## Record Turn Out Expected In Tuesday's Water Bond Election

Voters are expected to turn out in a record number for Tuesday's, Oct. 5, Ruidoso General Obligation Water Bond election. The \$1,000,000 G. O. Water Bond election is for a proposed Ruidoso water distribution and expansion project defined by many residents as a "Must!"

As stated in the Village's Call for Election, voters will have the opportunity to vote For or Against the village of Ruidoso insuring one million dollars in General Obligation Bonds for the purpose of "constructing, expanding, improving and extending the water system of the Village of Ruidoso."

The proposed water distribution and expansion project calls for an additional 40 million gallon off-river raw water storage facility located in the Upper Canyon and capable of assisting the area from the Upper Canyon to the Hollywood area if the need arises.

Also a one million gallon treated water storage tank will be located near the entrance of the San Valley subdivision, north of Ruidoso. The project also includes four new 500,000 gallon treated water storage tanks to be located, one each, in the Ponderosa Heights area, the Airport West area, the Highway and Indian Hills area, and the Pinecrest subdivision.

In addition to the increased storage facilities the plan calls for a 12-inch main water line to be installed down State Road 37 on Mechem Drive to the Mt. View Drive in Theaters.


Early steps also are being taken by the village to secure additional water rights.

Members of the village have anticipated that the water supply from the Rio Grande will be sufficient to meet the needs of the village. This does not include the water taken from the Ash Lake reservoir of which the village is entitled to 100 cfs.

Because of the lack of storage facilities, low existing in the village, much of the water goes down stream unused by the municipality. The proposed new water storage facilities and new storage tanks are designed to remedy the problem.

The village administration, both past and present, has consistently, for the past twenty-four months, endeavored to secure federal funds for the much needed water improvement project. Until recently no concrete assurance of federal grants have been presented to the village.

The situation now reported by village officials, is that we have been encouraged that federal help might possibly be received but only if the voters approve the water bond election. He continued, the government feels that if the voters do not

work in favor of the need of the water improvement project thru the federal government cannot interfere with local voting decisions.

The Ruidoso Village Council has repeatedly assured Ruidoso residents and property owners that only those water bond monies needed will be used for the project. If federal grants are made available to the village then only that portion of bond monies needed will be used, thus leaving the taxpayers.

One of the council members stated, "one of the reasons we want a large turn out of voters and a seventy percent vote in favor of the water improvement project is to convince the federal agencies that Ruidoso residents are in favor of the water expansion project."

A leading Ruidoso businessman stated this week, "If the voters will just look back a couple of months ago and seriously remember the very critical water shortage in our community they will vote in favor of the bond election." He further remarked, "how can they turn this 'survival' water bond down when it can't do anything but save as well as help our village, and without an increase in taxes?"

## Ruidoso Downs Village Council Refuses River Park Subdv. Plat

The Ruidoso Downs village council, in a meet held Monday evening at the village hall, again turned down a plat of the River Park Subdivision. Before a vote was taken on the plat, Trustee H. D. Pope noted that he had a financial interest in the corporation and disqualified himself from the vote. Councilman Charlie Carpenter stated that he could not see anything wrong with the plat and noted that he could see no reason for refusing to approve the proposal. Mayor Clotis Perry stated that, although the plat had been submitted over a year ago, he felt that no action should be taken until a full Planning and Zoning committee and a full council could act on the plan. Therefore, with a tie vote, the plat was not approved.

In other action by the board, the council:

- Accepted the resignation of Ed Witche as janitor for the village and noted that two applications had been submitted for the position of janitor since. Reserved action on the applications until an attempt had been made to secure someone for the joint position.
- Read a letter concerning the bankruptcy of a village business.
- Opened bids from two insurance companies for insurance on the village vehicles and accepted the bid of the Cooper Agency.
- Voted a resolution deleting items from the village inventory for the 1970-71 year. Noted that many of the items should have been deleted in prior inventories.
- Approved a request from the fire department for the purchase of nine dry chemical fire extinguishers.
- Following recommendations from the State Finance Department and the village auditor, agreed to purchase a check writer for the village office.
- Filed the monthly bills.
- Heard a complaint on garbage service from Pete Smith.

