Beautifully and with extreme bias we admit that our town is the very best. We say this with extreme humility for the simple reason that we must concede and yield to the rest of the world that Ruidoso is unique in its citizenship, climate, natural beauty, growth potential, history, recreational facilities, culture, and by all means in its headlong advancements.

Like all small "young" towns it has a few difficulties. We don't have too many natives but do have a few who act like some kind of native. Also, like other small towns, residents learn to refrain from talking about other people for fear the other people might be other people who have moved from the other town which the other people also moved, who by blood are not really other people but "kin folks."

"Other towns" seem to also have their special place in a small town. People are gregarious enough to follow other people to new areas. Living in a small town you also soon learn not to, as the youth put it, "bad mouth" other towns for fear you might offend someone who came from that "Other Town."

For several years now I have heard such towns named as Quitaque, Texas (proprietary); Kitty Quay, which is close to Turkey and Hollie; Mescalero, Tahoka, and many other towns whose residents obviously heard the call to the west. In all probability after realizing and experiencing the attributes of Ruidoso these same people took up residence. There are dozens of people in Ruidoso who are related somehow or another with Kitty Quay and a good number from each of the other towns previously mentioned. So it's wise not to talk down other towns.

There is an "other town" located in Louisiana, that perhaps deserves special recognition. Bogalusa, by name, but one native son, as far as we know, living in Ruidoso. I feel certain that Bogalusa can claim the record as being the only town represented in Ruidoso by one native son who, when the Bogalusans visit Ruidoso, provides a special page advertisement welcoming them to the area. The native son of Bogalusa is Ruidoso High School teacher Dub Williams who like the rest of us, has had pride in his native "other town".

We told this week, by residents of Williams, that he recently left Dr. Howard Tate, Ruidoso, to Bogalusa to fish in the swamp areas near his native town. Seems as though they had difficulty locating Bogalusa from the air (everything changes after you have been away for awhile) and then after getting into the swamp had mechanical trouble with the boat that had to leave the swamp area in a hurry to refrain from spending the night there. They did bring back a few fish and other things that Dub assures will not pollute Ruidoso.

Feel as though I had to defend Elmer Pirelli, Ruidoso Village Trustee, Ruidoso Valley Ambassadore president and president of the Noon Day Lions Club, regarding his picture being in the news very often. Elmer, capture why that he is, has not once asked me to take his picture, the truth is that I have had a difficult time learning to spell his name and everyone learns by repetition.

Looking ahead to April, canned peaches and eggs top the list of the United States Department of Agriculture's April plentiful foods list. One of the largest canner inventories on record is supplying canned peaches to markets all over the country. The golden glow of canned peaches is enough to give an added lift to any meal.

January egg production showed a four per cent increase over a year ago, and the increase is expected to be maintained during April, says USDA.

Supplies of potatoes — including fresh, frozen, and instant mashed — will be plentiful due to the record fall crop, reports USDA's Consumer and Marketing Service. To help you with these menus for April, this recipe features can-peach halves.

Cheesy Peach Salad

12-oz. pkg. cream cheese—at room temperature.

1/4 cup finely chopped pecans.

6 canned peach halves.

Lettuce leaves.

On individual salad plates, place lettuce halves under peach halves,

hole side up.

Form cream cheese into one-inch diameter balls and roll in chopped nuts, pressing nuts into cheese ball.

Place cheese ball in hole and serve.

Serves 6.

Size Names Deceptive On Packages

Which is bigger — bargain, giant, or family size? How about economy or large economy size?

As any shopper knows, there's usually no rhyme nor reason to the size names manufacturers give their products.

And some large sizes cost more per unit than their smaller brothers and sisters.

To clear up the confusion and deception by packaging, the Federal Trade Commission (FTC) has proposed a new rule that would apply to manufacturers using such terms as "jumbo," "economy," "giant."

For example: In order to use such a term, the manufacturer must offer the same brand in at least one other size, so comparisons can be made.

Each term must refer to a specific size within a particular brand. In other words, there can only be one "economy" size of Brand X.

If a size is labeled "economy," it must truly be an economy, at a per unit price substantially reduced from the regular price of all other packages of the same brand.

Fire of undetermined origin gutted Martin's Bar in downtown Ruidoso early Wednesday morning. The bar is owned by Martin's staff, who purchased the business for many years known as Denny's Bar, from Denny Davis in 1954. The bar had escaped two other major fires here in the last three years which destroyed several business structures each time in downtown Ruidoso.





Turkey Season Approach Brings Fire Danger Alert

The Department of Game and Fish is reminding sportsmen interested in hunting turkey this spring that the deadline for application is April 2, also that fire danger is likely to be extremely high in much and possibly all of the turkey hunting area.

Winter moisture has been very low in many of the areas where spring turkey seasons have been set, especially in the Sacramento Mountains and other areas in the southern portion of the state, leaving forests dry and fire danger high. If fire danger should become too extreme, the Forest Service can close the forests to recreational use which would restrict the turkey hunting in that particular area. In areas that are open, hunters are urged to use the utmost caution with fire.

Applications must be made on forms G-2 available from Department offices and license vendors and must be in the Department office in Santa Fe, Albuquerque, Las Cruces, Roswell or Raton by 5 p.m., April 2.
