There seems to be always the specter of economic death to pollute the financial atmosphere of such a community. To repeat our school student's slogan... we need a "Fresh Start."



800 Expected To Attend State Elks Meet Here

The Ruidoso Elks Lodge will host their first major convention in their new convention center this weekend. Approximately 800 Elks and their wives and guests are expected in Ruidoso this weekend for the 41st Annual Spring Convention of the New Mexico Elks Association.

The newly completed convention center contains 3,150 square feet, with ample facilities to handle the state convention. Plans are being made to construct an indoor swimming pool at the center.

Don Stark of Ruidoso, a past exalted ruler, is chairman of the 3-day convention and Mrs. Ed Brecheisen is chairwoman of the ladies' activities.

Registration begins on Thursday, April 23 and will continue through Friday morning.

Honored guests at the convention will be Frank Hise, Grand Exalted Ruler, and his wife, Mrs. Robert E. Boney, Las Cruces, and Ed L. Harbaugh of Roswell, chairman of the Grand Lodge Americanism committee.

The 1970-71 officers of the New Mexico Elks Association will be installed Saturday, and a banquet and dance honoring Hise will climax the celebration on Saturday night.

At the convention, activities will include a parade through Ruidoso on Saturday afternoon.

Grand Exalted Ruler's quarters will be located at the Ruidoso Elks Lodge, 401 Park Motel, Ruidoso, N.M. 88345.

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Council Grants Cable Franchise

A new cable television system has been granted a franchise to operate in the Ruidoso area. The Ruidoso village council, in a special meeting Tuesday night, voted unanimously to grant a franchise to Sierra Cablevision, headed by R. L. Battles, to operate a cable television system in the village of Ruidoso. (A copy of the ordinance granting the franchise appears elsewhere in the News.)

The new system will have its receivers in Alto and will service Ruidoso and the Alto area. It will bring in 6 channels, carrying all three major networks, and one educational channel out of Albuquerque.

Connecting rates for the new company will be as follows: first outlet connecting charge—\$15.00; first outlet, monthly charge—\$6.50; each additional outlet, connecting charge—\$5.00; each additional monthly charge—\$1.00.

September 1, 1970, has been set as the approximate date when residents of Ruidoso may begin connecting.

Frank Hise Here For Elks Meeting

Frank Hise, Grand Exalted Ruler of the Benevolent and Protective Order of Elks, will attend the annual convention of the New Mexico Elks Association that will meet in Ruidoso April 23-25.

The national Elks leader, whose home is in Corvallis, Ore., is a retired photographer. He will be accompanied by his wife. They will be escorted to Ruidoso by Robert E. Boney, Las Cruces, a Past Grand Exalted Ruler of the fraternity, and Mrs. Boney.

Under Grand Exalted Ruler Hise's leadership, the million and half Elks have developed a program giving strong support to law enforcement agencies to end violence on streets and campuses and also backing American efforts to bring a just and speedy peace in Vietnam.

Grand Exalted Ruler Hise is an ardent outdoorsman and was an early advocate of conservation and of environmental pollution. He led a successful campaign for legislation protecting Oregon's game fish and commercial fishing, and has been active in support of efforts to curb littering of streams and highways. He holds a river guide's license that permits him to take his friends down the swift waters of Oregon's mountain streams.

Hise will travel during his term as Grand Exalted Ruler, some 150,000 miles visiting Elks Lodges and State Elks Associations in addition to his other duties as chief executive of a fraternity of a million and a half members.

Hise joined Corvallis Elks Lodge No. 1413 in 1939 and was appointed Chaplain a year later. In 1944, he was elected Exalted Ruler of the lodge, of which he is an Honorary Life Member. In 1948 he was appointed a District Deputy Grand Exalted Ruler. He now serves on the National Elks Executive Council.

Compromise Negotiated To Resolve Race Track Problem

Attorneys for all parties involved in the Ruidoso Downs race track situation negotiated a compromise which may resolve all problems. They met in Santa Fe Thursday morning with Judge Samuel Montoya.

Montoya signed an approval of John Thompson's resignation as one of three trustees named by Montoya last week to run the Ruidoso race track and appointed Gloria P. Reed, Ruidoso Real Estate man, to take his place. Montoya then filed a voluntary recusal removing himself from the case, as he will be out of town for several days.