The next regular meet of the council will be held in the village hall Oct. 11, at 7:30 p.m.

Superintendent Pat Vahlman announced today that an appointment to fill the vacancy will be made at a special called meet to be held October 7, 7:30 p.m. at the school administration building. Bids on remaining bonds to be sold will also be opened at this meet.

## Highway Construction Officials Stress Caution By Drivers

U.S. Highway 70 construction officials reported this week that work on the one million dollar highway construction project between Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs is well advanced.

Construction supervisors have urged drivers to exercise extreme caution while driving through the construction area. Although the highway will not be closed to traffic, serious roadblocks will be necessary at various locations within the six miles of construction. One significant detour will exist at a bridge site approximately two miles east of Glenoco.

Officials also reported that detours will not be feasible at some locations within the construction project and the highway will have to be under construction under full traffic conditions.

Joseph W. Nail, Project Supervisor for construction east of Glenoco, stated "the safety of the public is our main concern and cooperation would be greatly appreciated to help prevent property damage or loss of life."

The highway construction contractor for the portion of the construction east of Glenoco is Healy Construction Co. of Santa Fe and Ruidoso. Wylie Bros. Construction Co., Albuquerque, is contractor of the construction project west of Glenoco.

## STORAGE IS VITAL

Ruidoso's water supply is totally dependent on the elements — rain and snow; think about that a minute.

Weather and stream diversion records for almost 60 years indicate periodic droughty conditions. These appear to occur in major proportions at approximately 15 1/2 year intervals, and minor proportions at approximately 7 year intervals.

History and records should be our best indicator — it has been dry before, and it will be again.

There is plenty of water most normal years, but raw and treated water storage, in the bank so to speak, to take care of the dry years is absolutely essential.

I urge a YES vote for the water expansion bond issue October 5, 1971.



## News 'n Notes

Entries are already coming in for the 1971-72 New Mexico Make It Yourself With Wool Competition. Girls will compete in 11 district contests, with winners vying for state honors December 4, in Clovis.

Information on how to enter may be obtained from district contest directors. Sub-deb, junior and senior division competition will take place on the district level, with state competition limited to junior and senior classifications. No adult competition (over 21) will be held in New Mexico.

Junior and Senior division state winners will represent New Mexico in national finals January 20, 1972 at Phoenix, Ariz. Prizes at the national level include European vacations for junior and senior division winners, college scholarships, savings bonds and many other prizes. Prizes are also awarded at the district and state levels.

Sub-deb entrants are between 10 and 13 years old; juniors are 14 through 16, and seniors are 17 through 21. Entrants in the district and state contests must be from New Mexico unless they are attending college here from another state. Garments entered in the contest must have been made after January 1, 1971, and must be made from American yarn or American loomed, knitted or felted 100 percent wool.

The Make It Yourself With Wool competition is both a sewing or knitting and fashion competition. Girls will be judged on knowledge of wool fabric or yarn and design; poise and presentation; the suitability of the garments to their way of life; and sewing or knitting skill. Girls are required to model their garments at all levels of competition. They must select and construct their own garments, although they may be advised and taught by an advisor, parent or teacher.

With sweet corn, for instance, and all vegetables, a quick hike from the garden, to the house to process them for the freezer is recommended. A delay of more than a few hours from picking to processing with corn is apt to result in significant loss of quality if it is refrigerated.

It is still necessary to scald corn properly before freezing, or it may have a taste like hay, or the cob, or be mushy. Corn should be husked, all silks removed, and ends trimmed. In a very large kettle (allowing one quart of boiling water for each ear of sweet corn) medium size ears should be scalded eight minutes and larger ears 11 minutes. Corn should be scalded in a covered kettle. The same boiling water can be added to for new batches of corn. When the water begins to look murky, it's time to change it.

