

White Oaks To Old Lincoln Race Scheduled For Saturday To Consolidate Ruidoso and Hollywood P. O.'s



With a \$600 hand-tooled saddle being the first prize in a 41-mile race, the White Oaks to Lincoln Pony Express Race promises to be an exciting one this year. Entry fees of \$20 will be pooled and divided among the winners, 50%, 30% and 20%.

Anyone wishing to ride is urged to submit their entry blank early because of the limited field of ten. Entry blanks may be obtained from Bill Ward, Box 100, Lincoln, New Mexico 88330.

The ride is scheduled to begin at 8:30 a.m. on Aug. 1 from White Oaks and continue by a pre-arranged route to Lincoln.

Three charges of horses will be allowed, the first of which will be at John Robinson turn off, 9.7 miles; the second at Escobedo School, 10 miles; and the third at South Base Road, 8 miles.

Last year's winner was Fermin Chavez, San Patricio, whose time was 2 hrs., 30 minutes.

Those wanting to send letters, to bear a special seal, should enclose their letters, addressed and stamped with 6 cent stamp as well as 10 cents for each letter, in an envelope and send it to: Pony Express, Box 217, Carrizozo, New Mexico 88301.

Letters will have the special seal affixed and then be carried in the race to Lincoln Town and sent to their destination by regular mail. Letters must be received in Carrizozo by July 30, 1970.

This year will mark the second running of the race, which was started last year in honor of the anniversary of Lincoln County.

An Old Time Riders' Contest will also be held in conjunction with the race and will start at 1:30 p.m. on Saturday.

Sunday, Aug. 2 at 1:30 p.m. will be the starting time for the Old Lincoln Days Parade and the final performance of the "Last Escape of Billy the Kid" will be at 3:00 p.m.

The Hollywood Post Office, effective Aug. 31 will be a Classified Station, or sub-station, of the Ruidoso Post Office according to Jerry L. Reynolds, Congressional Liaison Officer, Washington, D. C.

The Ruidoso News contacted Larry Morgan today (Thursday), press secretary to Congressman Ed Foreman (R-N. M.) who recalled the following correspondence between Reynolds and Foreman explaining the consolidation of the two area post offices.

July 14, 1970

Dear Congressman Foreman:

This has reference to previous correspondence concerning possible consolidation of the Hollywood and Ruidoso, New Mexico post offices.

These two independent post offices are located in the City of Ruidoso and there is considerable confusion in mailing addresses.

Some of the businesses and a number of people rent boxes at both post offices.

We propose to consolidate service under the Ruidoso post office, redesignating the Hollywood post office as a classified station.

This action will centralize mail handling functions at the Ruidoso post office and people will use "Ruidoso, New Mexico 88345" as their mailing address. The Hollywood Station will operate in the same quarters, and will provide the usual window and mailing services, including lock box service for those patrons who wish to receive their mail at the station.

The Hollywood postmaster will be named Superintendent of the Hollywood Station. The Ruidoso postmaster position is vacant at this time.

We propose to make the change effective August 31, 1970.

Sierra Blanca Sales Files Breach Of Contract Suit Against Culver

Alamogordo attorney Albert Rivera and his San Antonio, Texas associate, John R. Shaw, filed a \$215,000 breach of contract suit Monday in Lincoln County District Court on behalf of their client, Sierra Blanca Sales Co. and its principal stockholder, Mrs. Frances Henstley. Mrs. Henstley is the wife of Eugene Henstley, formerly majority stockholder in the Ruidoso Racing Association, currently serving a prison term for a tax violation.

Named as defendants in the suit are Eric N. Culver, Ruidoso Racing Association, Inc., and the All-American Livestock Sales Co., Inc.

The suit contends that money is due for professional services

owed to the firm as the result of stock sales in the race track amounting to \$1,513,590. That stock was owned by Eugene Henstley and Billie Henstley, who sold to Eric Culver, acting agent for Newco. The complaint further states that Culver agreed to pay Sierra Blanca Sales Co. \$223,000 (in the form of \$15,000 a year starting July 5, 1969 and continuing for 15 years) for professional services.

