### "Aunt" Edith To Be Honored Sat.

"Aunt" Edith Boyce Rigby, often recognized as being the earliest of all promoters of Ruidoso as a tourist capital and entertainment center, will be honored Saturday. The Glencoe native, with her late husband, built the Navajo Lodge in 1924 and for nearly three decades provided the area with entertainment and lodging.

Saturday's honors for the First Lady of Ruidoso's Entertainment development will include a special feature race in her honor at Ruidoso Downs. The day's honoring events will also include a reception for "Aunt" Edith at the Chaparral Motor Hotel to be held from 6:00 p.m. to 8:00 p.m. with dinner to follow.

Saturday's day of honor for the First Lady will be concluded with a dance at the Chaparral. Ray Reed and the Chaparral Road-runners will play for the gala affair.

### Von Rosenberg Is New President

An Alto home-building contractor, John W. Von Rosenberg, was elected president of the Building Contractors Association of Lincoln County at the Association's organizational meeting Tuesday evening in the Chaparral Motor Hotel.

Elected to serve with Von Rosenberg as officers were Bill Randle of Captain, an electrical contractor, vice-president, and Jack DiPaolo, long time Ruidoso area home builder, secretary-treasurer. Four directors, who, with the officers will comprise the Association's Board of Directors, are: Pat Huey of Captain, Dean Jansen, Lonnie Woods and Tom Shaw, all of Ruidoso.

The Association, formed in May, will be chartered officially by the 18,000-member National Association of Home Builders at that organization's Fall Board meeting in Boston Oct. 11. The charter will be presented at a dinner meeting to be held in Las Cruces, National Representative of the National Association and president of the Building Contractors' Association of New Mexico.

The Lincoln County Builders Association has set the third Thursday as the regular meeting date with dinner preceding the business session, it was said by President Von Rosenberg.

Tuesday evening's election was preceded by screening a National Association-produced film, "TAMAP," a study of the time consumed and methods used in construction of a residence.

### Dean Arraigned, Hearing Slated For August 25

Clifton Dean, 37, Ruidoso Downs, was arraigned Tuesday morning in Magistrate Court before Judge Austin Pritchett. Charges had been filed earlier by Lincoln County Sheriff Ernest Sanchez in connection with the fatal July 30th shooting of Joe Wilson, also of Ruidoso Downs. Dean was released on his own recognizance the night of the incident.

Sanchez has charged the man with two counts, voluntary manslaughter and carrying a concealed weapon. The first count is a second degree felony which carries a penalty of 10 to 50 years in prison while the second charge is a misdemeanor. District Attorney Ernest Williams will represent the state in the preliminary hearing scheduled by Judge Pritchett for Tuesday, Aug. 25.

During Tuesday's arraignment Dean was advised of his rights, arraigned, and released to his attorney, Bill Payne of Carrizozo.

Judge Pritchett stated that subpoenas would be issued later this week as witnesses in the preliminary hearing. Dean is employed as a horse trainer at Ruidoso Downs Race Track by Jim Paul of Scottsdale, Ark.

### Second Special Session Held By Village Trustees

The Ruidoso Village governing body was called into special session for the second time in as many weeks. The last special session, Wednesday, Aug. 19, was called by three of the four village trustees, Elmer Pirelli, Wayne Estes and Earl Allison. The Notice of Special Meeting was signed and acknowledged by all four village trustees. For the second time Mayor George P. White refused to sign the notice and did not attend. The first of the two special called meetings was held Friday, Aug. 14.

Mayor Pro-tem Elmer Pirelli called the special session to order and stated that the purpose of recalling a special meeting was that, in the opinion of the village attorney (John Thompson) the original special called meeting was not legal. The legality apparently concerned the need that a majority of the members of the governing body is required to call the body into special session. Pirelli alone had called the previous special meeting.

The Mayor pro-tem then stated that the purpose of this meeting was to consider a proposed agreement with the Humane Society of Lincoln County, Inc., New Mexico.

Trustee Earl Allison moved during the agreement as reached during their last special meeting be adopted, and put into a resolution to that effect. Council member Wayne Estes seconded the motion. A roll call vote was unanimous in favor of passage. Pirelli went on record as also being in favor of the decision.

