## News Coverage of All-American Futurity To Include Playboy

Nationwide news coverage, including representation from the Playboy Magazine, continues to increase according to Ruidoso Racing Association Director of Public Relations, Tim Thompson. Thompson stated this week that "We have had the best all around news, radio, TV and newspaper coverage of the races at Ruidoso Downs this season than ever before. Cooperation with all phases of the news media has been terrific," he concluded.

Scheduled for the 12th All-American Futurity race on Labor Day include Richard Rhodes, Chicago correspondent for the nationally known Playboy Magazine, Tony Slaughter of the Fort Worth Star-Telegram, Morris Williams, columnist with the San Antonio Light, KOLD-TV, Tucson, will send a film crew to cover the race for the noted John Paul Sports show, another Tucson television station, KQUN-TV will also film the race.

The American Broadcasting Co. has coordinated a plan with KOAT-TV, Albuquerque, to film the Ruidoso Downs Race Track story in reference to its impact upon the

economy of the immediate area as well as on the entire state. The AEC film crew, under the direction of John Byrner, will arrive early this week and for the filming of the half-hour documentary television show which is expected to be seen nationwide this fall.

Three other important stakes races are on tap for the popular "6-day weekend." On Friday, Sept. 4, "The Brigand Handicap" at 370 yards will be the featured event, connected by both quarter horses and thoroughbreds, running for a purse of \$5,000 added. Saturday, Sept. 5 brings about the twentieth running of the "Ruidoso Thoroughbred Futurity", for two-year-olds, which carries a total purse of \$1,500. The seventeenth running of the "Ruidoso Mile", for three-year-olds and upwards will be highlighted Sunday, Sept. 6, and will feature a purse of \$10,000 in added money.

Also many other feature events were scheduled on the preceding days before the "All-American" such as the two features which were written for Wednesday, Sept. 2. The tenth race on Wednesday's program was named in honor of the Siltmark Chateau Motel, in Ruidoso, one of the loveliest spots to stay while visiting in Ruidoso.

## Billie Clarke's New Business To Benefit Employers

A pioneer Ruidoso resident, Mrs. Billie Clarke, has launched out on a new business venture, she announced early this week. Mrs. Clarke announced that she would in the very near future provide an employer's service business, primarily for Ruidoso business establishments.

The new and unusual service for local businesses will include a complete management service and operational plan. Mrs. Clarke stated, "A portion of my plans are to permit local business people to get away for awhile after the strenuous summer season." ## "All-American" Climaxes Season

Climaxing the 1970 Ruidoso racing season will be the 12th running of the world-famous "All-American Quarter Horse Futurity" on Labor Day, Sept. 7. The "All-American" this year boasts a never-before heard of price of \$870,000 to increase its lead as "the world's richest horse race."

Ten two-year-olds representing five different states qualified for the finals of the "All-American" out of a field of 123 hopefuls last weekend. Unlike 1969, the year of Easy Jet, 1970 has no dominant contender as yet, but these ten represent probably the finest crop of two-year-old quarter horses that have ever existed.


Richard Thompson, general manager of Ruidoso Downs, says he anticipates "at least two or three thousand" more spectators at the Downs on Labor Day than last year, when the crowd numbered 10,500. "We may even top the all-time record attendance of 14,500 set in 1965," he added.

## Narcotics Clean-Up In Ruidoso Results In 5 Arrests, 4 Sought

Three Ruidoso residents were arrested and jailed last Saturday and two minors from Las Cruces and El Paso were arrested later in the week as the result of a nearly three month narcotics clean-up in which 17 charges of narcotics violations were filed. This is the first such raid in the Ruidoso area.

Warrants have also been issued for four other persons, one of which is a minor.

Arrested Saturday was Albert

"Spider" Shaw, 23, Nick Patterson, 20, and Margaret "Gigi" Mellon, 19.

Shaw was charged with unlawful possession of marijuana, unlawful use of marijuana and unlawful possession of a depressant, stimulant and hallucinogenic drug to wit methamphetamine. His bond was set at \$10,000.

Patterson was placed under \$5,000 bond on two counts of illegal possession of a depressant, stimulant and/or a hallucinogenic drug and with the unlawful sale of marijuana.

Mrs. Mellon was charged with the unlawful use of marijuana and placed under a \$1,000 bond. All three have been released from the county jail in Carrizozo on property bonds. Shaw was released Sept. 1 under \$2,500 bond. Patterson was released Aug. 31 under \$2,500 bond and Mrs. Mellon was released Aug. 29 under \$1,000 bond. They are scheduled to appear before Magistrate Austin Pritchett on Sept. 10.

