

County Hospital Bond Issues Carry



TO BE A REALITY—The \$445,000 Ruidoso-Hondo Valley General Hospital bond issue will fulfill, with the possible aid of an additional \$252,000 from Federal funds source, the hopes and prayers of Ruidosians and other Lincoln County resi-

dents for improved, larger and better equipped hospital facilities. Lincoln County residents voted last Tuesday, to furnish the means to build desperately needed additions to their present facilities.

Lincoln County voters opened the doors, county wide, to better hospital facilities in this area Tuesday, September 30. While not a landslide victory the unofficial record shows the Ruidoso Hondo Valley General Hospital question carried by 528 For to 287 Against, a margin of 241 votes and nearly 2 to 1 win. In Ruidoso the Ruidoso Hospital issue carried at nearly 5 to 1.

The Carrizozo located Lincoln County Municipal Hospital nursing home addition question carried by 469 For to 327 Against, a margin of 142 votes.

The Lincoln County Commissioners will record the vote officially at their next regular scheduled meeting.

The \$407,000 bond issue designates \$365,000 for the additions, improvements and equipment for the Ruidoso-Hondo Valley General Hospital. The Lincoln County Municipal Hospital in Carrizozo is to receive \$142,000 to make improvements to the Carrizozo hospital and add a nursing home section.

The voting pattern was as follows on Question A, the additional

Several are questioning just what Aspencade Celebration we are observing this year. Is it the 22nd or 21st? The records on file at the Ruidoso News states that the First Annual Aspencade was held in Ruidoso October 10, 1948 that would, even without an IBM machine, total 21 years. But even to muddle up the annual affair in 1953 it was advertised as the Fifth Annual Aspencade when it seems it should have been the Fourth. In 1958 someone called it the Fourth when actually it was the Fifth.

Regardless of what consecutive year this present Aspencade celebration is supposed to come under it promises to be one of the best. Just to show you the growth in the popularity of the annual event, in 1968, Dr. W. D. Barton was Aspencade Chairman, and 196 attendees at the 21st Annual Aspencade celebration. Thirty-five miles of the trip is scheduled to an area just below Mesquite for a covered wagon dinner.

Ten years later, 1968, the records reveal that a second day was added to the annual affair and that "hundreds attended." Still ten more years later, 1969, over 5,000, the largest crowd in Aspencade history, attended the autumn event.

But the popularity and really sincere appreciation of the Aspencade season cannot be equaled to that of one Willie Smith. He is back again this year as he was about three years ago. It seems, according to Police Chief O. E. Montes, that about three years ago Smith was jailed for an infraction of the law and was serving his time in the local container. Being a good fellow he willingly washed the police cars in preparation for the Aspencade Parade and after doing so asked for permission to "just go down and watch the parade and come right back." He did see the parade and the Chief did see him in jail. But three years later Smith is back, just couldn't stay away from Aspencade. He is also back in jail for another infraction of the law. One wonders who will wash the police cars this year?

FT. SUMNER VS. RUIDOSO, FRIDAY—RHS WARRIORS' WIGWAM WANT 'UM WHOOPING WIN

All other Aspencade activities will take second place Friday night as the Ruidoso Warriors go on the war path against the Ft. Sumner Foxes. It is the annual Homecoming Game for the Warriors who are anxious to add another win to their season's 3 won 1 lost record. Ruidoso has lost only to Canutillo Texas, class 6AA school, 22 to 0.

Ft. Sumner, rabid over two homecoming losses to Ruidoso in a like number of years, will be out to destroy the glory of Ruidoso's Homecoming and Aspencade celebrations. Ruidoso triumphed the Foxes, 27 to 5, last year at the Ft. Sumner Homecoming game and in 1967 did it again, 26 to 0, during the Warrior's Homecoming.

The Associated Press, Wednesday, released the top "Little Ten" in the state in class B and Class C schools. Ruidoso ranked the number 4 spot in the state with Ft.

Sumner holding down the number 7 position. Ft. Sumner's record for the season is, like Ruidoso, 3 wins and 1 loss. They were defeated by West Las Vegas, 20 to 0. The UPI rated Ruidoso 4th and Ft. Sumner 5th in New Mexico.