Trustee Wayne Estes also stated that he wanted to go on record as acknowledging the fact that the council did not show proper courtesy to the Humane Society during the Aug. 14 regular monthly meeting at which time he said he did not feel the council gave the society the courtesy of consideration of the proposed Village-Humane Society agreement.

The agreement will become effective when signed by both parties involved. The Humane Society was expected to sign the agreement today. In the agreement the Humane Society agrees to provide the necessary facilities and proposes to "maintain a shelter for unwanted animals, and to enforce, within reason, City Ordinance No. 99."

The Society also has assumed the responsibility to furnish necessary manpower on a 24-hour basis, and will accept and perform on-

calls during those hours, within reason. They will also furnish the necessary vehicles and equipment.

The village in turn has agreed to subsidize the Society for their performance in the sum of \$270 per month. The city also agreed to use village equipment in removing items for the proposed new Humane Society site. The items consist of a small office building, shed and chain link fence.

It was also noted that the Humane Society will conduct mass vaccination against rabies at least twice a year.

### Alert Local Security Patrol Officer Surprises Burglar

An alert local security patrol officer, last Saturday, Aug. 15, surprised a Texas man as he attempted to burglarize the Ruidoso Mercantile Store, formerly the House of Guns. The man was apprehended following a two hundred yard foot race with Ruidoso police officer Paul Lukens and Puckett Security Patrol owner, Leon Puckett, Sr.

Claude E. Pool, around 36, San Antonio, Texas, was arraigned Saturday afternoon in Magistrate

(Editors Note: The Ruidoso News, Tuesday morning, was granted an exclusive interview with Mr. Walter Hamrick, father of Leslie Hamrick. The interview was extended to the News by invitation from the family of the youth and held in the residence of a Ruidoso family who graciously hosted the Hamricks overnight following Leslie's release from the Ruidoso-Hondo Valley General Hospital. Portions of the interview are reported in the following article.)

An extended hand and "I am Walter Hamrick, father of Leslie Hamrick, and I just want to ask you to somehow express my thanks and appreciation to all the people who helped hunt for Leslie." So began the interview with the father whose son had been lost, apparently wandering, in the rugged Sierra Mountain area for nine days. He was found Sunday, Aug. 16, at the top of the Sierra Blanca Ski Area around 11:30 a.m. by ski manager Roy Parker and Denny Brooks, also employed by the ski area.

Regarding my statement, "It's not always that a newspaper is privileged to report on a news story that has such a happy ending," the elder Hamrick replied, "I wish I had the words to express just how happy we are that Leslie is safe and sound." And again the earnest request of a thankful father, "I would be very grateful if you would express my thanks to all of the people, everyone has been so wonderful to us."

The nine day ordeal, which the Odessa, Texas father admitted "seemed like an extended nightmare or like something that happens only to other people, began when Leslie, 16, a junior in the Odessa High School, became separated from two male companions. Hamrick said that he nor his

wife had overly quizzed their son because they felt like he was still in a kind of shock and "does not remember too many things about his experience." We do know that Leslie and two of his friends left the church group to "scout out the area around the church camp-site." The trio was part of a group of youths camping near the Bonito Lake and sponsored by the West Park Baptist Church of Odessa, Texas.

Hamrick said that as best as he could tell "Leslie and the other boys got confused as to what trail they were on and two of the boys stopped to rest while Leslie went on up the hillside on what he thought was the wrong trail but looking for the right one." The father further surmised that had Leslie stayed on the trail he would have returned back to camp as the two trails that meet "on the way up to the top of the mountain" return back to the lake and the general area from which they started.

Leslie told his father that "he waited and waited for the other boys for a long time" and before he realized it, it became dark and started to rain along with thundering and lightning. "The boy is afraid of the dark, and I just imagine that after that first night he panicked and began wandering," the father stated.

Co began an experience of eight nights of fear and panic by Leslie Hamrick who "had never been in this kind of area before and just didn't know what to do or how to act." So also began nearly nine days of daylight walking, listening, and looking for someone or something to come to his aid.