A 16-year-old Las Cruces boy, charged with unlawful possession of marijuana (2 counts), unlawful sale of marijuana (2 counts), and unlawful use of marijuana, was picked up later in the week and released under \$1,500 bond. A 17-year-old El Paso boy turned himself in to R. H. Hedgecock in Carrizozo and was released under \$500 bond. He was charged with unlawful sale of marijuana.

Both minors are scheduled to appear before Judge Richard Stanley in Carrizozo on September 14.

Warrants were issued in addition for Jim Adams, 25, of Ruidoso, three violations of unlawful possession of LSD, and use of marijuana; Gloria L. Bridges, 18, Holloman AFB, unlawful sale of marijuana; and Richard Logan, 20, Ruidoso and Midland, Texas, unlawful use of marijuana, and one minor charged with unlawful use of marijuana.

The arrests were made following nearly three months of investigation by undercover agents of the Narcotics Division of the New Mexico State Police.

Five state police agents and Lincoln County Sheriff's Deputies James Fitzgerald and Leon Puckett coordinated efforts in making the three simultaneous arrests Saturday. Lt. J. B. Sosa of the Santa Fe Division of the New Mexico State Police directed the operation.

## Postal Officials Here Mon. and Tues.

Two Postal Department officials were in Ruidoso this week to effect the consolidation of the Hollywood and Ruidoso Post Offices. Gary Welberg, Howell, of the Inspection Service, and John Biancali, postal services officer from the five-state regional U. S. Post Office Headquarters in Denver, Colorado, were here Monday and Tuesday to assist in the consolidation and to assign Mabel A. Wimberly as officer in charge of the Ruidoso Post Office. Mabel Baddillo was assigned Superintendent of the Hollywood station.

Mrs. Wimberly had been postmaster of the Hollywood Post Office for 20 years and was a clerk for two years prior to being named postmaster.

Baddillo had been the officer in charge of the Ruidoso Post Office since the retirement of L. F. Dryden in October of 1969.

Mrs. Wimberly explained that the consolidation was necessary following the annexation of the land involving the Hollywood Post Office by Ruidoso late last year, which left two second class post offices in the same village.

Clerks at the Hollywood station will be Jo Leland, who has been there 7 years, and Judy Kennedy, who has been there two years. The staff at the Ruidoso Post Office will include Mrs. Olga Russell, who had been there 7 years, Edwood Gradine, 2 years, and Mrs. Vangie Siddens, 9 months. Fran Lupulin, regular clerk, has been moved from the Hollywood office to Ruidoso. She has been with the service for 19½ years.

All patrons of the Hollywood station will continue to use their present address as it is until further notified by the Post Office Department, according to Mrs. Wimberly.

"With the consolidation of the offices and the force that we have, we are going to strive to give Ruidoso the very best mail service possible," Mrs. Wimberly said.

## County Agent's Column

Apple packing started last week in the Hondo Valley. There is an excellent demand for these early packed apples. Red delicious were selling for \$6.50 per box in Dallas last week.

Few fall contracts for calves have been made in this area although several other areas report some sales. Some 400 pound heifer and steer calves were selling for \$35.00 and \$38.00 per hundred weight respectively. Lambs are contracting for \$26.00 to \$28.50 per hundredweight in the Vaughn area.

The Lincoln County Fair on September 11 and 12 at Capitan will have another touch of the old time fair with many of the livestock on exhibit under the trees. The fat calves, sheep and fat lambs will be under the trees. As the livestock barn was destroyed by fire last week it is necessary that each exhibitor help furnish panels for their own sheep. Inside exhibitors will have plenty of room for their articles although tables will be in short supply. Anyone wanting a fairbook can get them at the County Agent's office or business in Carrizozo, Capitan, Corona or Ruidoso.

There will be an all day work day on Wednesday, Sept. 9 at the Fair Grounds. Any and all help will be appreciated. If you can help, bring a hammer or other tools.

R-R-D

I recently went to the National County Agents' Meeting at Oregon State University. On the way I visited the Colorado Fruit Experimental Farm, Dubois Sheep Experiment Station and Oregon State University Horticulture farm.

In Colorado they are trying different types of heating for frost prevention. One is a combined heating and sprinkler irrigation system. The Dubois Station has Rambouillet, Targhee and Columbia sheep under range conditions. They all have an excellent open face and good body size. They also have a few Landrace sheep.