The suit contends that the defendants have "willfully and wantonly" breached the contract and have refused to honor or make further payments. It asks judgment for the unpaid balance of \$233,000 plus attorney's fees.

Speiss Approves Track Stock Sale

A stock sale which would give control of Ruidoso Downs to the same group which owns Sunland Park near El Paso, was approved Monday by Chief Judge Waldo Speiss of the New Mexico Supreme Court. The sale is still contingent, however, on the approval by the New Mexico State Racing Commission, next scheduled to meet Aug. 24 in Ruidoso. The commission will consider at that time licensing of Sunland Park for its winter-spring program.

Previously, the sale puts Newco Industries, Inc., which owns 87 percent of the stock in the Ruidoso Racing Association, into the hands of Fortuna Corporation and Sunland Development Corp.

Fortuna owns Sunland and Sunland Development is controlling stockholder in Fortuna.

Speiss' approval came after his denial of a motion by attorney Charles Spear for a postponement of the hearing and the judge's declaration that the Peckey Club could investigate the new potential owner.

Speiss argued that the court order placing Ruidoso Downs in receivership gave authority to sell the track in the hands of the court-appointed trustee. The trustee's attorney, Frank Robinson, also argued there was a question if the Newco stock were under control of the three Ruidoso businessmen. Those trustees are Jack B. Armstrong, Thomas W. Perrett and Floyd E. Haake.

Speiss said that the bank and Newco asked for court approval of the sale without consulting the trustee to find the highest bidder. He added that the trustee could have had a chance to bid for the purchase of the track.

Attorney George Harris, Jr. of Albuquerque argued on behalf of the Ruidoso State Bank that the

One Survives Plane Crash Which Kills Pilot, 5 Others

Mrs. Betty Geyer of San Antonio, Texas was the lone survivor of a plane crash Friday which killed six people on their way to Ruidoso for a weekend at the races. She was rescued Monday after remaining strapped in the wreckage for more than 72 hours on the side of a mountain.

Mrs. Geyer was found in the fuselage of a Cessna 310 that had crashed Friday during a flight from Del Rio, Texas to Ruidoso. Clocks in the wreckage were stopped at 11:30.

The dead were identified as William Sumbling, about 27 of New Braunfels, Texas, Mrs. Geyer's brother; his wife, Carolyn Sumbling, 24; the Sumbling's daughter, Sandy Denise, 2; Mrs. Aina Sumbling, 47, the mother of Mrs. Geyer and Sumbling; Mrs. Geyer's cousin, Gordon Lytton, 28; and the pilot, Jerry Gates, 24, of Del Rio, Texas.

In the mountains enroute to the crash scene, which had been spotted late Sunday from the air. Guided by a helicopter hovering over the wreckage, the rescue team had to work its way slowly down a steep cliff to reach the plane.

The plane had struck a large tree, shearing off the wings and breaking away the tail section.

Civil Air Patrol search coordinator was Lt. Col. John Scoggins of Jal.

Seventeen members of the White Mountain Jeep Club in Ruidoso in 12 units participated in the search for the club, said they were alerted at 11:00 p.m. Friday, organized and left at daylight Saturday morning. The club left Ruidoso at 6 a.m. Saturday and Sunday, coming in at night to reorganize.

A special control point, set up at Windy Point on Sierra Blanca, which stayed in constant communication with Alamogordo and Roswell, was manned in shifts by Jim Cooper, John Harrelson and Mrs. Brecheisen.

Some Jeep Club members were also at the scene of the crash until late Monday night maintaining communications and aiding in the evacuation of the bodies.

Other Jeep Club members participating in the search which covered over 10,000 square miles included Don Stark and L. Z. Tate, chairman and co-chairman of the search and rescue team, Marvin Craig, who is rough terrain chairman, and Herb Brunell, radio and communications officer. Also manning the units were Dick Smith, John Von Rosenberg, Mrs. Don Stark, Ruth Harrelson, Ed Lane, Ed Brecheisen, Bill Hutcheson, Jim Cooper and his son, Hellic Baker, two youth members of the club from the Sierra Blanca Boys' Camp, Mr. Beddoe from Capitán, Ray Grand and Albert Jay in the Chapel of Roses ambulance and all county employees, honorary Jeep Club members.