During the night time Hamrick said his son remembers sleeping in what his son called "bear caves" and that on one occasion he "saw five bears in one group and that he hurriedly went around them because of fear." He said his son also told him of the coldness of the nights and how that he "fell off a ledge" during one of the nights. He traveled, unaware that the distance from the church camp site to the ski area was only around four miles, and that over 600 searchers were combing the mountainside searching for him.

"The boy did not have a coat, hat, knife, or matches during his ordeal," Hamrick related, "just his blue jeans and his shirt." For food, his father said, "he told us of eating wild strawberries. I am sure that he really meant wild raspberries." Searchers surmised that the boy never strayed too far from the South Fork of the Bonito, which provided him with water.

Did he ever hear or see anyone? Was one of the many questions asked by the father.

Puckett told the Ruidoso News that he and his daughter, Dena, were doing routine patrol when he spotted a man inside the Ruidoso Mercantile. He stopped and went to the apparent broken window by which the intruder entered and ordered the man out. He said that the Texas man seemed to be loading a pistol. Puckett then sent his daughter to a nearby pay-telephone and had her call the Ruidoso police for additional help.

Patrolmen Paul Lukens and Victor Brooks answered the call and the trio guarded possible escape exits and ordered the man to surrender.

The suspect, armed with the two loaded pistols, one on each hip, ran out the back of the store carrying an army type barracks bag containing the merchandise reportedly belonging to the Ruidoso Mercantile. He was chased on foot by both Puckett and Lukens until caught trying to climb a fence just east of the Troy Park Chevrolet Service Station on Highway 70, around two hundred yards from the scene of the break-in.

The police also surmised that the man had been in the store long enough to change clothes and ransack the store. When he escaped from the store he was wearing a new pair of boots, new trousers, and a new rain coat all identified as belonging to the Ruidoso Mercantile.

The charge of aggravated burglary, burglary with the use of a deadly weapon by either entering armed or arming himself after entering, carries a maximum sentence of 10 to 20 year prison and/or a fine of \$10,000.

When most often asked, "Yes, Leslie said that one time he heard what he thought was come chots from the upper maner. Roy Parker, ski area manager, and thought he heard someone yelling. The boy he said, 'I've been lost for 10 days—honest to God I've been lost for ten days.' Parker immediately, after bringing Leslie down from the top of the ski area, notified the authorities that the boy had been located.

Following a hurried trip via U.S. Army helicopter and Chaplain of Ruidoso ambulance to the Ruidoso-Hondo Valley Hospital where he stayed for around 24 hours, Leslie Hamrick, hopes to return to normal school what has happened and with his parents "continue to thank for for saving him."

The interview closed with a final request by the Hamricks, "It is impossible for us to express how much we appreciate everyone. Everyone has been wonderful. I am afraid if I try to list them I will forget someone, everyone has been so good to us. We are so very grateful, beyond words."

When Dave Rubinoff appears in piano concert in Ruidoso at the High School Gym on Sept. 10, he will perform as violin solos the full scores of Chopin's Polonaise, the Wotaw Concerto, and Rhapsody in Blue. The American public has grown to love these numbers arranged for piano and orchestra, but Rubinoff feels they are not given the proper attention.

A graduate of the Royal Conservatory in Warsaw, Poland, Rubinoff knew as a child the martial feeling inspired by the freedom today confronted with tyranny and treachery as Chopin knew it, the opus is appropriate as a current theme of the times. The Polonaise was written by Chopin with a burning spirit of national sympathy and has been heard to Carnegie Buried in Power.

He was more fortunate in preparing the new arrangement, Warsaw Concerto as the Composer, Richard Adenreth, worked with him on the transcribed violin version. Mr. Adenreth felt after hearing Rubinoff play the Concerto that it was a new revelation in depth of feeling as only the violin could express it.

**NEWS 'N NOTES**

Lots of shoppers are finding pork a good addition to their outdoor cookery repertoire. You'll probably notice that ham cuts vary less in price than other pork cuts from season to season, so ham may prove to be an excellent choice for the grill.

