

# Polo Game To Determine Title

The Lincoln County Centennial championship polo title will be determined this Sunday afternoon at the Peter Hurd Polo Field in historic San Patricio as a climax of two afternoons of match play.

As an added feature, early settlers of the county will be recognized during half-time of the title game as a special tribute to those who have contributed so much to the county's colorful history.

The polo competition and recognition ceremony is but a part of the full program of events continuing in celebration of the 100th birthday of Lincoln County.

Events will begin at the field at 3 p.m. both afternoons, with Sunday's play-off match between winners of Saturday's games to be followed by a match between the El Paso Del Norte Club's 8-goal team and San Patricio's 16-goal team.

An impressive 16-inch inscribed copper plate, centered with a Lincoln County Centennial bronze medallion, will go to the championship team, with each team member to receive a smaller replica. Awards are being furnished by the county centennial committee.

Those attending the polo games Sunday are invited to arrive early

to enjoy an authentic Mexican dinner to be served by women of St. Jude's Altar Guild in the old school building near the church beginning at noon and continuing throughout the day. St. Jude's Catholic Church also will be open to visitors Sunday with Masses to be conducted by the pastor, Father Dolan. The church completed about two years ago, features a painting of St. Ysidro by Peter Hurd in its entranceway which the public is invited to view.

There will be no admission for Saturday's polo events, but admission Sunday afternoon will be \$2.25 per car. Participating players for the games preliminary to the championship match are expected to include such well-known persons as Claude Barry, who at 70 years of age will be the eldest on the field, Bobby Holt and George Landreth of Midland, J. T. Michelson, Albuquerque, Louie Nalda, Pietown, Buzz Easterling, Quemado, E. V. Higgins and son, Tommy, El Paso, and Ross Easterling, a professor at New Mexico State University.


Also to be on hand and expected to actively participate is famous painter, Peter Hurd, who with the late English novelist, Eric Knight, introduced polo to the San Patricio

area back in the mid-thirties. Comprising San Patricio's team will be Tom Babers, Terry McNatt, Bob Chipman and Floyd Hainz. Del Norte Club players include Jaime Bermudez, Heriberto Bermudez, Oscar Bermudez and Beto Mueller. The Juarez team was to have shipped their horses to San Patricio at mid-week.

The games include six 7 1/2-minute chukkers, equivalent to quarters in a football game, allowing players to change horses. The 4 1/2-oz. ball utilized is made from bamboo roots and manufactured in England.

The Peter Hurd Polo Field at San Patricio is the scene of games each Saturday and Sunday afternoon throughout the playing season, with the annual feature highlight being the Eric Knight Memorial tournament in the fall.

Members of the San Patricio Polo Club congregates after the games for an informal meal and social hour in the club house near the polo field, a structure which has a fascinating history in itself for it is said to have been a former saloon, and a frequent and favorite meeting place of Billy the Kid to meet with friends for partying.

## Pony Express To Unreel Saturday

Days of the old West will be revived this Saturday with the staging of the first annual Atlantic Pony Express Race as a feature of Lincoln County's centennial observance.

Several entries, two of them, will include two-man teams, were supported by Bill Ward, chairman of the committee in charge, after the Sunday deadline had passed.

Combining to ride as one team, will be Burney Aldas, Lincoln, now retired after 41 years with the Bureau of Land Management, and Roy Payton, Captain, who is employed by the Carrizo Riding Stables in Ruidoso. Formerly, Chaves, who breaks and trains horses at San Patricio, is the No. 2 entry, with Frencher Dobbs, Carrizo, who works at the old Bar D Ranch, as No. 3.

The No. 4 entry is Zane Leslie, Jr., serving in the U. S. Army and whose father resides in Captain. Teaming up as No. 5 will be Charles D. Tuff and Eddie Hill, both of Jai, who, Ward said, had been "really training" for the competition.

Two trainers at Ruidoso Downs, Joe Lively and Clifford Lambert, are No. 6 and No. 7 entries, respectively. Lambert is an ex-jockey who rode the winner of the first All-American race at the Downs.

