Ernest Sanchez Appoints New Deputy Sheriff

Ernest Sanchez, Lincoln County Sheriff, announced this week his appointment of Leandro Vega, Jr., as Deputy Sheriff. Vega, a Lincoln County native, replaces Moses Sambrano who resigned recently to take another position with the county. The new deputy will be assigned to the Carrizosa area.

The newly appointed deputy sheriff is no stranger to law enforcement having served four years as a deputy, and, two, separately elected terms as Lincoln County Sheriff, Jan. 1, 1966 through Dec. 31, 1968. Highly qualified by law enforcement, Vega has attended numerous training schools including: specialized training in drugs, burglary, homicide and criminal investigation.

Until his recent employment with the sheriff's department, Vega was employed by the state of New Mexico as a supervisor at the Sierra Blanca Boys School.

In his announcement the Lincoln County Sheriff also reported on the department's activities during the first month of 1971. Sanchez stated that his department had housed a total of 52 prisoners during the month, served 796 meals, and served 80 court orders throughout the county.

His county wide report also revealed that the department had registered 8,000 miles and had answered 558 calls. They responded to 23 reports of vandalism or disorder and participated in one search and rescue mission in January.

A break down of the Lincoln County Jail's occupants through the month of January disclosed the following sentences being served: Illegal use of drugs, three; forgeries, two; possession of marijuana, one; stolen vehicle, one; tampering with a vehicle, one; disturbances, six; and drunkenness, twenty-four; possession of stolen property, one; batteries, six; worthless checks, one; allowing self to be served, one; assault, one; and murder, one.

The Ruidoso Board of Education, in its regular meeting held on Feb. 11, voted to sign contracts for another year with High School Principal Harold Longan and Elementary Principal Ed Miller.

A proposal by Superintendent Pat Vallant to study the possibility of a school bond election to build new vocational education buildings and typical existing buildings resulted in the authorization of Vallant and his staff to make a fact-finding survey and present it to the board for their consideration.

At the Feb. 11 meeting, the board members, Dave Parks and Ed Miller, were present.

A San Antonio, Texas newlywed's honeymoon was disrupted when the new bride was critically injured Wednesday afternoon following a one car freak accident in this mountain resort community. Married just four days, Mrs. Kathy Zane Smith, 23, wife of James Smith, was flown to El Paso's Hotel Dieu for emergency treatment shortly after the Wednesday afternoon mishap.

The accident occurred in the upper canyon of Ruidoso as Smith was reportedly taking a picture of his wife in front of the Whispering Pine Restaurant. The victim was apparently sitting on the base of a large sign off the roadway, when a car driven by Peggy Whitley, 40, Las Cruces, crashed into the base of the sign.

Mrs. Smith was rushed to the Ruidoso-Hondo Valley General Hospital by Chapel of Roses ambulance and later transferred to El Paso. The driver of the 1967 Cadillac, a lone occupant, was also taken to the local hospital for observation and released.

Investigating officer Carl Joren of the Ruidoso Police Department, following his investigation issued the driver a citation for driving while intoxicated and careless driving.

The couple, staying at the Story Book Cabins, were married Sunday, Feb. 13. He is a television station technician for KENS-TV, San Antonio, Texas.

The Lincoln County Development Association will meet on Tuesday, Feb. 23 in the Wortley Hotel in Lincoln starting at 6:30 p.m. with a no host dinner. The business meeting will start at 7:30 p.m. Business will include plans for 1971 and appointment of a nominating committee.

Ruidoso Council Approves Payment To Sewer Contractor

N. S. Shumway, contractor for Ruidoso's most recent municipal Sanitary Sewer project, appeared before the Ruidoso village council during their last regular meeting, Feb. 11, requesting final payment for the project. Shumway requested the village pay him \$19,450 plus \$1,760 interest.

Several council members expressed their dissatisfaction with the sewer project, stating that the sewer lines crossed village streets.

In response to the governing body's complaints regarding the project's street crossings, Shumway, in effect, stated that the patching was done according to the engineering requirements and that he had no control over the effect of the earth's shifting and weather elements and their apparent effect.

Shumway admitted that there were a few crossings that might be a fault of the contractor and that he was willing to go over the entire system with someone appointed by the village to check out the work. He said that he would repair work that both he and the village representatives agreed upon.

Trustee Elmer Perrelli told the group that he had "griped" about the sewer system at length but would admit that qualified engineers accepted the project and it was his opinion that the contractor should be paid.

Upon a motion by trustee Earl Allison to appoint Ruidoso Street Department Superintendent A. B. Chittwood, the council voted to agree with Shumway's request.

Trustee Wayne Estes moved that the council pay Shumway \$19,450 subject to Chittwood's report regarding patch work repairs. The motion, seconded by Elmer Perrelli, carried with trustee Allison abstaining from voting.

NUNLEY APPOINTED

In other action the council approved the Ruidoso Municipal Airport Committee's recommendation that L. Ray Nunley be appointed to the committee. Nunley, a local pharmacist and owner of Nunley's Drug, has been a resident of Ruidoso for five years.

The council also agreed upon the airport committee's recommendation that all aircraft be charged a \$10-down fee and set the fee per day at \$1.00 for light planes, \$2.00 for medium weight planes and \$3.00 for planes 12,000 pounds and over.