From the scalding water, plunge corn immediately into cold water; this generally means water with ice cubes in it unless the water supply is very cold well water. Ears must be submerged in the ice water to cool the cob thoroughly. Cooling takes twice as long as scalding—usually 16 to 20 minutes.

Don't process too much corn at once and be sure before starting that adequate cooling space is available.

### Price Freeze Questions and Answers

(Editor's Note: The following questions and answers are presented by the Bureau of Internal Revenue, administrators for the program.)

**Q—How did the Internal Revenue Service get involved in answering questions about the Wage-Price Freeze?**  
**A—**The Internal Revenue

Service undertook the assignment at the request of the Office of Emergency Preparedness which is the operating arm of the new Wage-Price program. Utilizing its nationwide taxpayer assistance network, the IRS receives, analyzes and investigates complaints and answers questions at 360 of its offices throughout the country.

**Q—What does the IRS do after it receives a complaint of a Wage-Price Freeze violation?**  
**A—**The IRS will acknowledge the complaint and, if there is a reasonable basis for concluding that a violation may exist, it may contact the alleged offender to obtain voluntary compliance with the Presidential order or conduct further investigation. The IRS offices will report to the Office of Emergency Preparedness when further action is required. Actual prosecutions are the responsibility of the Justice Department.

**Q—Do complaints of Freeze violations have to be in writing?**  
**A—**No. Although the IRS prefers that complaints be written to make referrals to the Office of Emergency Preparedness easier and to establish whether there is any pattern of problems in a particular area, all complaints are recorded, analyzed and investigated.

**Q—I'm supposed to get a promotion in October. Can I still be promoted despite the Freeze?**  
**A—**Yes. Actual promotions to established positions with greater responsibilities are allowed, as well as increases in apprentice's and learner's rates under programs set up before Aug. 15. However, merit and longevity increases are not permitted during the Freeze.

**Q—What sort of penalties will be invoked against businesses that violate the Freeze?**  
**A—**The Justice Department may seek an injunction to stop an individual or business from violating the Presidential order. Failure to comply with the injunction may place the violator in contempt of court and result in the handling down of civil penalties on an escalating daily basis.

The law also provides a \$5,000 fine which may be imposed for each violation.  
**Q—**My college announced

last spring that it would raise tuition for the fall semester. Is this increase covered by the Freeze?  
**A—**No. Increases in tuition rates announced before Aug. 15 may still take place, even though they do not go into effect until September, because commitments and, in many cases, payments have already been made.

**Q—**My landlord sent me a notice the first week of August that my rent was to be increased as of Sept. 1. Do I have to pay the increase?

**A—**No. Rents on apartments and houses cannot be raised during the Freeze period. Even if an agreement had been signed before Aug. 15 and scheduled to go into effect after the 15th, the increase would not be allowed.

School News

Ruidoso's first, second and third graders are attending White Mountain School in a program best described as "Continuous Progress." Each child starts at his own level, and progresses at his own pace. Parents and visitors are urged to visit the school, where no "visitor days" are planned. Nobody needs an appointment or an invitation to drop in. The program involves team teaching, small groups, individualized instruction, special education, teacher and parent aides. Visitors would see a lot of self-directed activity; and the "open classroom" concept, in which children set up their own equipment or gravitate to interest centers. Older children may be seen helping younger children. To call the system at White Mountain "progressive" is misleading, because it calls to mind the permissive or unstructured system that has been called "progressive" in the past. As a matter of fact, there are structures and regulations governing each child at White Mountain, but the children have shown they can do some of the ruling and regulating for themselves, when given the chance. To call the White Mountain system "non-graded" would also be incorrect. While each child may move back and forth to different levels in the different grades, the grades themselves remain. For example, a child may be registered in second grade. Yet he may study arithmetic at a third grade level, or spelling at a first grade level. As a year passes, he may "slow down" in arithmetic and move back to a second grade level, or "speed up" in spelling, and so on. At the same time, all the children in one grade do certain studies together, so no one gets "tracked" or programmed into a slot. With team teaching, and volunteer and paid teacher aides, each child gets more group activities and individual attention. In addition, there is a Special Education department directed by Mrs. Tom McNeil, in which children receive help where it is needed. Vision, hearing, speech, and other learning problems receive special attention. Spanish and Indian-speaking children get language training where needed, with emphasis on helping these children retain and respect their own languages and cultures. Mrs. Gale Fekky, school nurse, supervises a Perceptual Training program that gives children even more intensive help when needed. This program is carried on by parent volunteers who have shown the tremendous value of non-professional help in the schools. Anyone interested in volunteering a few hours a week at school should call the White Mountain office, or any White Mountain teacher.

