



## New Records Established By The Ruidoso State Bank During 1970

Officials of the Ruidoso State Bank announced this week that during their current 17th year of operation the local banking institution had set new records of accomplishments. A notification, sent to all shareholders and customers, reported that the bank's earnings for 1970 increased from \$1.76 per share in 1969 to \$4.87 per share in 1970. Per share book value increased from \$4.85 to \$9.54, an increase of 13.44 percent, according to the report.

Ed Wimberly, president of the bank, reported to the bank's stockholders and customers that "The Ruidoso State Bank's seventeenth year of operation has established new records in total assets, deposits, investments, earnings and capital accounts to make 1970 the most successful year in the bank's history."

In recapping the bank's progress during the latter part of 1969 and through 1970, the bank's official report that the move into the new bank building in late 1969 was highly significant and added greater emphasis to the bank's belief in the future of the entire Ruidoso and Lincoln County area. Opening the bank's third banking office in December in October, 1970, also added to the bank's endeavor to provide all the communities in the area with modern banking facilities.

## Ruidoso Downs Mayor Zeke Scott Submits Resignation To Board

The regular meeting of the Ruidoso Downs Village board was held Monday night, Jan. 25 in the village hall with councilmen Carpenter, Hale and Pope present. Mayor or pro-tem Perry chaired the meet in the absence of Mayor Zeke Scott.

A letter of resignation from Mayor Scott was read to the members of the board by acting mayor or pro-tem Perry in the first order of business. The council accepted the resignation effective immediately and elected Perry to fill the vacancy for the balance of the mayor's term.

The new mayor gave a short resume of his background for the benefit of the visitors present and named Joe Sudderth to the village board, pending approval of the trustees. It was agreed that Sudderth should meet with the council before a decision is reached on the appointment.

In addition the council: —Gave a short prayer for B. O. Harris, who recently passed away. Harris was a prominent citizen of the village.

—Read and approved the minutes of the last regular meet. —Discussed the recent dismissal of Ed Wishard by Mayor Scott and agreed to retain Wishard in his former capacity as jailer and janitor.

—Voted to reimburse Wishard for time lost. —Voted to pay the cleaning lady who had been cleaning the village hall.

—Discussed the expired terms of Dub Phillips and Mike Hernandez on the Planning and Zoning Commission and tabled the matter until the next meeting. —Discussed the matters of the village back-hoe and again voted to attempt to repair the machine rather than buy a new one.

—Heard the mayor outline his plan for the re-organization of the village government. Were told that complaints to the village must be in writing and submitted to the village office for action by the board.

—Approved the ordinance for the annexation of the new Bruce Griffin subdivision to the village. (This ordinance appears as a legal notice in this issue of The News.)

—Heard a report from William Jesperson on the availability of federal grant money for upgrading law enforcement under the Omnibus Crime Bill. Voted to make application for money for communication equipment and training for the village marshal.

—Adopted the village approved holidays for the village employees. —Adjourned the meeting at 9:00 p.m.

The next regular meeting of the council will be on Monday, Feb. 8 at 7:30 p.m.

Jack DiPaolo, president of the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce, announced today, Thursday, that he has called for a special meeting of all chamber members. The special called meeting has been set for Monday, Feb. 1, in the Chaparral Motor Hotel, Ruidoso Downs, at 7:30 p.m. In calling the meeting DiPaolo extremely urged all chamber Board of Directors and chamber members to be present for the special session. DiPaolo also extended an invitation to all area people who are interested in the Chamber of Commerce. Several chamber members have expressed their concern over the future of the chamber's activities in promoting the Ruidoso area. One member remarked that "it was extremely vital that the chamber members get together as soon as possible to work out a solution to keep our chamber of commerce active." He concluded by stating, "It is an absolute must that the town's people get behind our chamber of commerce, it's future is at stake."

The special called meeting by DiPaolo is an outgrowth of last Monday's Chamber Board of Directors meeting at which time the directors voted to do away with the chamber manager's office. The action was prompted because of serious chamber of commerce financial problems.

