Special Meet Held by School Board To Study Building, Repair Proposal

A special meeting of the Ruidoso School Board was held Tuesday evening at the administrative offices of the school. Purpose for the meeting was to establish a priority for spending of funds raised by the proposed bond issue.

Building, remodeling and repair will be done in the following order: 1. New vocational building. Increased the proposed size from 2,000 square feet to 4,000 square feet.

2. New library. The present library would be replaced for vocational education area. 3. Nob Hill - remodeling, re-roofing, ceilings, storage and freezer room, inside sprinkler system, correcting windows and removing partitions.

4. Junior High - Remodeling, re-roofing, re-painting, replacement of ceiling tile, lighting, cafeteria, removing partitions, correcting

windows, and installing lockers. Gymnasium-Re-roofing, sprinkler system, changing locker rooms, painting, lighting, shower stalls for girls' locker room, lockers, and tile.

High School - Roofing, painting, ceilings, lighting, removing partitions, doors, lockers, correct windows.

White Mountain - Correct heating and lighting. 4. Home Economics - Enlarging of kitchen area.

5. Gymnasium - Addition on northwest corner of building. 6. New administration building. 7. Parking area for high school to be paved.

Darrell Fowler, of Stern Bros. fiscal agents, gave a report on tax rates and maturity schedules for the proposed bond issue. Fowler noted that the Ruidoso District now rates 60th out of the 139 school districts of the state in school taxes. The board expressed a desire to hold the school tax at its present level although it might mean sacrificing some of the needed improvements.

Superintendent Pat Vaillant told of funds allocated by the Legislature for the purpose of Vocational Education, and reported that the Ruidoso district is making application for monies from this fund.

Richard Mound To Head Chamber; Annual Drive Set For May 4th

Twelve directors were present for the regular monthly meeting of the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce held Monday night at the Ruidoso Village Hall.

Election of officers was the first order of business at the meeting with Dick Mound elected president; Bob Ehrbridge first vice-president; Wyman Scarborough, second vice-president, and Duane Bryson, treasurer. Outgoing president Jack DiPaolo will remain on the Executive Committee as Ex-officio.

A Fair-Share dues plan was adopted for the 1971 membership drive, slated to be held May 4. Under the new plan, a minimum membership will be \$90 paid on a unit system of 4 employees. Each additional four employees will require another membership. Businesses with multiple memberships will be entitled to an extra vote for each membership.

Two alternative plans were submitted to the board by the "Fair Share" committee. One plan would require a 1% lodging tax on motels and restaurants, to be returned to the chamber for the purpose of advertising. Another would be a gross receipts tax of 2 1/2% on all businesses (similar to the Village business license) that would be collected by the Village and returned to the chamber. Due to the lack of time before the annual membership drive, it was decided to further study the two alternative plans and adopt the 4 employee system for 1971.

Other action taken by the board included:

*A thank you letter was ordered sent to the management of Sunland Park for the courtesies extended Ruidoso at the recently held Ruidoso Day at the track.

*Hear a report from the new citizen welcoming committee.

*Agreed to pay \$300 to construct and man a display for the Travel Show at the Western Plaza Shop.

*Decided to change the "Tourist of the Week" to "Tourist of the Month."

*Accepted July 3 as Chamber of Commerce Day at Ruidoso Downs Race Track.

*Heard a report by T. L. Thompson on a professional motorcycle race to be held at Ruidoso Downs Race Track in conjunction with Ascendace.

*Accepted the resignation of Ray Day from the board of directors. Frank Potter was appointed to fill the vacancy.

*Decided to set May 4 as the date for the annual membership drive.

The next regular meeting of the board will be May 17.

Athletic Banquet To Feature Lou Henson

The Annual All-Sports Banquet and award presentation has been scheduled for Thursday, May 13, with the location to be announced at a later date. All athletes will be honored this year for the first time. Although the banquet has been formerly held at an earlier date, it was felt by the Booster Club, that the event should be scheduled after all sports had been completed for the year.