### County Agent's Column

By RALPH DUNLAP

You can reduce the use of insecticide inside your home this winter if you kill bugs outside. Apply an invisible barrier of insecticide all the way around your house this fall. You can kill the bugs before they get in. Many insects that are common to spend the summer outside, head for the shelter of your house when the nights become cool. Heat radiating from the walls after sundown and lights at night attract insects seeking shelter for the winter. Some of the most troublesome pests are cockroaches, silverfish, crickets, boxelder bugs, elm leaf beetles and fall web-worm caterpillars.

A chlordane spray applied to the outside foundation of your home will keep out most of these invaders. If the invasion is already in progress, add Dibrom or Spectracide to the chlordane to give a fast knock-down. Dibrom, also sold as Fly Killer D, gives very quick results against boxelder bugs and caterpillars when sprayed directly on them. In areas where elm leaf beetles and boxelder bugs are a problem, treat the trunks of elm and boxelder trees with your insecticide mixture. Spraying is the best method of applying the barrier around the home. Treat the outside walls and foundation from soil to top and about five to six inches of soil next to the foundation. Give cracks and crevices extra attention. Also treat along edges of sidewalks and driveways. If a sprayer isn't available, then a sprinker can do. For treating window sills and thresholds, a paint brush makes a good applicator.

Read the label on your insecticide before mixing your spray. Use the rates recommended for control of household insects or flies. Plant foliage should not be treated with the mixture, however the bark of trees can be treated without injury.

The Red Delicious, the most plentiful apple, is excellent for eating and salads. For a general purpose apple consider the Jonathan or the Golden Delicious if you prefer a sweet general purpose apple. The Paula Henry and Golden Winesap have the best started and are good to store for later use. For apple recipes, get the Apple Variety use pamphlet from the County Agent's office.



### Three Sentenced To County Jail By Magistrate

A former Roswell and San Antonio, Texas resident, Mrs. Dorothy Gerber, 50, was sentenced Wednesday to 90 days in the Lincoln County Jail, Carrizozo, and fined \$25 by Magistrate Judge Arthur A. Pritchett at the Ruidoso Magistrate Court.

A veteran with a service-connected disability has one year from the date he receives his notice of service connection to apply to VA for Service-Disabled Veterans Insurance. He has one year from the date of his separation to apply for VA dental care, or to request unemployment compensation from his local state employment service. Veterans have eight years from date of separation to apply for and receive educational assistance benefits, which terminate after that time.

For a veteran with a service-connected injury or disease, there is no time limit for applying for VA disability compensation, but in order to receive payments dated from the time of his separation from military service, he must apply within one year of separation.



Ruidoso's Gary White set up the first Ruidoso score as he hit a Canutillo ball carrier hard on the Eagles' 6-yard line and David Boehm recovered the pigskin in the end zone for the first six-points for Ruidoso early in the first quarter. The try for the extra point was no good.

Ruidoso's second TD of the evening came when Ruidoso was forced to punt to the Canutillo team on a fourth down. The Eagle back was hit hard and a Ruidoso player fell on the ball on the Canutillo 44-yard line. From there Miller and Kent Skarda took turns as they blasted down to the Eagles' 19-yard line. Quarterback Miller then threw a perfect strike to halfback Calderon for the second TD. A running try for the extra 2-point conversion was stopped short.

