Saint Patrick's Day

In The Morning  
The first day of Spring is not until this Sunday according to the book, but for me it seems that Spring begins on Saint Patrick's Day.

I am sending you out this little message on Saint Patrick's Day — it must be about four o'clock — from looking — let me sleep outside for a minute.

All right, we are outside. The early morning hush is on the world. It is one of those times when you can hardly tell where night ends and day begins. But from a look at the North Star and the big dipper, it is bound to be around four o'clock. You know you can tell time on a clear night by the big dipper. It revolves around the North Star counter-clockwise. Now it is down west of the star approaching, close to the horizon. It is never so still outside — not

a sound of bird or other creature. Only the soft whisper of the West wind coming down from the mountain. Over on the southeast, there is the moon, about three-quarter size and the Morning Star giving off between the two of them quite a bit of light.

How can you say how you feel right now? Somewhere between the night and the day, alone outside under the moon and stars? You feel very close to God.

My friend, Adalberto Chavez, a native of San Patricio told me that there are three parts to the night: Prima, Moderna and Alba. Prima lasts from dusk to up around nine or ten o'clock — a time when you can be up and around to be around four o'clock. Around if you want; yet if you are tired the sleep you get in these hours will rest you three-to-one over any other time. Moderna is through midnight and on to the third crowing of the rooster, say two or three o'clock. This is sometimes called "the

dead of night" when all the world is sleeping the soundless. Alba is the latter part of the night when day is on the way.

So here we are out in the mystic spell of the Alba. We should be lonesome, but we are not, somehow. We ought to be hearing a rooster's little bugle call any time now, schooling up the vale from Juan, Montes or Manuel Carrillo.

There is a lot of awakening many a head memory along with the dreaming world. Is there any one sound that can carry you back as this does? A cheerful sound, it gives your heart a gentle lift. Well, we might as well go back inside.

Here before me on the table, beside a picture of my mother, is a little spring bouquet, a sweet blossom. They usually bloom around Saint Patrick's Day.

Years ago there was a grass fire out in front of the house which burnt down a large cedar tree. But down hidden near the roots of this tree a tiny sprout tree six inches tall had been hiding and was saved. Now this tree is twelve or fifteen feet tall. I cannot see it yet, but I know it is out there covered with fragrant blossoms of white trimmed in pink.

I know too, that down near the creek, nest mossy rocks, the true Shamrock of Ireland is growing.

"Waite!"  
For the past thirteen years when you would be driving up through the City in the Elms, along about this time — the big dipper outside in the brightening northern sky is down around the five o'clock mark — the only place open would be Waite's.

Always cheerful, bright and helpful Mr. and Mrs. Waite have made their place a true landmark of hospitable Lincoln County, and have helped to spread the fame of our land of the Pinos and Pines from coast to coast. These folks have served Ruidoso well.

Waite says, "I have enjoyed every minute of it."  
We are glad Mr. and Mrs. Waite are staying here in Ruidoso. Our home town would not be the same without them.

Waite's Place, Inc., reminded me a good deal of a famous restaurant in San Francisco back during the Gold Rush days of 1898 and some time after, called "Coffee Dan's Place."

My father used to tell me about "Coffee Dan's" and maybe the next time, or so, we might carry the story back to a little journey out San Francisco way.

## County Agent's Column

I was privileged to accompany the four Lincoln County 4-Hers to Santa Fe last week. They were legislative pages for the week. The pace is quite hectic and there are so many things going on at the same time that it was impossible to see many of them. There were over 400 bills in each the State House of Representatives and Senate. There were eight bills introduced on subdivisions alone.

Mr. and Mrs. Joe Cooper were in charge of the group the last half of the week and participated in the dinner given by the Citizens State Bank for the 4-H members and the Lincoln County Legislators.

About 80 bulls will be auctioned Friday, March 19, during a performance-tested bull sale at the Northeastern Agricultural Experiment Station Branch of New Mexico State University near Tucuman. The sale climaxes a 140 day test at the branch station which has become known in the South as the Tucumcari Bull Test.

The top 80 per cent of bulls nominated for the sale from the test will be auctioned beginning after a short program at 12:30 p.m. Pedigree catalogs may be obtained by contacting Bob Powell, Quay County Extension agent, Drawer 2, Tucumcari 86401. Pedigrees are also on display at the test station. The station is open and bull inspection is permitted any time prior to the auction.

A barbeque dinner will be served at the branch experiment station just prior to the program and auction.