This is the time of year when most fresh pork cuts tend to increase in price. Generally, less pork comes to market at this time of year. Even so you can find some good values in pork cuts, if you shop and compare. Center cut pork chops, of course, cost the most. Rib end or loin end cost less per pound, but you also get more bone. One caution when shopping for pork to grill, buy the cut thick enough so that the inside stays juicy when the meat is done and ready to eat. Pick a cut at least a half inch thick.

A good way to use ham slices is:

- 1 Barbeque-Glazed Ham, 3 1/2 cup catsup.
- 2 tablespoons brown sugar.
- 1 1/2 tablespoons Dijon-style mustard.
- 1 1/2 tablespoons Worcestershire sauce.
- 2 tablespoons lemon juice.
- 2 teaspoons chili powder.
- 2 1/2 inch slices fully cooked ham (about 1 1/2 pounds).

Mix first 6 ingredients for sauce. Slice fat edge of ham. Brush meat liberally with sauce; let stand 1 hour. Grill over coals 5 to 10 min.

## New Area Land Fill Site Is Officially Dedicated

The new Lincoln County Land Fill was officially opened on Saturday, Aug. 15 at a site about 10 miles northeast of Ruidoso. The land fill is the termination of many months of negotiation and study by the board of county commissioners, and it is hoped that the new facility will satisfy the needs of the communities involved for many years to come. The fill is comprised of two trenches, one of which is for the disposal of carcasses of dead animals, and the other for garbage and refuse.

Annual permits, which are good from July 1 through June 30, may be obtained at the county clerk's office in the courthouse in Carrizozo or on the site. Annual permits for motels will be \$50 but the commissioners pointed out that this price was set for the larger motels out of the city limits in mind and that exceptions could be made for smaller units. Annual permits for residents outside the city limits will be \$15.

## Crown Presents Rotary Program, White House Conference On Aging

The program for the Tuesday, Aug. 18 meeting of the Ruidoso Rotary Club was presented by Rev. Frank Crown of Ruidoso. A member of the local Committee on Aging, Crown discussed the Second White House Conference on Aging to be held in 1971.

The first conference on aging was held in 1961, and this second conference has been called by President Nixon to construct a more realistic and comprehensive national policy for older Americans through community, state and national forums.

Nixon is asking all older Americans to get together during the week of Sept. 20, 1970 to do three things:

1. To speak out about their problems and needs;
2. To establish priorities;
3. To hear possible solutions for their problems and to act locally or pass these solutions on to a higher level.

Governor Cargo is in the process of trying to get each community to set up a local committee on aging. Ruidoso Mayor, George White is now setting up a committee for this community. Crown said that the purpose of the local committee will be to obtain the co-operation and help of the churches, service clubs and individuals of the community in the effort.

Among statistics concerning aging Americans which Crown listed to the Rotarians were: one out of 10 Americans have reached or are past their 65th birthday; there are over 20 million older citizens in America today; the rate of older citizens in the country grows by 900 per day, or 1/3 of a million per year. 1970 census figures show Ruidoso's population at 2,040 compared with 1,657 in 1960, which represents a growth of 30% in the last 10 years. This is the second high-

est percentage of growth of a New Mexico city in the last 10 years, second only to Espanola which showed a 105% increase in population. New Mexico on the whole showed a decrease in population.

According to these figures, if Ruidoso is typical, there are now 340 people in Ruidoso age 65 or over, 170 of which are over 75 and 20 of which are over 85.

## Ruidoso Council Meets In Regular Commissioners Session — Sharp and Sweet

The governing body of the village of Ruidoso, meeting in regular session, Thursday, Aug. 13, covered matters ranging from hospitals to hostilities, along with normal routine village business. The session was attended by all members of the official governing group and held in the council chambers.

Following several routine business matters Mayor George F. White read a request from the Ruidoso - Hondo Valley General Hospital board of trustees. The hospital board requested the village to vacate a designated street immediately west of the hospital.

The street in question has never been opened for use and joins property owned by Dalton Ross. The board's request stated that the area would be used as an emergency road and that Hill-Burton funds could not be used unless it was a part of the hospital complex.

The governing body was informed that the Village Planning and Zoning Commission had recently voted to approve the vacating of the designated roadway. The trustees unanimously voted to vacate the road as requested by the hospital.