Canutillo came roaring back in the second quarter, but Ruidoso's defense really came on strong as they stopped the Canutillo eleven on the Tribes' 7-yard line to hand the ball over to the offense. Ruidoso couldn't get their offense moving and had to punt away from their own 5-yard line. After taking the ball on their own 43-yard line, the Eagles scored in 3 plays, two by passing. A kicking try for the extra point was true and the Eagles took the lead for the first time, 13-12.

Miller came up with the first of two pass interceptions shortly afterwards to set up Ruidoso's third touchdown. Quarterback Garcia lobbed a long pass

down to the Ruidoso 15-yard line, intended for his right end. Miller played the ball perfectly and stepped around the intended receiver, bobbled the ball momentarily then set sail for the opposite end of the field. Picking up good blocking from his teammates, Miller was hauled in on the Eagles' 14-yard line. Miller carried down to the 4-yard line out of the wishbone set and again he kept the ball and went over the double stripe standing up. This time halfback Frankie Calderon ripped into the end zone for the extra 2-point, putting the hard-hitting Warriors ahead, 20-13.

Ruidoso's hard-charging line and secondary completely throttled the vaunted passing game of the Eagles throughout the last two quarters of the ball

game. Miller picked up his second pass interception in the fourth quarter to bring his total to seven interceptions for the season. Kevin Lane, defensive back, also plucked off another aerial in the second quarter. Ruidoso's hard-charging linemen completely frustrated the Canutillo quarterback, as they applied the pressure again and again, either blocking the passer, wrapping up the quarterback or making him hurry his throws and missing the mark. 

### Three Sentenced To County Jail By Magistrate

A former Roswell and San Antonio, Texas resident, Mrs. Koufa Gerber, 60, was sentenced Wednesday, to 90 days in the Lincoln County Jail, Carrizozo, and fined \$25 by Magistrate Judge Arthur A. Pritchett in the Ruidoso Magistrate Court.

Mrs. Gerber was arrested and placed in custody Tuesday night by Lincoln County Deputy Sheriff Jerry Foster on a worthless check complaint signed by a local merchant.

The woman appeared before Judge Pritchett and after being advised of her rights pled guilty to the charge of issuing worthless checks. She reportedly issued a total of six checks to three separate Ruidoso merchants, the first on September 1. The checks amounted to \$75.

Issuing worthless checks under \$25 is a petty misdemeanor and carries a maximum penalty on each complaint of six months in the county jail and/or a fine up to \$100.

Judge Pritchett, in sentencing the woman, stated that he would suspend sixty days of the ninety days jail term if restitution of the \$75 was made. It was understood that the sixty day suspension would be a probationary period.

## QUESTIONS - ANSWERS RUIDOSO WATER BOND

**NOTE:** On Oct. 5 Ruidoso registered voters and Ruidoso property owners who live in Lincoln County will vote to approve or disapprove a one million dollar General Obligation Bond issuance by the Village of Ruidoso.

The G. O. Bond issuance has been called by the village to construct a major water distribution and storage system for the Village of Ruidoso.

The RUIDOSO NEWS will endeavor to answer any and all questions relative to the proposed water expansion project and election. Questions may be mailed to THE RUIDOSO NEWS, BOX 128, RUIDOSO, N. M. 88345.

**QUESTION -** If the October 5th Ruidoso Municipal Water Bond Election passes will municipal water rates be increased?

**ANSWER -** No. The proposed new water distribution and expansion system require additional employment cost for the village?

**ANSWER -** No. The new system will not require additional village personnel to operate or maintain the system.

**QUESTION -** Where will the voting place be located for the water bond election?

**ANSWER -** There will be just one voting place. The Ruidoso Municipal Building, Tuesday, Oct. 5 between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 7:00 p.m.

**QUESTION -** Who can vote?

**ANSWER -** Any qualified and registered voter. Also those qualified voters residing in any within the village limits of Ruidoso. A qualified voter must be registered thirty days prior to any municipal election.