Final weights in the test were taken March 8-9 and the information obtained will be available prior to the auction.

Gains indicated by the 112 day report were "very satisfactory," says Bobby J. Rankin, NMSU Extension associate livestock specialist.

### Pet Animals Are Big Business

Animals are pet lovers and the number of pets they keep continues to grow. A pet is a big business. It takes a lot of meat to feed 24.7 million dogs and 20 million cats, not to mention all of the accessories and veterinary medical services for these animals. In addition there has been a big boom in petting zoos, bird, rodents, reptiles and fish.

There are 7 1/2 million horses in the United States, and 75 per cent of these are companion animals. The number of horses in the U. S. has doubled in the last ten years. The amount of hay, grain, tack, blacksmith, and veterinary services required for these animals is no small figure either.

The number of cats and dogs has leveled off for the past few years due to restrictions against pets in city apartments, but the number of horses is still rising and nobody knows where it will level off.

### Apply Delayed Dormant Sprays As Weather Warms

Start your pest control program off with a delayed dormant spray of oil or oil plus lime-sulfur (calcium polysulfide). Spray when the weather warms, but before the leaves are unfolded on deciduous trees. This spray will control many of the most troublesome pests of ornamentals, such as scales, spider mites, bud mites and blister mites, some aphids and powdery mildew.

A delayed dormant spray should be applied during the time leaf buds are swelling until some green tips are showing. On broad-leaved evergreens, such as eucalyptus, the spray should be applied just as new growth begins.

Check weather forecasts before applying oil. Don't apply the spray if the temperature is predicted to drop below freezing within 48 hours after application.

Choose a warm, calm day to do your spraying. Never spray if temperatures are below 40 degrees. No very thorough. Oil kills by smothering the egg or immature stages. Therefore, a combination "hibernant" be used over the winter and in weeks and crevices. A very fine mist is the best spray to use to achieve thorough coverage.

To improve the effectiveness of the oil spray against scale insects, add Spectracide or other material. This is a must for control of eastern scale and European spruce scale.

Before buying a dormant spray material, read the label completely. Oil-lime-sulfur combinations should not be applied to evergreens, and lime-sulfur should not be applied to apricots.