Homecoming pre-game activities will begin at 7:15 with the presentation of the 1968 Warrior's Homecoming Queen and her Court. The Ruidoso Warrior Band will perform during the halftime intermission. March Media, Ltd., may still be

Council Issues TV Ultimatum

A letter of ultimatum, addressed to the Ruidoso Color Cable Television Co. stating that if the local TV cable service is not improved to the satisfaction of Ruidoso residents within the next 60 days, the Ruidoso Village Council will initiate legal action to cancel the Cable TV Co.'s franchise, was directed to be written at the Village Council meeting this week.

Mayor Lloyd L. Davis, Jr. received support from all members of the council on his recommendation. The council was informed the March Media, Ltd., may still be

interested in establishing a cable television system here.

Two contracts were awarded at the meeting. The first for 1,000 cubic yard of gravel at \$2.85 per cubic yard, and to be used for village streets, was awarded to the McCarty Construction Co., a local firm.

The second was for \$450,000 joint water and sewer junior lien revenue bonds for the completion of Ruidoso's sewer system project. The contract was awarded to the Department of Housing and Urban Development.

Joe Trunk, president of the Lincoln County Humane Society reported the society has handled 767 animals this year including 36 cats and 58 dogs within the last 26 days.

A report concerning stage two of the School House Park Development revealed that funds have been authorized to proceed with installation of two rest rooms and \$600 has been authorized to purchase playground equipment.







Erosion/Pollution Result of Present Boom

The Upper Hondo Soil and Water Conservation District Board of Supervisors recently asked the South

Central Mountain Resources Area to help convince the Lincoln County commissioners, planning and zoning committees, cities, local people and subdividers of the need for adherence to stricter regulations to prevent erosion and pollution problems.

In the last two years, the SWCD points out, over 3,000 acres of former ranchland has been platted for subdividing between the villages of Capitan and Ruidoso with many more acres purchased in the last two years for the purpose of subdividing into homesites, etc.

The vast majority of the land presently subdivided was platted so as to achieve the maximum

number of lots on the land with no thought given to erosion, road accessibility and maintenance, soil suitability for foundations, septic tanks, etc., or pollution of our mountain streams through silt-laden runoff.

Stricter regulations would greatly benefit the people and area today as well as in the years to come, the SWCD claims.

Philpot Finds 'Lost Spanish Mine' In Capitan Mountains

C. H. Philpot, living near Lincoln and owner of the J. & J. Mining Co., claims he has located the legendary "Old Lost Spanish Mine" at the east end of the Capitan Mountains.

According to local miners the long-sought mine originally operated by Spanish explorers around 1700 contains treasures as yet unknown.

Philpot said his find is a mine with tunnels running some 500 yards back into the mountain. The ore is 200 yards wide and a half mile long from showing on top of the ground. "The veins where I've dug are as much as 12 feet wide and they're awful good in hair silver, uranium, platinum, copper, asbestos, gold, silver, with some tin, manganese and hematite ore in the same mine," Philpot said.

The tunnel is about eight by eight feet with cedar logs still in place inside, Philpot thinks the Ute Indians killed the Spanish as there are various kinds of bones around the mine.

Philpot's find was based on an old map which pointed out a general location. When opening up a wash containing silver nuggets he felt cool air coming out of the hole he'd made, and upon further excavation the tunnel, partially caved in, was located.

In his 40 years of prospecting, Philpot has staked out claims all over the country. He claims he has owned the lost mine claims since 1950 and has spent 19 years locating the mine.

According to Philpot the government once had 800 soldiers looking for the mine and a fellow named J. D. Lux from Arkansas, Col. Green from Colorado and Wally Hesse has been active in the search for the mine recently.

The silver ore should grade out at 70 percent and Philpot said he had one chunk of silver that the Spanish apparently smelted. Philpot plans to sell the claims or lease the mine located in Box Canyon to some mining company that would work the property.

State Engineers Declare Hondo Water Extension

The State Engineer of New Mexico has declared an extension of the Hondo Underground Water Basin in Lincoln County.

On Sept. 15, S. E. Reynolds, State Engineer, issued Special Order No. 108 extending the Hondo Basin for the reason that the underground water basin, as presently defined does not include certain adjacent areas which are a part of the underground water basin having reasonably ascertained boundaries and in which new appropriations of water might impair existing rights.