NEWS 'N NOTES At the Hospital

The mailing of most un-ordered merchandise—that is, merchandise mailed without the request or consent of the person receiving it—has been banned by a provision of the new Postal Reorganization Act. Under this new act, only two types of un-ordered merchandise may be mailed: (1) Merchandise clearly and conspicuously marked as free samples, and (2) Merchandise from charitable organizations seeking contributions.

The recipient of un-ordered merchandise may use or discard it without obligation to pay for it. The Postal Reorganization Act makes it illegal for the sender of this merchandise to request payment for it. The date when this act will become effective has not yet been set. The Federal Trade Commission has announced however, that it will begin to enforce the ban on un-ordered merchandise immediately. This welcome information was taken from the December 1970 issue of the "Family Economic Review" published by the U.S.D.A.

If a large percentage of today's advertising for everything from cosmetics to foreign travel seems aimed at the young people in this country, consider these statistics: The number of persons in the United States who were 14 to 24 years old increased from 27 million to 39 million—or from 15 to 19 percent of the population—between 1960 and 1969, according to the Bureau of Census. It is easy to see why this audience is so desirable to advertisers.

Save leftovers—cool those bits and pieces of leftover meat, broth and gravies quickly; store, well-covered, in the refrigerator. Use them within one to three days after cooking.

You needn't worry if the meat around the bones of some thickly broiled roasts brown—even after cooking. It's safe to eat, according to U. S. Department of Agriculture poultry inspectors. Broiler-fryers tend to show this effect because they're marketed young, at 6 to 8 weeks. Their bone marrow has not fully hardened, and the red blood cells seep into the surrounding meat, causing a deep red or brown color.

The 30th Legislature, First Session, opened at high noon Tuesday in Santa Fe. Although the battle lines are not as clear as in the movie, "High Noon", some lines have already been drawn. The presiding officer in the Senate is Governor Robert Mondragon, and after the roll call, members of the Senate were sworn in for this Session and signed the roll. It was to me a very impressive and very important ceremony.

The leadership of the Senate was then elected, these leaders having been previously chosen in the Republican and Democratic caucuses. The next order of business was the introduction of bills; the first bill introduced in the Senate has to do with the implied consent of the driver on our highways to submit to a blood, breath or urine test if he is stopped by a police officer who believes he is driving while intoxicated. If he then refuses to take such a test, his license would be suspended for a year. I am a co-sponsor on this bill, and feel very strongly that it is needed legislation.

On Thursday I introduced a bill to establish a new judicial district composed of Otero and Lincoln Counties, which provides for one judge and a district attorney for this new district. Several bills changing the judicial districts in the State will be introduced, and I have high hopes that we will be successful in creating a new judicial district of Otero and Lincoln Counties.

I hope to have a weekly column to help keep you informed of what is happening in the legislature. My mailing address in Santa Fe is: Senator John E. Conway, State Capitol Building, Santa Fe, New Mexico 87501, and my phone number is area code 505, 827-2071, extension 106. I call my office in Alamogordo and Ruidoso daily, and if you want to talk to me, you can call either office and your message will be relayed to me. On Saturday, the 30th of January, I will be in my office in Alamogordo most of the day, and late in the afternoon will be in my office at the KARR Building in Ruidoso to meet with anyone who wants to discuss matters before the legislature.

### Ruidoso School Superintendent Concentrating On Vocational Ed.

"Vocational education is my 'thing' right now," says P. T. Vaillant, superintendent of the Ruidoso Schools. "This school system has just been missing the boat for too long as far as teaching students to work with their hands."

Vaillant has made several trips to Santa Fe during the past year conferring with the Vocational Education division of the State Department of Education, in an attempt to correct this situation.

Some of his efforts have paid off, in that the school recently received word that the state department has approved a \$5,000 grant for a vocational training program here.

"This, of course, is only a beginning," says Vaillant.

The new program, expected to begin this semester, will be a cooperative between the distributive and office education programs, which will hopefully develop into two distinct programs.

Vaillant has asked a team of men from Santa Fe to visit the schools here to evaluate the facilities and determine exactly what our needs are in relation to vocational education.

