One Who Remains Forever Young  
But right now I want to tell you about a friend of all of us who is an inspiration and a bright ray of hope to all of us who see the tribulations and the years of this world looking higher and higher upon the

Mayor of a Village That Is Becoming World-Famous  
The Village of Ruidoso Downs—did I think back when there was nothing here but the White Sulphur Inn, that this community called Pale Verde, and the Green Trees, would become world famous. Yet, what with the World's Highest Horse Race; The Quarter Horse Racing Capital of the World; and all this coupled with the color and fame of Ruidoso and Lincoln County itself—what with all this, I say, this little village has become known all over the world.

Zeke Scott, the mayor of Ruidoso Downs, is one of the most remarkable men you could find anywhere. At age seventy-five, he looks more like forty-five; and he gives the laugh to the idea that you have to get old in years. Truly, Zeke has lived the "Fountain of Youth" since you are lucky enough to have a friend like Zeke Scott, you cannot help wondering what it is in his life that makes him stay so young, healthy and cheerful. To see Zeke, as he works at his carpenter's trade, (which he has followed for twenty-five years) to notice his pink cheek, his cheerful smile, and the merry twinkle in his blue eyes—you would think he

had never known care and hardship. Yet, enough sorrow, trouble and hardship has come into the life of Zeke Scott to fill two or three lifetimes.

But we will pass lightly over this; because as Zeke says, "I made it a rule, long years ago, not to pass my troubles on to the other fellow. What I always try to do is make the other fellow's troubles lighter; and if we do this we help both ourselves and the other man too. If you can help the other man forget his troubles, even for five minutes, you have helped him and yourself."

All this is part of Zeke's way of life—of being a day-to-day Christian Gentleman in his every day life. He was a Bible School teacher for two years while he lived in Oklahoma and has read the Bible through twice, "from Kivver to Kivver."

Brief Sketch of Zeke's Life  
On Washington's birthday, Feb. 22, 1895 on a farm near Russellville, Ark., Zeke Scott was born. If you will look closely at Zeke you can notice that in his features and expression he resembles "The Father of our Country" upon whose birthday he was born.

After Zeke had attended a year of school in a one-room country school, and Zeke was about six or seven years old, the family began a journey westward toward Oklahoma, which was then Indian Territory. The family, including father, mother, two sisters, younger brother, and older brother and his wife—journeyed in two wagons, driving a herd of cattle, riding horseback, and walking part of the time.

The two most vivid memories of this trip for Zeke are the time one of the cattle got caught in the quick sand crossing the South Canadian River and had to be pulled out; and the time he fell off the black pony he and his younger brother took turns riding.

"I still carry the scar from that fall," says Zeke, feeling the back of his head.

Arriving at Indian territory after a month of five weeks' trip, the family settled one hundred miles east of Oklahoma City, near the settlements of Dewevka and Holdenville, on some farm land they leased from the Creek Indians. Zeke spoke highly of the people of the Creek Nation and of the happy days of farm life in frontier Oklahoma.

brother, father and myself, cut up a wagon bed full of oak firewood with a ribbon timber saw and sold it for a dollar and a half. That much money would buy a lot in those days."

Different Kinds of Work  
Andrew Carnegie, the founder of the American Steel Industry, when asked what his secret of success or his magic word might be, answered in the brief speech of his favorite Scottish, "Work."

Zeke Scott feels pretty much the same. He has been farmer, oil field worker, vegetable grower, ornamental rock worker and carpenter.

"I think it has helped me to keep my health and youth, to have done different kinds of work, and I think it is greatly important for us to keep busy at some kind of work. This is great, applying, both mentally and physically." This is an important part of Zeke's philosophy.

Give the Young Folks A Break  
Mayor Zeke's city-marshal Jerry Burgess is the youngest city marshal in the history of Ruidoso Downs, and here again is part of Zeke's philosophy.

"I think it is very important that

We give our young a chance to prove themselves. They are the ones who will be taking over the leadership of our country and our nation. They deserve a chance to gain experience for future leadership, and we, the rest of the people, will reap rich rewards for the opportunities and encouragement we give our young people."