Attorney George T. Harris, Jr., representing Albuquerque National and Ruidoso State Bank, told the news that he felt their proposal would eliminate the jurisdictional dispute between two New Mexico district courts, in which two different receivers have been appointed to run the track.

The group of attorneys met with Judge Compton, Chief Justice of the New Mexico Supreme Court Thursday. Compton designated Judge Waldo Spies, of the appeals court, to hear both cases. Judge Spies issued an order by which Judge Glavin's order appointing the Ruidoso Jockey Club as receivers was vacated.

The minority stockholders have agreed not to fight the Ruidoso State Bank and the trustees at the meeting of the New Mexico Racing Commission on Saturday. The trustees will replace Newco Industries at that meeting in requesting a racing license from the commission.

It was announced that the Ruidoso Information folders for conventions and other out-of-town groups are now available at the chamber office.



Wendell Chino, President of the Mesquero Apache Tribe and one of the six Indian members on the National Council on Indian Opportunity, will meet with representatives from the All-Pueblo Council, Colorado Ute Tribes, Jicarilla Apache Tribe, and Alamo, Canoncito and Ramah Navajo Chapters in Albuquerque.

Chino will discuss with the Indian leaders the National Council's report by the Indian members to Vice-President Spiro Agnew and the six cabinet members. The report covers a broad spectrum of Indian affairs with recommendations.

Now that the Indian people have a channel and an opportunity to discuss Indian problems and concerns at a high level of the government, Mr. Chino is soliciting reactions to the report. He will leave next week for Washington for a meeting of the National Council. The meeting in Albuquerque will provide additional information and views to Chino and he will convey this to the other members of the Council. The meeting will be held at the Albuquerque Indian School auditorium on Saturday morning, April 25, at ten o'clock.





4-H Club Offers Scholarships

Current or former 4-H members have an opportunity to apply for one of six national scholarships worth \$800 each offered to coeds planning to major in home economics in their junior year this fall, according to the National 4-H Service Committee.

Applicants for the grants must have been 4-H members for at least three years. They must be enrolled in the fall of 1970 at an accredited college or university toward a major in home economics.

Two scholarships are donated by each of the following: The S&H Foundation, Inc., New York; The West Bend Company, West Bend, Wis.; and Sunbeam Corporation, Chicago. S&H also is sponsor of the national 4-H home improvement program which currently enrolls 200,000 young women between the ages of 9 and 19.

Girls interested in applying for the scholarships should contact their state 4-H office or the county extension 4-H office.

Each state may submit the application of one girl to be considered for the six grants. Her 4-H and scholastic record will be judged in early November by the Cooperative Extension Service, the scholarship program administrators. Winners will be announced during the National 4-H Congress held in Chicago, Nov. 29 through Dec. 3.

The six scholarships are part of the 4-H College Scholarships Fund arranged and announced by the National 4-H Service Committee.

James Welch, Artesia, President of the Ruidoso Jockey Club, issued the following statement concerning the situation at the Ruidoso Downs Race Track.

The Ruidoso Jockey Club is a separate corporation from the Ruidoso Racing Association. It owns and operates the Jockey Club facility under a valid written contract with the Racing Association. It therefore is vitally interested in the situation that has developed at the Ruidoso Downs.

The Jockey Club had no knowledge of the financing arrangement that had been entered into between the Ruidoso State Bank, the Racing Association and the Ruidoso Jockey Club until the February 23, 1970 hearing before the State Racing Commission. When the Racing Commission turned down the Racing Association's application for a license and racing dates, the Jockey Club immediately offered its assistance. It filed an application for a license and racing dates and offered to work out an arrangement with the Racing Association for use of its facilities at Ruidoso Downs. It agreed to assume full responsibility for financing and operating the 1970 racing season.

John Harrison presided over the regular meeting of the White Mountain Jeep Club, Tuesday night, April 21.



Mrs. Bonal states, "In the interest of fair play, I as a Ruidoso business woman who has lived here for 21 years, and whose life savings are invested in the community, appeal to you to:

- (1) Contact the government agencies named by Congressman Stelger so that proof or lack of proof to his charges may be made public to the racing commission and the people of New Mexico. If this information is available to him, I'm sure that it should be available to you, too.
- (2) Contact the racing commission and Governor Cargo here to tell them that you have requested this information, and
- (3) Urge the commissioners and other state officials to continue racing dates at Ruidoso Downs until proof against the parties involved is brought forth or until the State Supreme Court decides on a receiver for the track."

