
Extension Club Meet Scheduled Aug. 27



WORLD FAMOUS GOLF COURSE DESIGNER - EXECUTIVE HERE

In keeping with the planned timetable of expansion and development of the Alto Lakes Golf and Country Club golf course, Don Blaugrund, owner and developer of Alto Village has called in one of the country's leading golf course design firms to submit a proposal for the design and construction of the second nine holes.

Robert Trent Jones, Jr. vice-president and head of the west coast office of the internationally known Robert Trent Jones, Inc. was in town this week to conduct a personal survey of the proposed site and for talk with Blaugrund. A quotation from the company's brochure said: "If you have already played a Robert Trent Jones course you appreciate the touch of mastery. If you have not played one, do so and you will recognize the special quality that lends even more excitement to the game."

According to Blaugrund perhaps the most important quality of a good golf course architect is his sense of the strategic playing qualities that should be incorporated in a great golf course. He must know how and where to put the "hot value" into the course. Here the extra talent shows and great golf courses are made. It is here the distinctive features of the Jones design will be found. Jones' tees are longer than normal (the way first with long tees), creating variety in the play of each hole. His greens are usually large, allowing pin placements that can be tough for professionals, easy for club members, and fair for all players. Fairway bunkers are mainly in those areas where an expert's strong drive might land if slightly errant. They are not placed to torment the struggler and the less proficient golfer, of whom there are many more than there are experts, Blaugrund said. The greens are framed by mounds and strategically placed traps. The test on these larger putting surfaces comes through carefully sculptured undulations which need to be read properly by experts and non-expert player alike. These things can be limited, but, according to Blaugrund, Jones creates them.

The world-wide firm with offices at Palo Alto, Calif., Montclair, N. J., Fort Lauderdale, Fla., and an agency in Europe has been responsible for such courses as the Beverly Hills Country Club, Houston Country Club, Spyglass Hill Golf Club in Pebble Beach, Calif., and the Mauna Kea Beach Hotel Golf Club, which the Rockefeller interests built in Hawaii.

After inspecting the proposed area, which lies northwest of the existing nine, Mr. Jones said any plans would be in accord with the uniqueness of the Alto Village area and the company's creed of making each hole more challenging for the expert while still maintaining a fun and fair game for the amateur. One unusual idea mentioned by Jones called for the Alto Lakes Golf and Country Club 18th green to be an island in the lake located near the front of the Clubhouse. If plans are agreed upon, an announcement will be made shortly, including the construction starting date.

A brochure will soon be made available to voters explaining the needs, facts and figures involved in the bond election.

The brochure points out that Lincoln County has not voted bonds since October, 1963 when a county-wide effort resulted in a \$525,000 issue for a new courthouse located in Carrizozo. The hospital has been over-crowded for some time and in need of additional beds. The time has now come, the brochure continues, when the governing bodies feel that it is necessary to make extensive improvements to the Ruidoso-Hondo Valley General Hospital. Hill-Burton Federal Funds can be supplied to pay over \$360,000 of the total estimated costs of \$1,018,000. If the assessed valuation of Lincoln County increases in future years a corresponding decrease in the tax rate could occur. New residents moving into the area will help pay for these necessary improvements and will also share proportionate costs as bonds are scheduled to be retired over a twenty-year period.

Any registered voter residing in Lincoln County who has paid a property tax during the preceding year is eligible to vote.


Hamar Bound To District Court

I have watched with alarm the increasing disregard of and unconcern for these summer cabin owners who helped build Ruidoso and sustain its growth, long before there ever was a race track, and the subsequent money it brought into the canyon.

Now, insult is added to injury, with the unrestrained movements of the ever increasing bear population each summer, and the lack of real concern for our personal rights and property damage. Several years ago, a huge black bear broke into our cabin repeatedly and tore off half the screened back porch. If you don't know how terrifying that can be in the middle of the night—let me tell you!

It was considered more of a joke by the authorities than a real problem, and little was done about it. We had to rebuild the porch and reinforce all the screens at our own considerable expense. Nevertheless, that spelled an end to our relaxed, carefree vacation in Ruidoso! We could no longer leave our screened porch for convenience, as cabin owners had done for years; we could no longer sit in our own yard without one eye on the wooded mountain back of us. My children cannot play in our yard without one of us constantly on the lookout for one or more of the six bears that prowl through our yard

can no longer enjoy a picnic lunch on their little table on our patio for fear of unexpectedly having to share it with Mama Bear and her 3 cubs. Our next door neighbors have been chased into their house more than once while trying to entertain on their patio and charcoal dinner for guests—not always with their dinner either! It has reached the ridiculous point where now we even keep the garbage can in the kitchen at night to discourage more marauding believe me, that's inconvenient! We keep every scrap of food put up, but that's just another added inconvenience—a refrigerator will hold just so much.