**QUESTION -** If the Water Bond Election passes, when will construction work begin?

**ANSWER -** Village officials report that construction will begin right after the first of the year or sooner if legal matters permit and if weather permits.

**QUESTION -** How many questions will be on the official ballot for the Water Bond Election?

**ANSWER -** Just one. Voting will be by voting machines and will have only one matter to be considered. For or Against the Village of Ruidoso issuing one million dollars in General Obligation Bonds for the purpose of

constructing, enlarging, improving, and extending the Water System of the Village of Ruidoso.

**QUESTION -** What part of the new Ruidoso water system will be constructed first?

**ANSWER -** Construction of the 40 million gallon off-river raw water-storage facility in the Upper Canyon. The next priority will be the construction and installation of three 1/2-million gallon treated water storage tanks, water mains and pumps in (1) Northwest of Ponderosa Heights, (2) Highway-Indian Hills Subdivision and (3) The Pinecrest Subdivision.

**QUESTION -** Will the new 40 million gallon raw water storage facility in the Upper Canyon serve any other areas of Ruidoso?

**ANSWER -** Yes, the system will be engineered so that if a need arises, the 40 million gallon raw water storage facility in the Upper Canyon can serve the Ruidoso area all the way to Hollywood.

**QUESTION -** If the Water Bond issue is approved by the voters will the Hollywood well be used?

**ANSWER -** No. The Hollywood Well was activated only because of an existing need during last summer's water shortage. It is not in use now and will not be used unless an extreme water shortage occurs as did last summer.

**QUESTION -** Is the Village of Ruidoso endeavoring to purchase additional water rights in order to secure more water?

**ANSWER -** Absolutely YES! In addition to attempting to purchase additional water rights, with the monies already allocated for water improvement projects, the new water and distribution and expansion system will have the storage facilities to retain water that up to now goes down stream.

**QUESTION -** What is the history, regarding the amount of water used by the Village of Ruidoso?

**ANSWER -** In 1900-07 the Village of Ruidoso, officially pumped 109,070,000 gallons of water as compared with 168,584,000 gallons in 1970-71. The estimated gallons for 1970-71 was set by village officials at 183,000,000 but due to water rationing during this past summer only 168,584,000 gallons was pumped.

The year and gallonsage for that year are as follows:

1966-67	109,070,000
1967-68	109,812,000
1968-69	142,425,300
1969-70	151,874,200
1970-71	168,580,600
1970-71 (Estimate)	183,000,000

**QUESTION -** Who will profit from the new water expansion

and distribution system?

**ANSWER -** The answer is not who will but emphatically WHO WON'T PROFIT by the water expansion and distribution system. Everyone will without question profit by the new system, resident, commercial businesses, tourists, students, and every property owner in the municipality.

**QUESTION -** Why do we need additional water treatment plants?

**ANSWER -** The village currently has treated water storage facilities for 2,500,000 gallons of water. The new expansion and distribution program, which includes five new treated water storage tanks, will double the present storage capacity to 5,000,000.

The reason for additional treatment and treated water storage is that because of the village's growth in the past ten years the village at the present just does not have the treated water storage facilities to match the growth needs. For example on two different occasions in 1970 the village pumped over a million gallons of treated water in a single day. The records show that on June 20, 1970, 1,050,000 gallons were pumped and then on July 8, 1970, 1,040,400 gallons were pumped for municipal use.

Raw water storage is a necessity but treated water suitable for human use is still another matter. The village needs additional treated water storage facilities.

**QUESTION -** Who will pay for the land and whose land will the village use upon which to construct the new million gallon storage tank and water treatment plant?

**ANSWER -** No purchase of land will be necessary as the village already has a lease agreement with the Eagle Creek Water Association for land in the vicinity of the San Valley subdivision. Plus the fact that the Village of Ruidoso owns one-half of the Eagle Creek Water Association, the other half is owned by the Village of Capitlan.

**QUESTION -** Has a Ruidoso Municipal General Obligation Bond ever failed to be passed by the voters of the Village of Ruidoso?