P AND Z DENIAL

Following a report from Rod Galbrow that the Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission had denied his request to use a downtown Ruidoso building for a cafe the council agreed upon a special joint meeting with the P and Z to discuss the matter. The request was apparently denied because of the inadequate off-street parking facilities as mentioned to be required in the current municipal zoning ordinance. The council agreed to meet with the P and Z on Wednesday, Feb. 17.

Main Street Improvement Continues To Gain Interest

The Ruidoso-Ruidoso Downs "Main Street Improvement Program" in recent weeks has gained both serious interest and positive action. At least one building is well underway in its remodeling project and several other businesses are finalizing plans for improvements.

The Perce-Parks and Associates building is nearing completion of both an expansion program and exterior remodeling changes. When completed the local real estate and insurance company will have around 2000 square feet of floor space which will include private conference rooms, closing contract room, storage and supply room, and a special customer lounge.

The exterior structure of both the building and the enlarged parking area has been architecturally designed to blend into the surrounding area as well as maintain a basic contemporary theme.

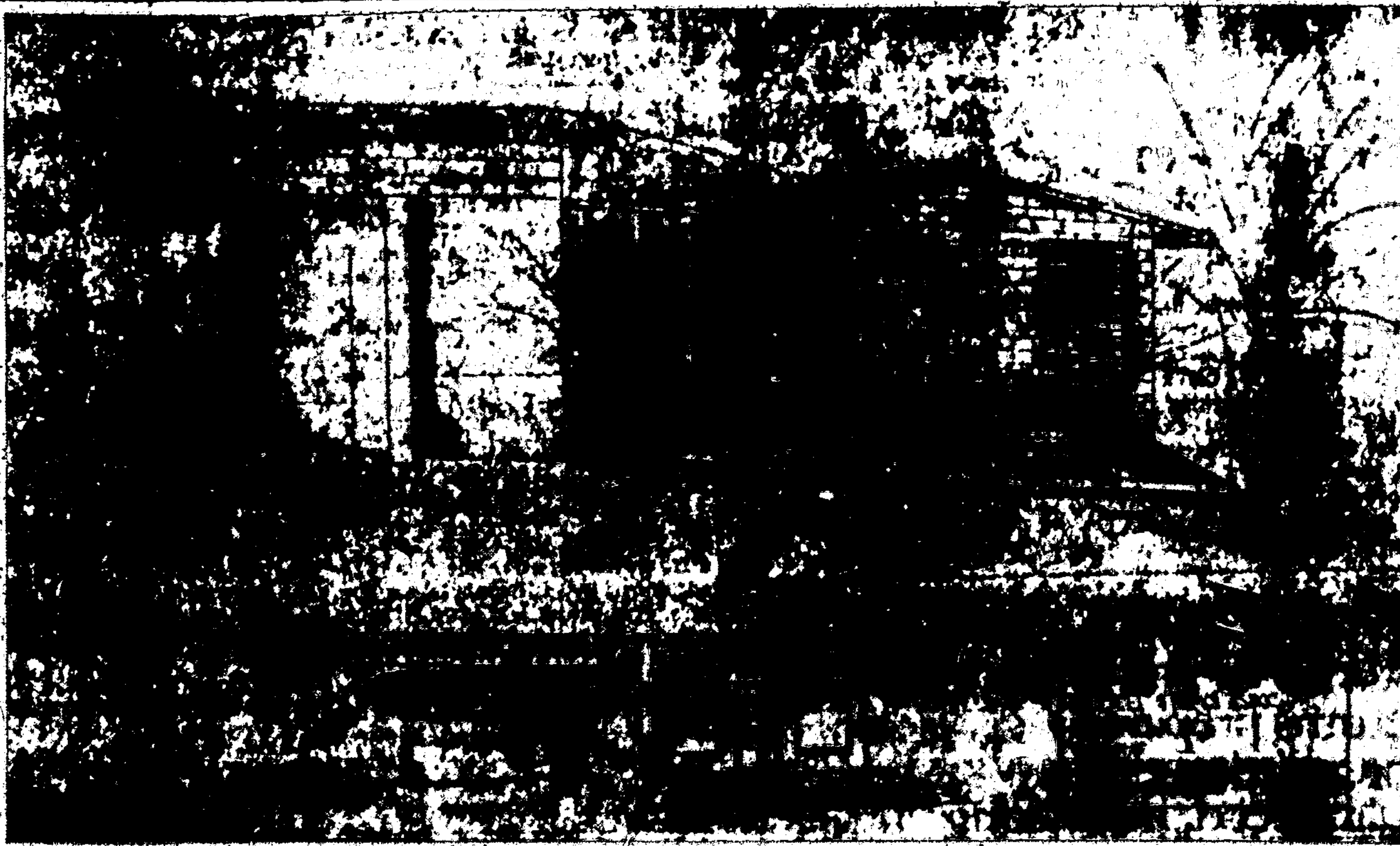
Included in the company's exterior changes and enlargement program was the purchase of the former Andy B. Bus residence immediately to the rear of the existing Perce-Parks building. Their im-

provement program calls for a complete interior and exterior remodeling of the former residence including joining the two buildings.

Tommy Perce, co-owner with Dave Parks, stated that the firm had for quite some time considered remodeling and updating their building. The local real estate broker remarked that "when the Ruidoso State Bank made a long term loan with low interest rates available in support of the village improvement program, we felt it was time to implement our plans."