Arrangements have been completed to make available a special Lincoln County Centennial cancellation for correspondence carried by the riders in the race, Ward announced. The cancellation will be applied by Postmaster Roy Harmon of Carrizo, with the letters to be taken to the starting line at White Oaks. Riders will dismount at the city limits of Lincoln and carry the letters to the courthouse to officially complete the race. The letters then will be put in the regular mail.

At least two scrimmage games are planned prior to the season's opener, possibly with the Alamogordo B's and either Clouderoff or Capit.

Seventeen players are missing from this edition of the Warriors, as the result of graduation, and 18 stalwarts were lost the year before. "This sort of situation really hurts," Newton said, "but we hope to make up for it by lots of hard work and spirit. Prospects are good for the backfield and end spots, but our interior line is hurting for experience."

Out of the 184 entries making final payments for the 1969 All-American Quarter Horse Futurity sale held at Ruidoso Downs last September, the 44 represent 246-year-olds - have Texas owners, with the highest single transaction being made in the "still eligibles" with 35, Pokey Go's sale to Hugh Huntley while New Mexico holds down third ranking with 14.

A total of 21 states have entries remaining for the \$200,000 "Richest Race in the World": Colorado has 8; Arizona, 7; Kansas, 6; Missouri, Illinois and California, 4 each; Arkansas, Nebraska, Washington and Michigan, 3 each; Florida, Ohio and Oregon, 2 each; while single entries come from Minnesota, Idaho, Pennsylvania, Utah and Virginia.

Two interests, the Burnett Estates of Fort Worth, Texas, and J. M. Frost III of Houston, Texas, each has four eligibles in the running. The S Lavy S Ranch of Lubbock, Texas, and Walker Merrick of Sayre, Okla., each has three entries remaining.

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

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### Initial Report On Proposed Airport Accepted at Meet

Possibility of a jet-accommodating airport for the county remains alive today following action by the Lincoln County Airport Committee in accepting recommendations contained in a report from an Albuquerque firm.

Acceptance came at the close of a Monday night meeting, held in the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce office.

The preliminary report, prepared by Gordon Herkenhoff and Associates, Inc., calls for a general utility airport with 8,300 foot runway.

Estimated cost was placed at \$1,810,500, including \$128,500 for terminal building, road improvements, parking lot and miscellaneous improvements, of which \$831,000 would be available through Federal Aviation Authority funds leaving \$779,000 to be provided by the county.

Site of the proposed airport is about 2 1/2 miles southwest of the old Fort Stanton Airstrip on portions of Sections 16, 17 and 20, which are either owned outright or leased from the state by Ry-Dan Ltd., of El Paso.

The committee agreed to seek a meeting as soon as possible with FAA authorities to further discuss the proposed airport.

## New Building For Alto Post Office

Patrons of the Alto post office, many of whom have been receiving their mail for years in the tin, frame structure, will have to adjust to transferring business in a spanking new, modern building. But they'll have at least eight months to do it in.

Announcement was received here last Thursday that the U. S. Post Office Department has awarded a contract to construct a new Alto post office to Kent E. Mansueto of Kearney, Ariz., who will lease it to the Post Office Department for nine years with renewal options running through 21 years.

The new building will be located a short distance east of the Inncredible on Lake Shore Drive, on land located between the roadway and Alto Lake. Preliminary estimates indicate the initial investment in the project will total approximately \$30,500. The accepted bid was the lowest of three received by the Department on a competitive basis.

Present plans call for a total of 260 square feet of interior space, with the one-story structure to be surfaced with native Lehen rock. Redwood will be used extensively, and attractive landscaping includes planters at the front of the building, as well as an area, near the roadway, to be centered with the traditional flag pole.

Ample space will be provided for parking at the west of the building, as well as maneuvering space at the south for postal vehicles.

Construction is expected to be completed in eight months, according to the official notification, however no indication has been received here as to the starting date.

Receipt of the announcement was received with considerable jubilation by the Alto postmaster, Mrs. Allen Lindamood, who had been anxiously awaiting word for the past several months.

Mrs. Lindamood, who has served as postmaster at Alto since 1953, is looking forward with anticipation to the new quarters which will provide considerably more space than now in the case.