President John Harrelson told the News that the majority of the club members were up virtually the entire 72 hours after the alert Friday night, getting only two or three hours sleep each night. He expressed a special thanks to Hank Graf and the Nob Hill Restaurant who fed all the searchers on Sunday.

Lincoln County Sheriff Ernest Sanchez and the state Sheriff's department was out in full force for the search, including deputy James Fitzgerald of Ruidoso and deputy Moses of Carrizozo. The forest service personnel were also helpful both in the search and in the evacuation operations.

A group of Ruidoso aviators were in the air searching all weekend for a total of approximately 100 hours as well. They included Bob Bryant and Bill Boone of Sierra Blanca Aviation, Bob York and Lee York, R. H. Hedgcock, Mr. and Mrs. John Hutcheson, Terry Hall and John Hall and Tim Thompson. A military helicopter out of Holloman flown by Major McCarty was used in the search and in the evacuation on Monday.

Deadline Nears For Elk and Antelope Hunting Licenses





Bill has also played the part of the pedlar and has played an outlaw prior to his selection this year as "The Kid", and has had numerous backstage jobs over the years.



Don't Whip The Boy

(A True Story of Billy the Kid) By DANIEL A. STORM

Copyright: by Daniel A. Storm (Editor's Note: This is one of several stories in a book later to be published by Dan Storm, entitled: "A Hand Full of Hand-Down Tales of The Kid.")

One winter some years back I was all by myself here across the creek, but I had a neighbor within easy walking distance down the vale who was a fiddler and also a story-book in human form.

I was a teenager then, and this fellow—Joe Woods' was his name—was well into his eighties; so he could reach quite a ways back in time, which is always good when it comes to telling stories.

Joe had survived an Indian massacre, a hand-to-hand fight with a bear in a cave, and he telling what all else. And by the way he had the marks to prove it all, too.

But there are some marks which he escaped getting from a sound whipping as a child. And he was whipped from this whipping by Billy the Kid.

Let us see if we can more or less put this in the words of Joe Woods.

My parents were killed in an Indian massacre down here at Round Mountain on the way to Tularosa, and my sister taken captive. I was an infant then and—the way it was told to me—I was left for dead and was picked up by a Mexican shepherd who took me to a Mexican family. Then this family turned me over to the Copelands. The Copelands—they used to live over toward the Capitanas.

One day I was playing around the house. In those days a young-





County Agent's Column

Range caterpillars are being found in a large area in the middle of Lincoln County. They were still hatching last week in some areas. An estimated 100,000 acres have a medium to heavy infestation with 250,000 with a light infestation. The infested area is mainly east and north of the range caterpillar infestation found last year in the area.

One encouraging note is that a few caterpillars have been found with parasite eggs attached to their back. This egg hatches into a worm and kills the caterpillar and later develops into a wasp or fly. Anyone in this range caterpillar area should look for these parasites.

After harvest of early season crops, such as radishes, leaf lettuce, green onions, early cabbage and peas, plant your garden space to late season vegetables which will mature crops before the first frost of fall. Vegetables which can be planted from now until early August are turnips, beets, carrots, kohlrabi, cabbage and cauliflower. Check with your local garden supply center as to the availability of the needed seeds and plants. You may need to settle for substitutes for your favorite varieties because of exhausted supplies.

In preparing the soil for your succession crops, the plant remains from previous crops can be placed in the compost pile, if free from disease. Diseased plants should be removed from the garden, allowed to dry, and then burned. Work the cleared soil area to prepare a good seed bed. Don't work the soil so that it is overly fine as this can lead to soil compaction after a heavy rainfall. To get the summer garden vegetables up and growing, be sure to keep the soil moist but not soggy after seeding. A light mulch can be helpful in conserving soil moisture. Besides promoting rapid seed germination, the moisture helps prevent soil crusting over the seeds and thus making it difficult or impossible for the seedlings to emerge. After the vegetable plants are well established, a heavy mulch will help control weeds and conserve soil moisture for plant growth.