The Oregon fruit trees have been able to get 340 boxes from an orchard the second year after transplanting. There were Red Delicious and Golden Delicious in rows 12 feet apart and the E. M. IX trees from four to six feet apart in the row. Also at the same farm they were picking buck green beans with a mechanical harvester. They could pick several acres an hour.

Temperature has great effect on certain alfalfa clones, a former graduate student of New Mexico State University, reported to the American Society of Agronomy in its annual meeting in Tucson Aug. 27. Charles "Rookie" Straley of Ancho who is now a doctoral candidate at Montana State University, said that temperatures significantly affected pollen germination and pollen tube elongation, as well as self-fertility. Straley's work is expected to help the understanding of the breeding behavior of alfalfa so that high-yielding varieties can be developed for specific environments.



## Vagrant Dies In County Jail Fri.

A 32-year-old man who had been picked up on vagrancy charges died early Friday morning in the Lincoln County Jail in Carrizozo. Picked up on Aug. 30 by state police, the man gave his name as Joe Chavato.

The report of an autopsy performed in Roswell over the weekend listed the cause of death as respiratory failure, probably due to drugs. Amphetamines and barbiturates were found in his system, according to the Roswell doctor who performed the autopsy.

Chavato was picked up approximately one mile west of the Texas Service Station on Highway 44 outside of Carrizozo after employees of the station reported to the state police a man on the highway who was behaving "strangely."

On the recommendation of a Carrizozo doctor, plans were being made to take the man to the state hospital in Las Vegas. Sanchez looked in on Chavato around midnight Thursday night and he seemed to be "doing better," but several hours later he was found dead in his cell.

He is reportedly survived by a wife in San Diego, Calif. Funeral arrangements are pending.

# Herbert Reddy Is One of Few Veterans of Spanish-Am. War

"They say I was born near Pendleton, South Carolina on Oct. 16, 1877," says Herbert M. Reddy, 93 of Ruidoso Downs. "I don't remember the event."

Reddy is among the few living veterans of the Spanish-American War. He and his wife, Mallie, who have lived in Ruidoso Downs since 1946 and in New Mexico since 1912, recently recalled some of their experiences for the Ruidoso News.

Mallie, who was born Jan. 3, 1878 near Cleburne, Texas, met and married Herbert in 1903 after his discharge from the Army in February, 1902. Before their marriage, she was a schoolteacher and had taught her own school of 60 pupils, grades 1-10.

The couple lived in Texas for 10 years where their two children were born and the oldest daughter died before moving to New Mexico. They arrived in White Oaks in April, 1912, soon moved to Carrizozo, and then in November of 1912 homesteaded in Kraut Gulch Canyon near the ghost town of Bonito City. They lived on the Bonito for 12 years; then spent 15 years farming in Artesia and near Portales. Reddy also tried a couple of "in-door" jobs, which didn't suit him, so they returned to the mountains, settling on a mining claim in Mills Canyon on the Bonito. They moved to San Patricio in 1943 and then to Palo Verde (now Ruidoso Downs) in 1945 where they have lived ever since.

Reddy enlisted in the Army in January of 1899 during the Spanish-American War and after basic training in San Antonio, Texas, was one of three volunteers picked from a group of thirty to be sent to the Philippines to handle the insurrection there. Reddy says, "We were told by the Recruiting Officers we would not have to stay in the Philippines more than 18 months, but we were there two years and seven months."

Reddy has recorded his experiences in the Spanish-American War in an essay which he calls, "Army Life During the Philippines Insurrection." He remembers leaving for the islands from San Francisco on the transport Sherman.

Reddy writes, "We called out about nine o'clock that night. A tug boat with a good band called around our ship playing, 'Where is My Wandering Boy Tonight?' and just as we were going out of the bay, we could hear the band playing, 'The Girl I Left Behind Me.' We were fourteen men short at roll call the next morning."