Makes 10 Pizzas
Bake at 450 F 8-10 Minutes

One ¼ teaspoon oregano.
Two tablespoons butter or margarine.
Preheat oven to 450 degrees.
Roll biscuits between sheets of waxed paper into thin rounds, about 4-inches in diameter.



Stevenson Files Supreme Court

Donnan Stephenson in Santa Fe has announced that he will be a candidate in the upcoming Democratic primary for Justice of the New Mexico Supreme Court. He said that it was his present intention to seek the four year term.

Never before a candidate for public office, Mr. Stephenson has been continuously engaged in the general practice of law in Santa Fe for upwards of twenty years. He commenced practice with Mr. Harry L. Bigbee, an association which continued for many years as Bigbee and Stephenson.

In 1962 with Charles D. Olmsted he formed the firm of Stephenson and Olmsted which became Stephenson, Campbell & Olmsted with the entry of Jack M. Campbell in 1968 following the completion of his second term as Governor of New Mexico.

Stephenson, fifty years of age, was born on a farm in Allen County, Kansas. Following attendance at elementary, high school and junior college at Iola, Kansas, he attended Kansas University, graduating in 1941 with a degree in business administration.

He spent World War II as a naval officer on board destroyers in both the Atlantic and Pacific fleets, serving in all theatres of action. He ultimately retired with the rank of commander.

Following active service he returned to the Kansas University School of Law from which he graduated in 1943.

Stephenson and his wife, Pat, will soon celebrate their twenty-eighth anniversary. They are the parents of two sons. He has for many years been active in administration of Presbyterian Medical missions, and is at present an officer and director of Presbyterian Medical Services, a non-profit charitable corporation.

Stephenson and his wife visited in Ruidoso last week prior to the Meet-the-Candidates dinner in Capitan.



Candidates Address Capacity Crowd At "Meet-the-Candidates" Dinner

Approximately 150 Lincoln County Democrats attended the "Meet-the-Candidates" dinner in Capitan Thursday night, April 16. They heard featured speaker Joseph M. Montoya, U. S. Senator, and all three gubernatorial candidates as well as 19 candidates for other state offices in the June primary.

The dinner was organized by Lincoln County Democrats to give the county residents a chance to meet and talk with candidates prior to the primary election in June. Mrs. Pearl Soderback of the Wortley Hotel in Lincoln prepared the meal.

The buffet style meal was served at 7:00 p.m. in the Capitan High School gym. Jorry Apodaca, state chairman of the Democratic Party from Las Cruces, served as M. C. for the evening. He began by recognizing Dessie Sawyer, National Committeewoman; Fern Sawyer, county chairman; and visiting county chairman, Randy Keeffe from Lea County. Rolla Buck from Otero County, and Don Frederick, Chavez, Apodaca then briefly addressed the capacity crowd and said, "I am very gratified that things are looking so well as they do for the Democratic Party in November."

Local candidates who were introduced at the dinner were candidates for state senator, Tom Hamilton and Don Hancock; for county commissioner, Jim Strong and Charlin Jones; for county treasurer, Mya Glen Elliott; and for magistrates, divisions 1, 2, and 3, Bill Payne, K. A. Huey and Austin Pritchett.

Each of 19 candidates for state office in attendance at the dinner were then allowed two to three minutes to introduce themselves and briefly address the group. The three gubernatorial candidates, Jack Daniels, Bruce King and Al Scorsone, then spoke at greater length concerning their various qualifications and their programs for the office of governor.

Joseph M. Montoya, U. S. Senator, was the featured speaker for the evening. He was introduced by Ralph Petty, Jr., state representative from Lincoln and Sierra Counties. Montoya told the crowd that he intended to take no part in the gubernatorial primary so that

he could devote all his energies to campaigning for the party's nominee.

He asked that he be compared publicly to Montoya on the issues of consistency of voting record, quality and nature of major issue legislation proposed and sponsored, amount of such legislation actually passed, special interests versus public interest, legislative attendance, Latin American leadership, and responsiveness to constituency problems.

In his closing address, Montoya did not respond at all to Edwards' challenge. He did, however, indirectly respond by listing at length his achievements not only while in the senate but during the whole of his political life.