Perce also had high praise for Mrs. Lindsey Butler of the Affirmative in Ruidoso for the architectural designing and professional consultation regarding their improvement plan.

The main street improvement program came as the results of a group of local businessmen who appeared before the Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission, Dec. 8, 1970, requesting their support for some type of main street improvement program. The Ruidoso P and Z unanimously voiced their

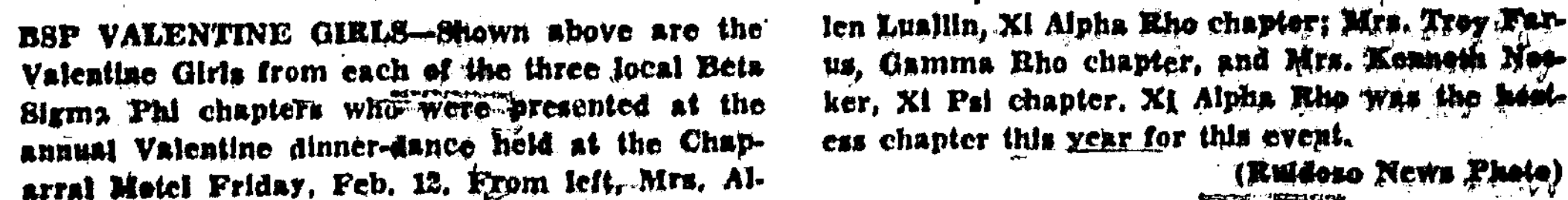

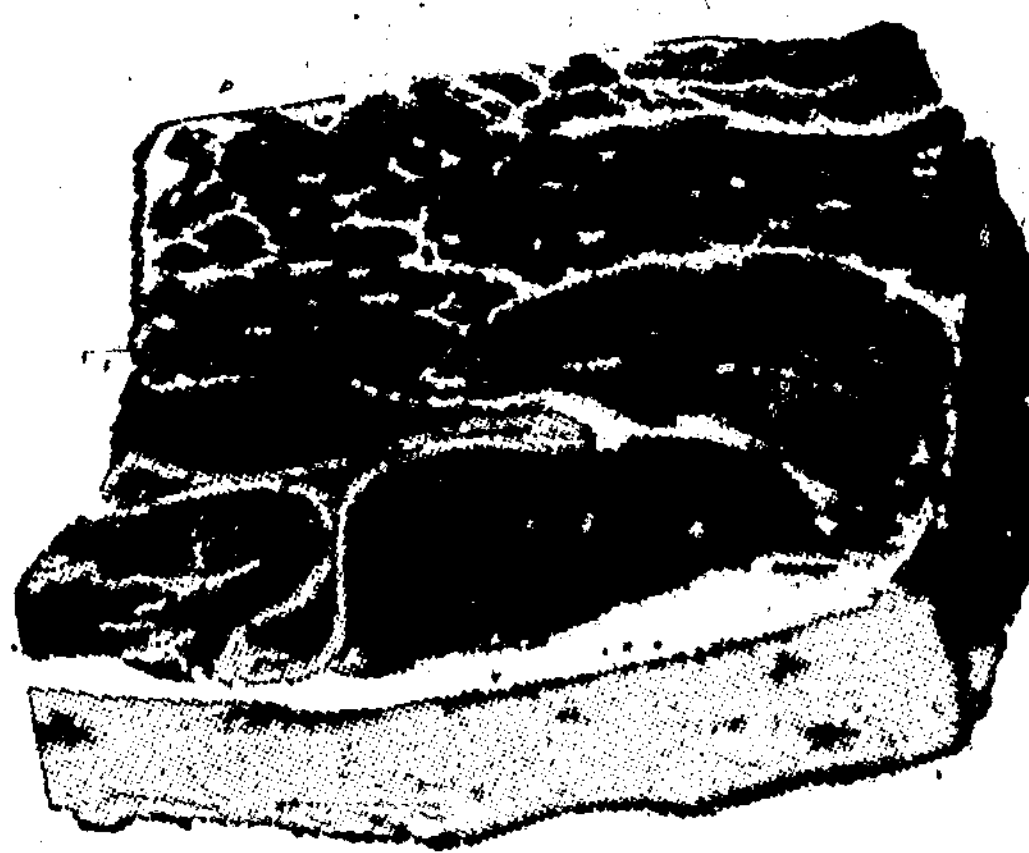

It has been and still is a strange year, ever since last summer. Since I first came here in 1925, last summer was the first that I was able to cross the creek every day. All the other years, the creek came up from one to two or three to several feet—and big floods, too, some of them.

What does this mean? This means that all last season not much rain fell up around the mountain. And right now the creek is lower than I have ever seen it in the month of February.

But what of that? I know it has been hard on the good ski folks. And drought is a serious matter with us all.

Yet we know that in due time the weather will straighten out. And more than likely we will get an abundance of moisture to make up for the skimpy season.

February, being the birthday month of Lincoln and Washington, is a time for us to remember to keep the faith. Trying times are good for us. They make us remember who we must turn to for the source of all good. And they make us draw closer together as good neighbors and brothers under God.

El Pobre Venadito
There is a beloved old Mexican song that I have been hearing most all of my life:

Soy un pobre venadito
Que habita en la serranía
Yo no bajo a la agua de día
Yo bajo a la agua de día
Por que me espanto de día.