The area added to the Hondo area comprises approximately 134 sq. miles and includes the towns of Capitan, Alto and Argus.



First Atomic Site Tour October 5

A Trinity Site Tour will leave Alamogordo Chamber of Commerce building on U. S. 84-70 at 9:30 a.m. Sunday, Oct. 5.

Cars coming from other areas may meet at the Stallion Range Center, U. S. 290, 12 miles east of San Antonio and 69 miles west of Carrizozo.

Because of security regulations, a military police escort is required and a non-commissioned officer will be in charge of the caravan. An officer will be in charge of the entire trip on White Sands Missile Range.

All cars must be at the gate entrance promptly at 10:30 a.m. No one will be permitted to enter after the caravan has passed through the gate. The tour will take approximately seven hours. There is no charge. Registration cards are required and may be obtained at the Chamber of Commerce office or the Dosowood Art Gallery at the Alamogordo Chamber of Commerce.

Other rules and restrictions set by government officials at W. S. M. R. are:

No weapons of any kind are permitted while on W. S. M. R. Cameras must be placed in glove compartment or trunk of your car. Photography is not permitted anywhere on the tour except at Trinity Site. Visitors will be told when photography is permissible. Please complete car registry cards and give to MP at Oscura Gate. No digging is permitted within the area; visitors may not pick up objects in the area; visitors are asked to stay on marked roads; refuse must be placed in containers provided; visit is restricted to one-and-a-half hours after time of arrival at Trinity Site; Everyone should have plenty of gasoline, a spare tire, sufficient water and food.

The first atomic test operation, known as Project Trinity, took place on the morning of Monday, July 16, 1945 in the north-central portion of the Alamogordo Bombing and Gunnery Range. Headquarters of the Bombing and Gunnery Range was located at Alamogordo Army Air Field, known since 1948 as Holloman Air Force Base, but the explosion site was actually nearer the town of Carrizozo, about thirty miles away, than to Alamogordo, which was sixty miles distance.

This particular site was chosen for reasons of both safety and secrecy. It was in a region of public grazing land that had always been sparsely populated and was now being withdrawn by the War Department for use as a bombing range. Preparation for the test explosion began in earnest four days prior to July 16, with an old ranch house situated on the range serving as base operations. The bomb (code name "Fat Man") was

placed on top of a steel detonation tower on Saturday, July 14, and installation of the detonation mechanism was then started. Meanwhile, other technicians went about installing seismograph equipment at varying distances from the tower location, which was designated Zero. Other instrumentation was set up for recording temperature, air pressure, and similar data wanted by the project scientist.

Three observation points were established at 5.7 miles each from Zero. These were wooden shelters protected by cement and earthen barricades. The observation point lying south of the bomb tower served as a control center, where Dr. J. Robert Oppenheimer, head of Los Alamos Scientific Laboratory, was to take his position. A fourth post was at the base camp, ten miles from Zero, and a fifth on a mountainside twenty miles distant. Most of the scientists and "visiting firemen" present at the test were stationed at this last post. Among them was Dr. Knox Millsaps, who was then chief scientist for the Air Force Missile Development Center, which has since conducted tens of thousands of research and development missions on the same sprawling test range.

The test was originally set for 0400 hours, July 16, but rain and lightning early that morning caused it to be postponed until 0530. The bomb could not be exploded under conditions where rain would increase the danger from radioactive fallout, as well as interfering with observations of the test. However, the rain stopped about 0400 and at 0530 the bomb was exploded successfully. In the view of most observers, the brilliance of the light from the explosion arrived some seconds later. But the shock still knocked over two men at one of the inner observation posts.

Immediately after the test, two lead-lined tanks went forth to explore the site with measuring instruments and to scoop up samples of material from the ground. The bomb tower had virtually disappeared, and in its place was a crater about 400 yards in diameter and fifteen feet deep. Sands in the crater were fused to a "glass-like solid and the color of green jade." This substance has sometimes been referred to as trinitite, after the code name "Project Trinity."

Movie Reported To Be Partially Filmed Here

Charles Cullin, Governor Cargill's press secretary, called Jim Hine this week and reported that the movie location scouting team observing the Ruidoso area last weekend had decided to partially film in this area. The bulk of the movie "The Witness and The Rose" will be filmed in Albuquerque. Producers will be United Artists and further information will be available when the leading party has been cast. The film Hine was told, will be a top notch movie.

