

Sewer Election Slated Tuesday

Voters in Ruidoso Downs will go to the polls Tuesday to determine whether the village will acquire a sewer system and if \$140,000 in general obligation bonds should be issued to help finance the project.

Ballots will be cast at the village hall, with the polls to be open from 8 a.m. to 7 p.m.

All residents who are registered voters in Ruidoso Downs are eligible to vote for or against the sewer project. However, only property owners may cast ballots on financing the projects.

Total estimated cost of the project has been placed at \$297,255. Village officials report that they have been assured of 33% per cent of the funds will come from federal and state grants, with another 25% from HUD.

At a town meeting Monday night, most residents present appeared to realize the need for a sewer system but some doubt was expressed as to the ability of the community to pay off the general obligation bonds. However, state officials present pointed out that never in the history of New Mexico had any village, large or small, failed to miss a payment on G. O. bonds. Government agencies from which the grants and loans are received "make sure the villages are able to pay the loans before the loan is made," one of the officials pointed out.

Earlier projected costs had been placed at \$350,000 but this was reduced when it was decided smaller trunk lines would be adequate to serve the area.

State health department officials Monday urged residents to vote in favor on both propositions. It was pointed out that under existing state and federal laws, if the system is not built, property owners will be forced to construct an approved septic tank and this cost would exceed the per unit cost of the public sewer. According to the state health officer, the majority of

the present cesspools or septic tanks in Ruidoso Downs are inadequate and would not be approved.

Officials also pointed out that should either of the propositions fail, the village would not receive any federal grants to aid in the construction of a sewer system.

Increase in property tax for the sewer system in 1970 is estimated at approximately \$9.20 per \$1,000 assessed valuation, according to figures prepared by village officials. Thus, if assessed valuation is \$4,000, average estimated increase in taxes would be four times the \$9.20 figure, or \$36.80. Officials also pointed out that assessed valuation is not to be confused with market value of a property as assessments are made at only about one-third of the actual value.

Those favoring the issue explained, in addition, that should assessed valuation for the village increase in future years, it is anticipated that a corresponding decrease in the tax rate would occur. Any new residents moving into the area would also help pay for the improvements thus enabling an even greater decrease in payments.

Latin American Study Grant Goes To RHS Grad

A former Ruidosoan, Charles Padilla, has been awarded a grant for study in Latin America at the Inter American Press Association of New York.

The grant, one of five awarded to applicants from throughout the United States yearly, is given to students of the IAPA who will make a significant contribution as a journalist specializing in Latin American affairs.

Provide Padilla a journalism major at the University of New Mexico, with \$2500 for the next 10 months of study and travel in South America.

Padilla, who will graduate from the UNM Andean Center in Quito, Ecuador, in two weeks, plans to attend a summer university session at Rio de Janeiro, Brazil, from June to September. He will then return to Quito to attend an international journalism conference for six weeks.

In November he plans to travel back south to Buenos Aires, Argentina, to Montevideo, Uruguay, Acapulco, Paraguay and Santiago, Chile. He will be granted a free library during this period for nine major center newspapers as well as the major wire services.

Padilla is a graduate of Ruidoso High School and served three years in the Army as an intelligence analyst in Washington, D. C. He lived and traveled in Europe for a year after his release from service and before returning to enroll at UNM in 1964. He is the son of Leon Padilla, formerly of Ruidoso and the late Mrs. Padilla. The elder Padilla was employed on the maintenance staff of the local school before moving to Albuquerque about three years ago.

Jaycees Earn State Honors


Ruidoso Jaycees brought home double honors from the state convention of 10 candidates, was elected on the venue held the past weekend in Las Cruces.

James Fitzgerald, immediate past president of the local chapter, was elected state vice-president and the Ruidoso organization was cited as the "most improved club" in the state for 1968-69.

The election of Fitzgerald marked the first time for a Ruidosian to hold a state office in the Jaycees, and the impressive 21-inch trophy is the first to be received by the local club.

Voting Precincts Consolidated

Consolidation of voting precincts in Lincoln County, necessitated by the new election code adopted by the state of New Mexico, will be in effect for the special election June 17 to name a representative to the constitutional convention.

The new code abolishes use of paper ballots in any state or federal election, a practice which has been used in the past by the Nogal, Ancho and Bonto precincts. As a result, Lincoln County is short the necessary voting machines, and lack of both funds to purchase the equipment and time has resulted in the consolidation move.

Realignment of the precincts in the county is the responsibility of the commissioners' court which has designated the following changes to be in effect for the special election.

The two voting precincts in Ruidoso 19A and B, will be consolidated into one, with voting place yet to be designated.

Pitacho, San Patricio and Honda voters all will cast ballots at Honda.

Captain village hall will be the voting place for Captain and Bonto.

FOR VILLAGE OF RUIDOSO—

Record Budget Is Proposed

Final draft of the proposed 1969-70 budget for the Village of Ruidoso will be presented tonight (Thursday) to the city council at its regular meeting.

Estimated expenditures total a record \$673,242, or an increase of \$80,209 over the budget under which the village is now operating.