(I am a poor little deer
Who lives in the mountains
I do not come down to water in the day time
I come down to drink at night
Because I am afraid in the day time.)

A few days before hunting season, as I would be driving toward the house after crossing the creek, just in the deepening dusk it would be a mother deer would appear a hundred feet or so in the head lights always at the same spot, going to water, followed ten or twelve feet behind by her little fawn.

The fawn, a little copy of his mother in form and color, always quickly copied his mother's every move: stopping when she stopped, working his large ears in listening as she did, pointing his nose in the air the instant she did.

During hunting season, I did not see these two, then a few days after the season, here in the head-

lights at the usual spot was the fawn, all by himself. Stopping, looking, sniffing the air—as his mother had taught him, but trembling and starting from time to time, his eyes wide and flashing green and red. How do I know he is a little buck? Because his mother has taught him to be constantly cautious, to leave nothing to chance, to play all the cards in the deck. Young though he is, he already knows his whole life is a constant and ever-increasing fight. And this fight is "win or take all."

Most every night he comes down, knowing his way a little better each time, though still in the shock of grief. He cannot understand what has happened to his only friend, his very life; but he goes on, coming down to his water, following her teachings and guided by her spirit.

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R. C. Scribner Named Lincoln County Heart Fund Chairman

Mr. Jack Daniels, 1971 Honorary State Heart Fund Chairman, today announced the appointment and acceptance of Mr. Robert C. Scribner of Ruidoso, as the Lincoln County Heart Fund Chairman for 1971.

Mr. Scribner, himself a victim of heart disease, is a rancher in the Ruidoso area, having taken up ranching after retiring from the United States Marine Corps as a fighter pilot. Mr. Scribner and family have lived in the Ruidoso area for seven and a half years; they have five children, four at home and one in college.

Upon his acceptance of the 1971 Lincoln County Heart Fund chairmanship, Mr. Scribner said that he believes wholeheartedly in the programs and goals of the New Mexico Heart Association, and is in complete accord with the effort of the Heart Association at the national level of 'Conquest of Heart and Cardiovascular Diseases in the '70's by Total Public Involvement.' His desire is to make the public aware of the fact that 54% (1,028,390) of all deaths in the United States are caused by heart disease, whereas cancer comprises 17% (318,918) and accidents and all other causes combined account for 29% (582,710). Though heart attack deaths alone claim some 608,000 victims annually, the death rate from heart attacks could be reduced by about 70% if all persons could be educated to recognize heart attack symptoms and to seek immediate medical attention. The New Mexico Heart Association is doing its utmost to educate the people of this state in this respect.

Mr. Scribner expressed his confidence in the cooperation and ability of the people of Lincoln County to exceed their projected fund raising goal of \$4,000. He urges all his fellow-citizens to comply with the New Mexico Heart Association motto of "Give Today—One Hour's Pay—To Drive Heart Disease Away." Mr. Scribner urgently requests everyone to mail in their contributions to the Lincoln

The Warriors will compete in a tournament beginning Friday in Carrizozo.

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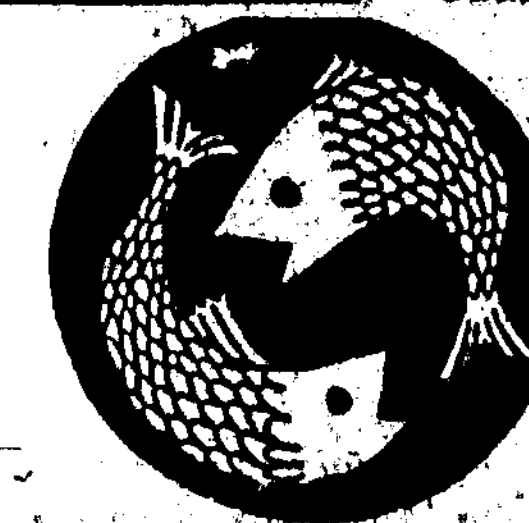

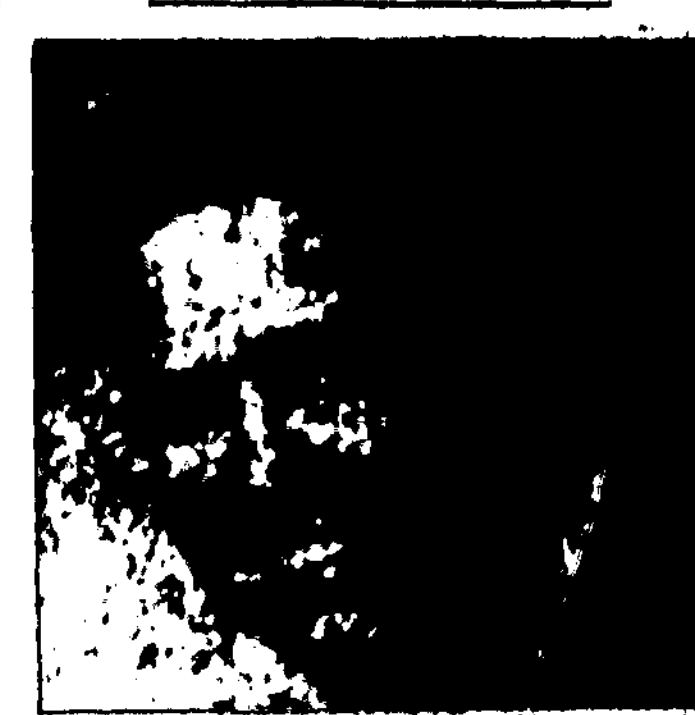

Conway From The Capital

On Monday the New Mexico Senate passed the judicial redistricting bill for Lincoln and Otero Counties. The bill that I introduced was part of this composite redistricting bill, and it now goes to the House Judiciary Committee. Under this bill, Lincoln and Otero Counties would have one judge and an elected district attorney. Initially the district attorney would be appointed by the Governor and then run for office in 1972.