During the meeting Councillman Wayne Estes, officially on the agenda, read a prepared four-page letter in which he began by stating: "I think that in all fairness, I should correct several points made in Mayor White's Letter To The Editor in the last issue of the paper." In his prepared statement Estes questioned the Mayor's understanding and hearing concerning the budget for the Humane Society. Estes maintained that his motion was to simply "negotiate with the Society to get the Village out of the dog business."

The councilman also challenged the Mayor's right to delete an item in the budget which was "duly moved, seconded and passed by the council as prescribed by law." Mayor White responded to Estes' statement by saying that he did not change or delete the budget he only suggested it to the state finance officer. The item in question referred to a \$2,500 item which, originally suggested by the village, was to be included in the budget towards the future hiring of a village subdivision inspector.

Regarding the deletion, Estes read, "The cost of \$7,500 per year for a qualified engineer for the village is not too unfeasible when you realize that during the past three years engineering fees have been over \$56,000!"

In his prepared statement, Estes also called the Mayor's attention to "A savings in order." Estes said, "Here again I can answer with facts and figures. . . Under the immediate past administration: Mayor Davis, Councillman Herb Brunell, Dr. James Beall, Elmer Pirelli, and myself, the village of Ruidoso finished the fiscal year with every department operating in the black. There was no transfer of money from one department to another and this was the first time in 24 years, the incorporated life of the village of Ruidoso that this had been accomplished!"

Following Estes' report the Mayor stated that he would accept if and that he had some things he wanted the people to know regarding the municipal airport, swimming pool, etc. At this point Councillman Estes interrupted the Mayor to which the Mayor responded, "Don't interrupt me . . . I will have you ejected."

In other matters of business the council voted to instruct the village engineer to proceed with preliminary steps for a new pavilion. They also agreed with Councillman Pirelli that immediate steps be taken to rid the city of "hazardous buildings." Pirelli requested a list of those buildings already determined by the fire department as fire hazards and also requested that copies of resolutions be posted and mailed to property owners showing building violations.

Mayor White, with the council's unanimous consent, appointed Victor M. Brooks to the Police Department. The Mayor refused to set upon a request by the Humane Society of Lincoln County to consider an agreement between the village and the society regarding animal control. He advised the trustees to study the proposal. The Mayor informed the council that he could not make a decision until he had time to further study the agreement.

The Lincoln County Commissioners met in regular meeting on Tuesday, Aug. 18 with Civil Defense representatives from Santa Fe to discuss civil defense programs for the communities in Lincoln County. They considered the possibility of Civil Defense Package Training Program Workshops for the various communities this fall. John Harrelson, civil defense director for the county, was present for the commissioners' meeting.

In other action the commissioners approved an addition to Pawn Ridge Subdivision located outside the municipality of Ruidoso, owned by Sam Montgomery, and agreed to put out a notice for bids on a 1/2-ton pick-up truck, a 1-ton truck and a used crawler tractor-dozzer-ripper to be used at the sanitary land fill.

The agreement as drawn by the society had suggested "at least a written report will be submitted by the Society every 90 days." The words, "at least" were also deleted by the council.

The written agreement stated that the society's authority would be limited to the enforcement of the ordinances pertaining to animal control and rabies control.



**MAYOR GEORGE P. WHITE**

**RUIDOSO MAYOR ISSUES STATEMENT**

A man may run for office for many reasons. I think that most men who run for office are well motivated. However, once elected personal motivation must take a back seat to personal duty. The function of Mayor is to preside over the governing body. The Mayor cannot even vote, except to break a tie vote. While the term may have a rather expansive meaning for a small village, the Mayor is the Chief Executive Officer, by statute and by ordinance. The statutes say the Mayor "shall cause the ordinances and regulations of the village to be obeyed." There is nothing permissive about this.

So, how do we do this? The purpose of a council meeting is to discuss matters, to exchange ideas, to consider reasonably and soundly, and to give interested citizens an opportunity to attend and be heard.

Our village regulations require that all contracts and documents be delivered at least three days prior to each meeting. While I can see that certain "emergencies" may arise, the purpose is to cause the exercise of considered judgment.