All Government "E" Bonds Continue To Earn Interest

All outstanding E Bonds are still drawing interest regardless of age—some have reached "final maturity." Glen A. Fowler, Vice President, Ganda Laboratories, and volunteer state chairman, said today.

Fowler made the statement because of wide public misunderstanding of terms and conditions of U.S. Savings Bonds.

"E Bonds now being issued have a maturity of 6 years, 10 months, with an automatic 10 year extension," Fowler said. "Older E Bonds—with original maturities ranging from 7 to 10 years—have been granted one or more 19 year extensions so no E Bond has reached 'final' maturity and they continue to earn interest."

Fowler said the current rate is 4 percent. If held to maturity yield is 4.01 percent the first year; thereafter 5.20 percent to maturity. Older bonds earn at the new 5 percent rate, beginning with the first semi-annual interest period starting on or before June 1, 1969, if held to maturity or extended maturity.

"Many holders of older E Bonds don't realize how their value has appreciated," Fowler said. "For example, a \$100 Bond bought for \$75 in July 1941, is now worth \$181.64."

"A prime feature of Savings Bonds is their tax advantages. Interest is exempt from all state or local income or personal property taxes. It is subject to Federal income tax, but the tax may be deferred until Bonds are cashed, making possible creation of 'Tax-Break' retirement and tax-free education funds."

Since 1959, when Waylon Jennings gave up his plane seat to Buddy Holly on the fatal Mid-Western flight which took the entertainer's life, the young singer has seemed destined for the stardom he is now close to.

It has been over 2 years since the handsome, smooth-voiced vocalist came to Nashville. Since his arrival nearly five years after the disbanding of the Holly group, "The Crickets," Waylon's talent and magnetism have announced to Music City and to the world that he is one of those "special" stars who attract the admiration of fans as well as that of seasoned pros in the music business.

Many people refer to Waylon as an overnight sensation—and he is really the classic example. For the 30-year-old star has been training himself for his present fame since the age of 12, waiting for the time when the right circumstances and the right combination of personalities would allow his talent to come to the fore.

At only 12 years of age, Waylon hosted his own music show on the radio station in his home town, Littlefield, Texas. Five years later, still a disc jockey, he began to concentrate on Country Music.

At 21, after 9 years of area talent shows and personal appearances, he took his talents to Lubbock, Texas where he continued to work and traveled part-time on electric bass player with Holly's "Crickets."

After relocation to Phoenix, and the premature death of their leader, Waylon formed his own music unit, "The Waylors." With them, he developed a unique style of music all his own. The combination of Country and Western, Folk and Rock and Roll soon made the Jennings group the top night club attraction in the area, appearing nightly in the Southwest's largest night spot, "J. D.'s" in Phoenix. A combination of talent and circumstances has allowed the development of Waylon's great talent. His fortunes have flourished under the sponsorship and encouragement of three of the biggest magnates in the music business . . . W. E. "Lucky" Moeller, who handles all of Waylon's booking engagements, Harlan Howard, top songwriter who furnishes him with most of his material, and Chet Atkins, RCA Victor's A&R Producer whose great talents have resulted in the fact that every release of Waylon's has been high in the charts. An example is his two-sided "Chokin' Kind," written by Harlan for the young vocalist, and "Love of the Common People," which is also the title of his hit album.

Waylon modestly gives credit to these three for his success. He tells of a former contract with A&M Records where his less-than-enthusiastic records were being produced by the now-famous Herb Alpert. With help from friend Don Bowman and Bobby Bare, his songs were brought to the attention of Atkins in Nashville and, shortly after, he was released from his contract by Alpert in deference to Atkins' great ability. The leader of the Tijuana Brass recently told Jennings that he had known all along that the great talent was there, but that it took Chet Atkins to develop the kind of music Waylon longed to be singing. Now RCA records the Country music that he sings, a brand of Country Music which allows all of the sorrow and joy and pain and hope of life to be expressed in its lyrics and melodies. He appeals to all audiences with his modern pop approach to sound and his own way of singing.