In this connection, Zeke praised three of the young people on his staff: Jerry Burgess, city marshal; Jack Keller, Sanitation Department; and Andrew Miller, Water Department.

"We are giving these young fellows a chance to make men of themselves, and they are coming through and giving a good account of themselves. I am very pleased with them," said Mayor Scott.

A Tremendous Future For Ruidoso Downs  
Regarding the future of his home community Zeke says, "With full cooperation of all concerned, the village of Ruidoso Downs has the greatest potential—or I may say fully as great a potential, as any small village in the State of New Mexico. And I am very happy to say that the cooperation and help of my fellow citizens is increasing every day."

We are all proud of Zeke Scott as a great friend and neighbor, and we wish him continued success in his work of making his community a better place in which to live.

## Trinity Site Tour Set For Oct. 4

The Alamogordo Chamber of Commerce is sponsoring a Trinity Site Tour on Oct. 4 to view the site of the explosion of the first atomic bomb near Alamogordo. The charge is made for the tour and reservations are not necessary. Alamogordo Chamber of Commerce address: Alamogordo Chamber of Commerce, 100 S. 4th St., Alamogordo, N.M. 88001.

The tour will leave the Alamogordo Chamber of Commerce building on U. S. 84-70 at 8:30 a.m. Oct. 4. Cars from other areas should meet at the Alamogordo Center on U. S. 84, 1/2 mile east of San Antonio and 1/2 mile west of Carlsboro.

A Military Police escort is required for the tour group. A non-commissioned officer will be in charge of the entire trip on White Sands Missile Range. All cars must be at the gate entrance promptly at 10:00 a.m. and no one will be permitted to enter after the caravan has passed through the gate.

The tour will last approximately 7 hours with the return trip to the Alamogordo Chamber of Commerce building on U. S. 84-70 at 5:00 p.m. The tour will be allowed on an individual basis. Participants are required to take their own lunch and drinking water, and no one will be allowed on the tour. The first atomic test operation, known as Project Trinity, took place on the morning of Monday, July 16, 1945, in the north-central portion of the Alamogordo bombing and Gunnery Range. Headquarters of the bombing and Gunnery Range were located at Alamogordo Army Air Field, known since 1948 as Holloman Air Force Base, but the explosion site was actually nearer the town of Carlsboro, about 30 miles away from Alamogordo, which was sixty miles away.

tion arrived some seconds later. But the shock still knocked out the men at one of the observation posts. Although no information on the explosion was used as a weapon during the war, people in surrounding areas were quite aware that something special had happened in the early morning of July 16. The light flash and sound blast made a vivid impression over a radius of roughly 100 miles. News was broadcast 100 miles away in Silver City. And Chicago newspapers carried an item on the explosion of a munitions dump somewhere in New Mexico.

There was considerable excitement in New Mexico later in the year over the discovery of cattle with curiously spotted hides and hair, apparently as a result of fallout from the atom test. But the site itself was kept off limits to the public until September 1953 when a group estimated at between 300 and 700 persons came for a "strictly public show" of the site.

By this time the Government had decided that the site should be a national monument. However, the site is still restricted, if only because it still lies within a military test range. In effect, the Alamogordo bombing and Gunnery Range was closed and after that 1953 an Air Force "closed" military reservation which in turn was designated in September 1957 with adjacent Army lands to form the special service White Sands Missile Range. Government officials at the White Sands Missile Range have set the following rules and restrictions for the Oct. 4 tour:

No weapons of any kind are permitted while on the missile range. Cameras must be placed in the glove compartment or trunk of the car. Photography is not permitted anywhere on the tour except at Trinity site. Visitors will be told when photography is permissible. No one is to enter the restricted area. Visitors may not pick up objects in the area. Visitors are asked to stay on marked roads. Signs must be placed in restricted areas. The visit is restricted to one-and-one-half hours after the time of arrival at the Trinity site. Everyone should have plenty of gasoline, a spare tire, sufficient water and food, and comfortable clothing.