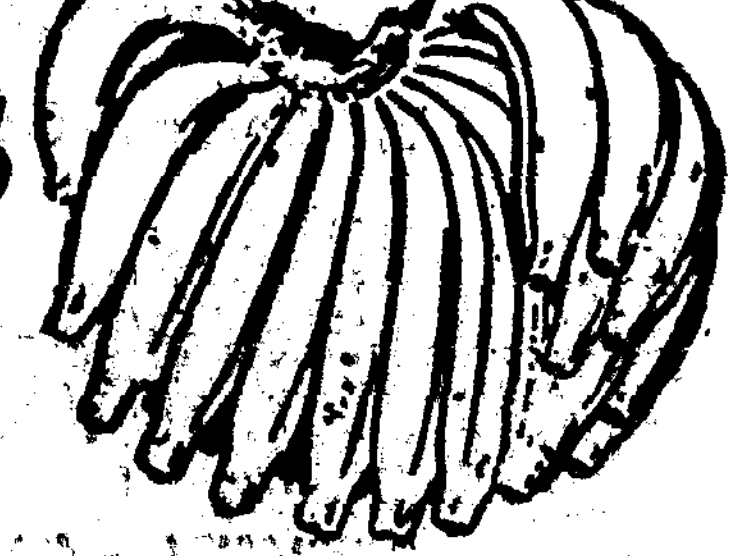

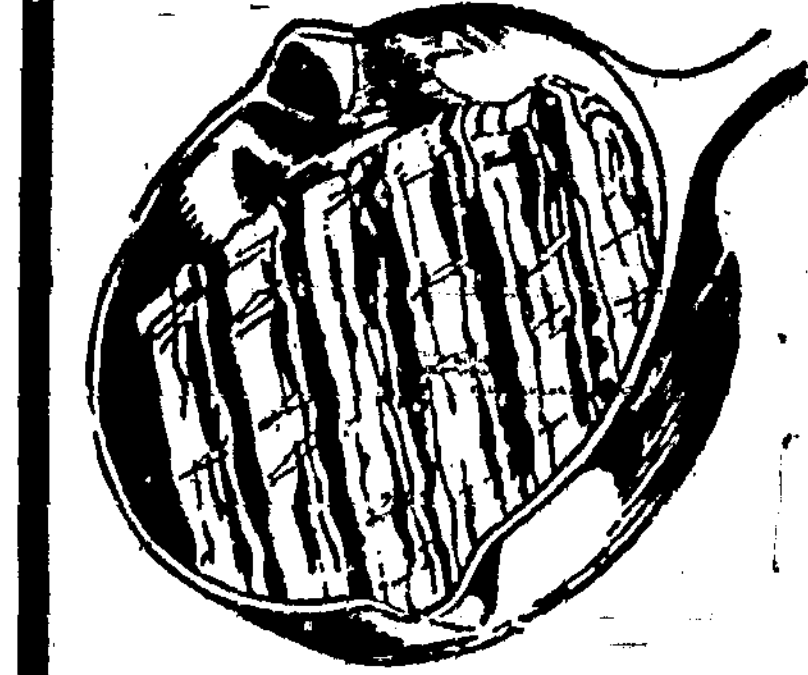

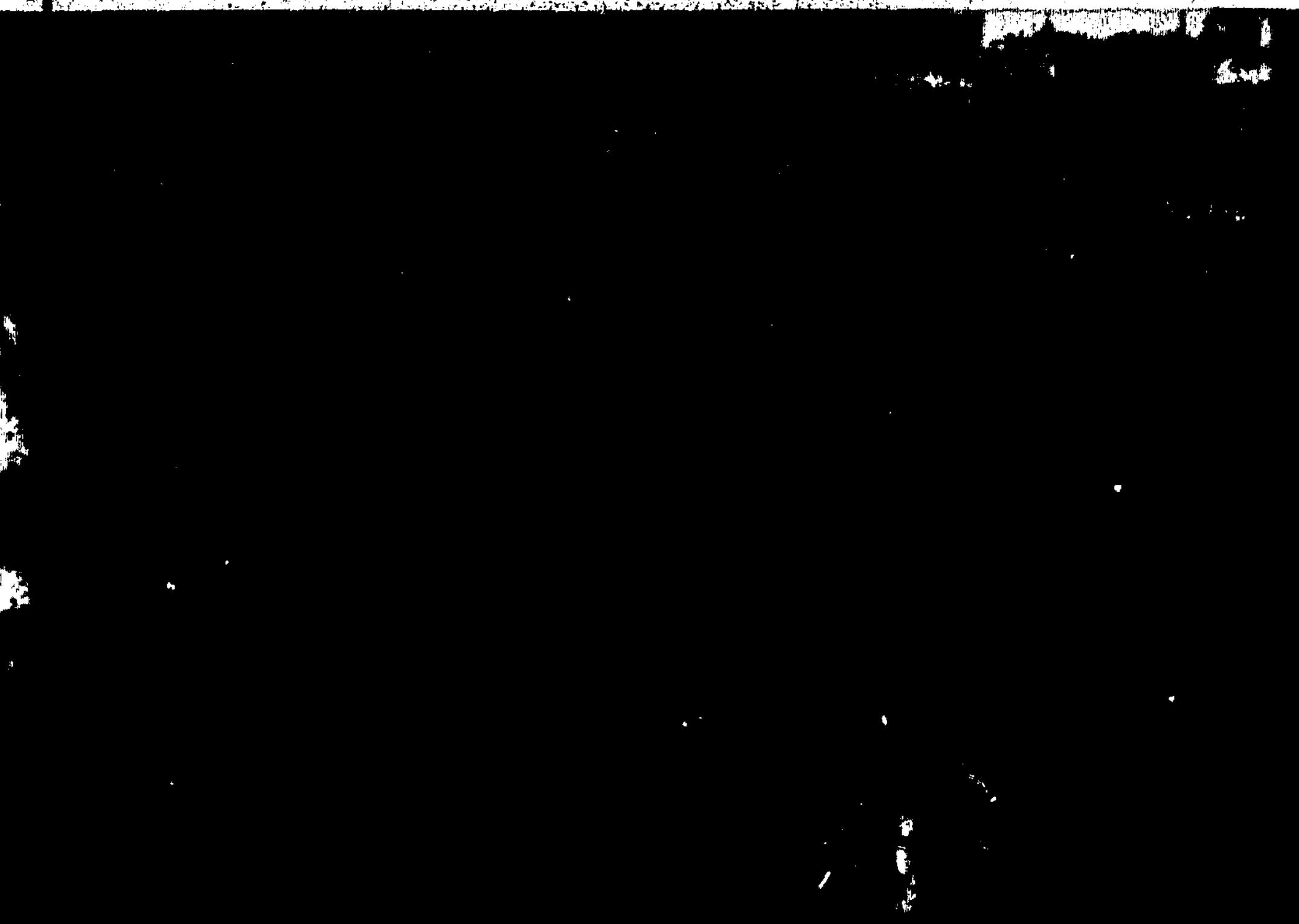

## Taxpayers Ask IRS

Q) This year I will be itemizing my deductions for the first time. What are some of the taxes that I may deduct?