**ANSWER -** NO! **QUESTION -** Has the Village of Ruidoso ever failed to meet its bond indebtedness, either G. O. Bond or Revenue.

**ANSWER -** NO. The Village of Ruidoso has never failed to meet its indebtedness regarding G. O. Bonds or Revenue Bonds.

**QUESTION -** How much will our taxes increase if the water bond issue passes?

**ANSWER -** According to local officials recent tax structure figures reveal that there will be no increase in our taxes and that our taxes may in fact be lower than in 1970.

The official report on the tax rate structure which includes municipal, state, county, school and hospital tax for 1970 and 1971 is as follows:

1970 tax rate per \$1,000 assessed property valuation	\$41.00.
1971 tax rate per \$1,000 assessed property valuation	\$54.00.

The 1971 tax rate decrease was due to the large increase in the number of new additions on the municipal tax roles and the increase in property valuation

in the municipality. 1972 tax rate per \$1,000 assessed property valuation—with a normal growth of the village will not exceed the 1970 tax rate and is estimated to be around \$55.00 per \$1,000 assessed property valuation.

**QUESTION -** What size earth tank is proposed for the upper canyon area?

**ANSWER -** Plans call for around a 40 million gallon earth tank to be constructed in the upper-canyon of Ruidoso.

**NOTE:** One of the serious problems currently existing in the village is that the village has not had adequate water storage facilities to contain water during rain and snow run offs. The results has been that the village has really never realized its complete quota of water at but very few times during the year. Currently the municipality of Ruidoso has a quota of 72 million gallons per year from the Ruidoso River and water taken from anywhere in the area water basin, including water wells. This does not include water taken from Alto Lake. Ruidoso has a fifty percent claim on the water in the Alto Lake Reservoir.

**QUESTION -** How does the current water situation affect our fire insurance?

**ANSWER -** New Mexico bases fire insurance on a municipality's ability to fight fires, its equipment water and related needs. If the water bond issue is not passed Ruidoso can be assured of a fire insurance cost increase.

The village is currently carrying a class 7 rating (the same as Roswell and Alamogordo) but since fire insurance is based upon adequate water, water distribution and storage, property owners' fire insurance rates will naturally be increased as the village is placed in an appropriate class to correspond with our fire fighting ability.

**QUESTION -** With our current water storage facilities, if we had adequate rainfall, would our village have equally adequate fire protection?

**ANSWER -** No! With the increase in both population and property improvements over the past ten years the results naturally are that more water is being used and additional fire protection is an absolute must.

According to village officials, if we would have had adequate rainfall this past summer (during the extreme and critical dry condition) the fire danger situation would have been just as critical because of the lack of water storage facilities and limited water distribution.

It is a known fact that during the past two Fourth of July weekends (1970-71) in at least one large area of the village there was not enough water stored to fight even a small fire. This was also unofficially reported to be the condition in several other Ruidoso areas as well.

**QUESTION -** If the bond election fails, what happens?

**ANSWER -** The village will have to wait at least two more years before it can call for another election which means that the village would have to go through at least three and possibly four more summers without adequate water distribution and storage.

Also, if the bond issue fails, government officials have stated that federal grants would

### Upper Hondo SWCD Gives Annual Report

The following is the Annual Report of the Upper Hondo SWCD. This report shows the District's activities and accomplishments during the period July 1, 1970, through June 30, 1971.

The Upper Hondo Soil and Water Conservation District was organized June 27, 1961, as a local subdivision of the State of New Mexico. It was formed to further total resource conservation and development and give local people the opportunity to plan, direct and carry out projects that will lead to the conservation and development of the area's resources.

Present Supervisors of the District are Bert Pflingsten, Chairman; Bob Scribner, Vice-Chairman; Ernest McDaniel, Secretary; Treasurer; Harvey McDaniel, Member; and LaVerne Peters, Member. These Supervisors are elected for three-year terms to administer the Soil and Water Conservation District program and its activities. Bob Scribner will complete his three-year term this year and will be up for re-election in October.

