

She is sponsored by the Rotary Club of Ruidoso, members of which will provide accommodations in a Rotary or Rotary approved home; provide one year's schooling; and supervise the student's welfare and experience.

Miss Stephenson will attend Ruidoso High School. She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Donald Stephenson of Dannevirke, New Zealand.

New Zealand is a British dominion of two islands located in the South Pacific. The capital is Wellington.

Miss Stephenson's father is a dairy farmer. She has completed 11 years of school at Dannevirke High. She is a Presbyterian.

Her school interests and activities include choir, Maori Club, guitar, sports, shooting, sewing, cooking and hair dressing.

Hobbies she is interested in are horseback riding, swimming, country dancing, singing, sewing and

hair dressing. In sports she says she is interested in basketball, soft-ball, swimming, tennis and horseback riding. She has been softball captain, class secretary and coach of two basketball teams.

In the future she hopes to become an airline hostess or a lab assistant.

The purpose of her visit will be to experience international living and goodwill.

Miss Stephenson will live with the Champ Hicks from January thru March and the Dick Parsons from April through June. While with the Parsons she will be included in a summer vacation trip. Her third quarter hosts have not yet been decided. She will live a week of the fourth quarter with the Barney Waldrop and 6 weeks with the M. B. "Buck" Buckleys.

## Village Has 24th Birthday

The Village of Ruidoso was incorporated 24 years ago Saturday, Nov. 15.

When the village was incorporated in 1945, a census showed 471 adults. Today Ruidoso has an estimated population of 3,200.

In the summer the village swells to hold 20,000 or more full-time and part-time population in Ruidoso proper.

From three employees in 1945 the village has now expanded to 44 full-time employees. Jim Hine holds the titles of village manager, village clerk, and treasurer. Don Hart is assistant village manager.

"Employees of the village, with the exception of outside workers, have two or more jobs each. If an employee has a talent it is utilized here," Hine said.

Hine is optimistic about the future of Ruidoso. "Only the citizens of the Village of Ruidoso can dictate what the future will hold," Hine says. "They have always been reasonable in their judgment as witnessed by their voting general election bonds to take care of our needs."

"The village has grown as a result of its citizens seeming to have the quality leadership needed as each problem presented itself. I think the future of Ruidoso will be just as secure for the next five

years as it was twenty years ago." Hine hopes for approval of the new constitution. He is especially interested in "Home Rule". In Article VI, Section 3-D of the proposed constitution it reads: A municipality which adopts a charter may exercise all legislative powers and perform all functions not

expressly denied by general law or charter.

Hine points out, that until now, a municipality has had limited powers to govern itself.

Members of the present village council are Mayor Lloyd L. Davis, Jr., Elmer Pirelli, Wayne Estes, Herb Brunell and Dr. James Beall.

The Ruidoso Downs Village Council had a second emergency session in as many weeks during their regular semi-monthly meeting held last Monday, Nov. 10. The meeting, held in the council chambers, was well attended with visitors hearing heated verbal discussions between Mayor Jack DiPaolo and councilman Billy Hale. The discussions were focused upon Hale's disagreement with the minutes of the previous meeting. Later in the meeting the council agreed to insert Hale objections into Monday's minutes but not to change the minutes of the previous meeting.

Mayor DiPaolo also was forced to break a tie vote regarding the confirmation of his appointment of Albert Richardson to the Village

## Warriors Boosters Give \$5000 Equipment To Ruidoso Schools

The Ruidoso Warriors Booster Club will finance gifts of a Universal Gyn and Video Tape Equipment, worth over \$5,000 for the Ruidoso schools.

The gifts are basically for the use of the athletic department, for training, replaying, viewing games and plays, but will also be used in other areas.

The Video-Tape equipment will cost about \$2,700. V. A. Miller, club president, paid this week that the video-tape equipment may be used for many school functions. He mentioned speech, science, drama and other subjects in which play-backs might be useful.

It was pointed out that one of the disadvantages of filmed playings was the waste in disposing of film. The video tapes will be erasable and so will be less expensive to operate.

The Universal Gyn is a weight training apparatus capable of accommodating 12 boys at a time. It features a rapid adjustment of weights. The body-building machine will be located in the weight room of the gym. Cost of the equipment is about \$2,400.

Ken Newton, Ruidoso High School athletic director, said that continued use over a number of years could result in a great physical advantage.