Vaillant wants to see if we have the need and the facilities for an office education and a distributive education program, as well as industrial education offering training in wood, metal, electronics, welding, auto mechanics, and arts and crafts.

"We have to accept the fact that all students simply aren't college material," Vaillant said. "Many students don't want to go to college, but don't really have an alternative. We need to reach these students and train them to make a living."

Vaillant told the News that last year "about 82% of the Ruidoso High School graduating class went to college. Of that figure probably only about half will finish, so that leaves about 75% of the class that will never earn a college degree. They need to learn a skill at which they can make a living, and that's what I'm trying to do for them."

The team from Santa Fe is expected to be in Ruidoso on Feb. 2. "If they determine that Ruidoso has a real need for and the facilities to handle a complete vocational program, then I plan to go back to Santa Fe and camp on a few dobersteins until I can get funding," Vaillant said.

# Special Education Places Emphasis On The Individual

At a school where emphasis is placed on the student as an individual with individual strengths and weaknesses, the Special Education Program at White Mountain Elementary School is especially designed to fit the specific needs of an individual child. One of many innovative student individualized programs at White Mountain Special Education deals with children with one or more problems in the physical, intellectual, social, or emotional areas offering individual attention and help on a one-to-one basis.

Many of the children in this program are highly intellectual and have what may be considered only a minor problem in the eyes of an adult. "But to the child, it is a major problem and can affect his performance in the classroom," says Mrs. Tom (Marie) McNeil, the Special Education teacher at White Mountain.

She works with about 36 children in a school day, no more than 15 at one time. Some may have problems affecting their performance and some are gifted children who need enrichment materials and programs in order that they can most nearly reach their fullest potential.

"The overall goal of this program," Mrs. McNeil explained, "is to offer for the individual child more success than failures within his school day. Through this self-fulfillment and self-esteem which they acquire, the individual potentiality and social responsibility of every child is developed."

A form of diagnostic testing is done along with daily observations of behavior, with a specific purpose of modifying or adapting a curriculum to fit the needs of the individual. Mrs. McNeil refers to this modifying and adapting as "prescriptive" teaching.

"Diagnostic Testing can be most useful in that a test might bring to light weaknesses, unrecognized potentials that could be weakened and developed, they may call attention to deficiencies that could be minimized or corrected, and they may indicate future success in school," she said.

According to Mrs. McNeil, in order to understand the results of standardized tests, certain cautions should be considered, such as:

- No test gives a complete appraisal of the individual; each measure only a small sample of his total ability.
- A test score should not necessarily be accepted at its face value; errors do occur in computation and in the interpretation of scores.
- A child is constantly changing and growing; he might score differently the next day if he were to retake the test.
- A child's interests, goals, values, and motives affect his day-by-day accomplishments in ways that are not reflected in his test results.
- Tests are used only as one guide and are weighed carefully against other behavior... over a period of time.

Three people were in Ruidoso this week testing Ruidoso Elementary students for the Special Education Division of the State Department of Education. These particular tests were to determine potential, learning disabilities and handicaps, but were also designed to determine specific strengths as well as weaknesses of the children tested.

Testing for the State Department were Mrs. Margery Fyles, Robert Blakeley and Roy Gonzalez, all of Albuquerque. Mrs. Fyles and Blakeley both spent three days at the White Mountain School which incorporates grades 1-3, and Gonzalez was at Nob Hill, grades 4-6. A total of approximately 40 students were tested.

Nob Hill school has no special education class at present, and Gonzalez told the News that he was assessing the school to determine if a need for such a program existed.

"The identification of a problem is important, but even more important is what can be done about it," says Mrs. McNeil. "Sometimes this involves teamwork with teachers, the school nurse, teacher aides, parents, administrators, physicians and others working together for the welfare of the individual child."

The school nurse is a particularly important member of the special education team, because it is she who discovers physical problems which may be hindering a child's performance, and refers him to a physician or someone else who can help him.

In the special education classroom attention is directed to a child's successes rather than his failures, although the children are often shown where they can learn from their mistakes. A wide range of instructional materials and learning techniques are used. Parent-teacher conferences are encouraged and visiting are welcome in the classroom.

