


hmmm

Co. Officials Meet Here

Six hundred to seven hundred visitors are expected in Ruidoso for the New Mexico Association of Counties convention being held here April 30 to May 2. All elected county officials from all of New Mexico's 32 counties are included in the association. Registration began Wednesday at the Chaparral where all business meetings will be held. The business sessions will be held all day Thursday, Friday and Saturday beginning at 9:30 a.m. They will include special seminars for each of the county offices which include county commissioners, clerks, sheriffs, road foremen, assessors and treasurers.

Don Stark, who is chairman of the Lincoln County Commission, is convention co-chairman with Phillip Larroquette, executive director of the New Mexico Association of Counties. Stark reports that most candidates for state offices will attend the meeting, including Senator Joseph M. Montoya, Governor Cargio has been invited. "Dances will be held at the Elks Lodge on Thursday, Friday and Saturday nights. A final banquet will climax the convention on Saturday night at the Elks Lodge. M. C. for the evening will be W. P. Hunter of El Paso, Texas. All other meals will be held at the Elks Lodge with the exception of a ladies' luncheon which will be held Friday noon at the Chaparral.

Newco Denied; Jockey Club Granted Race Dates-License

The New Mexico State Racing Commission met Saturday, April 25 in Albuquerque to complete the agenda of business interrupted by jurisdictional problems at the El Paso meeting on April 11. They denied a rehearing on the application for racing dates by Newco Industries, Inc. and granted racing dates to Ruidoso Jockey Club.

Following the Saturday meeting, two lawsuits have been filed against the four members of the commission who voted to deny the application and a court order has been issued ordering the commission to show cause why it shouldn't strike Sam Steiger's testimony from its Feb. 21 hearing and approve Emprise's concession contract.

Other Applications
Three other applications for racing dates at Ruidoso Downs were acknowledged at the Saturday meeting of the commission. One was the surprise filing of a letter of intent to apply for dates by Wendell Chino, asking for dates in the name of the Mesquero Apache Tribe.

Ruidoso Hosts Largest N.M. Elks Convention Ever Held



Chips from the Rangers Log

A limited fire closure is in effect for all National Forests in the Southwest. Here on the Ruidoso District of the Lincoln National Forest, fires are allowed only in developed recreation areas or in permitted areas designated by the Ranger.

To have a campfire outside of a recreation site you will need to stop by the Ranger Station and obtain a campfire permit. These permits are free and are issued for area where outside fires are safe.

Partial fire closures are necessary during the dry, windy months of April, May and June because of the severe burning conditions in the Southwest. Improperly tended fires can cause a holocaust that might destroy valuable timber and watershed lands within a few hours. More importantly life and property could also be destroyed by a thoughtless individual.

Building a safe campfire requires a few tricks. It pays to learn them for each person is liable for the cost of a fire if it starts.

Select a level spot away from overhanging branches, brush, dry grass and rotten logs. Never build a fire at the base of a hill.

Clean a circle 10 feet in diameter to bare dirt and remove everything that will burn.

Keep extra wood outside of the circle and to the windward side. Have a tool or water handy in case you have to fight an escaping fire. Always avoid starting ANY fire during gusty, windy weather—especially in dry brushy areas.

He earned the award for meritorious service while participating in aerial flight support of ground operations in Vietnam.



McCarty Files \$705,000 Suit

A lawsuit has been filed by Glover D. McCarty against Ed Wimberly, The Ruidoso State Bank and Longhorn Development Co. as defendants. The suit asks a total of \$705,000 in damages.

The complaint seeks damages of three causes of action. The first cause alleges that the bank, acting as escrow agent in a contract between the plaintiff and his successor in the purchase of Alpine Village subdivision, failed at any time to apply a \$10,000 payment toward the contract. It also alleges that the bank and Longhorn Development Co. did include with one another a secret agreement for the purpose of depriving the defendant of his interest in and to the property, causing the contract to be defaulted. Cause No. 1 asks for \$150,000 as compensation for direct loss to McCarty, plus \$50,000 for damages to the credit and reputation of the plaintiff, plus punitive damages in the amount of \$100,000.

The second cause for action is the complaint alleges that the bank under the presidency of E. B. Hood had an agreement with the plaintiff to loan him large sums of money and that the bank would permit the plaintiff to renew these obligations in the event he was without funds to meet them. It alleges that when Wimberly became president he immediately declared all notes due, filed two lawsuits against McCarty, and "surreptitiously" proceeded with foreclosure against McCarty's properties without carrying out an agreement to submit a proposal for settlement to the bank's board of trustees. It asks \$100,000 as compensation for direct loss plus \$100,000 for "damages to the plaintiff's earnings, future earnings, and entire livelihood, as well as punitive damage in the amount of \$100,000.

The third cause asks \$30,000 as compensation for direct loss and punitive damages in the amount of \$75,000, claiming that the defendant Wimberly as escrow agent applied proceeds due to Highwood, Inc., of which McCarty is the principal stockholder, to obligations alleged to be owed by McCarty and to other obligations not owed by McCarty.

Ed Wimberly, president of the Ruidoso State Bank, said today that the charges against the bank are "unfounded, malicious and without cause. The bank is committed as a national law bank."



County Agent's Report

Hondo Valley Apples Are In Full Bloom, Dunlap Reports

Apples are in full bloom in the Hondo Valley this week. This means that if you expect to have worm free apples the grower needs to have his sprayer ready to go. The first spray is necessary within ten days after petal fall and sprays are needed 14 days later.