Speaker for the banquet will be Louis R. Henson, New Mexico State University Athletic Director and head basketball coach. Henson, born and raised in Okay, Okla., started his coaching career at Las Cruces High School in 1958 and has worked his way up to his position at NMSSU.

Henson's record doesn't include a losing year since he started with Las Cruces High. Statistics from 1956 to 1971 read as follows: Las Cruces High, 1956-'62, won 145, lost 23; Hardin-Simmons University, 1962-'66, won 67, lost 36; New Mexico State University, 1967-'71, won 108, lost 33. Overall collegiate record, won 178, lost 69.

Henson earned his bachelor's degree in the spring of 1955 and later returned to NMSSU to take his Master's Degree in Education Administration.







National School Bus Safety Week April 19-24

It was announced today by P. T. Valliant, Superintendent of the Ruidoso School District that April 19 through April 24, 1971, has been proclaimed "National School Bus Safety Week" by the President of the United States Governor Bruce King has also signed a proclamation designating it as "School Bus Safety Week" in New Mexico.

"Our school bus operators in the Ruidoso district travel more than 62,000 miles per year transporting 623 pupils to and from school daily. The safety record by these drivers in deserving of recognition and commendation by the school district and the public." Mr. Valliant said.

The school district and school bus operators in the Ruidoso school district would like to remind the motorists about the law concerning when to stop and not to stop for a school bus.

When a motorist is either behind or approaching a school bus with the alternating flashing red lights in operation they are to stop until the flashers are turned off. If you are on a divided highway and approaching a school bus, you do not have to stop. If a school bus is stopped off the roadway and the flashers are not in operation, the motorist does not have to stop. The motorist should be extra alert

and reduce speed anytime they are passing a school bus, since children are involved.

All of the people involved in school transportation request the public's assistance in helping them to continue to maintain their safety record. "School bus drivers carry more passengers each year than any other transportation system and with greater safety."

C. B. Lemon, Director, School Transportation and Coordinator of Administrative Services, made the following statement regarding "National School Bus Safety Week":

"I heartily endorse this recognition of our School Transportation Program in New Mexico. I hereby urge that school administrators, and parents alike, take this opportunity to express appreciation to the many dedicated men and women involved in the business of busing children to and from school."

Teachers' School Slated At Socorro

New Mexico classroom teachers will have an opportunity to get help from the real experts when the New Mexico Association of Classroom Teachers has its helpmobile demonstration in Socorro on April 24. Entitled "Know How, Show How, Pow Wow," the demonstration will feature master teachers giving demonstrations on methods that they are using in their classrooms.

Open to all classroom teachers and other interested persons, the Pow Wow gets underway at the Socorro Junior High School with registration at 9:00 a.m. Demonstrations will be given at ten and eleven. After each demonstration the teachers will have an opportunity to discuss the methods with the demonstrators.

Demonstrations will cover all grade levels from kindergarten through high school and a variety of subjects. Special efforts were made to have such a variety so as to have something for each teacher regardless of his grade level or subject area.

Among the subject areas to be presented are mathematics in the primary grades, puppetry for the elementary grades, ninth grade science, woodworking for both junior and senior high, corrective reading, drug education, environmental education, innovative teaching in the upper elementary grades, bi-lingual education, learning disabilities and eighth grade history.

The Pow Wow is being sponsored by the NMACT Commission on Quality Education. Mrs. Helen Michaelson, commission chairman from Carlsbad, stated that the NMACT has been working on this project for more than a year. It is part of the association's program of improving instruction in New Mexico schools.

The demonstrators will be from throughout the state of New Mexico. Among the school systems to be represented are Carlsbad, Roswell, Albuquerque, Raton, Grants, Jemez Mountains, Los Alamos, Questa and Santa Fe.

The program is being financed jointly by the New Mexico Association of Classroom Teachers and the State Department of Education. NMACT President Joe Middleton stated that the association was very grateful for the support from the state department, without which the program probably would not have been possible.

Self-Employed Can Deduct Moving Costs

Self-employed persons are now entitled to deduct moving expenses on federal income tax returns, Maurice E. Johnson, IRS District Director for New Mexico, said today. The Tax Reform Act of 1969 not only liberalized rules on deducting moving expenses but extended the deduction to self-employed people.