Now, we are well aware that the bears are hungry. But if it's merely "the case of the hungry bears" as we are repeatedly reminded, perhaps a few well placed, adequately stocked feeding stations in the reservation up the slopes of Baldy would alleviate a lot of headaches, save a lot of hard feelings, and maybe somebody's life! In any event, their hunger should not be any excuse for us to have to bear the brunt of the damage done by potentially dangerous, marauding animals. To tell us to keep food put up is somewhat futile. Suppose that family had been eating dinner when ole papa bear decided he wanted their peach pie sitting on the table! What a bloody mess that could have been! When you can't even leave a pie out on your own kitchen table, the situation has gone way beyond "too far"! Must we now wait until some one is maimed or killed before action is taken? To tell us to keep the garbage cans tightly covered is uttering "ridiculous! Yesterday, I saw a can with its lid tightly chained to the can—and half the lid neatly folded back as though it were nothing more than aluminum foil! We have been very fortunate, thus far, to have been spared the tragedies of Yellowstone and Glacier—but it could happen here.

How could anything be more unsightly and repugnant to our visitors than the unending litter of garbage from one end of the upper canyon road to the other? I'm sure it's amusing to some—but amusing only to those who don't have to clean the mess up each day! And these seem to be darn few who deny that now some don't even bother with lids to the cans any more—such as the disgusting, un-

sanitary, uncovered assortment of cans in front of and around the Sherwood Forest area. Don't we even have any sanitation laws here? We keep our own garbage cans shut up in a wood house, so we don't have a filthy front drive; but that means very little, when we have a hundred other disgusting messes to view each day. Instead of the beautiful Ruidoso

Canyon we once knew—and took for granted, I'm with Mrs. Sparks—I don't have anything nice to say about the bears!
I sincerely hope and pray I can reach someone, here or elsewhere, with enough authority to act; someone human enough to understanding messes to view each day and someone intelligent enough to

admit the potential danger we live with each day.
I'd like to think when my two small boys and I return next summer, we'll find our beautiful Ruidoso woodland once again—and the return to us of our forest mountainside, where children can play, once again, unafraid.



grams are using the Military Industrial Complex issue as a whipping boy against the public resentment over taxes. He goes on to say military costs can and should be reduced, and the military could be more efficient but not so as to imperil national security.

On tax law changes: The omnibus tax reform bill is an all-encompassing far-reaching program that increases some taxes and lowers others. The tax bill was by no means all-good nor was it all bad. He goes on to explain the effect of the tax bill on the petroleum industry (of interest in New Mexico) and the advantages and disadvantages of the bill from the viewpoint of industries, corporations and the average individual taxpayer.

On education and library funds approved: He discussed the approval of the amended Labor-HEW Appropriations bill and points out the most important items affecting the New Mexico schools is the \$586 million approved for funding of PL 874, aid to impacted areas.

He furnishes a brief review of the U. S. public debt story with figures ranging from 16.9 billion in 1920, to 300.0 billion in 1968. Over the period, Foreman says, the value of the dollar as compiled by the Bureau of Labor Statistics starting with 1920 was 183 cents and was 39.2 cents in 1968.

On gun control: Foreman calls The National Commission on the Causes and Prevention of Violence's recent recommendations for the confiscation of the nation's handguns, wacky, unwise and unrealistic. Such a law would be ill advised, Foreman says, and even such a soft-in-the-head bunch like those on the Commission should realize that criminals are not going to march up and check in their guns.

He goes on to rationalize the possession of handguns and reviews legislation he has introduced regarding specific penalties for the use of or carrying of firearms by the commission of crimes.

He announced the Nixon administration opposes Federal gun registration and licensing of gun owners.