A great number of controversial bills are now being considered: several on ecology, Sunday liquor sales, and a bill to abolish our statutes on abortion. There are also several controversial bills now being considered in the House, but the Senate actually hears very little about these bills unless they pass the House, and then come to the Senate.

One of the frustrating aspects of being in the legislature is to have to vote against a bill which you actually think is good in theory. This happened to me this week on the bill presented to make the district attorneys of the State full-time elected officials. At the present time a district attorney can have a private law practice along with his duties as district attorney. Basically, I favored the bill, but the form in which it was presented did not strike me as being in the best interest of the state. There was no difference in the amount of salary to be paid the district attorney in Bernalillo County who handles probably 2,000 to 3,000 cases a year, and the district attorney in the Quay County area, who has possibly 150 cases a year. The form of the bill was such that it could not be amended to make it workable, but I hope it is a bill that will be presented in the next session after more thought has been given to it.

It is also frustrating to cast the one dissenting vote on a bill. On Friday I did this, and I am sure it will not be the last time. The State Police presented a bill which makes it a misdemeanor for any person to wear a uniform or a badge that is a close replica of that worn by the State Police, or to drive an automobile which has similar markings to that of the State Police. On the face, this sounds fine, but it is not a bill that is directed toward a person who is impersonating the State Police, but is rather directed toward some of the municipal and County law enforcement departments in the State.

The testimony at the committee hearing was that the State had had been mistaken for the State Police. The Chief of the State Police

County Agent's Column

(Lincoln County Agent)

I was called into a home last week as they had an invasion by bugs. Upon close examination, they were found to be clover mites. They are smaller than a pinhead, usually living on the lawn grass or clover. During the cold days they move into homes, running over floors, walls, furniture and windows. They do not bite or carry diseases or feed on human blood; but they are a nuisance in the home and leave a red stain when crushed.

Spray the outside of house and nearby lawn on a still day with diazinon, Kelthane or dibrom. Once the mites are indoors they are not affected by sprays applied to lawns. Use a vacuum cleaner to get the mites inside the house.