If you have a codling moth trap you may be able to time your sprays more closely by spraying six days after the first female moths appear. Otherwise follow a 14 day spray schedule. Codling moth sex lure traps will again be used in the Hondo Valley. There were four last year at A. T. Pfingsten, Dave Bonnell, Juan

One of the easier ways to spread fertilizer is with a cyclone seeder, either the kind you carry or the kind you roll on the ground. The regular ground-controlled fertilizer spreader is quite satisfactory, but is slower. Fertilizer applied by hand or shovel causes a spotted, green lawn and may burn the grass. If your lawn became yellow last year due to iron deficiency, apply five pounds of iron sulfate per 1,000 square feet. Supplemental applications may be needed during the growing season.

By all means, apply some fertilizer during the spring and summer for an attractive lawn. If you don't apply fertilizer because it increases the number of mowings,

Dr. Darrell Sullivan, professor of Horticulture reports that a growth retardant, Alar, has improved apple quality and even delayed the bloom on experimental apple trees. The growth retardant was sprayed on soon after full bloom. It increased color and firmness of Red Delicious. When sprayed in late September it delayed bloom about five days.

Crossbreeding of beef cattle was discussed on April 28 at the Carrizo Recreation Center starting at 7:30 p.m. Lewis Holland and Bobby Rankin pointed out some of the advantages and disadvantages of crossbreeding program.

Dr. Holland is in charge of the beef cattle crossbreeding project being carried out at Fort Stanton and the College ranch. He will tell the group what is being done in a crossbreeding program here as well as results from other tests.

Dr. Rankin will assist with the program and tell the group how to interpret beef performance records. He is in charge of the Tucuman Bull Test program and has been in charge of this program since it was started.

The program is sponsored by the Lincoln County Farm and Livestock Bureau. Anyone interested is invited to attend.

New Mexico's wool sales were called last week after early showings revealed little buyer interest.

Moswell Wool and Mohair showed wool about an hour Monday and stopped because only one buyer was bidding. Bond Baker Co. Roswell, showed about two hours Tuesday, then stopped, also drawing only one bid on most lots. Artesia Wool Co-op called off its sale scheduled Wednesday. About half a dozen prospective buyers attended, but most said they had no orders. Albuquerque Wool Warehouse, scheduled to sell late in April, postponed its showing indefinitely.

on the highways, should have a slow moving vehicle emblem. The emblem is a fluorescent orange-yellow, 18-inch triangle with a dark red reflective border. When attached to the rear end of a tractor, a hayrack, or any slow moving vehicle, the orange-yellow is highly visible during the daylight hours. The reflective red border glows brilliantly around a hollow triangle when it is in the path of headlights at night. In some states, law requires the emblem to be displayed on all tractors. The emblem is most easily identified and seen when it is located at the rear-center of vehicles about three to five feet above ground. The position permits quick eye contact, is within normal headlight beams and can be seen for as far as a sixth of a mile behind the slow moving vehicle.

If you plant good-quality seed, you are off to a good start toward a profitable crop. You may examine seed and see some difference between lots. Since you cannot tell the quality of seed by looking at it, the only way to determine this is to read the tags.

The analysis tag states the crop and variety of crop seed in the bag, name and address of the seller, origin, lot number and net weight. It also gives the quality of the seed determined by analyzing and testing a sample taken from the seed lot. This quality is indicated by the percentage of the germination, and when present the percentage by weight of inert matter, mixture of other crop and weed seeds.

The certification tag is a sign used by the buyer that the seed has met specific minimum field and seed quality standards of a state certifying agency.

If the seed is treated to control seed-borne diseases, a special warning tag must be attached to the bag. If the treatment is poisonous the tag will be marked "Poison Treated" in red letters. Insist on tagged seed and remember, it is worthwhile to read the tags before you buy.

Lawns need to be fertilized at least once a year. A frequent question is "What plant foods are needed?" The answer is almost always nitrogen and phosphorus. Nitrogen is one of the most often lacking.

Several management practices are necessary for a good lawn. But you can do nothing more important than fertilize. The only exception are the few lawns on unusually fertile soil. Even these will eventually need some fertilizer.

There are several types of fertilizers. Commercial materials like ammonium nitrate, ammonium sulfate and 10-20-0 are the most commonly used. Organic fertilizers are rapidly becoming popular because they release nitrogen slowly and therefore seldom burn the grass. These fertilizers are more expensive per pound of nitrogen.

Bluegrass, fescue and other cool season grasses are best fertilized in late fall and early spring, with light applications during the growing season. Some homeowners keep their bluegrass active all summer by making bi-weekly applications of fertilizer. Watch for disease if this is done. Apply two to three pounds of ammonium nitrate or similar fertilizer per 1,000 square feet, beginning at first signs of growth.



No Penalties For Extension On Tax

Taxpayers who receive extensions of time for filing their tax returns will not be subject to penalties for failure to pay tax for the period covered by the extension, except as hereinafter provided, the Internal Revenue Service announced today. This applies both to taxpayers who apply for extensions and those who receive extensions automatically pursuant to regulations. Interest—as contrasted to penalty—will continue to be charged at a 6 percent per annum rate from the original due date of the return, except to the extent that payment of tax is deferred pursuant to an election made by a corporation to pay the tax in installments in accordance with the law.