Commission OK's 84-Day Meet At Sunland Park

The New Mexico Racing Commission has approved an 84-day racing schedule for the 1969-70 seasons at Sunland Park. The green light was given during a Commission meeting held Wednesday, Aug. 13, at Albuquerque. Art Johnson, Sunland general manager, was on hand. The Commission okayed Sunland's plan for a split fall and spring seasons, the first such separate campaigns since 1962. Twenty-seven days are slated through Sunday, Dec. 7. The 57-day spring season will extend from Jan. 1 through May 10. Highlights of the upcoming racing calendar include six Friday "twilight" programs and two dark Friday days. The scheduling of Friday twilight programs, according to Johnson is part of the newly-announced plan of co-ordinated programs with the Juarez Race Track. The twilight agendas are booked for Oct. 24, Oct. 31, April 10, April 17, April 24 and May 1. First post will be 3:15 p.m. "In keeping with our aim of minimizing conflicts in racing dates between both tracks, Sunland will be dark on the first two Fridays of the fall season," Johnson pointed out. The twilight programs were scheduled to avoid any conflict with Juarez on Fridays. The Juarez track, Johnson noted, will be dark when Sunland is in action on Friday nights. In addition, the Juarez booking establishments will no longer accept wagers on Sunland Park races. Except for the six twilight programs, all Friday cards at Sunland will be staged under the lights, starting at 7:30 p.m. Both twilight and night programs will cover 10 races. The first night program is planned for Nov. 7. As part of the co-ordinated racing schedules, Sunland and Juarez will not conflict on Saturdays as well as Fridays. All Saturday and Sunday programs at Sunland will be staged in the afternoon. Both tracks have joined forces in a combined effort to attract racing fans from throughout the South-West. A joint out-of-town advertising and group promotional plan is now under study, Johnson said. All Saturday and Sunday programs at Sunland will consist of 12 races with a standard first post of 1:30 p.m. Last season, Sunland staged 11-race afternoon programs. The "extra" races this season will be of 160 Quarter Horse variety.

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

Two Or Three Breaths Enough For Water Diver

The eerie underwater world can be beautiful, but treacherous. Swimming through that world has its thrills and hazards. Overbreathing is one of the hazards according to a warning issued by the New Mexico Tuberculosis and Respiratory Disease Association.

When a swimmer breathes deeply and quickly many times before diving, he overbreathes. By this extra breathing, he hopes to build up his supply of oxygen in order to double or triple his time underwater.

But the swimmer who overbreathes may stay under a lot longer than he wants. He may never come up. Overbreathing can be fatal.

The bursting feeling in the lungs that signals swimmers to come up for air may never happen after overbreathing. An unexpected blackout makes these swimmers lose consciousness—and drown.

To avoid underwater tragedy, swimmers usually should not take more than two or three breaths before plunging into the water.

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Booklet Summarizes Forest Management Objectives

The Southwestern Region of the Forest Service, U. S. Department of Agriculture, with what is being done on forest growing demands of a new booklet, "Management of the Southwestern National Forests."

The booklet, by Regional Forester Wm. D. Clark, describes the objectives of the National Forests and National Game Lands of the Southwest where the land comes from the forest lands to the 1900's and the status of the forest lands in 1950.

To manage the forests for maximum sustained yield of wood, water, wildlife, range and recreation, a present and updated Regional Multiple Use Management Guide has been developed specifying how the National Forest System lands are to be managed. This management guide sets out the objectives for the various uses of the forest lands.

The booklet outlines how the resources, uses and activities within each area are to be coordinated in the most practical manner.

The new booklet summarizes in popular easy-to-read form the management objectives and detailed instructions contained in a larger and more technical Regional Multiple Use Management Guide prepared for use in the field by Forest Officers. In the booklet, photographs help the reader to gain a better understanding of Forest Service Management of the Southwestern National Forests, National Game Lands.

The Management Zones are identified in the Regional Guide and are briefly described and illustrated in the booklet. They are:

- Water Influence Zone**—Made up of areas along streams, rivers, lakes and reservoirs. It generally is a riparian zone with riparian and other uses.
- Wildlife Influence Zone**—Includes areas where wildlife is abundant and where the management objectives are to maintain and improve the wildlife habitat.
- Recreation Influence Zone**—Includes areas where the management objectives are to provide for recreation and other uses.
- Wilderness Influence Zone**—Includes areas where the management objectives are to preserve the natural beauty and scientific interest of the area.
- Wildland Influence Zone**—Includes areas where the management objectives are to preserve the natural beauty and scientific interest of the area.

Intermediate Zone—From 5,000 to 10,000 feet in elevation, this area is important for the production of commercial timber and forage. Hunting and fishing are important activities. Water, wildlife and range are important resources.

Highland Zone—Elevations range from 8,000 to 10,000 feet. It is a timber and range area. Hunting and fishing are important activities. Water, wildlife and range are important resources.

studies portions of the North-South National Forests in northwestern New Mexico, Oklahoma and Texas. Because of climatic limitations, the land is suitable for forest production by not cultivating.

Woodland Zone—Found in the 2,000-4,000 foot elevation range, this land makes up 32 per cent of the region's area and includes the familiar piñon-juniper vegetation. Water yield is low but the zone is important for forage and wildlife.

Management aims are increased storage production, maintaining

grime habitat, and improving watershed conditions.

Forest Zone—The highest lands in the region from 10,000 feet to more than 12,000 feet. Snowfall is heavy in these areas especially in the winter months. The forest is important for water yield and wildlife.

Writing that our population continues to grow, Mr. Clark said "we must get all we can out of the ex-

isting land without impeding the ability to produce. The Forest Service is convinced that Multiple Use Management is the best system available to make the most of the National Forests to produce the maximum in public benefits now and in the future."
