## President of Lionism Will Arrive Sunday

Dr. Robert L. McCullough, Tulsa, Okla., and president of Lions International, will be the principal speaker during the 43rd Annual New Mexico State Lions Club Convention here this weekend. The much honored chief of Lions International is scheduled to arrive in Ruidoso Sunday at which time he will be formally introduced at a special ceremony at the convention headquarters, The Chaparral Motor Hotel.

Dr. McCullough was installed as President of Lions International on July 4, 1970. He is the third Oklahoma Lion to assume the leadership of the world's largest humanitarian service organization, with more than 932,000 members in 146 countries and geographic areas around the globe.

Dr. McCullough was elected Third International Vice-President in 1967 during the 50th Annual International Convention in Chicago and has served as Second and First Vice-President. His history of Lionism includes his service as District Governor and two-year term on the International Board of Directors where he served as a member of the Executive Committee. He holds a MacIver Key Award, six International President's Awards and Ambassador of Good Will Award.

Since his election as an Executive Officer, he has officially represented the Association in travels throughout the United States, Canada, Africa, South America, Europe and Asia.

An osteopathic physician and surgeon, Dr. McCullough received his Doctorate from Kansas City College of Osteopathy and Surgery and also has an honorary Doctor of Science Degree. He is a member of the Oklahoma State Board of Health and a Past President of the American Osteopathic Association.

He is Chairman of the Tulsa Youth for Christ Board of Directors, Director of the Arkansas Enterprise for the Blind, past member and Chairman of the Board of Directors of Youth for Christ International, Past President of the Green-T Club of the Tulsa Chamber of Commerce, Past President of the Building Committee and Trustee of the Oklahoma Osteopathic Hospital, member of the DelMoyle Legion of Honor, 32 Degree Mason, Shriner, Knight Templar, and is listed in Who's Who in America.

Dr. McCullough is a Sunday school teacher and deacon in the First Baptist Church. He and his wife Bert have two married children and six grandchildren.

## Appointment, Budget Receive Attention of Ruidoso Council

The Ruidoso Village budget and the appointment of a councilman to fill the vacancy created by the resignation of Wayne Estes caused tempers to flare at the regular meeting of the Ruidoso Village Council held last Thursday evening at the village hall.

Members of the council maintained that mayor George White had not given them sufficient time to consider and had not consulted them before naming Ed Brecheisen to the vacant council post. It was noted by one council member that the mayor had the power to appoint with "the advice and consent" of members of the board, and stated that he felt that the person so named should be considered by the entire board before holding an open meeting, to avoid embarrassment to the appointment. Mayor White commented that the board should not have a private meeting to discuss any village business. The board voted unanimously against the mayor's recommendation.

In presenting the village budget, the mayor recommended that the salaries of the councilmen and mayor be made zero, and that the salaries of all department heads remain the same as the previous year. A raise of 5 to 10% had been allowed in the tentative budget drawn up at two earlier meetings. When asked why he recommended the changes in the budget, the mayor replied that he had changed his mind.

Councilman Elmer Pirelli made the motion that the council reject all of the recommendations except the portion concerned with the mayor and councilmen's salaries. This motion was seconded by Councilman Earl Allison. The mayor refused to accept the second, saying that it was out of order. The mayor called for a public meeting to discuss the budget and was reminded that the deadline for presenting the budget to Santa Fe was June 1.

Trustee Pirelli asked for the question on the motion which was denied by the mayor. Mayor or White noted that the board could ask for an extension of time for preparing the budget. At this point, councilman Pirelli made the motion that the budget remain as it had been drawn with the exception of the councilmen's salaries, and that they be made zero. The motion was then seconded by councilman Earl Allison. The mayor refused to accept the second, saying that it was out of order.

## Buck Owens Show To Appear At The Chaparral's Jamboree Center

The Chaparral Motor Hotel's continuing effort to accelerate the area as the nation's Country and Western Music capital will be again intensified this Sat., June 5, as they present one of the nation's leading country and western performers in the person of Buck Owens.

Owens, who for five straight years was voted America's No. One Country Music Artist, will be appearing in the Ruidoso area for the first time. The popular world-wide entertainer last year was named Country Music Ambassador to the State of Texas at Texas Governor Preston Smith's inauguration and also Ambassador of Goodwill to the State of California by California Governor Ronald Reagan.

Appearing with the internationally known country singer and entertainer will be Susan Raye, the Buckaroos, Buddy Alan and the television popular Bakersfield Brass.

Miss Raye, appearing for her fourth time at the Chaparral, is a top flight performer in her own right and pleased the Chaparral audiences at each of her previous performances here. She is a regular on the nationally televised Buck Owens Show and a frequent guest on the also nationally televised Hee Haw show.