"There is considerable misunderstanding about nursing home payments under Medicare in New Mexico." Bill Riggs, social security field representative, reports. This is of particular concern to the 67,400 New Mexico citizens over 65 who are eligible for the hospital (Part A) part of Medicare. Only limited coverage for full-time skilled nursing care and other health services provided in the nursing home can be paid for under Medicare. Many people believe that the law pays up to a hundred days of nursing home services under any circumstances. This is not true.

In approving the Medicare law, Congress specified that in order to qualify for nursing home care under Medicare, the patient must have need for a special type of care following discharge from the



The Lincoln National Forest is presently experiencing a heavy infestation of the pine beetle. It primarily attacks young ponderosa pine. Occasionally larger ones are attacked. The beetle kills trees individually and in small groups. The infestation to date covers approximately 100,000 acres in the Lincoln National Forest and the adjacent Mesquero Apache Indian Reservation. The infestation appears to be moving north. At present Mesquero and White Tail are on the northern boundaries. Surveys were made in 1970 to determine the extent and intensity of the infestation. Approximately 300,000 individual trees, at the rate of two to four trees per acre, are infested. Some or all of these trees may die this year. The infestation may kill many trees in the next three or four years. The history of the insect indicates that outbreaks of this kind occur periodically in wild forest stands. The outbreaks occur in cycles, build to epidemic proportions, and then gradually subside.

A cost-benefit analysis of the present beetle outbreak indicates that direct control measures are too costly for the timber resource benefits that would be derived. We do not believe that the infestation will affect overall timber production from the Lincoln National Forest. Of the excessive number of trees growing on the area, only a small percentage will be killed. Natural beauty will be impaired for the next few years as the crowns turn brown during the dying process. However, we do not believe the Forest Service can justify spending several million dollars to eliminate a situation that is a natural ecological process. It is nature's way of controlling the less vigorous individuals in a population. Weakened trees are usually the most susceptible to beetle attacks. If your trees are too crowded to grow properly or if they have been infected with mistletoe, they may be successfully attacked by the beetles. By removing mistletoe trees and reducing the number of trees per acre, the remaining trees have a good chance to survive. There are some indirect control measures which can be helpful:

**Conway Speaks On Narcotics Problems**

John E. Conway, Republican candidate for State Senator from Otero and Lincoln counties, spoke last week to the Lincoln County Republican Women's Club at the Tully Ranch near Glenora. Conway discussed the narcotics problem and stated that if elected he would introduce legislation for a new judicial district composed of Lincoln and Otero Counties. The candidate stated, "The Third Judicial District includes Dona Ana, Otero, and Lincoln counties. The judicial district can be changed only in the legislative sessions following the national census. I believe that an elected district judge and district attorney responsible only to the people of our two counties will result in less delay from arrest to prosecution and in better utilization of personnel. At the present time Lincoln County is without the services of an assistant district attorney either on full or part-time basis. Conway also said that he felt there was not enough communication between the voters and the members of the legislature during the legislative session. He stated that he would return to the district on weekends whenever possible during the session to meet with the people to discuss pending legislation.

### Late Rally Falls Short For Warriors As They Bow To Demons, 30-27

Although scoring first against the Dexter Demons, the Warriors enjoyed a brief lead as they played catchup football from the second period until the final gun last Friday night at Dexter and came out losing to the Demons, 30-27.

Sophomore quarterback Blaine Miller hit halfback Danny Bell on a 53-yard screen pass in the waning moments of the first quarter to give Ruidoso an early 6-0 lead over the Demons. Miller also split the uprights for the extra point.

Dexter came roaring right back after the Warriors' TD and never gave up possession of the ball as they stayed on the ground and went 61 yards in 18 running plays from 5-yards out for the Demons' first touchdown of the game. Quarterback Gary Shaw made good the extra points on a reverse and Dexter took the lead 8-7, which they kept throughout the rest of the game.

The Demons scored again in the second quarter from 3-yards out

on a pass play from Shaw to Eddie VandenBout and ran for another 2-points after to increase their lead to 16-7 at halftime.

The two teams traded touchdowns in the third quarter Grassie going over from one yard out for Dexter and Miller hitting Darwin Beal for the first of three TD passes to Beal from 24 yards out to put the score at 24-15 at the end of the third quarter.