### Ruidoso Band Boosters Hear Fund Reports

The regular meeting of the Band Booster Club was held Monday evening in the high school library, with 12 members present. President Patty White called the meeting to order, and minutes of the last meeting were read by Secretary Jo Perryman.

It was announced that the Booster-sponsored Enchilada Supper, which was a profit of \$204.20. The Snack Bar, operated by the Boosters, at all home games, was terminated very profitable. Monies from this project were used to defray expenses of the enchanche supper, and other expenses of the club. Total returns were not completed for the annual Ruidoso Reves, but all felt that it was very successful.

LeRoy Gooch, band director, gave a report concerning the Southern Singers from the University of Texas. Tentative plans are for the Southern Singers to perform at the Chaparral April 5, at 8:00 p.m., with all tickets to be \$1. This group has performed in Ruidoso before, and were very well received.

The Club voted to purchase 30 new music stands, and authorized Mr. Gooch to check into the cost. It is hoped the new stands will arrive in time for the Spring Concert. The band left on tour Thursday, March 18, and will return Saturday, March 20. The Booster Club voted to donate \$100 for the tour, to help defray expenses. Mr. Gooch announced that the band will open all concerts on the tour with the "All-American March".

A) Generally, you may deduct real estate taxes, state and local income taxes, general sales taxes, state and local income taxes, and personal property taxes.

There are a number of taxes not deductible. Among these are Federal income, estate and gift taxes, as well as alcohol, tobacco and other excise taxes. You should check the instructions that come with your Form 1040 to make sure you deduct the proper taxes.

Q) I understand the IRS has a booklet that is helpful to the small businessman. Where can I get a copy?

A) A copy of the 1971 Tax Guide for Small Business, Publication 334, can be purchased for 75 cents at IRS offices and from the U. S. Government Printing Office in Washington, D. C., and its branch stores throughout the country.

Q) Is it true that there is a penalty for filing your income tax return late?

A) Yes, a penalty of five percent of the taxes due and unpaid on the date the return was required to be filed will be imposed for each month the return is late. The total delinquency filing penalty is limited to 25 percent.

Under unusual circumstances, a taxpayer may be granted an extension of time to file a return. Extensions are not granted as a matter of course, and requests for your request must be substantial. Your request for an extension must be made before the due date of the return.

Q) Does it make any difference if I used a red, white and blue or a black and white Form 1040 for my Federal income tax?

A) No difference at all. Actually, the tax packages mailed to taxpayers contained the red, white and blue Form 1040 while the 1040's available at banks, post offices, and

some office buildings are black and white. The IRS, however, urges taxpayers to use the multi-colored form whenever possible, since the red lettering on the form highlights areas where errors are most commonly made. The sure to use the post-off label that came on the tax package you received in the mail. Using the pre-printed label will speed any refund due and eliminate possible errors. Simply peel off the label from the front of the tax package and affix it to the Form 1040 you send to the IRS.

Q) What tax rate should I use when I report my mail's wages for the fourth quarter?

A) The combined rate is 9.8 percent, 4.8 percent each for employer and employee, and should be used when filing your Form 941 Quarterly Report on Household Employees, for the months of October, November and December. The deadline for filing and paying the tax is February 1, 1971.

Note that the rate goes up effective January 1, 1971 from 4.8 percent to 5.2 for both employers and employees.

## Washington Report

From Your Congressman  
**HAROLD RUNNELS**

After a slow start the 92nd Congress is beginning to get down to some of the serious business at hand, with the spotlight in the House initially being on the Appropriations Committee and the Armed Services Committee.

The Appropriations Committee started hearings late last week on President Nixon's budget for fiscal year 1972, while the Armed Services Committee, of which I am a member, started hearings on the draft and the all-volunteer army concept.

I'll have more to say on the all-volunteer army in a future column, but this week I would like to talk briefly about the matter of revenue sharing, one of the more controversial proposals in the President's budget.