A total of \$17,000 of the increase would be used to retire sewer revenue bonds issued for the project currently in progress, with another \$3,000 earmarked for payment on sales tax revenue bonds issued in December for municipal building improvements and sealcoating at the airport.

Also represented in the increase is \$29,000 to meet operating costs brought about by normal growth and higher prices for necessary materials.

A total of about \$15,000 is being asked to finance added personnel and or salary increases. Plans are to add one additional full-time employee in the street department and to create the position of fire department head to receive department pay.

The fire department currently has three salaried firemen, with the remainder being volunteers. It is understood that the fire department head would be one of the three new job salary.

Any proposed salary increase would, it was explained, be based on merit and tenure of service, rather than a straight across-the-board raise for all village employees.

The official budget hearing by the state has been set for Wednesday, July 9, at 9 a.m. in Ruidoso. Conducting the hearing will be the local government division of the Department of Finance and Administration, State of New Mexico.

Village councilmen have been working on the proposed budget for the past two months. James Hine, village clerk, reports that a copy of a formal report of the budget will be available in a preliminary budget two weeks when a preliminary budget was available.

RUIDOSO IN SPOTLIGHT

The proposed ordinance is rather unique in its approach to zoning and departs drastically from the standard rigid ordinance of the past three decades, points out Ronald Chaplin of Chambers & Campbell, Inc., Albuquerque who has worked closely with the commission.

No existing use of land will be affected by the ordinance.

Through the light planning design system of the ordinance, future land use will reflect both the

Bids Sought For Repair of Pool

Oral bids will be taken at tonight's (Thursday) meeting of the Ruidoso village council for necessary repair work for the municipal swimming pool.

Originally scheduled to open two weeks ago the municipal pool was found to have loose and dislodged tiles around the edge, necessitating repair tile and plaster work.

Local requirements of advertising a bid, as waived when the council declared the project an emergency and necessary for the protection of the health, safety and welfare of the public.

It is estimated that repair work could be completed in time for the pool to open the week of June 9.

Early Morning Blaze Destroys Hicks' Dwelling

The Downs opening day was a real smasher, breaking a 23-year record in attendance and mutual handle. An estimated crowd of 4,200 pushed \$200,604 through the mutual windows for an increase of \$61,234 over opening day last year. Sunday's crowd estimated at 5,300 watered \$203,614, an increase of \$26,905 on the second day of racing last year.

On hand to usher in the 1969 racing season were George Ranch, president of Sunland Park; Eric Culver, president of LaMesa Park; Sunland Park General Manager Art Johnson; J. B. Ferguson, vice-president of Ruidoso Downs; Chuck Taylor, Downs secretary; former Ruidoso Downs presidents Phil Richardson and Willard Kruger; Harvey Foster, executive secretary of the New Mexico Racing Commission; Don Jones, executive secretary of the American Quarter Horse Association; C. G. (Denny) Smith, AQHA Director of Racing, and J. L. (Dusty) Rhoades, former president of the American Quarter Horse Association.

The death of former Ruidoso Downs president A. B. Green on May 23 was a shock to the entire Quarter Horse world. Mr. Green died at his home in Purcell, Okla. Tribute was paid to his memory with a moment of silence at the race track when announcer Bob Dudich revealed the sad news.

During his tenure as Ruidoso Downs president for two terms he increased stockholders' dividends 35 per cent, breaking a 12-year record.

A. B. was known as one of the cleverest breeders of running horses of all time. "Seventy percent of a horse's speed comes from the dam's side," he once told me at his famous Green Pastures Ranch. His foundation mares were Barbara L. and Miss Meyers. He also owned Go Man Go, three consecutive years a world champion and leading sire, and the immortal Top Deck. He bred 31 AAA horses, and was hardly ever off the list of leading breeders and leading money-winning owners.

He was never too busy to take some time off from his oil business for an interview. I suppose I have done about a half dozen magazine articles on him. The last one in last month's issue of the Western Horseman.

Ben S. Wood III, Chairman of the Kentucky Quarter Horse Racing Commission of Hopkinsville, Ky., visited General Manager Richard Thompson and Racing Secretary Pete Drypocher Tuesday and Wednesday. Plans are being made for the 10-day Quarter Horse meeting at Latonia Race Track beginning Oct. 4.

The eyes of the Quarter Horse world will be on this meeting, as it is the first major pari-mutuel all-Quarter Horse meet to be held east of the Mississippi. It is hoped that it will draw support from the major stables.

He also challenged the right of Councilman Hugh Sittles to vote on the issue on the grounds Sittles was a part time employee of the Chaparral and as an ordained Baptist minister, opposed to liquor sales. Both objections were over ruled by DiPaolo on the advice of Parsons.

Motion to deny the transfer was made by Clovis Perry and seconded by Sittles with Hale and J. A. (Curly) Crockett voting in favor.

In other action the council voted to hire Lynn Perry as a helper on the garbage truck during the summer.

Also rejected by the council was Wheeler's application to change ownership of the license from the Western Constructors, Inc., to him and his wife, Ethel.

Wheeler asked the council to continue the hearing because his attorney could not be present but this was denied on the advice of Richard Parsons, village attorney.