### Game Bird Season Set by Department

A 65-day continuous quail season was set last week by the New Mexico State Game Commission at its September meeting.

The statewide season, which will run from Oct. 31 through Jan. 3, 1971, has a bag limit of 15 quail per day with 30 in possession, singly or in aggregate of all species. Legal shooting time is one-half hour before sunrise to sunset.

In addition, the Commission approved the recommended seasons for prairie chickens and pheasants. Prairie chicken dates are Dec. 5 through Dec. 7 in the southeast portion of the state, with bag limit of three and possession limit of six birds. Legal shooting hours for prairie chicken and pheasants are one-half hour before sunrise to sunset.

The pheasant season is Nov. 28 through Nov. 29, statewide, with a limit of two cocks per day.

During the 65 day quail season, sections of the Bosque del Apache National Refuge will open to quail and rabbit hunting. Refuge land lying east of the Bureau of Reclamation channelization project and lands lying west of the AT&SF railroad right-of-way will be open.

The bag limit on the all-species quail season is the same as the one approved last year although the previous season was a long one. It was split by the big game seasons. This year, the season will continue through the big game seasons with the early opening giving hunters a chance to harvest some of the quail that are lost to natural mortality.





## Traffic Tips

By DANIEL AUSTIN

**1. Upon all roadways of sufficient width a vehicle shall be driven upon the right half of the roadway, and where practical, entirely to the right of the center line, except as follows:**  
 A. When overtaking and passing another vehicle proceeding in the same direction under the rules governing such movement.  
 B. When the right half of a roadway is closed to traffic while under construction or repair.  
 C. Upon a roadway divided into three (3) marked lanes for traffic under applicable thereof; or  
 D. Upon a roadway designated and signposted for one-way traffic.  
 E. Upon all roadways any vehicle proceeding at less than the normal speed of traffic at the time and place and under the conditions then existing shall be driven in the right-hand lane then available for traffic, or as close as practicable to the right-hand curb or edge of the roadway, except when overtaking and passing another car proceeding in the same direction or when preparing for a left turn at an intersection or into a private road or driveway.  
 In our area this law is very much abused, due to the terrain. Drivers are prone to cut to the inside of curves, to cross the center stripe. They also are sightseeing and weave from side to side across the center stripe.  
 We have many bad accidents from this type of violation. Most head-on collisions occur from this infraction of law, these head-ons generally have fatalities involved.

## Fort Stanton Art Rated Excellent

The school art exhibit from Fort Stanton received an overall excellent-plus rating at this year's New Mexico State Fair in Albuquerque. The exhibit, which was completing with all public and private schools throughout New Mexico, represented the work of 70 students. # Innovative Program Begun At White Mountain School

"Instead of 'new' or 'different' we like to refer to it as 'better,'" said Sid Miller, Ruidoso Elementary School Principal referring to a program involving some major innovations at White Mountain Elementary School this year. Miller explained to a group of approximately 130 parents and other members of the community in a general meeting last Thursday night that many of the changes being made are "new" only to this area and this school system, but that some involve concepts that are actually quite old.

The meeting was held just prior to an open house at White Mountain for the purpose of explaining to parents the new program and allowing them a chance to visit their child's classroom, meet his teachers and ask any questions they might have. White Mountain incorporates grades 1-4.

The basic innovation at the school is a non-graded reading program which, in essence, allows a child to progress at his own rate at a level which is neither too difficult, and therefore discouraging, nor too easy, and therefore boring. Miller had nothing but praise for his staff of teachers for the many hours of planning and hard work involved in remodeling the traditional system. "They work all day, go home and plan some more, and then dream about it at night!" he said.

Miller spoke briefly and then introduced a group of teachers and aides who each explained one facet of the new program. They included Nellie Ruth Jones, who explained the non-graded reading program; Nancy McCarty, who spoke on the testing involved in the program; Susan Miller, team teaching; Louise Bruce, reading levels and progress reports; Mary McNeil, special education; Helen Brown, teacher aide program; Gayle Petty, perceptual education; Karen Heckman, volunteer aides; Fessie Cole, phonics; Carey Lois Godley, teacher planning; and Peggy Crostio, library and Title I project.

