State Finance Dept. Approves Village Budget

Raymond Lara, chief of the State Department of Finance, Wednesday, approved the Village of Ruidoso's \$784,436 budget for the 1971-72 fiscal year. Lara's approval was given after his reviewing of the then proposed budget during a public hearing held at the Ruidoso Municipal Building's council chamber. The newly approved budget is \$31,920 over the previous year's budget.

The chief of the State Department of Finance expressed his appreciation to the village for their budget preparation stating that it was, "very nice." He also commended the village officials for their part in the budget process and especially commended clerk - manager James L. Hine for his efforts and presentation of the budget.

Village officials in attendance for the public hearing on the budget included Ruidoso Mayor George P. White, Trustee Elmer Prell and Hine.

During the review of the budget it was noted that the village had a cash balance at the close of the recent fiscal year, June 30, of \$19,219, the largest in the village's history.

Salary increases in the newly approved budget over the 1970-71 adjusted approved budget amounted to \$25,428. The largest single department increase was in the Police Department with an overall increase of \$11,010 over the previous year's adjusted approved budget.

The accepted budget also revealed that the village Administrative Department's total budget requirement was \$43,335 lower for the current year in comparison to the 1970-71 approved adjusted budget. Only one other department of the village showed a decrease in their overall operational requirements.

It was also noted that Ruidoso's first voter approved general obligation bond, was the improvement bond issuance of \$120,000, will be held this year. The bond was issued in 1961.





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"Learning By Doing" Attracts Interest For Summer Program

Over fifty volunteers, both residents of and visitors to the Ruidoso area have participated in the first four weeks of the Christian-Episcopal-Methodist Summer Program.

Designed to provide activities of value during the summer for boys and girls, two courses are being offered: one entitled "Excursions in the Land of the Chumash" and a Thursday Morning Art Class. We are not bound by a school as such, our classrooms have no four walls and are completely mobile so that they move to "where the action is." Under these ideal conditions we are able to expose our young people to fascinating places and we all have the opportunity to actively and directly learn from a large number of interested, talented and interesting persons... this we believe is the best way to make learning meaningful and a fun thing."

Next Wednesday a grand ride, a picnic and hike to the summit of Sierra Blanca is planned. The excursion on July 21 is to the Hobbs Valley for a day which will include afternoon with artist Peter Dorn and a visit to the art studio of Peter Stoops. Lunch is planned at the Silver Dollar Restaurant. It is suggested by the students that it be "Circle Diamond Ranch."

July 28 will be spent hiking to and in the back high mesas of Sierra Blanca. Among artists Walter Scott was head, a guided tour of historic Lincoln Town. Lunch is planned at the Old World Hotel.

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