Additional deductions under the new law are now permitted for pre-move house-hunting trips, temporary living expenses at the new location for up to 30 days while looking for a permanent place to reside, and expenses related to selling a residence or settling a lease, Mr. Johnson said.

The total tax deductions for the three categories of expenses may not exceed \$2,500, with the deductions for house-hunting and temporary living expenses limited to \$1,000.

Deductible moving expenses include the cost to the taxpayer for moving himself, his family, household goods, pets, and personal effects from the old residence to the new one. For the taxpayer to qualify for the moving-expense deduction, his new place of work must be 50 miles farther from his former home than his former place of work.

A self-employed person is required to perform services full-time for at least 78 weeks during the 24-month period following arrival at the new location. And not less than 39 of the 78 weeks services must be performed in the first 12 months.

Full-time employees need to meet only the 39-week rule to deduct expenses.



Low Cost Insurance For Disabled Vets


The Veterans Administration notes that hundreds of disabled veterans are not taking advantage of valuable low cost insurance available to them.

Donald E. Crow, Director of the Albuquerque Regional Office, said that present VA disability ratings result in more than 7,000 veterans being added to VA compensation rolls each month.

When they are, Crow said, they are encouraged to apply for the special RH insurance with premiums so low that a 25-year old veteran, for example, can carry a \$10,000 insurance policy for \$2.60 a month. RH National Service Life Insurance is available to veterans separated from service after April 25, 1951, and who apply within one year from the date of notice from the VA granting service connection for a disability.

Thus, if a veteran converted within 120 days after separation, the \$15,000 Servicemen's Group Life Insurance he held while in service and later becomes eligible for RH insurance, he could carry \$35,000 insurance at comparatively low premiums. In many cases, veterans could not qualify for other insurance or could do so only by increased premiums, Crow said.

Disabled veterans are urged to get additional information from the nearest VA office as soon as possible after receiving a disability rating.

This is like the good old days — to look up at the Sierra Blanca and see it sparkling white to start off the summer. The river called for its water and there it is — ready to trickle down, replenishing the rivulets, springs and underground streams.

Late April Snow

It never grows old to smell the new rain after it has fallen on a dry countryside, and the breeze carries a thousand pleasant aromas of herbs, bushes, grass and twigs all refreshed with Heaven's water. And the snow, coming late this way takes you into a dreamy Spring-in-Winter world with the white flakes flying and mingling in the gale with the blossoms of the cherry, plum and pear—so that you can hardly tell snow from snowy bloom. And the blossom parade which got off to such an early start—somebody blew the whistle and the whole line-up stopped in its tracks.

"La Golondrina" (The Swallow)

But just before this break in the balmy beginning of Spring, the Swallows who every year come up from Mexico got word of the early coming of the good weather, and though they must have known it was too good to be true, they sent their lone scout (El Peregrino) to come and look the country over.

This little lone pilgrim arrived at the house the evening of April 17, very early in the year. I was surprised to see this tame little fellow, who stayed unafraid just above the front door under the eaves. He acted as if he were getting down for the night, but in the morning he was gone. Something told him to hurry back down to the rest of his clan down in Old Mexico, and tell them the time was not yet.

The way these swallows do is to send first this lone scout. Then if he does not return in a certain time, here comes a little band of a dozen or so. Then before long there are the whole tribe, two hundred or so circling in the evening sky. They like dull dry weather in which to build their colonies of mud houses, under the eaves of cliffs, in culverts, or under the eaves of the houses of people that they like. (It is good luck to have the swallows build their homes close by or under your roof.)

Since time immortal, people of Spanish origin have been great lovers of birds; and the swallow has a special place in their heart. A world-wide favorite song tells of this bird: "La Golondrina."

There are several types of Swallows. These are the Cliff Swallow, sometimes called by the Spanish, "Pajaros Adoberos", or "Adobe-Building Birds".

Soon they will be with us in flocks all over the countryside and it will be happy days when they are circling in the skies.