The Board of Supervisors meets regularly on the first Tuesday of each month at the

High Country Lodge at 7:00 p.m. There were twenty-two regular meetings this past year with an average of four of the five supervisors attending each meeting. There was also an average of nearly three guests at each meeting. One of these meetings was a joint meeting with the Carizozo SWCD.

The Upper Hondo Soil and Water Conservation District entered the Goodyear Award Program this year and won first place. Bill Edgar was selected as the outstanding cooperator and Bert Pflingsten as the supervisor to go on the expense paid Goodyear Tour at Litchfield Park, Ariz.

The outstanding Soil and Water Conservation District Award was presented also to the Upper Hondo District at the Annual State Association meeting in Tucuman. The Upper Hondo SWCD Board of Supervisors volunteered to host the 6th SWCD meeting in Lincoln on August 6, 1971. The Upper Hondo Board will also host the Annual State SWCD Association meeting in Ruidoso, Nov. 16-19, 1971.

The Annual Plan of Operations of the Upper Hondo SWCD for fiscal year 1971 and highlights of action taken on the objectives consisted of the following:

1. Assist South Central Mountain Resource Area in implementing project proposals within the SWCD. The Supervisors have actively supported the

SCMRA. Bob Scribner, Vice-Chairman of the Board, is Chairman of the Steering Committee. Four new project proposals were submitted this past year by the Upper Hondo District to the SCMRA for assistance in getting needed resource conservation and development in the area.

2. Give necessary assistance to community ditches in obtaining recognition to their irrigation systems. During the year, final plans were completed for the Ambrosio Chavez community ditch, and construction will be done this fall.
3. Provide assistance and direction in getting the proposed Capitan Lake installed. The proposed site was resurveyed, and new designs were made. A new estimate revealed an increase in cost. The State Game and Fish Department withdrew cost-sharing funds which state-aided progress while new funds are being sought.
4. Encourage and assist in getting erosion control measures started on the watershed above proposed Capitan Lake. Trial structural work on gulches along with vegetable plantings were completed. Due to the recent drought, the plantings have not responded well.
5. Work with the County Commissioners in getting a planning and zoning ordinance passed. The District worked closely with the Lincoln County Planning and Zoning Commission in establishing proposed planning and zoning ordinances for submission to the Lincoln County Commission.
6. Work with subdividers and individual ranchers owners in the proper use and development of their land. Through an intensive education and information program, the subdividers are now more aware of the technical assistance available to them in coping with land use and planning problems. Subdividers in the District were contacted by District officials and furnished leaflets outlining assistance available to both subdividers and individual rancher owners.
7. Encourage the continued use of the Great Plains Conservation and Rural Environmental Agricultural Programs in the District. Ranchers and farmers continued to participate in both of these very beneficial programs. The majority of the application practices was to improve livestock watering and grazing distribution.

### Mail Service To Be Improved

Lincoln County postmasters amplifying on a new letter mail service program recently announced by Washington headquarters, today identified local areas which are to receive overnight delivery of first-class mail originating within the Lincoln County area.

Practically all areas contiguous to Lincoln County will benefit from the next-day delivery under a new mail service goal announced by Postmaster General Winton M. Blount.

These areas include the following: Farmington, Gallup,

Chama and Tucuman in the State of New Mexico. Postmaster General Blount on August 23 unveiled the Postal Service's new goal of overnight delivery of local area first-class Zip Coded letter mail deposited by 5 p.m.

The Postmaster-General has pointed out that this program will affect more than half of all first-class letter mail sent in the United States.

Postmasters in Lincoln County say, "Customers of every post office in the country will be benefitting from the new service goal."

Substantially more than half of the 52 billion pieces of first-class letter mail handled annually are for delivery in the city where deposited or its nearby community.

The areas outlined today by Lincoln County Postmasters are those within which next-day delivery will be provided for Zip Coded letter mail deposited by 5 p.m. on weekdays in local Post Offices.

The Postal Service has set Oct. 31 as the deadline for achieving the 95-percent goal.