President Nixon, in his State of the Union message, proposed that \$5 billion in federal revenues be distributed to state governments for use in any way they see fit.

These block grants, with no strings attached, represent a new concept although the matter of sharing federal revenues with the states and local governments has been a part of the American system of government since the very beginning.

Revenue flowing from the federal treasury to the states has been increasing steadily over the years, with categorical grants, in-aid last year reaching \$24 billion, about one-fourth of all revenues available for domestic use.

There appears to be widespread agreement on the responsibility of the federal government to provide financial aid to the states. One of the reasons for this is that the federal tax structure, despite its shortcomings, is a more equitable and efficient producer of revenues than state and local tax systems that depend largely on sales and property taxes.

While there are many arguments for federal revenue sharing, it is questionable whether the President's proposal will go very far in the current Congress. The President's request of \$5 billion is included in a budget which, according to the most conservative estimates, will have a deficit of \$11 billion.

With this being the case, it is questionable whether Congress will go along on such a new, untried program. Nevertheless, there is no denying that many of the states are in dire financial trouble and will be looking to the federal government to help them out.

While the President's proposal for \$5 billion is a start, it is this Congress that there is a possibility that some sort of revenue sharing proposal may be enacted, at least in the coming year.

One of the alternative proposals is for the federal government to take over administration and operation of all state welfare programs. After all, increasing welfare costs is one of the major reasons many states, including New Mexico, are having a difficult time keeping up with expenditures.

This in itself is a relatively new concept in federal revenue sharing and the matter will be debated at great length. There are many arguments in favor of such a proposal, and the New Mexico Legislature was one of the first to adopt a resolution advocating such an undertaking.

The whole matter of revenue sharing, whether it be outright grants to states or a total federal welfare system, will be one of the major issues in the current Congress. I will appreciate receiving your views on the matter.