Presently, the post office shares space in the small frame structure with Lindy's Store, which handles a variety of food items and an assortment of miscellany. Space for the store which is operated by the Lindamoods, gradually has been decreased through the years to allow for necessary expansion of postal operations.

The old post office building, which stands at the intersection of the Captain highway and the road to Sierra Blanca ski area, was built in 1901 by the postmaster, William Walker. He also built the log cabin which stands next by. The office has been moved from time to time through the years but never very far away. It has been moved from the present building to the log cabin, from the cabin to across the creek, then back again several times depending on the whim of the postmaster. The last move was in 1923, and it has remained at the same location since then.

Mrs. Lindamood is a third generation of her family to serve Lincoln County as postmaster. Her grandfather, Frank Leggett, became Ruidoso's first postmaster in 1882.

Her father, John A. Haley, served as postmaster at Carrizozo. Two questions are paramount in the minds of not only the Lindamoods but others who, through the years, have made the combination post office-store a sort of general headquarters. Will the store remain, once the post office is moved to the new building, and what will happen to the log cabin nearby?

Hopefully, the log cabin can be moved to another location. And hopefully, "Lindy" will be able to retain the building so that he can continue to keep "store" while Mrs. "Lindy" spends her day in the brand, spanking new post office.

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## Fish, Game Head To Meet July 31 With Council

The director of the New Mexico Department of Game and Fish is scheduled to meet with the Ruidoso village council at that body's regular meeting July 31, it was learned today.

Ladd Gordon has notified city officials that he will be present for the session after being invited to meet with the council by Mayor Lloyd Davis, Jr. Alleged pollution of the Ruidoso River which the department says has caused a series of fish kills will be discussed. "We hope the meeting will prove of mutual benefit to all concerned," Mayor Davis commented today.

Report of a fish kill immediately below the Ruidoso sewage treatment plant was released by the Game and Fish Department to news media of the area early in July, in which it was stated that plantings of catchable fish scheduled would not be made "if the problems continue to exist." The department director was quoted as saying "We need the cooperation of everyone in the area, industry and the City of Ruidoso, alike, to see that these problems are cleared up."

City officials say they first learned of the fish kill from the newspaper reports. Mayor Davis said he had written Director Gordon offering the "cooperation" requested from the city, and suggesting that in the future the village be extended the courtesy of being notified in advance before news releases of such nature are disseminated.

Local officials point out that checks are constantly made at the sewage treatment plant to make sure that sufficient chemicals are used to kill all bacteria before the effluent reaches the river. They expressed doubt that the plant was responsible for pollution to the extent it would kill fish planted in the river, but said they were very willing to discuss the matter with the department's director.

## Prospects Good For Completion of '70' Improvement



## Ruidoso Summer Haven For Southwest Children's Home

Driving up the tree-shaded road to the big white clapboard building, the surrounding area of land is dotted with children of all ages, running, romping and playing on the grassy fields.

The little ones are on swings, the older ones in the middle of a baseball game, or if it happens to be Tuesday evening, everyone is awaiting their turn at horseback riding.

This is the summer retreat of the Southwestern Children's Home of El Paso, located one block west of city hall, which officially opened in the summer of 1928, after land for the home had been donated a year before by pioneer Ruidosians, Mr. and Mrs. Ike Wingfield, now deceased.

On July 4, 1927 the Wingfields made the presentation of nearly 30 acres and the same day over \$200 was raised in Ruidoso to start the building.

Local lumber and business men along with others from El Paso and Alamogordo gave the lumber, hardware, plumbing and electrical equipment.

Still others provided furniture, bed springs, and the vocational school of El Paso made the beds, tables and benches.

A 1,000 gallon water tank was donated. Southern Pacific railroad provided a car to ship furniture and supplies to Tularosa. Chris Fox furnished trucks and men to bring it from there.

And this same spirit and generosity on the part of the people of the area is as evident today as it was over 40 years ago.

Mr. Doyle De Arman, recreational director at the home said, "We owe so much to the people of Ruidoso. While we are here, they treat us royally."

Just two examples of the many and varied contributions made are a television set given by Mr. and Mrs. Joe Swartz, to free swimming two afternoons per week provided by pool manager Nick Vincent.