A few of Jennings' songs that he has recorded include: "Mama, The Chance I'll Have To Take," "Anita You're Dreaming," "Gop The World and Let Me Off," "Look Into My Tear Drops," "I Wonder Just Where I Went Wrong," "Time To Bum Again," "That's What You Get For Loving Me," "The Chokin' Kind," "Mental Revenge," "Walk On Out of My Mind."

The Grand Ole Opry star has also added several albums to his credit which are listed as: Waylon Jennings Folk - Country; "Leavin' Town"; "Love of the Common People"; "The One and Only Waylon Jennings."

ESTELLE AND CHARLES FLOTA

Books of Verse by Charles and Estelle Flota Published Recently

A first may have been celebrated in the book world with the recent publication by Exposition Press of "Memory Garden", by Estelle Flota, and "Life Yesterday - Today - Tomorrow", by Charles T. Flota. The authors, husband and wife, have written books of poetry, each unique in its own right.

Both Mr. and Mrs. Flota are originally from Illinois, but have made their home in Truth or Consequences, New Mexico since 1939. "Memory Garden" by Estelle Flota is a book of verse recalling moments of by-gone days. Childhood impressions, the involuntaries of nature and the deep joys of love are her most frequent subjects.

"Life Yesterday - Today - Tomorrow" by Charles Flota is the picture of a many faceted life. The poet's career has been devoted to the practice of law, with the exception of periods of military service during the two World

Wars. Service days and the courtroom, as well as friendship, love and history, are among his themes. Estelle Flota was born in southern Illinois and grew up on her father's farm. She was graduated from Southern Illinois University and received a B. A. degree in Education from Northern Illinois University. For many years she taught English and history in Illinois and South Dakota, and after her marriage she earned an LL.B. degree.

Charles Flota, who was also born in Illinois, earned his LL.B. from the Chicago - Keok College of Law, his Master of Laws from the University of Chicago, and was awarded a Juris Doctor. Before becoming an attorney he was a farmer, miner, clerk, railroader and school teacher. He served in many official capacities as an attorney in Illinois and New Mexico. Flota is presently the special appeal agent of the Selective Service System in Truth or Consequences.

Council Adopts 2 Resolutions

The Mesquero Apache Tribal Council met last Thursday and adopted two resolutions requesting the addition of passing lanes to a portion of Highway 70 and affirming a co-operative relationship with the New Mexico State Police.

The council said that the unimproved section of Highway 70 between Mesquero and Tularosa does not have provision for truck or bus passing and slow moving vehicles constitute a hazard on the highway which could be alleviated with the addition of passing lanes.

The second resolution stated that the members of the council and the entire tribe have enjoyed

a "cordial and helpful relationship with the New Mexico State Police. The tribal council believes in the integrity and impartial application and enforcement of the laws of the state wherein they apply to members of the tribe."

The resolution re-affirmed the tribe's faith in the New Mexico State Police and pledged continued assistance to the state police. It further stated that "upon call by the president of the tribe or the tribal council as a whole for the assistance of the State Police, that it supports and encourages such assistance and relationship for the proper administration of

Local Pharmacy Is Burglarized

Don's Prescription Pharmacy in Ruidoso Downs was the victim of a break-in and burglary either late Saturday or early Sunday morning, July 19.

Taken were five 10cc. vials of Talwin, which is an analgesic pain reliever according to Don Swalander, owner of the pharmacy.

The incident occurred sometime between the hours of 7 p.m. July 18 and 8 a.m. July 19, and was reported at 10 a.m. July 19. Ruidoso Downs Village Marshall Joe Rockhill said he suspected that more than one person was involved in the break-in.

The burglars apparently entered through the rear of the building after tearing loose a picket fence behind the building. The air conditioner was pulled off the rear window through which they entered the building; proceeded to the back room of the drug store and took the Talwin.

No arrests have been made to date in connection with the incident.