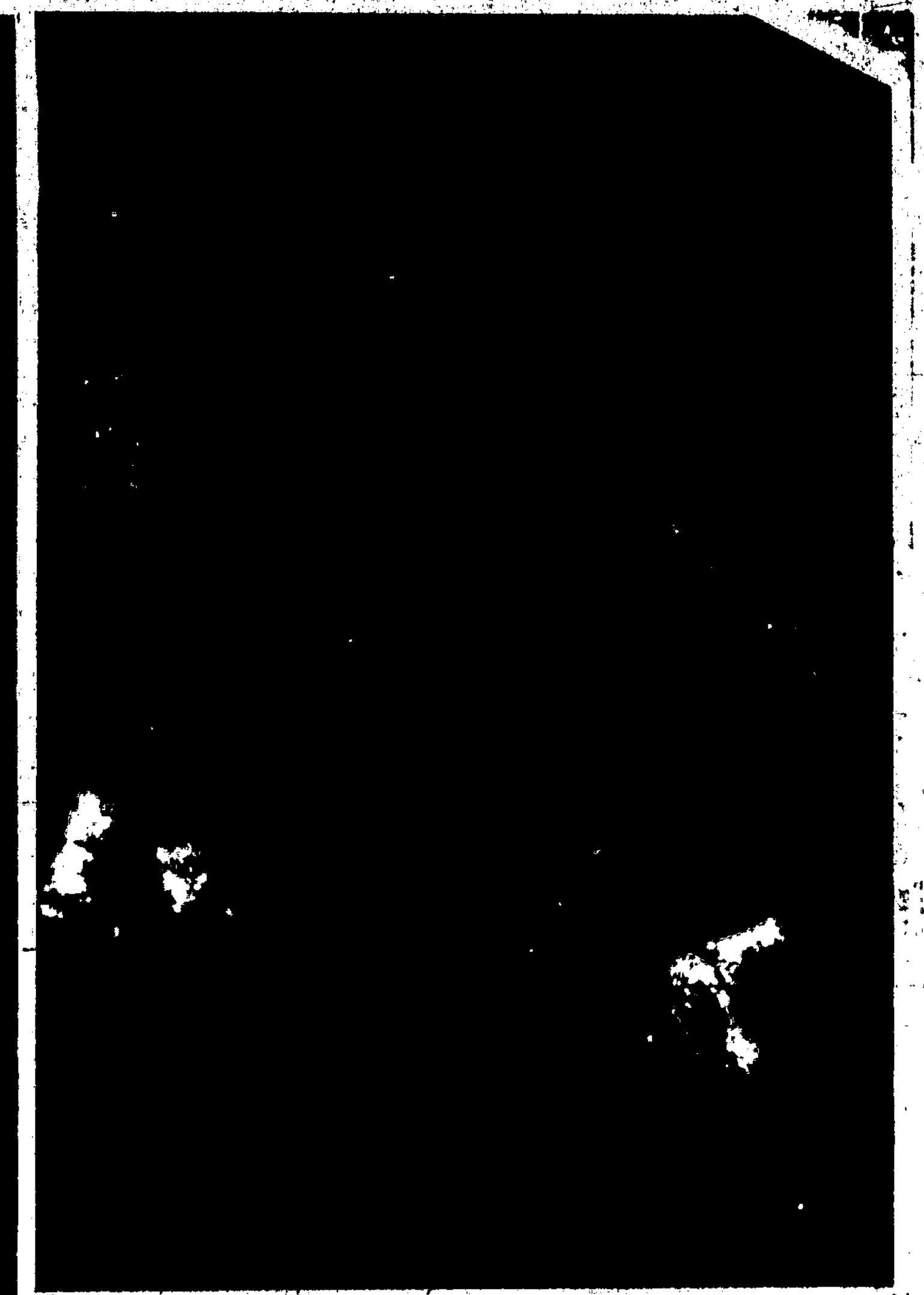

### Seasons Announced For Trapping

Furbearing seasons for 1971-72 were set recently by the New Mexico State Game Commission at its March meeting in Santa Fe. The statewide season on ring-tail, raccoon, badger, weasel, mink and fox was set for April 1, 1971 through March 31, 1972. Seasons for beaver and muskrat were divided into two sections: North of US 66, April 1 through April 30 and Nov. 1, 1971 through March 31, 1972 with the exception of drainage of the San Juan and Chama River opening Oct. 1, 1971 through March 31, 1972; South of US 66, December 1, 1971 through March 31, 1972.

A change in the previous regulations for beaver trapping opens the San Francisco River Valley within the Olla National Forest to trapping Dec. 1, 1971 through March 31, 1972. As in the past, no other land, either public or private was opened within the exterior boundaries of National Forests. There is no bag limit on any fur-bearing animal and these animals may be taken by means of firearms, bow and arrow, or traps with the exception of beaver which may be taken by traps only.

A resident trapper's license is \$2.50 and beaver tags must be purchased at \$1.00 for each tag. Beaver are trapped.

Licenses may be purchased from Department of Game and Fish offices in Santa Fe, Albuquerque, Las Cruces, El Paso and Roswell and authorized license vendors throughout the state.

### Lincoln County Above Average In Health Care

In an attempt to come up with a proposal for providing better health care in rural areas of New Mexico, the University of New Mexico School of Medicine has recently made a detailed analysis of rural health care. Minimum adequate health care is defined by the survey as fewer than 149 physicians per 100,000 population (the national average) or when residents are beyond one-hour driving time of reaching a physician. Sixty percent of New Mexico's population lives in such villages — covering 15 per cent of the state's area. Twenty percent of New Mexico's population live in areas where there is no health care at all. These people occupy 80 percent of the state's area. Statistics collected show that in Lincoln county, there are 165 physicians per 100,000 population.

## Conway From The Capital

Probably the most controversial bill to come before the Senate this session was SB-330, the so-called "Viet Nam War Bill". Basically the bill said that no inhabitant of New Mexico shall be required to serve outside the territorial limits of the United States in the conduct of armed hostilities not an emergency, unless authorized or ratified by a congressional declaration of war. It further required the Attorney General of New Mexico to bring an appropriate action in the Federal court to defend and enforce the rights of New Mexico inhabitants.

The debate in the Senate ranged far and wide on this — from the draft, narcotics, youth problems, to the future of the United States, and many others. The debate was very emotional, and the sponsor of the bill having to stop several times to regain his composure.

I felt there were several problems with the bill, two of which I will discuss. The bill, in essence, would encourage persons in the military to disobey the order of their superiors. No military organization can function under these circumstances. Secondly, the matters presented in this bill should be handled by the U. S. Congress and should not be considered by state legislature. I voted against the bill.

The Senate reapportionment bill passed the Senate this past week. It increases the membership from 42 to 45, giving Bernalillo County three more Senators. The plan was presented by the Democratic leadership and is a fairly good plan with the exception that there are large discrepancies in population ranging from 15,462 in one district of Valencia County, to 26,507 in the first district of San Juan County.