A boy can work out safely alone, or 35 boys can exercise in 30 minutes. The equipment will be available for use by the girls also.

The Booster Club will be selling advertisements to appear on one of three clocks the first of which has been installed at Nuneley Drug. The clock is pictured in this issue. Cost will be \$50 for 12 months. Each clock carries the names of 12 advertisers.

Paintings of the advertising signs will be done by the Boosters, who own, and will maintain the clocks. Boosters are planning to set up four teams of solicitors in four areas of Ruidoso and will be calling on merchants in the near future. Further locations of the clocks have not been decided.

The council also heard a report from village attorney, Richard Parsons that the Federal Housing and Urban Development representatives, F. Worth TYZAK, informed him of the postponement of their scheduled November 12 meeting in Ruidoso Downs until Nov. 24. The official federal government HUD group will meet with the village officials regarding proposed site relocations for the government approved 36 low rent houses for the village.


Burroughs was retained by Ruidoso Downs residents J. A. Crockett, Harley Farnhill, Norman Wheeler and Mr. and Mrs. Vaden McCray.

While serving as pastor of Ruidoso Downs Baptist Church Stiles was appointed to an unexpired term left by a resignation. His term will

expire in March 1970. In May, Stiles resigned his position as pastor and accepted other employment. As a result it was necessary for him to move his family from the parsonage. Unable to find suitable housing within the corporate limits of Ruidoso Downs, Stiles accepted housing in Ruidoso.

He maintains an office within the Ruidoso Downs limits, receives his mail, and votes in the Downs precinct.

Payne, upon investigation and research into legalities involved and the status of the Downs Council has refused to take quo warranto action against Stiles.



(Continued from Page 1—Sec. A) Paso. Military officials are expected from White Sands Missile Range and Holloman Air Force Base.

Information will be used for testimony regarding recommendations on Senate Bill 343, introduced by Sen. Joseph Montoya D-NM, last January.

No decision is expected from the Roswell meeting. If designation is approved in Washington by the committee and Senate, construction of approximately 301 miles on U. S. Highway 70 in New Mexico and 98 miles on U. S. Highway 60 in Texas could be expected to be accomplished as money is made available.

Representatives are expected to stress economic benefits in their specific areas that construction of a four-lane, limited-access highway, could accomplish.

The fact that 10 major defense installations are located along the proposed route is considered to be a strong factor towards its adoption.



**Editor's Note:** In checking with the New Mexico Game and Fish Department we were informed that many different methods are used to estimate the numbers of deer available for hunting.

Among these are sight, Bureau of Land Management counts, aerial counts, and in areas where grazing leases do not include sheep and goats, the sign method.

We were further informed that out-of-state hunters account for 17% of license revenue while removing 3% of the total game killed.

The New Mexico Department of Game and Fish considers the out-of-state hunters an asset rather than a liability.

Dear Mr. McClellan:

I am writing in protest to the two week big game hunting season announced this year by the New Mexico Game and Fish Commission together with the issuance of 500 doe permits in the Capitan area and still more doe permits in southeastern New Mexico. This two week season in southeastern New Mexico is certainly not warranted by the numbers of deer in this part of the state. I have talked with numbers of ranchers who ride their ranges almost daily and without exception they all say that there are fewer deer this year than they have seen in years. One rancher told me that the F & G Commission sends out men, sometimes college students, to make a game census and that they then base their estimates of the deer population on their findings. One means of determining the number of deer is to take a count of the number of droppings in a given area, and from this estimate the number of deer in that area (sheep or goat droppings very close-

ly resemble deer droppings and even old timers can scarcely tell the difference, except in a very large deer. Now it is significant that there are many sheep and/or goats in southeastern New Mexico. Could it be that the Fish and Game Commission based their estimates of deer on these findings and extended the season two weeks and issued all those doe permits, mistaking sheep or goat droppings for those of an excess number of deer?

It is the consensus of opinion of those with whom I have talked, that this is a very short sighted policy adopted by the Fish and Game Commission, only to attract more hunters into southeastern New Mexico and collect the 500 out-of-state big game license. This policy will further thin out the deer population to a point that hunting will become so poor that in the long run, fewer hunters will come in from out of state and New Mexico will then be the loser.

