Healthy Growth Reported for Bank

Healthy growth the past year and a good future financial picture was reported to stockholders of Ruidoso State Bank at the 15th annual meeting held here Tuesday afternoon.

The summation was given by W. A. Hutchison, chairman of the board and chief executive officer, who presided at the meeting.

Comparative statement of condition and earnings of the past year were reviewed by Ed Wimberly, president. He reported the bank had net earnings of \$1.09 per share as compared to 83 cents the previous year and stated that total resources had increased nearly \$1 million over 1968 with deposits up a like amount.

The report showed total resources of \$9,829,934.14 as compared to \$8,830,804.16 in 1968, with deposits amounting to \$9,829,934.14 compared to \$8,830,804.16 the same time last year.

Capitan To Host State Rifle Matches

The Capitan rifle range will be the scene for the sixth consecutive year of the New Mexico Rifle and Pistol Association's annual 30 calibre New Mexico championship matches Saturday and Sunday, July 19-20.

The matches are expected to draw the maximum 150 competitors, many of them army personnel. Last year's state champion, Bill Wolf of Roosevelt, will be back to defend his title, according to R. H. Hedecooke of the Ruidoso Gun Club.

Trophies awarded to winners will be retained for a one-year period when returned to the association in time to be presented to the winner of the 1970 matches. In addition, M. R. A. points will be given those placing in each event.

Entries are assigned in one of two categories, civilian or service, and each category will include four classes, master, expert, sharpshooter and marksman. Service or Match rifle will be used.

Opening day matches will get underway at 8 a.m. with the High New Mexico resident competitor to be awarded the Joe Medinger Trophy and five points. In event a non-resident is the match winner, he will receive five points. Last year's winner was Wade Hedecooke of Las Cruces, member of the Ruidoso Gun Club.

Match No. 2 winner will earn the Ruidoso Lions Club trophy, and winner of Match No. 3 the Knight Trophy and five points. Individual aggregate scores of the first three matches will determine the winner of Match No. 4, who receives the George T. Trimble trophy and 10 points. The day's competition will conclude with Match No. 5, winner of which receives the Fred Stalker trophy.

Shooting to close the state championship will begin at 7 a.m. Sunday, July 20, with Match No. 6, the winner to receive the R. H. Hedecooke trophy. Going to the winner of Match No. 7 will be the Grant County Gun Club trophy, with the Frank A. Foster trophy awarded winner of Match No. 8. Awarded winner of Match No. 9 will be the Harry Orme-Johnson trophy.

Match No. 10 will be for the New Mexico State Championship and will be based on individual aggregate scores of Matches 6 through 9. A gold-plated championship medal and 20 points will go to the high New Mexico resident who will be designated as "New Mexico 30 Calibre Champion for 1969". He must be a legal resident of the state. In event a non-resident takes first place, he will receive the Charley Fuller trophy and 20 points.

High aggregate master will be awarded the Lee Shoemate Memorial trophy; high aggregate expert the George D. Wilson Memorial trophy; high aggregate sharpshooter the Glover Distributing Co. trophy; high aggregate marksman the Ruidoso Gun Club trophy and high aggregate service rifle winner the Ruidoso American Legion trophy.

In addition, each will earn eight points.

High aggregate junior will be awarded the Al Freeland trophy and a bronze medal, provided there are as many as three juniors fire the course.

Governor's Trophy Match will be No. 11 for the New Mexico state championship team honors. Winner will be decided from aggregate scores of Matches 6 through 9 by high four men, pre-designated from each club. Team winner will receive the Edwin L. Mechem trophy and five points for each man.

Total of scores for the high four Service Rifle Men, pre-designated, of Matches 6 through 9 will determine team winner of Match No. 12, with the Park Borelle trophy to be awarded plus five points for each man.

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
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Christmas In July Bazaar Set July 26 At Episcopal Church

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Application Deadline Nearing For Elk and Antelope Permits

Sportsmen planning to apply for 1969 New Mexico elk or antelope hunt permits must have their applications submitted by 5:00 p.m., Aug. 8. Applications may be sent to Game Department offices in Santa Fe, Roswell, Raton, Las Cruces or Albuquerque, and should be made on Form C-1. These forms, along with 1969 New Mexico Big Game Hunting Proclamations, are available at all New Mexico Department of Game and Fish license vendors and Department offices.

Applicants for elk and antelope permits should send check or money order with the applications. Those not successful during the public drawing will have the check or money order returned. Resident elk permits cost \$15, non-resident permits cost \$50. Resident antelope permits cost \$10, non-resident permits cost \$40.

Elk hunts involved in the Aug. 8 deadline are P1 through P6. Hunters wanting to apply for the general bull elk hunt have until Sept. 19 to make application and forms will be available after Aug. 8. The applications for the Tres Piedras P7 elk hunt are due by Dec. 29.

Locations and dates of elk hunts are: P1—Taos, Nov. 29 through Dec. 7; P2—Pecos, Nov. 29 through Dec. 7; P3—Rogue, Dec. 13 through Dec. 21; P4—El Vado, Dec. 13 through Dec. 21; P5—Southwest, Sept. 27 through Oct. 5; P6—Guadalupe, Oct. 4 through Oct. 12.