While in the Philippines, many of the detachments were far from medical aid and Reddy often found himself in the position of amateur "doctor." Once, while Reddy's detachment was 75 miles from a doctor, one of the men broke his leg above the knee and it fell to Reddy and another soldier to set the leg. Reddy describes the experience,

"We laid the man on his back, straightened his good leg with his heel flat on the bunk and his toes straight up. At the foot of the bed we nailed a board vertical to the bed. We took the thread off a spool, and drove a nail through for the spool to roll on. With the pulleys finished, we took adhesive tape and began on one side of his heel, drew the tape around, leaving a space between the heel and tape large enough for a small rope to be drawn through and he tied to the tape. Then, we took an old Spanish siege gun and used it for a weight. They were built like an old fashioned screw jack without the screw in it. The rope was fastened in the handle of the gun and it served for a weight. A doctor was sent for and he was fifteen days getting there. He removed our splints, and put the broken leg in plaster of Paris, but as the plaster would not set up, the splints went back on just as we had had them. He did tell us we had set the leg as well as he could have done. The doctor asked me to join the Medical Corps with the offer of five more dollars per month but at the time I was filled up on bed pans and declined the offer."

On another occasion Reddy was assigned to take a man out of the jungle to a doctor. He had been bitten on the hand by something and blood poisoning was setting in. In the course of a very rugged trip, through the jungle and down the river, Reddy lanced the man's hand with his knife, and although it "hurt him terribly" by the next day he was feeling so much better he was able to take his hand out of the sling and ask a woman to hold it for him.

"He took the baby and loved it so, he entertained the crowd, while we waited for the new crew to be forced to come aboard to row our boat."

After two years in the Philippines, which included some very harrowing experiences for the young volunteer, he tells about nearly missing the boat home.

"On our return home, two years plus later, we were allowed ashore at Lolo. As we were returning to the ship, I, being on the outside next to the drill ground, was commanded by the officer in charge of guard mount to fall in for guard duty. (He was short a corporal.) Corporal Flynn took my suit case and went onto the ship, and I fell in for guard duty as ordered. The orders were being given by bugle and this puzzled me, for I had not heard orders by bugle in a long time. While I was wondering if I would know what to do, the whistle of my ship blew for leaving port. I said, 'I'm being left behind,' and the officer responded with, 'Well, get the hell out of here!' He did not have to say it a second time. I was gone."

Corporal Flynn was aboard the ship, watching out for me, and when he caught sight of me coming in for the home stretch, he yelled, 'Run-Reddy-Run!' And run I did, getting to the gang-plank just as it was starting up. I fell onto it and went up with it. I made it and we were now on our way to Manila coming home."

After his discharge Feb. 24, 1902, Reddy settled at Stoneburg, Texas where he met the young schoolteacher, Mallie Jane Alexander, whom he was to marry.

Mallie was a friend of Herbert's sister Bessie and went over to the Reddy house at Bessie's invitation to meet the young soldier just returned from the war. When she arrived Herbert was in the kitchen talking to his parents so Mallie and Bessie sat down in the living room to wait. "We waited and waited while Herbert stayed in the kitchen telling his father 'war yarns'. Finally at 10 o'clock Bessie took me back to meet him, and he wouldn't even look at me when we were introduced!" she says.

Two weeks later though he asked her for a date, and six months later they were engaged. Mrs. Reddy says a typical date in those days was either a trip to the silent movie or to church.

The Reddys had two children, both of whom were born in Texas. The oldest, Orine, died when she was seven years old in 1911 and shortly after they moved to White Oaks where Herbert's brother had settled.

Because of his experience in the war, and usually out of sheer necessity, Reddy was often called on for medical aid, not only to his own family, but to other members of the community as well. "Those were rugged times," they said, "and a doctor wasn't always handy."

Herbert and Mallie went home to her mother's house for Mallie to have her second child. Because of a severe storm, Reddy was unable to go for a doctor and announced that he would deliver the baby himself. Mrs. Reddy remembers assuring her mother that everything would be all right, to which her mother responded, "Not unless Herbert knows a great deal more than I do!"

"And she had nine children!" Mrs. Reddy added. Herbert obviously did know enough because Dorothy was delivered without any complications. Soon after moving to White Oaks the Reddy's daughter was seriously injured and Reddy's quick reaction probably saved her life. The family had gone to the mine to eat a picnic lunch on the Fourth of July, and little Dorothy was playing "grocer" utilizing some big stacks of lumber for grocery shelves. "Reaching for a can of tomatoes on the top shelf," she knocked the whole lumber pile down on top of her. Her mother

bullet had gone through the boy's stomach, and Reddy cleaned the wound with a knitting needle with a gauze saturated in iodine form attached to the end. Reddy says that the wound "never even festered" and healed completely.

