


**Ski Area Opens Thanksgiving Day**

**Duane Bryson Is New Head At Community Public Service Office**

H. Duane Bryson, named manager of Ruidoso's Community Public Service, arrived here Monday. Bryson replaces Max McCoy who has been Ruidoso manager since 1964. McCoy has accepted employment with the Texas Electric Service Co.

Bryson said he never saw Ruidoso until three weeks ago when he came up to look the town over. He said he liked Ruidoso and found the people friendly and helpful. "Any way I can be of help to people here, I will try to do my part," Bryson stated.

**Local Officials Testify At Hiway Route Hearing**

Officials from Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs attended a hearing before a U. S. Senate subcommittee, concerning the placing of a portion of U. S. 60 and 70, in West Texas and Southeast New Mexico, into the federal interstate highway system, in the Hill Country.

Sen. Joseph M. Montoya, D-N.M., wanted that committee present testimony at the hearing would be complete with similar requests from other states. He said there were at least four bills now pending before the Senate's Public Works Committee requesting addition of more than 10,000 miles of U. S. Highways to the interstate system.

Montoya assured participants their testimony would be included and that he would do his best to look after their interests.

Attending from Ruidoso were Mayor Lloyd L. Davis, Jr., Councilman Wayne Estes and Don Hart, assistant village manager. Mayor Jack DiPaolo of Ruidoso Downs represented his community at the hearing. Although Ruidoso councilman Elmer Pirelli did not attend, a statement of his was incorporated into the hearing.

Davis said this week that Ruidoso's testimony was based upon tourism as the backbone of the area's economy. Testimony presented by Ruidoso pointed out that attendance at Ruidoso Downs Race Track passed the quarter-million mark last season and more than 80,000 persons skied at Sierra Blanca during the 1968-69 season.

"Without scheduled air rail or rapid transportation of some kind Ruidoso is totally dependant upon good highway structure," Davis said.

"If Highway 70 is included or added to the federal interstate system, based on the workings of the system in other areas, that such time as construction would occur in this area, it would probably bypass the community by as much as two or three miles... but would give Ruidoso access to a major thoroughfare."

Davis said construction would probably not be underway for many years but that the presentation of testimony was part of a long-range outlook.

"The increased highway facility would certainly be a benefit where heavy race track and skiing traffic was involved. 'Probably,' Davis said, 'the ultimate success of Highway 70 being included in the interstate system will be the design and location of the road running from Riverside to Tularosa.'

**Ruidoso Village Council Commends Pirelli For 8 Year Commission Work**

Elmer Pirelli, eight-year member and four-year chairman of the Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission (formerly the Planning and Land-Use Committee) received public praise and expressions of appreciation Tuesday from the Ruidoso Village Council.

The council, meeting at a noon session, recognized that Pirelli had done a fine job in the Planning and Zoning Commission both as a member and chairman.

Pirelli, now a councilman, did not return to the Planning and Zoning Commission as recent New Mexico rulings discourage municipal council members from serving in both capacities.

Fire Chief Tom Walker, and assistant chief Sam Nunnally, brought the council up-to-date on the condition, classification, etc., of the

No. 4 pumper stationed at the White Mountain Sub Station.

**Downs Council Holds Quiet Regular Session**

The Ruidoso Downs Village Council, during their regular semi-monthly meeting, Monday, reaffirmed their plan to gravel as many streets as finances in the current year approved budget would permit, confirmed the Mayor Jack DiPaolo's appointments to the Ruidoso Downs Housing Authority, and requested the village attorney, Richard Parsons, to investigate the insurance liability requirements of the High Chaparral Horsemen's Association.

Mayor DiPaolo was required to break a tie vote in his appointments of Ken Geselin and J. C. Day, Councilmen Hugh Stiles and Clive Pezry voted in favor of confirming the appointments. Councilman Billy Hale and J. A. Crockett voting against. Geselin was re-appointed for a one year term and J. C. Day is to fill the unexpired term of Vaden McCray. Day's term will expire April 7, 1972.

The council unanimously approved the resignation of LeRoy Bannister, who requested to be relieved of the local housing authority position. To fill the vacancy, the mayor appointed Red Massey. His appointment was confirmed by the

council. The village attorney reported to the council that he had received notification that an alternative writ or mandamus suit had been filed in district court by former Planning and Zoning chairman and Executive Secretary of the Local Housing Authority, Harley "Jack" Farnell.

The writ asks the council to show cause why it has not removed councilman Hugh Stiles from the council in light of the fact that he has moved out of the village. The district court denied the request by Farnell to make void all council voting actions in which Stiles' decision was decisive, retroactive from the date of his moving from the village. The hearing is set for December 9 in Carrizozo.

Farnell was fired by the council from his position as housing authority executive secretary.

Due to the absence of members of the Planning and Zoning Commission, Mayor DiPaolo directed the village clerk, Allen Gray, to write Mrs. Vaden McCray, Planning and Zoning Commission secretary, instructing her to bring all P and Z records to the village hall before the next regular meet-



# Heartland Conference Is Eye-Opener To Sheltered Youth

"We, (area youth) live such sheltered lives here," said Cindy Harris this week, "there are more problems than we know."