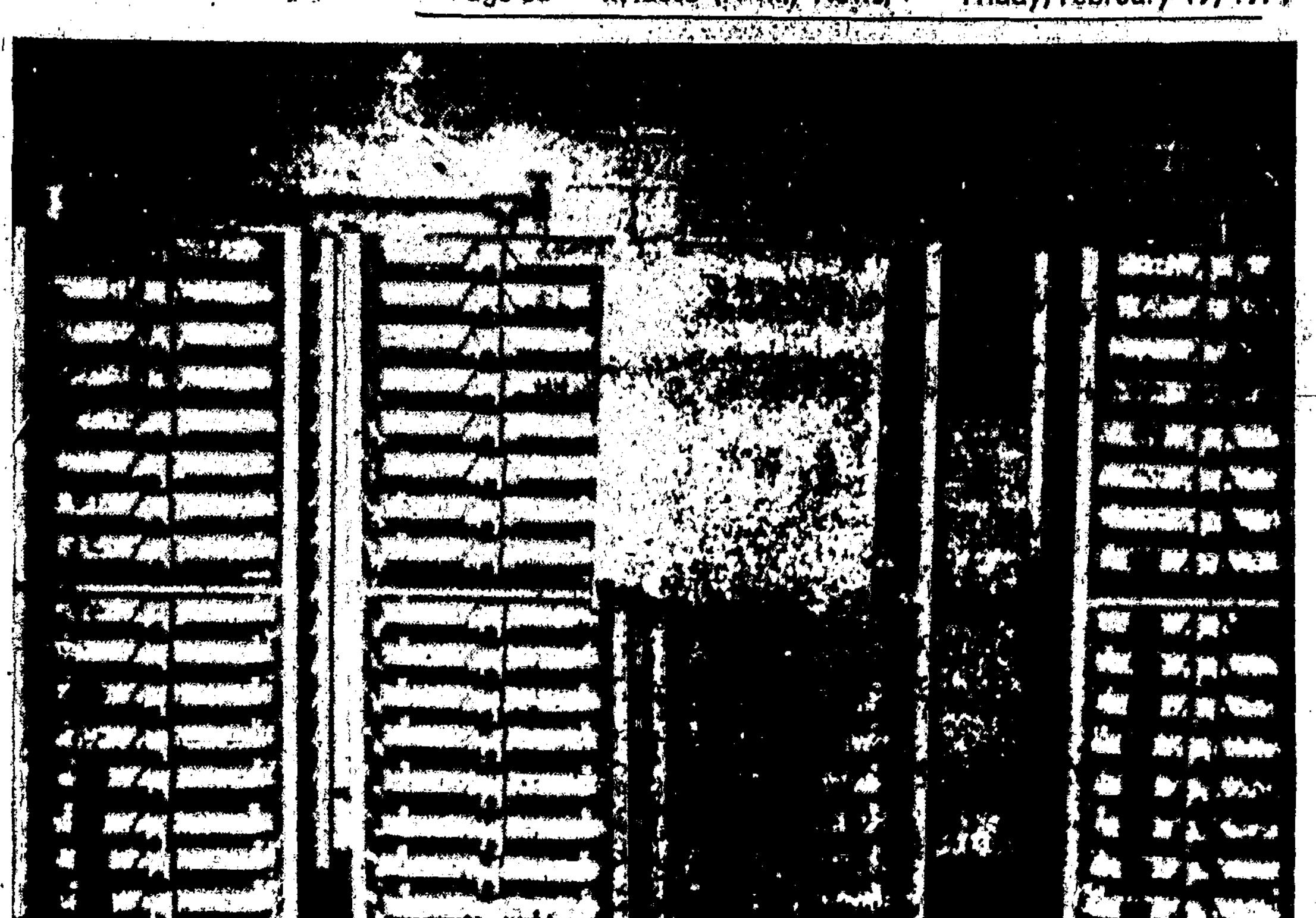
R-R-D

I spent an enjoyable day at Olathe, Kansas last Sunday watching the spinning guild from Albuquerque, card, spin and weave wool. There are several methods of spinning and weaving. The dyeing of wool with native material was fascinating. The algerita made a brilliant yellow and walnuts a rich brown.

The Overall Economic Development Plan for Lincoln County was reviewed and revision started at their (the Lincoln County Development Assn.) meeting Jan. 28 in the Rural Electric Cooperative Building in Carrizosa. It was decided to postpone the membership drive until the brochure was available. The price on the Lincoln County Centennial Medalion was discussed and the group agreed that the price should remain at \$1.50 each at present.

Walter Henn discussed the Pony Express Race. He pointed out that there were 1400 letters carried in 1870 or almost twice as many as last year. The awarding of a saddle was a new feature this year. He suggested that the finish line be changed to the pageant grounds for the safety of the crowd. The riders could come through the west side by temporarily removing the fences.

Mescalero Hatchery Visited

Almost all of us love to fish but few of us know of the problems involved in the raising and stocking of the streams and lakes that we frequent in this, the most popular of outdoor sports. In an effort to enlighten the sportsman, we recently toured the Mescalero National Fish Hatchery to see just what is done to promote fishing in our area.

The Mescalero Hatchery was put into operation in early 1966 and is one of the newest in a chain of 91 such hatcheries operated by the Bureau of Sport Fisheries and Wildlife. It is located on lands owned by the Mescalero Apache Tribe and leased to the Department of the Interior. The hatchery is located just south of the village of Mescalero on the Tularosa River and is supplied with water from three springs; Church Spring, which is used for the incubator and the inside tanks and Head Spring and Carillo Spring, which are used for the outside tanks.

Largest shipments of eggs arrive in April and October and are supplied by commercial hatcheries in California, Washington and Idaho. The eggs are flown into the hatchery in small cartons packed in ice

and immediately put into the incubator trays. Water, at a constant temperature of 55 degrees, flows through the incubator in which the eggs remain for the three to four days required to complete the hatch. After hatching, the fry are left in the incubator for about a week while feeding on the remainder of the egg yolk sack.

From the incubator the fish are moved into the inside tanks where they will stay for 5 months or until they are three inches long. The water in the inside tanks is kept at 55 degrees and is kept moving to exercise the fish as they gain weight and size.

Feeding, at this time, is required every 30 to 45 minutes. Extreme care must be taken in the aeration of the water, as too much or too little oxygen can kill the fish.

Growth room must be allowed while the fish are reaching 3-inch size by thinning and placing them in additional tanks. When the fish reach the 3-inch size they are moved to the larger tanks outside the building and feeding time is gradually reduced to 5 times per day. By the time that 8 inches of growth is reached, the fish are fed only 4 times per day and ration

are reduced to maintain their size for easy handling.

It takes about one year for the fish to reach the eight inch size. The Mescalero Hatchery is also charged with the distribution of the fish to waters of the state. Ninety percent of the fish are distributed to the 20 miles of streams and the 16 lakes on the Mescalero Reservation. The balance go to other reservations on federal and state waters where they are needed.

The hatchery raises only rainbow trout of catchable size and is operating at full capacity of the available water at this time. Approximately 300,000 fish are raised by the four employees per year.

Don Ellis is the hatchery manager and his employees are Forrest Dowler, assistant manager, Nick Garcia and Keith Miller, both fish hatcherymen.

The hatchery is open to the public and we would encourage this as an interesting side trip while visiting Ruidoso.

Steer Roping Contest Slated For February 28

The High Chaparral Horsemen's Association will hold a steer roping contest, Sunday, Feb. 28, at the Denton Arena in Ruidoso Downs. The special steer roping event will begin at 2:00 p.m. and is open free to the public according to club officials.

The local club and clubs from area towns will compete for special awards for single steer roping competition and also for team competition. Mike Hernandez, HOHA Director stated that "we are looking for a good showing from the local and neighboring towns."

Southwestern National Forests range from deserts to timberline. These forests are rich in water, outdoor recreation opportunities, timber, wildlife, forage, clean air and natural beauty. In order to meet the demands of the American public for these resources and still preserve the land's productivity, the Forest Service operates under a Multiple Use Management Plan.