The so-called Republican plan was much closer on the one-man-one-vote rule but was a hodge-podge crossing many county lines. It called for 36 Senators and I felt it would be unworkable. I had hoped for either a 42 or 45 member plan that would have small differences in population in each district. There is considerable talk that the reapportionment question will end up in Court.

The slot machine bill was considered Friday. This would have legalized slot machines in New Mexico. I voted against it. We are kidding ourselves if we think this will solve our money problems. It will bring in organized crime and later Nevada gambling. The day before the bill was considered, one of the lobbyists asked me to support the bill. I asked him who he was representing and he either didn't know or wouldn't tell me. It makes it difficult to believe that this was solely a revenue measure. Senator Dunn and I voted no.

This is the last week of this session of the legislature. We will be considering upwards to 250 bills. I urge all of you who want to talk to me to call my office in Alamogordo, 437-1840, or my office in Ruidoso, 257-6778, and they will give your message to me.

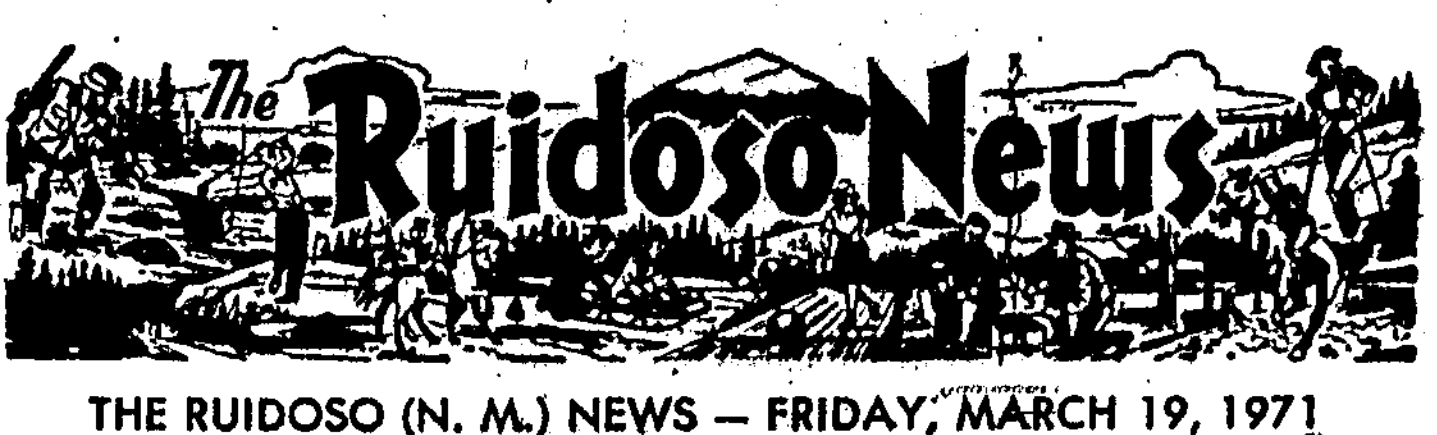

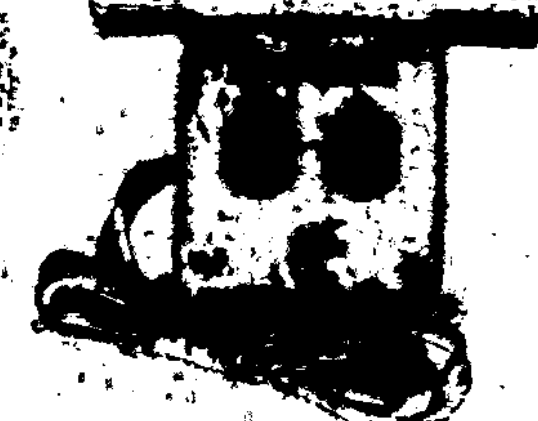

## Taxpayers Newsletter

**SPENDING** — Lawmakers next week (the final week of the 30th Legislative Session) are expected to crank an additional \$1.5 million or more into the next fiscal year's budget, regardless of warnings from all fiscal experts that revenues may not cover that additional amount. Revenues have been projected at \$261.6 million for that fiscal year, July 1, 1971, to June 30, 1972. Expenditures, however, are projected at \$263.1 million. The additional \$1.5 million could still be made up by increases in revenues, at least one expert has stated. The amount, after all, less than 1 percent of the total budget.

