guaranteed not only so that the press could serve as a community bulletin board for advertising medium, but also to enable it to serve, unfettered, as a vehicle for the expression of opinion.

The protection of the freedoms of press, speech and peaceable assembly was for the benefit of the people and the nation.

The most eloquent statement of the case ever made was perhaps by the immortal British poet John Milton, whose words from the Areopagitica have rung down through the centuries:

"Though all the winds of doctrine were let loose to blow upon the earth, so Truth be in the field, we do ingloriously by licensing and prohibiting, to misdoubt her strength. Let her and falsehood grapple, whoever knew Truth to be worsted in a free and open encounter?"

John Stuart Mill was the author of the famous essay "On Liberty", which should be required for every citizen.

He says, "If all mankind were of one opinion, and only one person were of the contrary opinion, mankind would be no more justified in silencing that one person, than he, if he had the power, would be justified in silencing mankind."

These glowing words are all too easily given lip service in Fourth of July oratory, but forgotten when it gets down to cases.

People are sometimes so sure they are right they do not wish a contrary view to be heard. But if they are so sure they are right, why do they fear an open encounter?

We have a warning from the late Judge Learned Hand, in his famous naturalization day speech in New York during World War II: "The spirit of liberty is that spirit which is not too sure that it is right."

It is not only acceptable, it is supremely right, that in a democracy, conflicting opinions should be tolerated and permitted to be heard, however strong the encounter.

In a free nation there need be no consensus on policy, or on the methods for putting policy into effect.

What there must be, if a free nation is to endure, is agreement on the ground rules—for without such rules there is no ball game. Today, frighteningly, we see these ground rules violated by extremists on the left and the right.

The rules for peaceful discussion and resolution of differences were set forth long ago in the Constitution and the Bill of Rights, and are embedded in the British Constitution and in the constitutions of free peoples throughout the globe.

The columns of this newspaper have always been open to dissenting opinions. That is why it was a grievous blow to us to learn that there are those who would use economic sanctions to silence any citizen (in this case a newspaper editor) simply because of disagreement with that citizen's views.

EVERY LITTER BIT

(Editor's Note: This week we offer a guest editorial by Steve Long on behalf of Boy Scout Troop 39.)

Litter is becoming more of a problem in our nation every day. We owe it to ourselves to become more litter-conscious.

There are two principle reasons why we in Ruidoso should become more litter-conscious. The first is common to any place: The public health danger; the second is peculiar to Ruidoso and other resort towns: It is an eyesore to the tourists.

The litter problem in our community has not reached the point that it is a severe health problem—but if our community continues to grow at the rapid pace at which it has been developing it will soon be there.

There are two principle reasons why we should be careful about the appearance of our town. If Ruidoso is to continue to grow it will need more year-round residents. While the appearance of the community is not a prime consideration for moving it is one that will help influence a family to settle here.

As far as tourism goes, any recreation area that is trashy and dirty will usually not attract tourists. Many people who come to Ruidoso for the first time will take note of such things when planning to return or not. One might consider that every time he throws a paper cup or such out of his pocket, let's face it—every tourist we lose costs us.

Along that line, litter such as trash thrown out of cars, is only part of the problem. We need to clean up, fix up and paint up our property. A trashy or messy house or leg up is not only a safety hazard but also an eyesore.

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
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**Funeral Held