Cindy's remark was made in the wake of her attendance, with four other Future Homemakers of America Club leaders from New Mexico, at the Heartland White House Conference in Tulsa, Okla., Nov. 11-13.

The Tulsa conference theme was "Today's Youth and Moral Values." It was one of three district meetings held prior to the White House Conference on Children and Youth, Dec., 1970, in Washington, D.C.

The conference, which has stirred up some controversy in state news media, was not taken over by hippies, and did not foster any riots, Cindy said. Cindy feels she personally gained a great deal from the conference.

She said there were isolated incidents arising from the deliberate attempt to bring together persons of varied ethnic, religious and economic backgrounds. In one instance a boy demanded the right to be on a session panel.

Cindy said she felt that all attending had an equal opportunity to speak. Also, she feels she was fortunate in being able to talk to other youth and hear their views... to receive information first hand.

Cindy stressed that the conference placed great emphasis on youth and that this was its announced intent. She said about four students appeared on discussion panels and they were all university students; the 200 more youths should have been included on panels.

She said some "longhairs" took part but they were not at all what her conception of "hippies" is—that they were "perhaps dissident but intelligent and capable people."

The conference was made up of about 600 persons, one-half adult and one-half youth. She recalls, during a racial problem discussion, a Spanish student from Mayfield High School in Las Cruces, explaining that, in her school, students work together to control problems.

Cindy will present her impressions of the conference before various audiences here soon. Among the audiences will be the F. H. A. Club of Ruidoso High School. She attended the sessions and followed in educating youth in sex was discussed. 

# Upper Hondo SWCD Annual Report Reflects Area Action and Growth

The Upper Hondo Soil and Water Conservation District issued its annual report last week.

A short history of the district which observed its 28th birthday on June 27, 1931, said the district was organized as a legal subdivision of the State of New Mexico to further total resources conservation and development and give local people the opportunity to plan, direct and carry out programs that will lead to the conservation and development of our natural resources.

The district currently contains 1,101,186 acres including 728,778 acres of private and state land. Approximately 80% of the landowners are District Cooperators.

Present supervisors are: Bert Pflingston, chairman; Chas. Jones, vice-chairman; Ernest McDaniel, secretary-treasurer; Harvey Bonnell, member, and Bob Scribner, member.

Landowners who have formerly served on the Board of Supervisors include: Peter Hurd, Jack Higgins, Ralph Bonnell, C. H. Parker, Floyd Skinner, W. F. Coe, George Smith, Wilbur McKnight and Daniel Bunton.

The Board meets on the first Thursday of each month at the Woodley Hotel in Lincoln at 7:00 p.m.

Priorities last year were placed on the Rio Ruidoso Watershed flood prevention, reorganization of community ditch irrigation systems, and the application of recreation practices on private land.

One of the most pressing problems the District has had this past year has been the erosion problems caused by the installation of the new highway from Hondo to above San Patricio.

A. T. (Bert) Pflingston was re-elected president of the New Mexico Assoc. of Soil and Water Conservation Districts during its annual meeting in Alamogordo, N.M., this year. He was elected president of the New Mexico Ladies Auxiliary.

The district was active in the working of the SCWRA (Southwestern Conservation Resources Act) this year. This organization was set up and run by local people to coordinate the workings of local, state and federal agencies and ideas of local people in developing total resource conservation and development within Lincoln and Otero counties.

Bob Scribner, also, was elected chairman of the SCWRA meeting committee.

Proposals developed by the District and submitted to the operating committee included requests for: Assistance in developing an inventory of woodland products in the area and their marketing potential; assistance in achieving orderly planning and development of subdivisions within the area.

Proposed projects submitted to the SCWRA that have been completed or are near completion include the installation of the Fossiliferous and Maxwell Community Ditches, preliminary investigation on the Ruidoso Watershed, a river-flow study on streams in the District for feasibility of ditch consolidation, and the acquiring of reclamation water for Nogal Lake.

# Chips from the Rangers Log

Turkeys are the talk of the day with Thanksgiving here. This is especially true with the Forest Service office vs. of the Ruidoso District have been hunting these wary birds and trying to figure ways of increasing their numbers.

Managing turkey habitat is probably the most difficult wildlife problem on the District. Little is known about wild turkeys other than their numbers. In New Mexico it is estimated there are 25,000 wild turkeys. Here on the District the maximum is 410 in 1958 with a harvest of 40 birds last year.

Turkey numbers are very important since only large flocks of 15 or 20 birds are capable of increasing. Smaller flocks, like those on the District with only seven to 10 birds, just simply maintain their numbers.

Cold springs are devastating to young poults with pneumonia taking the greatest toll. Various other diseases and predation also keeps turkey numbers low. Another important effect on numbers around Ruidoso has been through loss of agricultural lands which supplied a steady diet of grain.

At present the Forest Service is working in the establishment of

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

Most of the goose hunting in southeast New Mexico is found in the Pecos River Valley between Ft. Sumner and Carlsbad. The largest flocks are concentrated around Roswell and Artesia.