Dates for 1969 New Mexico antelope hunts are: Northwest—Sept. 27

and 28; Tres Piedras—Sept. 13 and 14; Clayton—Sept. 4 and 5; Northeast—Sept. 6 and 7; Southeast—Sept. 27 and 28; Southwest—Oct. 11 and 12. 184 Eligible For 1969 QH Futurity

A total of 184 entries remain eligible for the 1969 running of The All-American Quarter Horse Futurity set for Labor Day at Ruidoso Downs, according to nominations secretary Lis Devine. Designed for outstanding two-year olds, the race is the richest in the world with an estimated purse of \$600,000.

With ten pre-paid, 170 made the seventh payment of \$500 and owners of an additional four made penalty payments of \$11,500 each to supplement their two-year olds.

The four supplemented horses are Lucky's Boy, owned by the A. & O. Enterprises of Gates, Ore.; Reller, from the Jacob Bunn, Jr., stables, Tulsa, Okla.; Miss Three Wars, owned by Paul W. Travis, Rochester, Minn.; and Cuter Yet, from the A. B. Green Estate, Purcell, Okla.

The last remaining fee is \$500 for the trials due on entry day, Aug. 19. The trials will be run Aug. 22 with the ten fastest quarter horses going on to the All-American Sept. 1. The next twenty fastest will run in two consolation sets for Aug. 30 and 31.

Last year Dr. D. G. Strole's Three Oh's sped the 400-yards in :29.1 to capture the All-American and a \$160,372 portion of the purse.

Heading this year's speed-packed field at this time are such brilliant freshmen Easy Jet, winner of the Kansas Quarter Horse Futurity; Pokey Go, whose sire and dam Pokey Bar-Coetta were both All-American winners; Canadian Sails, Savannah's Reward, Jet Seeker, Howdy Jones, Breadstick, Top Divi, Gains Baby, Ina Charger, Jet Injun, Cookie Gum Drop, Cute Kiss, Forthcoming, Rebel's Image, First D.V.I., The Sniper, Precious Jones, Go Moon, Go Mobile, Speckled Hen, Reller and Cuter Yet.

There were no injuries reported but damages to the Datsun were expected to exceed \$300. Frank Henning, owner and driver of the vehicle, was issued a careless driving citation.

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

Results of Public Opinion Poll Released By Foreman

Results of a legislative questionnaire mailed recently to citizens of the 2nd Congressional District of New Mexico by U. S. Representative Ed Foreman have just been released.

Foreman received nearly 30,000 answers, he reports, from every community and all of the 18 counties in his districts, including Democrats, Republicans and Independents.

"Because of this diversified and widespread response, I believe that this poll is a reasonably accurate expression of public opinion," says Foreman.

A compilation of the replies as released by the representative shows the following response to the 12 questions asked:

- Should the Federal Government develop laws to prevent strikes by public employees?
 - YES—61%
 - NO—32.8%
 - No Response—6.4%
- Do you favor lowering the voting age to 18?
 - YES—30%
 - NO—66.7%
 - No Response—3.3%
- Do you favor legislation which would return to the states and local governments for use as they see fit, a percentage of the money now collected in Federal income taxes?
 - YES—70.2%
 - NO—23%
 - No Response—6.8%
- Do you believe the Federal Government should guarantee an annual income to heads of families whether or not they are working?
 - YES—5.2%
 - NO—95.5%
 - No Response—4.3%
- Do you support the proposal to convert the Post Office into a government-owned corporation on a self-supporting operation?
 - YES—70.9%
 - NO—21.3%
 - No Response—7.8%

"From the results of this questionnaire," says Foreman, "it is evident that the people of New Mexico fully realize that every dollar that is received from Washington must be paid for by them or borrowed and paid for later by their children or grandchildren, with interest added. They know, too, that Government has no money or income that it doesn't first take from the people. Most of these folks feel that they are getting more government than they need, and more government than they want."

HEW Official Scheduled To Be Speaker At Summer Clinic Here

Francis J. Land, M. D., Commissioner of the Medical Services Administration of the Department of Health, Education and Welfare, will address physicians attending the 1969 Ruidoso Summer Clinic on August 23.

The summer clinic to be held July 24 at the Chaparral Motor Hotel is sponsored by the New Mexico chapter of the American Academy of General Practice Physicians. From throughout the nation will attend to participate in workshops and discussions in various fields of medicine.

Dr. Land is the first commissioner of the Medical Services Administration. The Administration was created August 15, 1967, in the Social and Rehabilitation Service as part of a major reorganization of Federal welfare, rehabilitation and social service programs.

In addition to his duties as commissioner, Dr. Land is a professor of clinical medicine at George Washington Medical School and a consultant to the Surgeon General of the United States Air Force. He is also a member of the Council on Medical Education of the American Medical Association and served as an AMA delegate for 10 years.

A past president of the Indiana Academy of General Practice, he was a member of the Board of Directors of the AAGP and served as vice president in 1965-1966.

Before joining HEW in 1966 as a medical consultant for the new Medicaid program, Dr. Land was active in family practice in Fort Wayne, Ind. He is a graduate of Ohio State University and University School of Medicine.

Charles Pemberton, M. D., of the Cancer Control program of the United States Public Health Service, will also address the clinic.

Dr. Pemberton has offered to help establish the Cervical Cancer Detection Research Project of the AAGP in New Mexico. Plans for the project will be made at the clinic.

The morning sessions of the clinic will also cover anemia, problems in pregnancy, heart disease, childhood disease and infection of the central nervous system.