Parsons told the council action must be taken since it was an advertised hearing.


Hunting Guides Group Organized

Biggest handle on a single race was on Saturday's Inaugural Handicap, when fans pushed \$19,011 through the mutual windows. The Big Q paid \$2,344.20 on Saturday and \$1,945.60 on Sunday.

L. Rhoades, former president of the American Quarter Horse Association; Don Jones, executive secretary of the American Quarter Horse Association, and Denny Smith, AQHA Director of Racing.

Highlight of Saturday's card was the Inaugural Handicap, which turned out to be a one-horse race when William D. the Luxenberg-Hazleton Stables' entry took command at the club house turn after a brief burst of speed from Duke Strings and went on to win by eight lengths. But the classy roan son of Indian Hemp and the Khaled mare In Prints missed his own track record by one and three-fifths seconds when he registered in 1:13.35 for the six furlongs over a track labeled "fast."

Sunday's Dale Robertson Allowance Stake was the thriller of the day when J. R. Adams' Dixie Man, an odds-on favorite, just made it in a photo finish so close it took the stewards 15 minutes to decide the outcome. Heel Bar broke alertly and got the first call, but Yankee Rob quickly went to the front and looked like a sure winner under strong urging from jockey Larry Byars. Dixie Man got up from third place in the stretch and closed brilliantly to win by two lengths. The Adams' colt boosted his life time winning to over \$72,000.

Jerry Nicodemus, who rode last year's All-American winner Three Oh's, started out the Ruidoso Downs season with a bang by riding three winners on Saturday and five winners on Sunday.



Timber, or wood, is one of the uses of your National Forest under the Multiple Use concept. The Ruidoso District, although not a large timber producing district, does produce a significant amount of wood products. Some of these products are: Logs to be manufactured into lumber, fuelwood, posts, poles, Christmas Trees and windings.

Sawlog sales on the district cut approximately 1 million board feet of timber per year. These sales remove the mature and over-mature trees on lands which management is primarily directed toward the sustained yield of wood products. Proper management of this resource assures an equal or increased amount of timber for future generations.

The current Timber Sale on the District is located in Phillips Canyon, just off the highway to Sierra Blanca Ski Area. This sale was up for bid April 15, 1963 and the J. G. Harris Lumber Co. was the successful bidder. The sale consisted of 237 thousand board feet of Ponderosa Pine, White Fir and Douglas Fir Timber. The mature and over-mature timber on approximately 275 acres is being removed. The trees which will remain are in the 41-60 year age class and will be available for harvest in approximately 60 years.

The stumpage, or purchase price paid for the timber, is put to use in several ways. The County Treasury receives 25% and another percentage is applied to Timber Stand Improvement on the sale area. The remaining money is placed in the Federal Treasury. This provides funds for the County, Timber Management and the Federal Government.

Nixon Supports Foreman Bills

Support by President Richard Nixon is expected to enhance the chances of passage by the Congress of two bills that have been introduced by New Mexico Congressman Ed Foreman.

Foreman recently introduced legislation prohibiting the dissemination of "seditious materials" through the mails and penalizing agitators' use of weapons in campus demonstrations. Speaking in support of both issues this past week, President Nixon called for a crackdown on student demonstrators and requested the Congress to pass new laws against the mailing of obscene matter.

Foreman noted he is receiving widespread support on both bills. "Americans are losing their patience with the malcontents who seek to disrupt our educational system," he said. Foreman added, "Complaints from New Mexico about the sex-oriented mood is rapidly increasing. New Mexico residents are disgusted... and rightfully so... with this unbridled, unwanted and deeply offensive material they are receiving by their mailbox."



Sunday Liquor Laws Clarified

Lincoln county residents will be voting in the near future on general dispenser sales of liquor on Sundays. The county commissioners, following presentation of a petition from a Ruidoso delegation, have voted to call a special election in the near future, with date yet to be set.

If approved by the voters, Sunday sales would be allowed from 12 noon to 11 p.m. Sunday sales would be by the drink only, for consumption on the licensed dispenser's premises.

Regulations governing Sunday service of liquor in New Mexico under terms of a 1939 law have just been released by the State Liquor Division. The new law became effective June 20, and Sunday service allowed under the law would be on June 22.

According to State Liquor Director L. A. McCulloch, the Sunday service law, as well as other new laws affecting liquor regulation in New Mexico, will be discussed at a meeting May 28 in Santa Fe.

The regulation to govern Sunday service of liquor allows such service only by those holding dispenser's liquor licenses. This is the type of license held by operators of lounges or taverns. Retailer (package store) and club licensees are prohibited from Sunday service.

The law permits service of liquor on the licensed premises on Sunday, provided sale or other acquisition of the liquor has taken place prior to Sunday during legal hours.

Another new law becoming effective June 20 will allow for Sunday liquor sales at New Mexico's horse racing tracks during the track's season, also between 12 noon and 11 p.m. Sunday. A referendum is not required for the tracks, which include Ruidoso Downs, to commence Sunday sales.

This law also is the one that provides for local option in Lincoln and the counties of Bernalillo and Taos, for general dispenser Sunday sales.