The Multiple-Use Plan directs the Forest Service to coordinate the resources, uses and activities with public needs. The objective is to provide the greatest good for the greatest number of users in the long haul without damaging the land's ability to produce.

To minimize conflicts between uses and needs the Forest Service has divided the land area into management zones. Each zone explains the management objectives which are most applicable for the zone and provides direction of the zone.

Nine zones exist in the Southwestern Region—Arizona and New Mexico National Forests. These are the Chaparral, Intermediate, Water Influence, Great Travel Influence, Special, Desert, Grassland and Woodland Zones.

Within each of these zones management direction varies according to a zone's ability to furnish public needs for its specific resources. In the Travel Influence Zone, of which on the Ruidoso Ranger District includes the Sierra Blanca Ski Area and all campgrounds and roads, the emphasis is to maintain and enhance the natural beauty of the forested environment while providing for maximum enjoyment of the recreational public.

A zone not common to all National Forests is the Special Zone.

This zone includes wilderness and primitive areas or other areas of historical, scenic, natural or botanical interest.

The Ruidoso District of the Lincoln National Forest is fortunate in having the White Mountain Wilderness as its Special Zone. Though the primary use of the zone is for recreation purposes, water yield and forage production for wildlife are equally important products. The undisturbed, natural condition of the area provides many persons with an opportunity to reflect back upon our pioneering past.

Multiple-Use Management is a difficult concept to explain. The intricacies of the environment and the impact of people needs must be carefully interwoven to prevent damage and still provide local and national economies with a growing base.

It boils down to helping provide you with the lumber for your homes, the beef steak for your dinners, and the clean air and water you desire for a happy life. It also means seeing to it that your children will have these same benefits—that they too may romp and play across mountain meadows not defiled by the avarice of the human species.

Though the job may be difficult the Forest Service has accepted the challenge and looks forward to the time when the Multiple-Use concept becomes a household word.