The non-graded reading program involves 11 reading levels based on the Lippincott Basic Reading Series rather than the traditional grades one through three, with level 1-4 roughly equivalent to the first year, levels 5-7 equivalent to the second year, levels 8 and 9 to the third year, and levels 10 and 11 designated as "enrichment levels."

A system of tests are used to determine at which level to place beginners and to discover when a child has mastered one level and is ready to move on, and the teachers stressed that extreme care would be used to see that a child is never put, in a reading level where the work is too difficult for him.

Mrs. Jones told the parents Thursday night that the big advantage of the new system over the old is that now every child can have "at least one successful learning experience during the day." The children are much happier when they are working at their own level because they are learning. They are not discouraged by work that is too difficult for them to master, nor are the faster learners held back by the rest of the class. Students don't either pass or fail now, they just work at their own level and have a lot more fun, Mrs. Jones said.

She also felt that the new system is more enjoyable to the children in that they are not limited to one personality during the day, and by the same token the teachers enjoy meeting with different groups of children.

Replacing report cards carrying the traditional letter-grades will be "progress reports" to be sent home every 6 weeks or whenever the teacher feels that it is necessary. The reports will carry detailed, personal comments to be written by the teacher in the various disciplines, including reading, language arts, math, social studies and science and writing, as well as space for parent comments. Absences will not be listed on the reports, but if a teacher feels that a child has been absent too much she will include that in her comments.

The plant at White Mountain features some classrooms separated by folding doors, a situation which adapts itself well to the concept of team-teaching. Team-teaching was defined Thursday night as simply any situation in which two or more teachers work with one group of children. One teacher who utilizes this system at White Mountain, Susan Miller, explained the purpose and advantages of team teaching. The first big advantage she said was in the area of class preparation. A third grade teacher normally has to be prepared to teach 15 subjects, which means that she must spend a considerable amount of time in class preparation. In a team-teaching situation class presentations are split so that a teacher has more time to spend on fewer preparations, raising the quality of classroom presentations.

Another advantage to team-teaching lies in the fact that the students can receive more personal attention. If one or several students are having trouble with a new idea, one teacher can take them aside and work with them individually while the rest of the class moves on.

Also incorporated in the new program at White Mountain are programs by which students with unique problems affecting their learning will be given special attention. Mary McNeil has organized a special education program in which any child with disabilities affecting his performance can receive individual attention. The special education classroom will also be used for a child who is especially gifted and who has gone above his level in the third grade, Mrs. McNeil said.

Teacher Aides  
Mrs. Helen Brown is employed by White Mountain as a teacher aide and Karen Heckman is heading a group of parents to serve as volunteer aides this year. Their job is to supplement teachers in their duties which are educational in nature but needn't be done by a professional teacher. Mrs. Heckman said that parents who are interested in serving as volunteer aides, which entails about 2 hours of work a week, should call her to sign up for duty.

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# Students Spent Vacation Working

A sizeable majority of Ruidoso senior high school students spent their summer vacation working, results of a recent survey reveal. Dub Williams' Sociology and Economics class at Ruidoso High School questioned 178 students and discovered that of that number, 162 students (almost 95 per cent) had summer jobs.

They earned a total of \$58,175 (\$35,030 by the males and \$23,145 by the females) which averages \$359.10 per student. The group as a whole saved a total of \$20,273.70, an average of \$125.10 per student.

The survey also contained questions concerning the nature of the jobs the students held and how they spent their money. The most common jobs were at grocery stores, at the race track and service stations, and many spent their summer doing ranch work, construction work, baby sitting and yard work. A large majority of the girls who worked last summer were employed as waitresses, Williams said.

The main recurring items in response to the questions concerning how the working students spent their money included clothes, school supplies, car expenses, bills, (many of them hospital bills), insurance, shoes, gifts, trips and ski equipment.

The breakdown by class of amounts earned during the summer is as follows:  
Senior Males — \$10,922; senior females — \$5,905;  
Junior Males — \$9,726; junior females — \$5,815;  
Sophomore Males — \$11,681; sophomore females — \$6,615;  
Freshman Males — \$2,931; freshman females — \$2,907.