The children's annual mountain vacation begins when they arrive in the middle of June from El Paso by chartered bus and to individual cars driven by members of the staff. Trips of supplies follow making weekly trips.

The 11-man staff is composed of Miss Elizabeth Moore, manager; Victor Moore and daughter of Mrs. Victor Moore (director of the home); four counselors (one woman) in charge of the kitchen; two helpers; Mr. DeArman; and Mrs. DeArman, who "lives in" where ever it is needed.

Mrs. DeArman has long been associated with the home having been raised there from the time she was eleven and most recently serving as secretary in 1961.

A typical day for a child at the home begins at 7:30 when the "get up bell" rings. The older children take care of their chores while the younger ones spend about 30 minutes listening to Bible stories, poetry or singing. At 8:15 everyone meets in the main "living room" for a few minutes of prayer before breakfast. After everyone eats and finishes any other unfinished duties, there is a "free play" until lunch time. During these morning hours the boys are usually found playing with cars or trucks; the girls with their dolls or jump ropes. Many also join in to make use of the volley balls, tether balls, horseshoes, or any of the assorted games available to them.

Later in the day after the noon meal and rest period which follows, the children are again allowed to participate in any of the activities they choose.

But after supper at five there are organized team games of volley ball, kick ball or baseball which the youngsters can participate in or just watch from the sidelines.

It is also at this time of day that many hikes are taken under the leadership of Mr. DeArman. The most recent jaunt was to the park across from Belle's Riding Stable, for a picnic supper. The younger children were transported down and back enabling them to join in the fun.

A "Vespers" service is planned and carried out by the children begins at 8 p. m. Usually included in the service are singing, Bible stories and object lessons by the children. After Vespers everyone prepares for bed with "lights out" at 10 sharp.

Some of the special activities during the summer have included a "seminar school" for the older girls conducted by Leigh Shapleigh, and overnight trips for the older boys.

"All in all it's two months chock full of fresh air, cool weather, varied outdoor activities, and companionship for children from broken or neglected homes.

Mr. DeArman added that an important aspect of the stay for the youngsters was that, "They get a chance to be children up here."

But redheaded 11-year-old Warren Parker, who is spending his second summer here summed it up best by saying, "I think it's just great."

## Nogal Mesa Camp Meeting Over, But Inspiration Still Remains

Nogal Mesa today appears silent and deserted, but the broad expanse of grounds still harbors the sound of several hundreds of persons who Sunday concluded the 29th annual Ranchmen's Camp Meeting, and who look with their inspirations and a renewal of spiritual life.

An estimated 350 persons were present for the services on Sunday, concluding the open-air meetings which had gotten underway the previous Wednesday evening. The intervening days had been spent in dedication and re-dedication, strengthening their Christian beliefs and friendships.

To those attending, it was universally good to come upon the mountain for four days, forgetting the rush and bustle and worry of everyday life, and there to receive inspiration, guidance, and Christian beliefs and fellowship.

Although the first services were conducted August 1, 1940, little has changed in the fundamental concepts upon which the camp meeting was founded. Men and women of all creeds are welcome, no dues are charged, no collections taken. All expenses are defrayed by donations. Any funds over and above the cost of food and help go into permanent buildings and improvements.

In the early days, the large tabernacle tent was stretched at the very brink of the mesa, with an old table serving as a pulpit. Stockmen cooked the food donated by the ranchers. In 1949, the beautiful and spacious pine tabernacle was built by ranchers, through donation and gifts of labor. Here from its open side at the brink of the Mesa, worshippers are able to look miles across the valley to the peaks of mountains, into the distance. Those attending say it is not difficult to be inspired with an understanding of God when such a view of his handiwork is before the eyes.

Other improvements have been made possible by numerous persons—an electrical system, additions to the dining hall and kitchen, a commissary, a "coffee" room are among just a few of the facilities which have been made possible by people who care.

Still standing is the prayer tree which was selected at that first meeting years ago. The men hold their afternoon meetings under this spreading alligator-barked juniper, with a free exchange of thoughts invited from all. The tree is inscribed with the date of its choice, and was dedicated the first year as a place of prayer "for the sons and grandsons who will be coming here for generations to pray." Though the ladies sit in comfort in the tabernacle for their afternoon meetings, they are con-