Probably due to the influence of an uncle who was a medical doctor, Reddy remembers that as a child he was always wanted to be a doctor. He was an ardent student of physical culture and a "natural food fanatic," according to his daughter, before it became so fashionable. He and his wife often went on 15 or 16 day fasts when they were ill, and still swear by that method of treatment.

"Always willing to contribute to science," Reddy has donated his body to the University of New Mexico School of Medicine.

On the Bonito Mrs. Reddy came down with small pox while the family lived in Carrizozo, and after recovering her doctor recommended that she move to the mountains. They homesteaded in Kraut Gulch Canyon on the Bonito where Reddy maintained a truck farm. While Reddy was building a new house for family and they were all living in the smokehouse, a big snow storm came and naturally "we greenhorns hadn't laid-up enough supplies," Dorothy says. Mrs. Reddy says she remembers fixing potatoes "in every way imaginable" during the week that they were snowbound.

By 1918 it was imperative that Dorothy start to school so the family moved to Payson where Herbert worked as a carpenter for

the Parsons Mining Co. and Mallie operated a boarding house for the miners. After the mines closed down Reddy and Jim Robinson formed a partnership to raise cattle, while Reddy continued with his carpenter work to supplement his income. He and Robinson were partners for eight years from 1919 until 1924.

Dorothy finished the 8th grade at the Parsons school and the family moved to Artesia in 1924, not to return to Lincoln County until 1939.

Great-Great Grandchild The Reddy's daughter, Dorothy is married to Harley A. "Jack" Parnell, and is the postmaster of the Ruidoso Downs post office. They also have four grandchildren, eight great-grandchildren, and one great-great-grandchild.

Both have always been interested in community affairs and have watched Ruidoso Downs progress for the past twenty-five years.

Mrs. Reddy is a charter member of the First Presbyterian Church in Ruidoso and is also a charter member of the Ruidoso Rebecca Lodge. She went through most of the chairs of the Lodge and served several terms as District Deputy President, all after she was 70 years old. She is presently

Chaplain of the Auxiliary to the Clay Green Camp of the Spanish-American War Veterans.

Mr. Reddy was a charter member of the Ruidoso Odd Fellows Lodge and was a member of the Ruidoso Downs Volunteer Fire Department for years. He is a past Commander of the Spanish-American War Veterans Department of New Mexico, has held the post of Commander of Clay Green Camp for several different terms and is the present Commander. Mrs. Parnell is presently the president of the Auxiliary of Clay Green Camp and of the state provisional department.

Mr. Reddy says that there is only one other member of Clay Green living today, "and he's older than I am."

### Hondo Valley Apple Grower Meets With Governor David Cargo

Bert Pfingsten, noted independent Hondo Valley Apple grower and several other apple growers throughout the state met with Governor David Cargo last week. The group met with the governor in an effort to seek assistance in drafting proposed legislation for a uniform apple tax which would be used to promote New Mexico apples. Cargo gave encouragement to the group and assured them of his assistance.

The encouragement came during a meeting Thursday morning between Governor Cargo, Sen. Arturo Jaramillo of the Chiriquito Apple Cooperative, Bob White of the New Mexico Apple Council and Bert Pfingsten, an independent grower from Hondo.

"One of the things I would like to accomplish during my remaining months in office is seeing that something is done to promote New Mexico apples," Governor Cargo told the group. "I think we've got to both promote and upgrade New Mexico apples if we want to get anywhere."

The Governor also told the group there will never be any progress in promoting the New Mexico apple if cooperatives and independent growers can't get together and mutually cooperate in upgrading the apples and then in promoting them for market outside the state.

The Governor said much has been done during the past two years to improve the apple industry, and he said he will do what he can to assist in further improvement.

The apple growers agreed that a uniform apple tax on the retail level will be a starting point from which to consolidate an effort among both individual growers and the cooperatives, and the three said they will work with legislators in the near future to draft proposed legislation for such a tax.

The Governor explained the tax would be imposed on all apples sold in New Mexico at the retail level. He said the tax would be uniformly imposed on New Mexico grown apples as well as on apples grown out of state.

## Measles Vaccine Offered To County Children

The new measles vaccine (Rubella) is being offered to school children, grades 1 through 6 and pre-school children, ages 1 to 6. The County Health Department will be administering the vaccine in Lincoln County Sept. 8 and 9.

German Measles has caused hundreds of mothers to have babies that were born dead, deaf,

retarded, or with heart trouble. To stop the spread of this disease, every elementary school child should be immunized.