A child may attend special education class from one to three periods a day. A child with an immediate need for a severe article of the program may attend for each period of special education class. A hypodermic needle, which requires one to be injected, may be used. One child may attend for one or two periods, while another child may attend for three or four periods. The child may have frequent contact with the classroom teacher, but the teacher may not be in the classroom.

Another child may have a short attention span and be inattentive. A goal for this child would be consistent increase of his attention span. One technique used would be for him to listen to records or tapes with cardboard paper work or illustrations which have a high interest value for him.

Children with a hearing loss will be given extra auditory training and instruction in how to best attend within the regular classroom setting as well as opportunities for speech improvement.

Referring to the special education is flexible. Whenever the child's behavior indicates that he can function in the regular classroom environment, he is moved immediately.

Mrs. McNeil said, "Emphasis is placed on understanding of what children's behavior means to them. It has been said that often such a child is special he should receive education tailored to his unique personality. To do this, special attention must be directed to a program set up to fulfill these needs."

### Traffic Tips

By DARRELL AUSTIN

64-22-17 - Operation of a motor vehicle by a person under twenty-one years of age while possessing alcoholic liquor prohibited.

-No person under the age of twenty-one shall operate a motor vehicle upon a public highway of this state while knowingly and unlawfully having in his possession any alcoholic liquor.

64-22-18 - Person under eighteen years of age operating a motor vehicle while possessing alcoholic liquor charged as a juvenile offender.

Any person under the age of eighteen years of age who violates section 1 of this act shall be charged as a juvenile offender.

64-22-19 - Minor driving motor vehicle while possessing alcoholic liquor - Suspension of driver's license.

Upon determination that a minor violated the provision of this act, the judge trying the case shall suspend the minor's driver's license for a period of not less than one day but not for more than any period of time which runs past the twenty-first birthday of such minor.





## Care In Antibiotic Use For Livestock

In the years ahead livestock and poultry producers will be challenged as never before to produce more food, more efficiently and more economically to feed our rapidly rising world population, according to W. A. Ljungdahl, extension livestock specialist at New Mexico State University. When used as recommended, antibiotics are extremely beneficial to mankind, he says, but without them our food would be much more expensive.

"Because some researchers have suggested that antibiotics may be a potentially serious threat to public health, antibiotics are under careful scrutiny by food and drug officials," Ljungdahl explains. "The public health concerns are the effect of a build-up of antibiotic-resistant organisms and the possibility that antibiotics may leave residues in meat."

Ljungdahl says if antibiotics continue to be effective in controlling disease and aiding in the production of food, they are a useful tool. And it is the responsibility of every person involved in use of antibiotics to prevent abuse and misuse.

So far, feed additives containing antibiotics have not been prohibited. But the following injectable antibiotics are prohibited: penicillin in oil or wax; benzathine penicillin preparations; penicillin G hydrochloride; chlorprocaine penicillin O; chlorotetracycline injectable; tetracycline; chloramphenicol and bacitracin injectable.

In addition to avoiding prohibited antibiotics, livestock producers must use permitted materials properly. Residues in meat can occur if drugs are used near the time

of slaughter, Ljungdahl warns. Follow all instructions pertaining to antibiotic use and be sure you observe withdrawal recommendations for permitted injectable drugs, he adds.

### FIRE FIGHTERS HAVE BIG YEAR

The unusual long and severe 1970 wildfire season on the Nation's public lands meant record earnings for the Forest Service-trained organized firefighting crews of the Southwest, Regional Forester William D. Hurst said today.

Hurst said the 1,800 members of organized crews—1,000 Indians and 800 mostly Spanish-Americans from northern New Mexico—earned \$1,904,065, topping the previous high by almost half a million. In 1970, the skilled firefighters worked 54,165 man days, including 30,450 outside the Arizona-New Mexico region. Their travels took them throughout the western states.

The firefighters operate in 25-man crews. Several National Forests in Arizona and New Mexico bear responsibility for recruiting, screening and training these elite forces. The forests and the number of crews they oversee are:


### New Mexico Is "Little Africa" Says Denver Post Article