Talking Book Service Available To Blind, Disabled Persons

Persons with visual problems or other handicaps rendering them unable to read conventional books may avail themselves of "talking books," according to Leo Yates, extension family life specialist at New Mexico State University.

Talking book machines and recorded books are available free of charge from the New Mexico State Library, Santa Fe. Applications for library service should be addressed to Books For The Blind and Physically Handicapped (or BHPHD), Box 1026, Santa Fe, N. M. 87501.

A statement from a professional person - doctor, nurse, social worker, welfare worker, teacher, librarian or clergyman - explaining the nature of the disability must accompany the request for service, Yates says. Books are mailed directly to the borrower, who has only to reverse the mailing labels to return them. Postage is free for this service, which is supported by federal funds.

Large print books are also available to anyone - including those not visually or physically handicapped, the NMSU specialist adds.

Further information is available from Mrs. G. G. Ross, Librarian for the blind and physically handicapped at the address given. Mrs. Ross is also available as a speaker on the subject or will provide displays of available materials and equipment to groups requesting this service, the family life specialist says.

Orchards Damaged By Late Freeze

I visited several orchards last Thursday and Friday. The apple prospects are varied. The Picocho-Bondo area had a good bloom and no freeze damage at that time. The San Patricio-Glencoe area had a freeze that killed most of the Red Delicious blooms. Unless there are more late blooms, the Red Delicious in this area will be short. The Golden Delicious and Rome Beautys have prospects for a full crop yet, although there can be freeze damage until early May.

Lucio Zamora was planting a new orchard on the hedgerow system. He is planting a semi-dwarf spur type tree on 20 foot rows and 8 to 12 feet apart in the row. This will be a short solid row of trees in the mature orchard.

Sickness In Deer Under Investigation

A number of sick and emaciated deer have been reported in the Mayhill-Pecos area of the Sacramento Mountains. Some estimates indicate that at one time nearly 50 percent of the deer were effected by what New Mexico Department of Game and Fish biologists think was a bacterial disease. Gerald Gates, game biologist, feels the sickness has run its course as the Department study team sent into the area found very few sick animals and only one that had died.

Although many reports were received about the poor looking deer, no large number of dead animals have been found or reported to date.

Two deer were killed for study by a pathologist in an attempt to find out just what was causing the sickness. Gates said that until further laboratory tests were made, any definite diagnosis of the ailment will not be possible. However, Salmonellosis, a bacterial infection, is suspected from the preliminary tests made by Dr. K. P. Altera, Animal Pathologist from Fort Collins, Colo., who is conducting the tests for the Department of Game and Fish. Additional bacteriological studies are being run in Silver City and more tissue samples have been sent to Fort Collins for further analysis.

Gates advised that isolation of a bacterial disease in wild animals is extremely difficult and that the Department may not find the exact cause of this particular problem in the Sacramento mountains.

Deer herds in the southern part of the state go through a period of stress every year during February and March, causing a normal loss in weight and condition. Situations such as the one that developed near Mayhill is not in the normal pattern.

BRIDGEWATER, S. D. TRIUNE: "We are constantly reminded of the drug problem in our nation - it is out-of-control. I think most of us tend to sit back and ignore the worldly problems such as this because we say it 'doesn't happen in our small community.' Well, I think the 'silent majority' better take action because those problems are here too."

Your Social Security

Social security payments account for the largest single share - about 24 percent - of total income of people 65 or older and their wives or husbands, according to Bob Noble, social security Field Representative.

Social Security Administration studies of the Nation's 20 million older people indicate that their annual income is about \$50 billion, with social security benefits accounting for \$20 billion, Noble said.

About 20 percent of the income of older people comes from earnings, according to the study. Income from assets accounts for 18 percent. Other sources are: public pensions other than social security, 7 percent; private group pensions, 5 percent; public welfare, 4 percent; veterans' benefits, 3 percent; contributions from friends or relatives not in the older household, 1 percent; other sources, 3 percent.

Disaster Committee Reviews Drought

The Lincoln County Disaster Committee met on April 15 and reviewed the drought situation in the County. The extremely dry winter and early spring has reduced the normal soil moisture drastically and only a series of above normal rains can restore the soil moisture. The spring grass and annual forage need this moisture before they can produce any forage for the range livestock.