Note: Three-day measles (Rubella), and 10-day red, hard measles (Rubella) are not the same disease. If your child is protected against 10-day measles, he still needs an immunization against 3-

day measles. Since many rash-producing diseases are often mistaken for 3-day measles, we recommend that you allow your child to take this vaccine even though you may think he has had the disease.

Exceptions: Immunization should not be given if: (1) your child is on medication; or (2) if your daughter has begun menstruation. If this situation exists in your family consult your family doctor about the vaccine.

Schedule: Sept. 8 — Corona School, 8:30-9:30 a.m. Carrizozo School—11:00-12:00 noon, Capitan School—1:15-2:00 p.m. September 9 — Hondo School, 10:00-10:30 a.m. Ruidoso Schools — 1:00-3:00 p.m. Pre-school children in Ruidoso area report to Nob Hill School between 1:00-2:00 p.m.

All children 1-6 years may be brought at the above times to the schools in their area. School children will have permission forms sent home by the school to be signed and returned.



Knapp, a native of Gillette, Wyoming who has recently made his residence near Ruidoso, is a sculptor. Most of his work will be bronze castings of western and Indian subjects, though he will also show some landscape drawings done in pencil and charcoal.

Barbara Campbell, director of Gallery III, said, "We chose two artists for a particular reason. This will be our last and largest show of the season and we wanted to present art of the Southwest, both in paintings and sculpture. Both of these men are well-known and appreciated by people who collect art of the American West."

Knapp grew up among the ranches and Indians of Wyoming. From an early interest in drawing, he went on to study art and to finally become an artist with the Walt Disney Studios in Hollywood. Encouragement from Harold McCracken of the Whitney Gallery of Western Art motivated him to cast in bronze the wax figures he had been fashioning. Since then Knapp's bronzes have been shown and sold throughout this country and in Europe.

Zachry grew up in the ranch country of North Texas near Ruidoso. At the age of 16, he began riding in area rodeos. As he was pursuing an art degree at Texas Tech, the rodeoing became a means of meeting college expenses. As a member of the Tech rodeo team, Zachry qualified three consecutive years for the National College Rodeo finals in bareback bronc riding and steer wrestling. He has relied on this experience and his ranching background in painting the Southwest. The appeal of the authenticity of his work is a part of his very unusual success—over 200 private collections contain his paintings, in addition to many hanging in banks and office buildings.

Gallery III, located in downtown Ruidoso, will be open Friday, Saturday, Sunday and Monday of the Labor Day weekend.



## Handgun Excise Tax May Be Directed To Wildlife Restoration

A popular bill to redirect the long-standing manufacturer's excise tax on handguns from general treasury receipts to wildlife restoration and firearms safety programs has passed the U. S. House of Representatives, according to a recent news release from Wildlife Management Institute.

The bill, H. R. 12475, now is in the Senate Subcommittee on Energy, Natural Resources and Environment. It will be considered along with two similar Senate versions, S. 3800 and S. 3027. Senator Philip A. Hart (Mich.), subcommittee chairman and author of S. 3027, is receiving numerous requests that a hearing be scheduled on the bills promptly.

Excise taxes have been collected on handguns since 1942. Yearly collections now amount to more than \$5 million. H. R. 12475 is supported by state and federal wildlife agencies, by the firearms industry and by sportsmen. A number of New Mexico sportsmen have watched the progress of this and similar bills very closely.

## II-S Deferments Still Available

Mrs. Elizabeth Jackson, executive secretary of Selective Service, local board No. 14, has announced that class II-S Student Deferment is still available to any registrant who wishes to apply for the deferment. All those registrants who now hold Class II-S will be continued in this classification so long as they continue as full-time students progressing satisfactorily.

Boys initially applying for Class II-S are reminded that the Local Board may not consider a registrant for Class II-S until he is actually enrolled in school, the college has submitted a Student Certificate (SSS Form 109) to the Local Board, and he has applied for

the Classification in writing by letter or a request for Undergraduate Student Deferment (SSS Form 104). When all of the above requirements exist, the Local Board may process the registrant for Class II-S.

Deferments may not be continued for boys currently in Class II-S until the board has received a current Student Certificate (SSS Form 109) certifying that the registrant is a full-time student progressing satisfactorily in the current academic year.

Registrants are reminded that it is their responsibility to see that the Local Board has all of the necessary information to classify them II-S.

Boys planning for a technical or vocational certificate rather than a baccalaureate degree must meet the above conditions with the exception that they must apply in writing for a II-A Vocational Deferment.