Miss McAdams, who took a group three years ago, said that any student can participate who is 15 and has at least a B-average. The students who will be guided by Miss McAdams are Susan Starkey, Sandra Weaver, Jane Scribner, Jeff Scribner and Gary Mayo.

Miss McAdams said that the tour is a study and the students will be spending time in the classroom besides touring. Two American professors are going with the tour besides the European professors the tour picks up in each country. Comparative government and cultures will be the main line of study, said Miss McAdams. The students will also get 1/2 high school credit.

Leaving for six weeks, the students will spend 8-10 days in each country they visit. Scheduled visits are to Italy, England, France, Netherlands and Austria.

## Downs Trustees Plead Innocent

Ruidoso Downs Village Trustees Billie Hafe and H. D. Pope entered a plea of innocent to charges of extortion, bribery and conflict of interest in a hearing before District Court Judge E. Forest Sanders in Carrizozo last Friday.

Assistant District Attorney Lawrence Pickett of Las Cruces said that Judge Sanders had set a trial date in late July on the accusations charging both men with conflict of interest. The Judge announced he would delay setting a trial date on extortion and bribery charges until after the July trial.

A Lincoln County Grand Jury had returned the indictments against the two trustees in early May. At that time the jury also filed "accusations" saying that the two men had financial interests in land offered for sale to the village housing authority while they served as members of the village council.

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

The case will be heard by District Judge S. E. Campos.

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

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

## Your Social Security

"I may never live to collect a dime from all this money I'm paying into social security!" This is a statement often heard from young workers according to Bob Noble, social security Field Representative.

The fact is Noble said, "the social security program provides for much more than just retirement payments. Disability and survivors benefits are two very important areas of protection often overlooked by the young worker."

Disability payments can be made to a young worker and his dependents with as little as one and one-half years of work if he becomes disabled before age 24. These benefits continue as long as the worker remains disabled. Survivor's benefits may also be payable to the young worker's dependents with as little as one and one-half years of work under social security.

Most of today's young workers will live to collect their social security at retirement Noble said. However, the young worker also can have peace of mind in knowing that he or his dependent will be able to collect on his social security should he become disabled or die before reaching retirement age.

## Caging A Tomato?

Canaries, parakeets, parrots, rabbits, mice and even alligators are often housed in cages by homeowners. But have you ever thought of "caging" a tomato plant?

The use of cages instead of trellises on which to grow garden tomatoes saves the labor of driving stakes, stretching overhead wires, tying branches, and pruning. Procedures employed in caging tomatoes is to set the plants, place a cage over each one, then leave them to themselves. The plants grow upright inside the cages with no human assistance or interference. No staking, pruning or training is needed. Each plant grows with some of its leaves and stems coming through the six-inch squares of wire mesh, of which the cage is made, to support itself in an upright position.

Cages are made of concrete reinforcing mesh of 10-gauge steel having six-inch squares and four to five feet high. Five to six foot lengths of the material are bent into cylindrical shape. The bottom wire is removed, leaving legs on the cages which are pushed into the ground for anchorage.

Cages permit tomato plants to develop naturally and to provide shade for ripening fruit. Sunscald, fruit cracking and fruit rots are greatly reduced. This system may be used by commercial growers as well as home gardeners.

### Taxpayers Newsletter

**TAX STUDY** — The Taxpayers Association of New Mexico has contracted with the Legislative Council Service to continue the on-going

tax structure study. The contract was signed effective May 15 and will continue to November 15. The contract was the first signed by the Association with a state agency since 1961, when the Association undertook part of the work of the so-called Little Hoover Commission.

Funds for the study were provided by the 1971 Legislature and will come to the Association on a "cost basis." A total of \$40,000 has been set aside for the study and will be utilized as expenses are incurred by the Association.

The study will be engineered by a 3-man professional committee consisting of Franklin Jones, Fred Moxey and Jack Deaton. Jones, Bureau of Revenue Commissioner for the state, has participated in most of the past tax studies since the Campbell administration. Deaton, a Roswell accountant, participated in early studies also under the Campbell administration. Moxey, who previously was executive secretary of the New Mexico Oil and Gas Association and was one time state tax commissioner, is a recognized authority on New Mexico's tax structure and related laws.

Subjects for the study will include property taxes, mobile homes, estate taxes, tax credits, fees, the corporate franchise tax, mileage allocation, special direct taxation, school finance, and natural resources taxes. Experts in those areas will be called as advisors to the professional committee from all segments of the population.

A legislative summary and supporting legislation will be submitted to a legislative committee in November. The Association will thereafter employ its own draftsmen, researchers and typists to complete the study.

Final reports of all activities of the study will be submitted to interested parties upon the completion of a mailing list. Persons interested in the study should contact the Taxpayers Association to be added to the list of expertise witnesses and mail recipients.