Because of the major economic impact of movie making in local communities, Governor David Carrizo has asked that a special mayor's workshop be held to acquaint community leaders with the requirements of Hollywood producers. Mayor Lloyd Davis and Village Manager Jim Hine are planning to attend.

The workshop will be held in conjunction with the premier showing of "The Good Guys and the Bad Guys" filmed exclusively in New Mexico in Santa Fe on Oct. 7. The stars and production staff of the movie along with other prominent Hollywood producers will visit Santa Fe during the premier special guests.

The program includes a luncheon at the La Fonda, followed by an afternoon conference on "How To Attract Movies" followed by a tour of Santa Fe's Film Center and the "Cheyenne Social Club" 4300, 606 western street.

County Agent's Report

Lincoln County had nine market calves at the Eastern New Mexico Fair in Roswell last week. Curtis Boyd of Capitan had a calf placed third in the medium weight class. It sold in the Junior Sale to Armstrong & Armstrong Construction for 600 per pound.

Cecelia Pacheco had a fourth place market lamb that sold to Roswell Wool and Mohair for \$120 per pound.

Riley Armstrong had the 10th and 11th place calves in the lightweight class. Carol Cooper had the 13th place calf in the same class. In the light-heavyweight class, Curtis Boyd had the 10th place calf and Gary Chipman had the 11th and 12th place. In the heavyweight class, Curtis Boyd had the 8th place calf. Cecelia Pacheco took 7th place with her Brangus calf and would have probably placed higher if it would have let the judge feel of it.

The Lincoln County booth placed third in the competition at the Eastern New Mexico Fair.

Harvest of pinon nuts has begun in New Mexico on a limited basis with full scale harvest only days, or at most, a few weeks away. The annual event provides a good opportunity for a family outing into the forest, and also provides some income for commercial harvesters.

Gathering of pinon nuts takes place in September or October, usually after frost, when the mature cones of the pinon tree open, allowing the nuts inside to fall. However, some pinons are gathered on a limited basis while the cones are unopened. Harvesters find that extracting the nuts from the unopened cones is somewhat unpleasant because of a sticky resin. The resin is difficult to remove from the hands, although some forms of hand cream can be used as a cleanser.

A number of methods have been devised for speeding and facilitating pinon harvesting, but the most popular ones continue to involve hand labor. You will find some who climb the trees; others who place a covering over the ground beneath the tree before shaking the tree to free the nuts; and still others who pick the pinons from the ground without benefit of the covering. A fast picker may harvest 20 pounds of pinons a day, or about 20,000 nuts.

Research indicates a locality must have a normal amount of rainfall and other favorable growing conditions for three successive years to allow pinon pine trees to yield a good harvest. A pinon tree is about 25 years old before it begins to bear nuts, and at 75 years of age the tree is large enough to produce nuts in commercial quantities. The tree is long-lived, and may continue to produce pinons for hundreds of years.

After picking, the nuts may be eaten in their natural state, or they may be roasted and consumed in that manner. Pinons may be used in a variety of recipes calling for nuts, including candy, cookies, fowl dressing and mince meat turnovers.

Some people cherish pinons for their flavor and although small, is high in food value. The pinon nut has a high percentage of kernel.

Chips from the Rangers Log

The recent nip to our cool morning air indicates summer is nearly over and fall is close at hand. In fact, fall has arrived in the high country with some aspen already yellowed by the chill.

It is our deciduous trees—those which lose their leaves each year—that are the best indicators of approaching fall. Predominating the color producers are aspen, oak and maple. Though summer green now, these trees in two weeks will cloak the hills with a red and gold splendor.

The green color of summer leaves is caused by chlorophyll—a pigment which in the presence of sunlight converts carbon dioxide and water into sugars which plants store and use for growth.

But as the summer sun wains and nights chill, the trees have stored all the sugars needed for next spring's growth. Thus slowly the sugar content in the leaves increase until it destroys the chlorophyll.

The color of all deciduous leaves is composed of many pigments similar to chlorophyll but not as abundant. These pigments are often yellow or red. When chlorophyll dominates it absorbs all wave lengths of sunlight except the green one, which it reflects back into the air. Thus only the green is seen by us during the summer. With the destruction of chlorophyll the other pigments can be seen.