I refused to buy a license for myself and my wife and instead we prefer to go to Texas, pay out out-of-state license fee and hunt deer where there is an actual abundance of deer. We would hope that other residents of New Mexico will, after reading our sentiments, also protest this short sighted policy and try to influence our State Game and Fish Commission to adopt such conservation measures as will assure good hunting for residents and out-of-state hunters alike.



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# Warriors Whitewash Tigers In Last Of Season Game

The Ruidoso Warriors ended their 1969 football season with an undisputed white washing of the Truth or Consequences Tigers last Friday night in Truth or Consequences. The Tigers were never able to catch up to the near perfect performance of the Warriors and were

out-played and out-classed in every phase of their 47-0 loss. It was the final game for both clubs and left the Truth or Consequences Tigers in the cellar position of District 3B. Ruidoso concluded its season with an honorable 6 won, 3 lost and 1 tied record.

The Warriors, outweighed nearly 20 pounds per player, scored 38 points in the first quarter. Barry Nelson, 135 pound senior halfback, put the Ruidoso blue on the scoreboard a minute and a half after the opening kick off. The stalwart Warrior halfback, in the first series of downs, raced around the left side of the Tiger line for 51 yards and pay dirt. Nelson also scored on runs of 46 and 49 yards.

The second Warrior touchdown, five and a half minutes deep in the first quarter, came on a hard drive by fullback David Latham from the 2-yard line. The Tribe added two points to the score when Blaine Miller faked an extra point kick and passed to Carey Horton. Two and a half minutes later, following several Tiger miscues, the Ruidosans took over the ball and on the second down Nelson scampered the Tiger right side for his second touchdown. Blaine Miller kicked the extra point, making the score 21-0 with one minute and thirty-eight seconds left in the first quarter.

The fourth Warrior touchdown came via the air as Pat Farrar connected with Barry Bizzell. The pass play covered 34 yards and then to add to the Tiger misery, Farrar again went to the air and caught Jimmy Davis in the end zone on a 19-yard pay off with 39 seconds left on the clock.

The second quarter, although scoreless, saw the Tigers' only scoring threat of the evening. A hard-driving scramble by the Tiger halfback, 176 pound Ray Romero, covered 45 yards before he crossed the goal line only to be nullified

by an offside penalty. The Tigers had but one first down and 19 yards gained in the first half of play. In the third quarter, Barry Nelson covered 49 yards for his third TD of the night. Nelson gained 251 yards on the ground during the game. In the final period of play, the Warrior quarterback, Pat Farrar, passed to Barry Bizzell who made a sensational catch and easily collected six more points for the Warriors. The play covered 30 yards.

Outstanding defensive plays by the Warriors held the Tigers to three first downs and 106 total yards gained. The Tigers gained but 55 yards in the air, fumbled four times, two of which were recovered by Ruidoso, and were forced to kick on six occasions. Ruidoso coaches had high praise for the Warrior defensive efforts during the entire game.

Ruidoso individual statistics give Barry Nelson, the leading ground gainer, gained a total of 251 yards rushing, David Latham 90 yards, and Pat Farrar 32 yards. Barry Bizzell, 145 pound senior end for the Warriors was the leading pass receiver with a total of five for 114 yards. Nelson had 38 and Jimmy Davis 19 yards in the passing column.

## Deer Season Off To Good Start In This Area

New Mexico deer hunters had excellent hunting, during the opening weekend of the hunt in the southeast part of the state. Good weather, excellent conditions and an abundance of deer went together to make one of the best opening weekends in recent years.

Reports from Department of Game and Fish field personnel indicate the two hot spots to be the Capitan and the Guadalupe Mountains. Also, good hunting was reported in the Sacramento Mountain Area. Hunter success in the Corona area was fair with heavy hunter pressure.

Department of Game and Fish highway checks at Roswell, Artesia and at the entrance of the Guadalupe Mountains reported that most of the deer were in excellent condition and many large bucks were being taken.

The southeast deer hunt will continue through Nov. 23, giving hunters lots of time to get out and bag their deer.

## Game Law Violations Rise During Hunting Seasons In State

The opening of the big game hunting seasons brought a sharp rise in the number of game law violations filed by the Department of Game and Fish.

Killing illegal deer, which includes does, fawns and spike bucks, in most areas has been by far the most frequent violation. Through the second weekend of the season, the Department had filed 12 cases for this violation.

Failure to tag and illegal possession have also been frequent violations this season. The Department has filed against at least five violators for using an artificial light

in a game area while in possession of firearms. The Department Conservation Officers have also filed one case for hunting after hours and one for aiding and abetting in the killing of a doe deer.