They recommend that procedures be started so that a drought area could be declared on May 1, unless conditions improve.



County Agent's Column

By RALPH DUNLAP (Lincoln County Agent)

Your chances of having a tire-car accident are about four times greater when towing a trailer. You can improve the odds and make your vacation or business trip safer and happier by following these suggestions:

Install a strong, safe trailer hitch with stabilizer bolted or welded to the frame of your car or truck.

Put heavy-duty springs and shock absorbers on your car or truck if weight on the hitch is more than 100 pounds.

Check electrical systems on both car and trailer to make sure all lights are working properly.

Adjust outside mirrors to give you a good view to the rear on both sides of the trailer. Add extra-long mirrors if necessary.

Take extra weight into account. Add additional air to car or truck tires to prevent sidewalls from flexing. Underinflation causes tire overheating, and increases the possibility of blowout.

Remember extra length. Allow more time to pass other vehicles.

Use gears and motor to help slow your vehicle, instead of relying completely on brakes. Use a low gear on hills to keep from overheating brakes. No matter how good your brakes are, they won't stop you if they get too hot.

Pay careful attention to steering. Ease into any change in direction, so car and trailer won't sway too much.

Avoid traffic situations that may require a panic stop—a sure invitation to jackknifing the car and trailer.

Stay alert. Remember that you are pulling extra weight and length. Follow a more leisurely pace and your drive will be smoother, safer and more enjoyable.

shy creatures who wait for an unlikely insect to become entangled in their web. Very few are really aggressive hunters who stalk their prey. After capturing an insect, all spiders crush a portion of it in their jaws and inject it with a digestive juice. Then, they literally suck the carcass dry.

Spiders are very abundant around your yard and garden. There may be thousands around the average home. This may not be a very pleasant thought, but since they are active mostly at night, we are unaware of the large numbers which are present. Because of the many insects they eat, some scientists believe spiders are more important than birds in controlling these undesirable pests. But you may ask, how about the poisonous spiders? Are they not dangerous to have around? Actually the hazard is very low. Almost all spiders are somewhat poisonous, but very few are seriously so.

In the last 250 years in the entire United States, there have been fewer than 100 human fatalities caused by spiders. This includes many very old, very young, or unhealthy people, who were quite

susceptible to arthropod venom. The number of deaths among healthy adults is extremely low.

As long as a spider is not handled roughly, it will not intentionally bite a person. They cannot see clearly beyond a few inches. As far as they are concerned, a human is a very large object to walk across, and is definitely not very edible.

And so, enjoy the beautiful design of the spider web on your shrubs and garden plants. Thank these little creatures for the job they do for you. Let them help maintain the balance of nature, and control some of the pests which would otherwise damage your flowers and vegetables.

The best thing to do when you feel like exercising is just lie down until the feeling goes away.

1971-72 School Budget Albert T. Serna Told For New Mexico Promoted by Army

Property taxes levied for public school purposes in New Mexico increased by \$13,529,501 or 61.78 percent during the past decade. Over 46 percent of property taxes levied for collection in New Mexico during 1970 were for public school purposes.

The increase in property taxes levied for school purposes (\$13,529,501) accounted for 47.49 percent of the total property tax increase (\$28,496,356) in 1970. Property taxes levied for school purposes were \$35,401,851.

Approved budgets for public schools for the current biennium are \$476,345,651.



Resource Area Meet Held In Ruidoso

The South Central Mountain Resource Area held its meeting in Ruidoso, N. M., April 13, 1971, with Robert Scribner, chairman, conducting the meeting. The executive committee met in the morning and the steering committee in the afternoon.

The second project was suggested by the New Mexico Department of Hospitals and Institutions to help train the students at Fort Stanton on Christmas tree care. The third project proposal also came from their organization, requesting a long range plan for beautification and development of the state hospital at Fort Stanton.

The Law and the Court—Today

ED. NOTE: The Ruidoso News, in cooperation with area courts and law enforcement agencies, will print a series of articles in an endeavor to give area residents a better understanding of recent changes in both civil and criminal laws and the relationship of these laws to the courts.