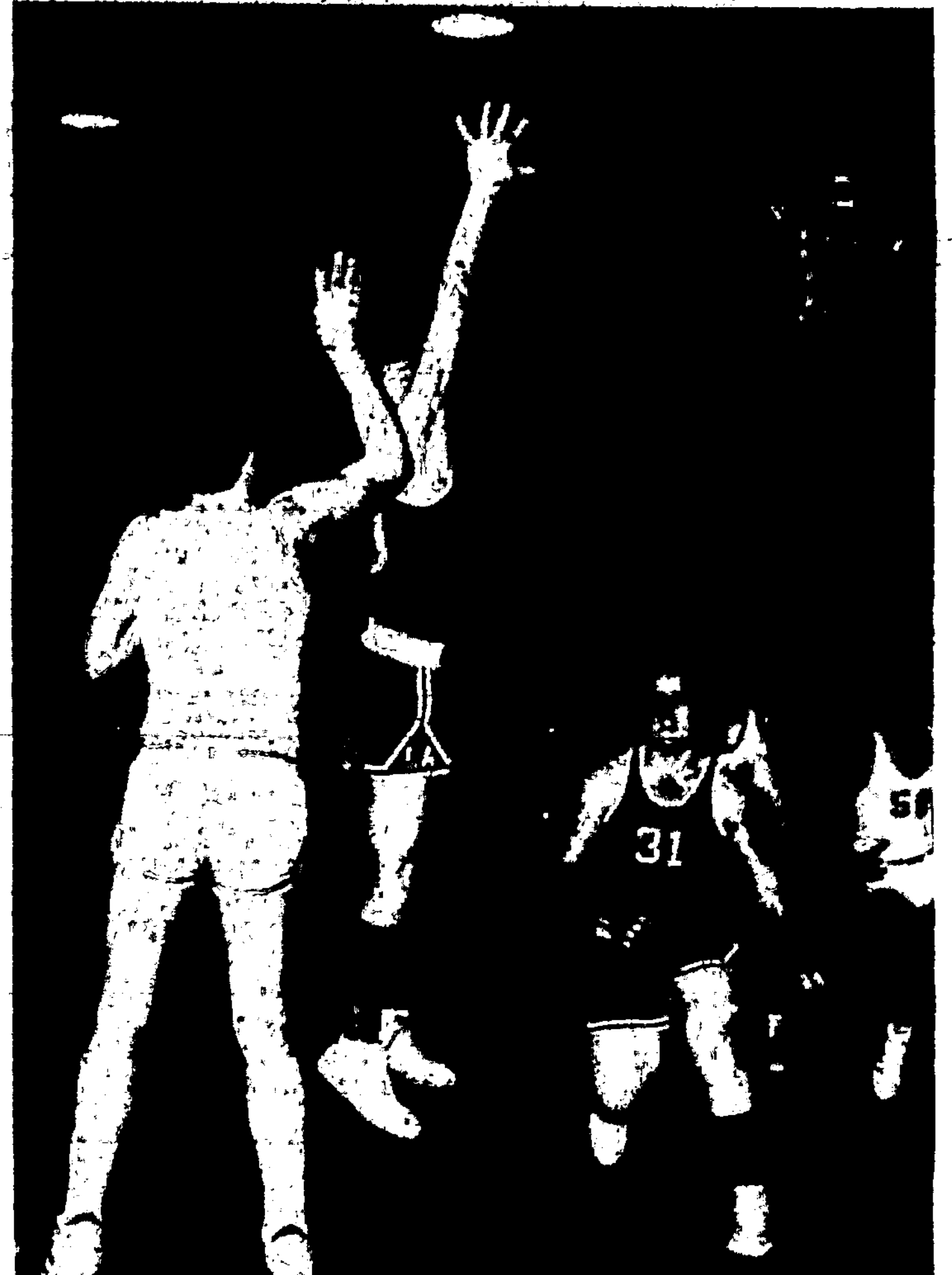

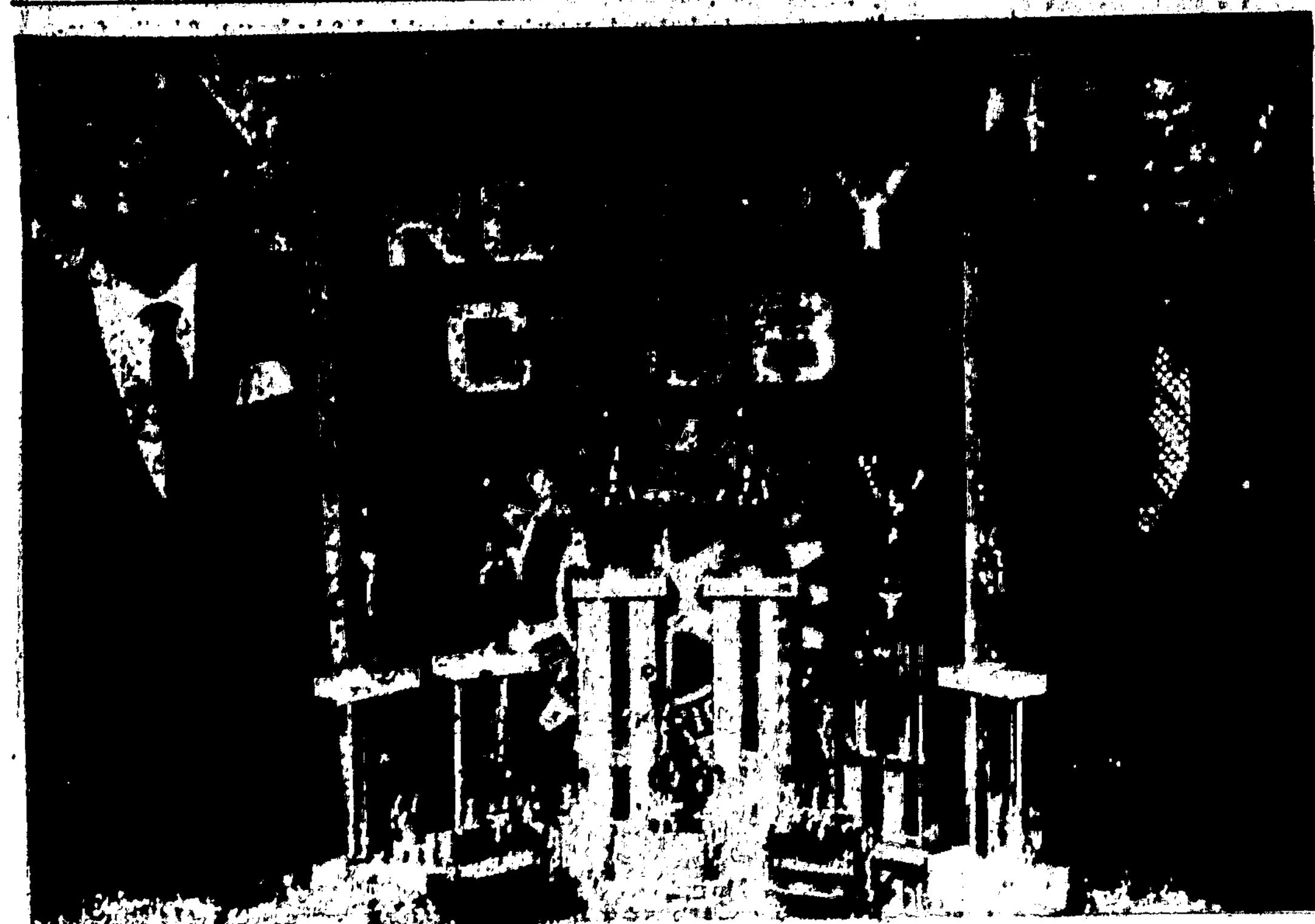

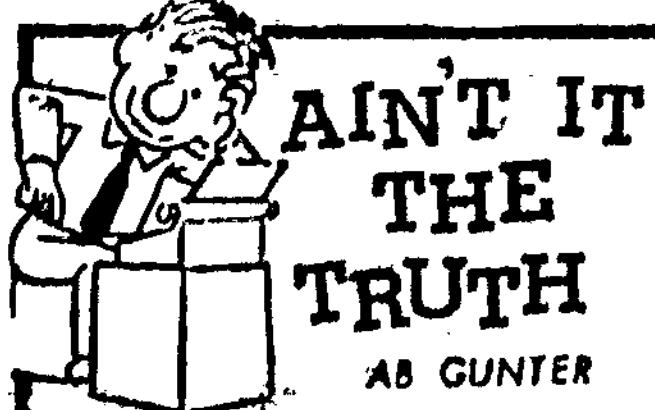