The Department puts as many men as possible in the field during the big game season and patrols the game areas as closely as personnel numbers will allow.

Jerry Muth of the Vail Ski School was elected president of the Rocky Mountain Ski Instructors Assn. (RMSIA) by the board of directors at the group's recent annual meeting and seminar.

Mark Addison of Lake Eldorado Ski Area was elected vice-president.

The RMSIA in its annual meeting also voted to make stronger ties with the Professional Ski Instructors of America (PSIA), the national policy setting body, by including all certified instructors in the Rocky Mountain area in the national body.

Jim Riley of Squaw Pass, retiring president, was named general chairman of a committee studying the possibility of a North American Ski Instructors Congress which would be held in 1970 at Vail.

The RMSIA seminars are held in conjunction with the annual meetings and serve as a means for the instructor to broaden his knowledge and outlook.

## Four of Five Get Desert Bighorns

Four of the five hunters participating in the desert bighorn sheep hunt on the San Andres National Wildlife Refuge, were successful in bringing down trophy rams.

Hunters downing their rams are Elmer W. Clark of Roy, Tim E. Kelly of Albuquerque, Pat J. Lovato, Jr. of Santa Cruz, and Darwin T. McCoy of Alamogordo.

Only two bighorns were available to hunt the desert bighorns, among the 100 trophy animals on the North American Continent. A total of 187 bighorns applied for the li-

ces.

During last year's hunt for the elusive desert rams, four of the five hunters succeeded in bringing down sheep.

This year's season closed Sunday, Nov. 9.

# Horsemen Invited To Visit Charros

The High Chaparral Horsemen's Ass'n. has been invited to visit Ruidoso, N.M., by President of the Ruidoso Charros Ass'n., Ben Sautillana.

Mike Hernandez, president of the High Chaparral Horsemen's Ass'n., carried the word of the invitation from his recent visit to Mexico.

The Charros, Hernandez explains, are similar to American riding and rodeo clubs, except they compete with other associations. The sport in Mexico is like football here.

The Charros compete with clubs in other cities, areas, districts and finally in a national competition (finals) called the Congreso Charro Ases National Convention. This convention will be held in Juarez this year and Hernandez is planning to attend.

**Jarpees**

Rodeo in Mexico is "Jarpees" and the events are all once annual and different from those familiar here.

The picture shown with this article is of a 14-year-old girl, Marcela Regalado, tossing a bull by its tail. Hernandez said this 14-year-old girl often outdoes grown men in this event working with the same stock.

The "tossing the bull by its tail" event is probably the closest thing to our bull dogging. It is called Coladura (cola). The rider approaches the bull from the side, reaches for the tail, and slips the bull's tail with his legs. In that, the bull runs with his legs all in the same direction. Dogging, as in the American bull dogging, are not eligible for it.

Another event in el Paso de la Muerte (The Pass of Death) - the art of jumping from the back of a gentle horse to the back of a wild one, and then riding the wild horse for a specified time.

The Fiesta de Yellan is an event wherein the participant ferried a mare with his larri, the Jarpees de la feria is similar to our bull riding event.

Hernandez said, through invitations issued by Sautillana, he was able to visit a horse farm nearby Puebla, attend a charro, and a Club meeting.

The horse farm was owned by Justo Fernandez, Hernandez' wife is a daughter of former Mexican President Maximilian Aylla Ochoa. He said the Fernandez' own about 100 head of horses in the price range of \$50,000 to \$100,000.

One of the family's side trips, this year, was to Guanajuato in the state of Gto.

Hernandez said his children had never seen Guanajuato and that he felt the town was unique in that all transportation into and in Guanajuato is in one-way tunnels. He theorized the tunnels which are paved in brick were left from colonial days. They have been modernized and lighted and access to streets are by ramps.

The town is located in a canyon between mountains and even entry into the town is by tunnel. The tourists here would definitely need a guide, Hernandez said. The city's economy is based on farming, especially strawberries.

Hernandez said he will have to start a new savings account this year but that he feels travel in Mexico is comparable to travel in the U. S. He said a first-class motel room costs for about \$8, including TV and telephone. Meals are comparable in price and most menus are printed in English and Spanish.

Changes Mexico, Hernandez said, is making rapid changes and is advancing in modern technology.