We are greatly appreciative of Ruidoso Division III Magistrate Judge Austin A. Prichett for his assistance in the undertaking. Citizens who desire an explanation or interpretation of a particular law may write the Ruidoso News and a response will be printed as answered by a responsible legal authority.

This week upon request of several individuals, we are printing the new state implied consent law which will go into effect July 1, 1971. The new law, an endeavor to get drunken drivers off of the highways, was passed during the recent state legislative session.

NEW MEXICO MOTOR VEHICLE LAWS

ARTICLE 22 IMPLIED CONSENT ACT

Any person who operates a motor vehicle within this state shall be deemed to have given consent, subject to the provisions of the Implied Consent Act, to a chemical test or tests of the breath or blood for the purpose of determining the alcoholic content of his blood, if arrested for any offense arising out of the acts alleged to have been committed while the person was in actual physical control of a motor vehicle while under the influence of an intoxicating liquor.

A breath test shall be administered at the direction of a law enforcement officer having reasonable ground to believe the person to have been driving or in actual physical control of a motor vehicle within this state, while under the influence of intoxicating liquor. If the person comes under the provisions of Section 64-22-2.0 NMSA 1953 the law enforcement officer may designate the test or tests to be given.

Consent of Person Incapable of Refusal Not Withdrawn— Any person who is dead, unconscious or otherwise in a condition rendering him incapable of refusal, shall be deemed not to have

Test — Revocation of License Or Privilege to Drive—

A. If a person under arrest refuses upon request of a law enforcement officer to submit to chemical tests designated by the law enforcement agency as provided in Sec. 64-22-2.0 NMSA 1953, none shall be administered.

B. The commissioner, upon receipt of a sworn report of a law enforcement officer that he had reasonable grounds to believe the arrested person had been driving or was in actual physical control of a motor vehicle within this state while under the influence of intoxicating liquor and that, upon his request, the person refused to submit to a chemical test, after being advised that failure to submit could result in revocation of his privilege to drive, shall revoke the person's New Mexico driver's license or any nonresident operating privilege for a period of one year. If the person is a resident, or will become a resident within one year and is without a license to operate a motor vehicle in this state, the commissioner shall deny the issuance of a license to him for a period of one year.

Revocation of License or Privilege to Drive — Notice— Hearing — Review— A. The commissioner shall notify the person who refused to submit to a chemical test upon request by a law enforcement officer that his New Mexico driver's license or any nonresident operating privilege has been revoked or denied. The notice shall inform the person of his right to a hearing.

B. Within twenty days after the date a notice of the commissioner's action has been mailed to him, a person whose license or privilege to drive has been revoked or denied for refusal to submit to a chemical test may request an opportunity for a hearing. A date for the hearing shall be set by the commissioner as early as practicable but not exceeding twenty days after the receipt of the request.

The hearing shall be held in the county wherein the offense for which the person was arrested took place. C. At the hearing the commissioner or his agent may administer oaths and may issue subpoenas for the attendance of witnesses and the production of relevant books and papers.

D. The hearing shall include the following: (1) Whether the law enforcement officer had reasonable grounds to believe that the person had been driving or in actual physical control of a motor vehicle within this state while under the influence of intoxicating liquor; (2) Whether the person was arrested;

(3) Whether the person refused to submit to a chemical test upon request of the law enforcement officer; and (4) Whether the law enforcement officer advised that the failure to submit to a test could result in revocation of his privilege to drive.

E. The commissioner shall enter an order either rescinding or sustaining the revocation or denial of the person's license or privilege to drive. F. A person adversely affected by an order of the commissioner may seek review within thirty days in the district court in the county wherein the offense for which the person was arrested took place.

The district court upon thirty days written notice to the commissioner shall hear the case. On appeal, it is for the court to determine only whether reasonable grounds exist for revocation or denial of the person's license or privilege to drive.

Severability— If any part or application of this act is held invalid, the remainder or its application to other situations or persons shall not be affected. Effective Date— The effective date of this act shall be July 1, 1971.