**DEFICIENCIES AND SUPPLEMENTS** — A tentative \$4.16 million price tag has been finally nailed down on the variety of deficiency and supplemental appropriations carved out of the \$22 million surplus. The DFA has recommended \$8 million for the operating reserve and \$2 million for the State School Support Reserve, also out of the surplus. What is left is a \$6.34 million slice of the surplus pie. Legislative proposals aimed at utilizing the \$6.34 million, however, total \$17.46 million, and of that amount, only \$8.7 million can be classified as spending items that will not repeat themselves again next year. The upshot is the Legislature will have to purge their own proposals with meat and bone in the next week to end the session with fiscal responsibility.

That list of deficiencies and supplemental appropriations goes like this: Legislature \$390,000; 2nd Judicial District \$70,000; Attorney General \$25,000; Governor \$5,000; Space Shuttle Promotion \$60,000; Lt. Governor Expense \$1,000; Motor Vehicle Department \$300,000; Secretary of State \$24,000; Racing Commission \$10,000; Railroad Authority \$50,000; Commission on Alcoholism \$25,000; Health and Social Services Department \$3.8 million; Environmental Disaster Fund \$80,000; Department of Hospitals and Institutions \$225,000; Southwest Medical Health Center \$20,000; Adjutant General \$2,000; State Police \$130,000; New Mexico State University \$125,000, and Eastern New Mexico University \$200,000.

**MOBILE HOMES** — Proposed taxes on mobile homes in New Mexico appear lost in this session because of an attempt to crack the tax into the already cumbersome and chunky property tax structure. A proposal fostered by the Taxpayers Association of New Mexico to place a flat 2 percent tax on the value of the mobile homes and then have it collected when the mobile home owner purchased his trailer license tag was pushed aside in favor of the straight ad valorem tax. The 2 percent collection would have been distributed to counties through a special fund, but county officials through their own lobbying group were fearful that they wouldn't get as large a share. The Taxpayers Association and their proponents of the 2 percent tax, meanwhile, were skeptical of any proposal that would be administered by county tax assessors. Now it appears the entire proposal is bogged down in committee action and won't see the light of day before the session is over.

**WELFARE CUTS** — It is doubtful that cuts in welfare payments announced this week will take place. What is more likely is that the Legislature will appropriate up to \$4.2 million to the Health and Social Services Department as a deficiency in order to prevent the payment cuts.

**ENCUMBERING SYSTEM** — It is hoped the current legislature will adopt an encumbrance system for state agency spending — a method of planning down budgets and plugging funds for specific debts. The system, if properly administered, could prevent overexpending and agencies operating in the red following the close of fiscal year books. The cash system currently employed and involving the sometimes ridiculous rulings of the State Finance Board should have been done away with years ago.

**INCOME SURTAX** — Out of the deluge of local option tax bills, only one appears favored for passage — HB 412, a measure to provide for a county income surtax to pay for mental health programs specifically in Albuquerque and elsewhere if they want them. The measure, introduced by Rep. Tom Hoover, R-Bernalillo, does call for a referendum on the surtax before it can become effective. The measure first was introduced by Hoover without the referendum provision, but Hoover told one House committee it was a draftsman's error in the Legislative Council Service. The provision was amended. Hoover, who is the House minority leader and who has carried the reputation of a fiscal conservative, introduced a handful of local option tax bills this year. It's getting difficult to tell the liberals from the conservatives without a program.

**OOPS!** — Senator Fred Groce, R-Bernalillo, who is the Senate's answer to New Mexico's pollution woes, introduced an unassuming little amendment to the committee substitute for the proposed new Economic Development Board over the Department of Development. Groce, who has turned pollution into a private business tag was pushed aside in fa-

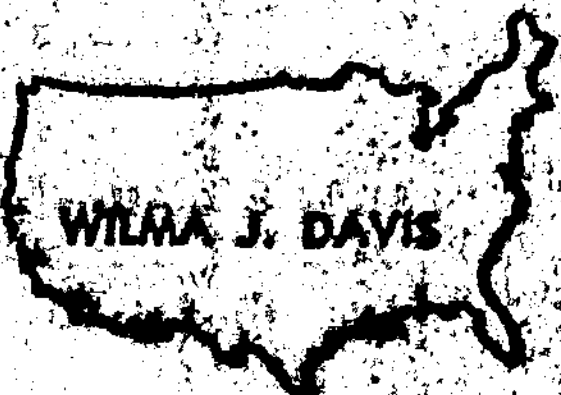