It is somewhat astonishing to review recent events. At our council meeting August 13, 1970, it was quite evident that an employment contract had not been read and considered by all present, having just been presented. I stated that I wished to defer action to the next meeting so that the agreement could be reviewed.

At 10:22 a.m. at the race track in the Village of Ruidoso Downs, on August 14, 1970, our Marshall "served" me with a notice of a special meeting to be held in Ruidoso in 30 minutes. The avowed purpose was to discuss this same employment contract.

I feel that this action is unreasonable and arbitrary, if not otherwise capricious. Is this the beginning of a new era when special meetings will be called on 30 minutes notice every time a Mayor, or opposing Councilman, is out of town, or employed and unable to drop everything and race back to the Village? I do not believe that this is reasonable. It has the effect of all the hazards set forth above, and the more immediate effect of making another man your Mayor, even if only pro-tem.

I submit that our affairs cannot be managed in this fashion. I do feel that citizens who are interested in duly constituted government should make their position clear, while they still have an opportunity to do so. It may be later than you think.

**Mescalero Cattle Auction Held**

A total of 2380 head of beef cattle were auctioned Saturday (Aug. 15) at the annual Mescalero Apache Cattle Growers Association sale, according to W. A. Lujan, extension livestock specialist, at New Mexico State University. Livestock were sold in lots of 125 for steers and heifers, in lots of 150 for old cows, and lots of 30 for old bulls.

Top price was \$40.25 per hundredweight for a lot of 125 steer calves estimated to weigh 325 pounds at delivery date Oct. 1 to Dec. 15.

Lowest price on steer calves was \$40.75 per cwt. Heifers ranged from \$40 to \$37.75 per cwt. Cows ranged from \$19.75 to \$20.50 per cwt. One lot of 30 bulls sold for \$20.50 per cwt.

The volume buyer of the sale was W. F. Parker, Arriba, Colo., who bought 1250 head of steers and heifers. Other buyers were from Kansas, Oklahoma and Texas.

Prior to the sale, buyers toured the reservation to see representative cattle offered for sale.

### Brazilian Agricultural Economists Schedule Visit In Ruidoso Downs

Seven Brazilian agricultural economists will tour Chaves, Quay, Roosevelt, Curry, Harding, Torrance and Lincoln Counties of New Mexico Aug. 17 through Aug. 24.

The group spent Thursday and Friday, Aug. 13 and 14, on the New Mexico State University campus in Las Cruces. Their trip throughout the state is coordinated by Ted Arvizo, assistant to the Director of International Programs at NMSU.

The Brazilian agricultural economists have been visiting five United States universities prominent in agricultural economics. These are Ohio State University, Purdue University, Michigan State University, New Mexico State University and the University of California at Riverside.

The group is traveling throughout the United States sponsored by the Agency for International Development in cooperation with the U. S. Department of Agriculture and Land Grant Colleges and Universities.

On Monday, Aug. 17, the Brazilians traveled to Roswell where they toured the de-calling plant, observed Artesia well and crop irrigation, observe a feed lot operation from warm-up to finish feeding and toured Glover Packing Co.

Tuesday morning, Aug. 18, the group arrived in Portales where they toured a dairy farm and observed underground and sprinkler irrigation systems. Tuesday afternoon the Brazilians traveled to Clovis where they visited the Worley Feed Mills and participated in a livestock auction.

They spent Wednesday, Aug. 19 in Harding and Quay counties. They joined the New Mexico Hereford Association Ranch Tour at the Linda Lambert Ranch and completed the tour in Tucuman. The agricultural economists then toured the bull testing program in Tucuman.

In Torrance County on Thursday, they visited farms to observe potato culture, storage and marketing. The Brazilians will also participate in a discussion on "Transition Problems from Dryland Farming to Irrigated Farming." They will also note the Estancia conversion of land in the

vicinity to crop production.

The final day of the Brazilian tour of New Mexico will be spent in Lincoln County. They will tour the New Mexico State University Fort Stanton College Ranch where they will study the cattle cross-breeding program, and range research and experiments. Later in the day the visiting agricultural economists will tour Ruidoso Downs Race Track where they will discuss the track's contribution to the community.

The barns were north of the lodge across the creek and his cattle ranged where Cree Meadow Golf Course is now.