The intensity of color is caused by the sugar content. Good fall colors result from a slow cooling, which allows for a large accumulation of sugars in the leaves. A warm fall with a sudden freeze kills the leaves. Then the leaves simply turn dull brown and fall off within a few days.

This month the nights have been cooling slowly. With any luck the yellow-gold of aspen and oak, tinged slightly with red maple, will produce a riot of colors this fall, providing many hours of nightseeing enjoyment.

On Oct. 8 the public is invited to attend, at their own expense, a 3-3-9 to be held at 7:30 p.m. at the Fairgrounds Indian Village before the pow-wow to be at the Tinglo Coliseum. Also planned is a parade.

New Mexico tribes plan to be joint hosts for the conference and delegates from Indian Tribes from all states and Alaska are expected to attend.

Topics other than involvement to be discussed at the conference include "Indian Youth in Times of Rapid, Social Change"; "Indian Rights and Tax-Exempt Status"; "Federal, Indian Policy"; "Self-Determination for Indians"; "Jurisdiction—The Indian Bill of Rights Amendment" and "Water Rights".

One of the most favorable characteristics of pinons is their excellent keeping quality. Dry, unshelled nuts have been marketed after three years of storage in the New Mexico climate. The shelled nuts become rancid after three to six months, roasted kernels become rancid more quickly than when unroasted.

Funeral arrangements have been delayed pending arrival of the body from Guam.

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
Last Rites Held For Rachel Venego

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
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Canutillo Drops Tribe 22-0

The Ruidoso High School Warriors suffered their first defeat of the 1969 football season, losing to the Canutillo, Texas Eagles, Friday night, Sept. 26, 22-0.

The Warriors just couldn't get their offense working against the sparked 6-AA Eagles, netting only 117 yards and seven first downs for the night. The Eagles, chalking up 389 yards and 16 first downs, found the Warrior defense extremely difficult inside their own 30-yard line.

Though the statistics seem a little one-sided, the game was much closer than it seemed. In the first quarter neither team was getting closer to pay dirt than 35 yards out.

The Warriors, receiving an Eagle kick-off on the 15, returned it to the 25. Three plays netted only 1-yard. On fourth down, Blane Miller averaging 32 yards per try, got off a booming 43 yard punt to the Eagles' 32.

The Eagles, in eight carries, moved the ball 26 yards to the Warrior 39, before being forced to punt. A high end-over-end punt off the toe of Joe Padilla, took a bad hop and was killed on the Warrior 4-yard line.

With a first and 10 on their own, halfback Barry Nelson was unable to find running room on the first try. Fullback David Latham gained only one to the five. On third down, quarterback Blane Miller found end Barry Bizzell open on the 22 for 18 yards and a first down.

Two carries by Latham were good for 20 and 5 to the 47, Nelson, being double teamed most of the night, lost 9 on a pass reception. Miller was smothered for four losses, three times for the night on pass attempts, lost 14 to the Warrior 52 to bring up fourth down and 21 to go.

Gary Stagner, playing his best defensive game of the season, raced down field as Miller got off a 28-yard punt. Lopez, attempting to take the bouncing ball, fumbled, and Stagner pounced on the fumble on the Eagle 42.

The Eagles, taking possession of the ball on their own 4, put together their first of three successful drives for the evening. In six plays on carries by Padilla, Ortega and Payton, the Eagles moved to the Warrior 35. On first down, Danny Ordo took a hand-off from Padilla and raced the distance to the goal line. The point after attempt failed and the Eagles led 6-0.

It was ball control by the Eagles for the remainder of the second quarter and half-time found the score still Eagles, 6-0.

Fired up by the crowning of the Homecoming Queen at the half-time and the 6-point lead, the Eagles dominated the entire second half. However, led by Stagner, Williams, Bizzell, Estes and Donham, the Warrior defense gave up only two scores in the period.

Midway in the third quarter, a Warrior pass was intercepted on the 24, the Eagles marched 47 yards in 10 plays to the Warrior 28. Hard running halfback, Ray Ortega, climaxed the drive with a 28-yard scoring run. The conversion attempt failed and the Eagles led 12-0.

Over 300 pounds of game fish have been stocked in Nogal Lake by New Mexico State Game and Fish Department personnel.

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

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
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ALONG THE BONITO
